While standing there and talking the cork worked out of the bottle and the fiery fluid, about eight ounces, ran all over the unfortunate boy and from the waist down he was burned in a most horrible manner.

As soon as the fluid struck the flesh the little fellow knew that he was in danger and asked to be taken to his father's office as soon as possible. He was taken to the Harde-man flats and the little sufferer given medical care.

Last night he suffered a great deal, and also today. The attending physicians say that he is in a critical condition, and may not pull through.

LEAGUE MEETING.

The Meeting Last Night Well Attended and Resolutions Passed.

From Tuesday's Daily:

Pursuant to the call that was made for a meeting of the Business League, quite a number of the members were present last night to discuss the proposition of asking the government to station one or more tobacco experts here next year to assist the farmers of this county in raising tobacco, and to teach them how to handle the crop after it is harvested.

Every one present expressed himself highly pleased with what the government has done in the way of demonstrations here, and also with the way the tobacco industry of this county is doing this year.

If the farmers of this county plant sufficient acreage next year, there is no doubt but what a packing house will be the next thing to be established here in connection with the tobacco industry. The Sentinel hopes that the farmers will become sufficiently interested to increase the acreage over that of last year, and to this end, if the farmers will send The Sentinel the number of acres they propose to cultivate in tobacco next year, it will be placed before the superintendent of the Texas tobacco experimental work.

The Sentinel has been assured that there will be a good market for the crop of 1906, and if all who plant next year are as successful as those who tried the experiment this year, they will find that growing tobacco is a very profitable crop.

The subject of having refreshments at future meetings of the League was discussed, and at the next meeting there will probably be something doing.

The meeting then adjourned to meet next Monday night.

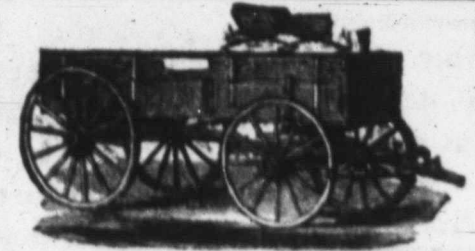
Want a Receiver

FACTORIES make cities.

THIS county should have at least one hundred acres in tobacco next year.

A MARKET will be guaranteed all who will plant tobacco next year.

REMEMBER that the valley has been designated as the manufacturing reservation, and it is factories that are needed in the valley.

THE greater Nacogdoches is not so far off in the dim and distant future. The fifteen thousand mark will be heralded to the world some day.

WHEN a man becomes attacked with the disease commonly called "graft" it is more fatal to his character than the bite of the yellow fever mosquito.

HUNT for happiness and let trouble alone—it's too easy to find. The man who is looking for trouble usually finds it, and sometimes in very large chunks.

NACOGDOCHES county within the next few years will be the center of a great tobacco growing industry, and this will be followed by tobacco factories.

THE business league has been taking a vacation. It will get busy pretty soon and then the people will hear that body in a way that will do the whole county good.

THE movers in the cotton warehouse scheme seem to have played over in the wrong end of the checker board, and the game seems to have become blocked.

THE thoughtless, unkind word, is the one that has caused many a heart ache. Cultivate the habit of speaking of the good qualities of your neighbor—you and the entire world will be the better if you will.

THE merchants of the town should attend the meeting of the swine breeders in this city tomorrow afternoon. The farmers are trying to get out of the rut and it is the duty of all the business men to assist them in the undertaking. The meeting will be held in the court house.

TOBACCO culture in Nacogdoches county last year proved to be a success, and next year the crop will be a better paying proposition because the quality of the weed as grown here has passed the experimental stage. It is now a known fact that the best domestic cigar filler grown in the United States can be grown here.

NACOGDOCHES county has an opportunity to secure the services of an expert from the department of agriculture for another year in order that the farmers may receive further instructions in tobacco culture. If the farmers and the business men desire to see the tobacco industry in this county made a success, it is time for them to say so.

GET BUSY RIGHT NOW.

The United States Department of Agriculture is ready to assist the farmers of Nacogdoches county in the matter of raising another crop of tobacco under the supervision of the government experts. The superintendent of the experimental department of Texas and an expert are in the city now for the purpose of ascertaining just what the farmers and the business men of Nacogdoches are willing to do in the matter and they will stay here several days and they will see the farmers and see just what encouragement the farmers will give the movement. In view of the fact that the farmers who tried the experiment last year all found it to be a profitable venture, The Sentinel is of the opinion that there should be at the least estimate one hundred acres planted by the farmers next year. The matter of raising a fine grade of tobacco is no longer an experiment—the government has demonstrated that the finest domestic cigar filler tobacco is raised in the county. The center of Melrose is in the center of Nacogdoches county. The merits of the weed grown in this part of the state. Numbers of farmers and truck growers near the city have stated to The Sentinel that it was their intention to engage in the culture of the weed. If they are still inclined to plant tobacco next year they should let the fact be known, as the superintendent, Mr. W. M. Hinson of the department of agriculture, is here for the purpose of ascertaining the probable acreage that will be planted here next year so that he can make his report to the department. The farmers must not procrastinate in this matter, but make it known now how much they intend to plant so that an expert can be stationed here to teach the farmer and the trucker how to grow and take care of a crop, and also how to handle the same at harvest time. Let every man in the town and the county who has the interest of the agricultural development of Nacogdoches county at heart get busy right now and keep on hammering until enough interest is taken in the culture of tobacco, so that the buyers of leaf tobacco will come to this market and buy the product, the same as the cotton buyers. The crop that was grown here this year, while the year was very unfavorable for the successful cultivation of the plant, proved a profitable venture and all were highly pleased with their experiment. These are not the one who have to be convinced, they have tried it and know what there is in the growing of tobacco. It is not expected that the farmer will devote his entire farm to growing tobacco, but it is expected that he will at least plant two or three acres as an experiment, and those who tried the crop as a money maker will no doubt double the acreage next year. But presumptions are not to be taken into consideration at this time. What Mr. Hinson

desires is cold facts as regards the acreage the farmers will plant. Let everyone interested constitute himself a committee of one to assist in gathering the data, so that the report can be sent in and the expert sent here at the earliest possible date and get his forces organized.

In a few more months excursion rates will be made on all the railroads to the old states and also low rates from the old states to Texas. Nacogdoches county has quite a lot of fine farming land that should be developed, and while in the old states invite the old friends to take advantage of the opportunity and visit Texas and see what a grand and glorious country this is.

IF SUCH a thing as graft exists at Austin the papers are powerless to expose the matter on account of the fact that they have no protection in the courts as to libel. It may be that it is the greater in office who opposes the passage of a good libel law is the reason why the legislature has not passed the law. The Sentinel stands ready to assist the cause along.

INDUSTRIAL opportunities in the south, and especially in Texas, are greater today than they were ever known before. Nacogdoches county alone can accommodate many hundred industries farmers and the town of Nacogdoches is an ideal location for factories of all kinds. There are several special advantages of the location of factories that the stranger perhaps would like to know. Here are to be found all the hardwoods of the south, the finest water supply in East Texas, fuel oil only twelve miles to the east and the coal fields of Timpson less than thirty miles away. By locating here the long haul of fuel is cut off and then the raw material is here in unlimited quantities. Two trunk lines of railroads cross here. One running east and west and the other north and south.

THERE should be no hesitancy on the part of the farmers and truckers of this county in engaging in the growing of tobacco. The government selected this place for experimental purposes and the experiments were successful and the name of Nacogdoches is now connected with the world as the place where the finest cigar filler tobacco is grown. While there are other localities in Eastern Texas where a good quality of leaf is grown yet when the finished product is on the market, the Nacogdoches grown tobacco always takes first place. If the soil here had never been tried, The Sentinel would advise the farmers, and others; who are in a position to grow tobacco, to go slow, but on the other hand the soils have been tested and success is assured the grower who understands growing and handling the weed will find it to be a money crop.

In the matter of graft it can be stated that it has been found to exist even in some of the counties of this state. Liberal commissions have been paid to some of the officials for "their influence" in making contracts with the several counties, if the reports as published in some of the papers are true. Roll top desks, typewriters, office chairs, and even pocket knives, have been received and accepted "for an appreciation of courtesies extended."

THE farmers last year held their cotton until they made the markets come to ten cents, and if they are well organized this year they will get eleven cents for the fleecy staple. Here's trusting that they will succeed in their undertaking. If ever there was a class of working people who have been imposed upon in past years it has been the farmers of the south. Millions have been made in the speculation on the products of the farm, and if the farmers can organize themselves into an association sufficiently strong as to control the price of the cotton market The Sentinel stands ready to assist the cause along.

THE state president of the Farmers Union has issued a call for all the county Unions to hold meetings next Saturday for the purpose of taking up the matter of demanding 11 cents for the cotton crop of this season. The government report of the number of commercial bales of this year's crop up to the first of September shows a decrease of about 20 per cent compared to the report of the crop on the same date last year. If the same conditions prevail all over the cotton growing states, there is no reason why cotton should not be worth 11 cents. In this part of the state the crop is painfully short, and the farmers will have to get the price asked for their product or there will be many of the best farmers in the county in the hole next year. The Sentinel hopes that they will be able to hold their cotton until they get a fair price for their crop.

THE laws of Texas are all good, when properly administered and before criticizing the actions of the officers it would be well for the critics to post themselves regarding the law in certain offenses before passing their judgment on the actions of a court or the officials. Only a few days ago, an arrest made in this city wherein the accused was charged with a felony. He was a very poor man and a stranger besides. The officers of the court placed his bond at a very nominal figure, and it was some time before the man could get the required number of signatures to the bond. In time, however, a good and sufficient bond was made and the accused given his liberty pending the action of the grand jury. Now then comes the critics and they are making a noise about the nominal bond, and say that the officers have failed in their duty in placing the bond at the figure at which it was placed. The Sentinel

has made an investigation, and finds that the revised statutes of the State of Texas among other good things provides that the defendant's ability to make a good and sufficient bond shall always be taken into consideration. That an exorbitant bond is unlawful. The case in question and the bond that the stranger was required to give are all in compliance with the laws of the state. If the bond had been placed at a higher figure, it would have been equivalent to "remanded to jail without bail."

At The County Poor Farm.

A trip to the county poor farm will convince the knocker of the farm that the commissioners of the county did a good thing when they decided to purchase a farm upon which to work the county convicts. The superintendent of the farm has it in excellent condition and the crops that were raised their this year will more than pay the running expenses, and yet there will be a surplus to start off the farm with, another year.

THE finest crop of peanuts ever raised in Texas or the south has been harvested and the hay from the vines will be sufficient for all the stock on the farm. The peanuts will be used to fatten the hogs and the superintendent says that he will raise enough meat to supply the wants of the farm. Then they will have one of the finest crops of sweet potatoes in the county and there will be potatoes on the market from the farm. The corn crop is way above the average of the corn crops of the county. Taking all things into consideration the people should be proud of the farm and the manner in which he has handled it.

ONE good thing the superintendent has done this summer, and that is he has built some of the finest road beds in Texas. For three miles he has made a road way from the far corner of the farm that is as good as some of the streets in the cities of the state. This was done when it was too wet to work in the fields, and at times when the hands were up with their work. In another year he will have the road built into the city, and it will then be one of the principle drive-ways in the county for those who find pleasure in driving over good roads.

District Court.

THE fall term of the Nacogdoches district court opened Monday morning. All the officers of the court were present, and quite a number of visiting attorneys are also here.

THE docket is very heavy and if the grand jury follows the instructions of the judge in making a thorough investigation of all crimes in the county, there will probably be something doing in bringing the wrong doers to justice.

LEE Martin and W. A. Thruston of Attoyac, passed through the city today enroute to Huntsville, where they will attend the Sam Houston Normal. This is the third year for Mr. Martin in that school while it will be the first for Mr. Thruston.

A GOOD SUGGESTION.

Movement to Organize the Men and Women of the Republic.

The following letter was given to The Sentinel for publication, and it explains itself:

El Paso, Tex., Sept. 9, 1905.
Giles B. Crain, Esq.,
Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Giles—I have been thinking it would be a good idea for us to get up an organization of men and women who were born during the Republic of Texas, that is, between the 13th of November, 1835 and the 29th of December, 1845. I use these dates for the reason that while Texas did not declare her independence until the 2nd of March, 1836, her delegates met in consultation in November 1835 at San Felipe de Austin and adopted a plan and powers of provisional government on November 13, 1835.

I take it that there are in our section of the State more Americans who were born at that period than anywhere else in the Republic and write you trusting that you will agree with me in this matter, and to get suggestions from you as to how we will procure the names those who are born at that time with the organization of Melrose is in met here in the two men who were the Republic an Center. I was born in 1833. I cannot at this moment recall with certainty any men in Nacogdoches county who were born in the Republic except you and myself and Fritz Hoya and Tille Hoya.

Please write me about this matter and mention such persons as come within this designation as you may remember, with their addresses. Very truly your friend,
Peyton F. Edwards.

The Sentinel has made some inquiry as to who were born in this part of the Republic of Texas during the dates mentioned in Judge Edward's letter, and the following names have been suggested: T. J. Hill, Jno. E. Christian, W. J. Crossland, J. J. Millard, J. J. Lewis and J. W. Lewis.

There are others here who were born during the ten years between 1835 and 1845, and it they will send their names to Capt. G. B. Crain, Nacogdoches or to The Sentinel, expressing their views upon the subject of such an organization, the same will be appreciated.

READERS of The Sentinel in the old states are invited to write to the paper and ask questions about this country. These letters will not be published, but a prompt answer will be returned giving information about Nacogdoches county and what the county has to offer in the way of special inducements to the home seeker.

Report of County Institute.

The Nacogdoches County Institute met Saturday, Sept. 16th at the High School building in Nacogdoches, for the purpose of organizing and laying out a plan of work in conformity with the new laws of the state in regard to institute work, etc.

The following numbers on the program were discussed and each solicited considerable interest: Methods of Teaching Phonics, lead by S. B. Hand.

In Teachers' Examinations, should there be a double standard of grading one for the white and one for the negro? lead by G. W. Tillery and G. B. Layton, followed by general discussion. This question was sprung by the appearance of a statement sometime since purporting to have come from the State Board of Education in which it was suggested that there might be some way devised in which the "better class of negroes" could get certificates "honorably" although they fail in present requirements.

The next subjects was, Resolved, that it is the best interest of the teachers and schools of the county to have one institute of five days instead of four institutes of two days each.

It was found to be the unanimous opinion of all, that four institutes were better.

The Institute next proceeded to permanent organization and elected the following officers for the ensuing year:

The County Supt. J. A. Spears, outlined his plan of institute work for the future which was to divide the county into three or four sections with a local institute in each, and supplement these by as many as four general, or County Institutes, at the county seat during the year. This plan was unanimously approved of.

The Institute adjourned at 4 o'clock p. m. subject to the call of County Supt.
