SAVE MONEY IN MARCH.

Texas Treasury Warrants Will Soon Be Worth Par.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 27.—State Health Officer Tabor has filed a deficiency certificate with the governor for \$15,000. This is to cover quarantine expense in keeping yellow fever out of the state. When the fever first broke out in New Orleans, a deficiency certificate calling for \$10,000 was issued by the governor, and that with the new certificate, shows that the expense of quarantine has been less than \$25,000.

The blind institute will call on the governor for a good sized deficiency certificate early in the new year, which shows that the appropriations made by the last legislature

for this institute for this year, are falling short early.

As the general revenue will have plenty of money by March, it is believed that the state's paper will be cashed for only a slight discount, but at the same time the next legislature will be called upon to make good the various deficiencies.

He Will Leave for the National Capital Tomorrow Evening.

Hon. M. L. Brooks, congressman-elect from the Second congressional district, came in from San Augustine last evening and will remain in the city until tomorrow evening, when he will leave for Washington to be present at the opening of congress on Monday, December 4.

Mr. Brooks states that the record in the Houston-Brooks contest has been made up for both sides and forwarded to Washington and an effort will be made to secure an early hearing before the proper committee of the house.

CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS.

President Roosevelt Will Recommend Corrective Legislation

Chicago, Nov. 27.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Washington, D. C., says: probably the most tangible result of the insurance investigation in New York will be a strong effort made to pass some sort of corrupt practices act so as to require publicity for all expenditures and contributions for federal elections throughout the country.

Within a few days Chairman Cortelyou of the republican national committee will have ready a complete list of all contributions made through him in the last national campaign.

As a result of the revelations in New York, the postmaster general, after consultation with the president, is preparing to show up his books and he probably will go on record as favoring some sort of law or a political custom which will prevent reception of political contributions from corporations.

The president will take up the same matter in his message and probably will urge such action by congress as will put a stop to the unfairness of soliciting and accepting contributions from corporations without a direct vote of all stockholders.

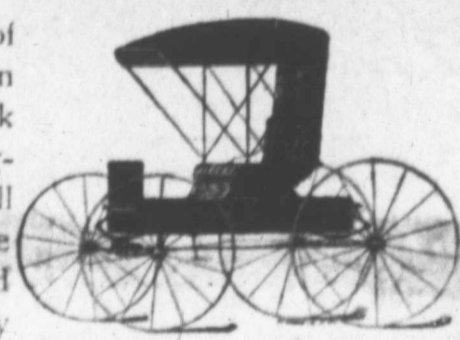

THAT new jail and court house proposition was passed up by the commissioners court.

DON'T expect too much of your newspaper man unless you happen to be one of the best patrons of the paper.

WITH the policy holders in the old line insurance companies who reside in Texas, Lawson seems to be the man of the hour.

THE Center papers are responsible for the statement that Judge Perkins will be a candidate for congress two years hence.

THE latest estimates put the Jewish population of the United States at between 1,250,000 and 1,500,000. It is claimed that there are 600,000 in the city of New York.

THE schools of Nacogdoches are unexcelled, and there are many other inducements here for homeseekers. Good health, a fine climate, and a good living for every man will work for it.

WHAT the people want is better roads in the country. The country people are some of the big tax payers and they are entitled to good roads. They should ask for this and demand that they get it.

VISITING teachers to Nacogdoches who have investigated the system of which the schools of this city are run, say it is the best in Texas. That's saying a big lot, yet they should know what they are talking about.

THE people of Nacogdoches county are in good shape this year. A very fair corn crop, a fine lot of hogs and beef cattle, and quite a lot of sweet and Irish potatoes, not to say anything about the finest lot of ribbon cane syrup ever made in the country.

REPORTS from Washington are to the effect that the Government may have an Official Gazette, which will be published daily. The Commission is considering the advisability of recommending its establishment to print all departmental orders and save waste by duplication.

THE law makers will have to hurry if they patch up the broken section of the Terrell election law in time for it to be of service at the next election. As it is of but very little use and the sooner Governor Lanham calls the boys together the sooner the people will feel at ease on all important matters of election.

TAX payers in Nacogdoches county this year are a little slow in coming in. Remember that next year is election year and that to have the privilege of voting at any of the elections, it is necessary to have your poll tax receipt. Better pay up the next time you are in town. Don't put the matter off until it is too late.

ONE YEAR'S ADVERSITY.

Because a section of the state happens to have a bad crop year once in a while, is no reason for having a case of cold feet, and selling out at a great sacrifice and going to a new section where conditions happened to be more favorable. Recently a number of East Texas farmers have sold their good homes and moved to the west, thinking that their fortunes would be better than here. On this subject, the following words of wisdom from the Dallas News is reproduced for the benefit of those who are thinking of making a move from East Texas: "Leaving aside all disputes as to which section of Texas is preferable as a place of residence, it must be conceded that the 'mover' is ordinarily the least successful unit of the population. Three 'moves' are said to be equal to one 'burnout.'" Some years Western Texas is more prosperous than Eastern Texas, and some years Eastern Texas is quite preferable to Western Texas. The man who chooses his location after careful consideration, and stands to his guns, with confidence in himself and pride in his own efforts, is the man who wins the largest measure of success in any portion of any state. The rainfall in Northern and Eastern Texas has been phenomenal this year. It is said that seventy-two inches—six feet—of water fell in Red River country during the seven months of 1905. The result is downed crops, wasted fields and dispirited farmers. But the man who cannot stand one year's adversity without the loss to the "sweetness and light" vouchsafed him by the Creator ought to move to Russia and get up against the real thing.

KING COTTON has his crown on straight these days, and his loyal subjects are in holiday mood. The ginners' report showing something less than seven and a half million bales, when the estimates were around eight million bales, sent prices skyrocketing in the direction of the prediction of the Southern Cotton Growers' Association that cotton would go to 15 cents. On the 21st inst. cotton made a leap of 102 points, or a fraction over \$5 a bale, in one and a half hours. It is said that Harvie Jordan and his associate bulls cleaned up a profit of \$8,000,000. The cotton producer, however, will not complain at that, since the extraordinary leap in the price of the staple has added \$50,000,000 to the value of the total year's crop.—Current Issue.

If the population of the city increases within the next few years as it has the past two, the trustees of the Nacogdoches schools will have to provide more school buildings. In the High school building there are some six hundred or more pupils and that is about the limit. The trustees of the Nacogdoches University intend to repair the old University building, but this will only accommodate the schools for a few more years. The Sen-

tinel has always said that Nacogdoches as a town "is the best what is" and from the way people are moving here the paper is inclined to believe that there are others who are thinking the same thing.

THE Southern Cotton Growers Association proposes to inaugurate a movement to get the farmers of the cotton growing states to hold at least three million bales of the crop this year for better prices than are prevailing at present.

THE commissioners court has taken no action on the matter of providing the county with a new jail, as was suggested by the last grand jury. The county will have to send all prisoners in the present thing used as a jail, to other counties which will soon become rather burdensome.

THE Southern Cotton Growers association is agitating the matter of cutting the cotton acreage of next year deeper than it was cut this year. The officers of the association are of the opinion that the farmers of the south should have at least 12 cents the year around, and The Sentinel hopes that they will get the price.

THE East Texas farmer who planted a small patch of ribbon cane, an acre or two in sweet potatoes, and made anything like a half a corn crop, need have no fears of going hungry this winter, but then who ever heard of an East Texas farmer having to go hungry. It ever there was a spot of earth where the Lord smiles twelve months in the year that spot is East Texas. By looking at the map the stranger will see that Nacogdoches county is very near the geographical center of this chosen section of the south where the people are always happy and have plenty to eat and then have some of the good things for sale.

THERE is entirely too much money spent on the roads of this county, and but very little good resulting from what is spent for the half way the roads are worked, and the bridges repaired. Every session of the commissioners court there is a long string of accounts and they are all for the road and bridge account. The Sentinel believes that if the county would employ a county road superintendent and let the county superintendent work in conjunction with the precinct road overseers, that the county would get better service. The city of Nacogdoches for a long time depended upon the street and bridge committee to look after the affairs of this department. The city finally employed J. J. Ramey as street commissioner and paying him a straight salary, and it is a noticeable fact that the streets are in better shape than they have ever been before, and the street commissioner instead of being an expense to the city has made money for the street and bridge fund of Nacogdoches. The county could do as well if not better.

DOTS FROM DEL RIO.

Great Sport For Hunters in Old Mexico.

Del Rio, Tex., Nov. 20.—I arrived at this place several days ago, but found it too muddy to do much looking around and it has been raining at intervals until the mud is worse than it was when I came. It rained all day yesterday and the whole country is a sea of mud, consequently I cannot make my report on Del Rio at this writing.

The rain yesterday busted up a bull fight just across the river (Rio Grande) over in Old Mexico, at the same time spoiling my best opportunity to witness one of these brutal and heathenish exhibitions. I wasn't sorry much that it rained, for I never felt like I wanted to see a bull fight, yet I had made up my mind to take this one in, it being so close at hand and practically no expense.

I have found lots of good people here whom I knew in East Texas. The leading general merchandise store is owned by Norvell & March Bros., and one of the prettiest little drug stores west of San Antonio is the property of Dr. J. F. Merritt. All of these people are from Rusk county and their names are prominent in East Texas business circles. I have met many other people here from that section of country, some of them from Nacogdoches county.

Dr. S. L. Boren, of Pano-la county, son of Judge Tom E. Boren, of Carthage, is a prominent young physician here, enjoying a lucrative practice.

Will Irby, of Rusk county, well known to many of the young people of Nacogdoches has a position in Merritt's drug store.

This is a fine little town and is chuck full of hustle and enterprise. It is the "Nacogdoches" of this part of the country and is landing some big enterprises. The finest thing in prospect is the Orient Railroad, which is heading this way from San Antonio. If it comes it will make Del Rio a port of entry, which would naturally be followed by a large government building, etc.

It is only about two miles to Old Mexico, which may be reached by ferrying across the Rio Grande. I have not been down to the river yet. In fact the mud has kept me in narrow confines and I have contented myself with looting around the print shops and Merritt's drug store.

I stopped six hours in Houston on my way out here. I never saw such a jam of people in my life. It was almost impossible to make my way along the side walk from the Central depot to the Rice hotel and back. The great throngs of people to be seen at all these big fairs, shows, etc., is (to use the Frenchman's expression) "one grand contradiction" to the great cry of hard times. There is lots of prosperity in the country yet.

EVERY citizen of Nacogdoches is proud of the splendid schools of this city.

THE candidates will soon let the dear people know how anxious they are to serve their country.

WHAT'S the use of leaving East Texas to find a better farming country. Such a thing would be impossible.

IN writing to your old friends about Nacogdoches, tell them something about the splendid school system of this city.

RUMORS are to the effect that Nacogdoches county will have a good system of county roads at the close of next year.

MAKE no rash promises to the candidates. There will be a number in the field and there will be some good material to select from.

IT'S a settled fact that there is not a man in the county but what could do something in the way of placing the advantages of this county before the public.

NACOGDOCHES is a good old town to live in, and if you are looking for a good place to locate and send your children to school pay Nacogdoches a visit before locating elsewhere.

DURING the winter evenings it would be a good idea for the fruit and truck growers to figure on erecting a canning factory here to take care of the large surplus fruit and vegetables.

THOSE who are in a position to know what they are talking about say that the cotton market will be touching the 15c mark by Christmas. The Sentinel hopes that the report is true.

ATTORNEY GENERAL MOODY has filed a reply to the packers' claim that they had been promised immunity by Commissioner Garfield. The attorney general denies that any such assurance was given.

THE world owes every man a living, provided he will work for what he gets, and for an every place to get work and a good living. East Texas is about the best proposition on the map. Nacogdoches county is near the geographical center. Make a note of this.

WELL the boll weevil and Southern Cotton Growers' association, and the Farmers Union have succeeded in convincing the cotton speculators that the cotton crop this year will be less than ten million bales, and the prices have advanced, and are advancing every day. Cotton will be worth something at the close of the season.

THE 15 CENT CAMPAIGN.

"With producer and consumer now fully aware that practically famine conditions are destined to prevail before another crop of American cotton can be available, there is nothing at all remarkable in the prompt and sweeping response Mr. Jordan has had to his call for pledges to hold cotton for 15 cents," is the way an observant cotton man puts the case. Mr. Jordan, in a published interview asserts that farmers all over the south are sending in pledges by mail and by wire so fast that his clerical force in the Atlanta office of the Southern Cotton Association has fallen behind in its work of counting and assorting them, and additional clerks has to be employed. Originally Mr. Jordan expected to secure these pledges through the personal solicitations of canvassers to be put out from the various state headquarters and from Atlanta, but before these canvassers could be sent to the field the mails and the telegraph had brought pledges for hundreds of thousands of bales and still they come. This is but one of the many evidences of the value to the farmer of organization. For many years the spinners profited immensely through concert of action and gained advantages over the unorganized farmers which they cannot enjoy under present day conditions.

THE commissioners are getting tired of the manner in which the road and bridge funds are spent and in a short time some of the leading members of the commissioners court will make their views on the subject of good roads known through the press of the county.

THE county commissioners should investigate the roads of some of the counties in the state where bonds have been issued for the purpose of building good roads. The farmers of this county are entitled to have good roads and they should see that they get them.

AN Associated Press dispatch from Havana, Cuba, states that the Cuban government can take care of the troubles in the Isle of Pines and that it will not be necessary for the Washington authorities to send war vessels to maintain order.

WITH such an array of fruit and truck land in the vicinity of Nacogdoches in a high state of cultivation, it appears to The Sentinel that a Fruit and Vegetable Carnival should be held here next year. The horticulturists and the truckers of the county are invited to make their views known through The Sentinel on this subject.

PERHAPS the boll weevil destroyed the plans for the Nacogdoches cotton mill. If such is the case there are other enterprises which would do well here. One is a canning factory which should be erected in time to take care of the fruit crop next year. A canning factory will not take much capital to operate, and

at the same time will furnish a good market to the truck grower for surplus fruit and vegetables. The Nacogdoches Fruit and Truck Growers' association should look into the matter of a canning factory.

COTTON continues to advance in price. While there is not much more cotton in the hands of the farmers, yet what surplus there may be on hand will bring good prices.

ANOTHER strike is on in Russia, Witte complains that he has not received proper support from the reform elements, there are rumors that a "false emperor" has made his appearance and has obtained a large following, and a generally disturbed condition prevails.

A SMALL canning factory would be a good thing for the fruit and truck growers of Nacogdoches county. Not one of the expensive kind, but just an ordinary canning plant. The Sentinel believes that enough stock could be secured from the members of the truck growers' association in Nacogdoches to build and equip it.

NACOGDOCHES should have better roads, even if a special law has to be enacted, and a bond issue voted to raise the funds. The farmers of this county are entitled to have good roads to haul their produce to market, and the commissioners should see that proper steps are taken to give the county the desired relief in this direction.

A STENOGRAPHER, formerly employed in Chicago by the Armour Packing company, has been arrested on the charge that he attempted to blackmail officers of the company. It is alleged that this stenographer secured several letters from the company's files, and threatened to deliver them to the federal authorities unless paid the sum of \$40,000.

MISS MYRTIE LOGGINS of Conroe, has purchased the San Augustine Vidette. Miss Loggins is an experienced newspaper woman and will give the readers of the Vidette a full dollar's worth of reading every year. The Sentinel extends the right hand of fellowship to Miss Loggins and trusts that she will find her stay in the Red Land City a profitable one.

MR. LAWSON the man who exposed the methods of the old line insurance companies may have control of the New York Life and the Mutual at the next election. The Texas policy holders are willing that he should, according to the sentiment at the San Antonio convention of the policy holders. If he should succeed in getting control of the big companies, there will be something doing in the way of making reductions in salaries, and cutting down expenses in general. Lawson may be rated as a fool, but so far he has played a very smooth game and has enlisted the sympathies of the American people, which means he has achieved a great victory.

WHILE IN HOUSTON.

A. Seale, a prominent citizen and business man of Nacogdoches, came in last night and is autographed at the Rice, where he was seen by a representative of The Post.

"My section of the country," said Mr. Seale, "is rapidly coming to the front as one of the best fruit and truck growing sections of East Texas. For a long series of years the farmers believed that they could not raise anything except cotton as a money crop and the result was that the county grew poorer all the time.

"Finally, a few years ago the idea of trying diversification in the way of fruit and truck raising was taken up, and from the first I might say that it has been a success with those farmers who have tried it in the right way. Of course there are many instances in which the diversification idea has not met with success, but it was due mainly to the fact that the people who tried it and gave it up did not possess sufficient patience or else did not try in the right way, as I have said.

"There is every indication to believe that at an early date oil in great quantities will be found in Nacogdoches county, and, in fact, as I stated in an interview in The Post more than a year ago, there is already an abundance of oil in the field, but from some cause it has been tied up in some mysterious way that no one seems to understand.

"The Nacogdoches South-eastern railway is now in operation for a distance of twelve miles out of Nacogdoches and regular passenger trains are run daily from Nacogdoches to Woden, a point in the center of a splendid agricultural and timbered section."

Mr. Seale will be in Houston several days attending to matters of business importance, as well as seeing the wonderful spirit of progress which is manifest on every hand.—Houston Post.

While the cotton failed to yield as largely as expected in East Texas, The Nacogdoches Sentinel calls attention to the fact that the farmers of that county are independent of the situation. It says: "While the cotton crop may be a very short article in Nacogdoches county this year, there is one thing to a dead moral certainty, and that is, there is plenty of corn, hogs, and ribbon cane syrup to do the thrifty farmers for the next twelve months. The farmers of Nacogdoches county do not have to go hungry." All of which goes to show that in diversification lies the salvation of the Texas farmer.—Houston Post.

THERE may be something doing in the Nacogdoches oil field in a few more months. There is a movement on foot to put in a demonstration well and The Sentinel is informed that the promoters are meeting with fairly good success. This will set the outside world at ease as to the all important matter of there being oil in paying quantities in Nacogdoches county.

Stock Law Election Proclamation.

Whereas the commissioners' court of Nacogdoches county, Texas, on the 14th day of November, 1905, granted a petition duly and legally signed and filed in said court asking that an election be ordered by said court to determine whether or not hogs, sheep or goats shall be permitted to run at large in a subdivision of Nacogdoches county described in said petition and whereas said court ordered that an election be held on the 30th day of December, 1905, to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large in the following described territory beginning: At a point in front of B. L. Melton's residence where the Nacogdoches and Garrison road crosses the mud creek. Thence south westerly with said Garrison and Nacogdoches road to a point where W. L. Campbell's north boundary line crosses the said Garrison and Nacogdoches road. Thence in an eastwardly direction with said Campbell's north boundary line to the west branch of the Carrisso bayou. Thence continuing in an eastwardly direction to the east branch of Carrisso bayou to a point where the Appleby and Shady Grove road crosses said east branch of the Carrisso bayou. Thence eastwardly on a direct line to Will Cox's former residence on the lower Nacogdoches Venice and Logansport road. Thence up said road toward Venice to where said road crosses the Naconiche creek. Thence up said Naconiche creek to a point where Mud creek empties in. Thence up said Mud creek to the place of beginning.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and county and who are also freeholders in Nacogdoches county, and resident citizens of said subdivision are entitled to vote in said election. B. L. Melton is appointed

Presiding Judge of said election, and O. D. Kerr and W. J. Shepherd as assistant Judges, who shall appoint two clerks to assist them in holding the same. The Judges of said election shall within ten days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the County Judge.

BIG LAND SUIT.

Five Leagues in Cherokee and Nacogdoches Counties Under Litigation.

Tyler, Texas, Nov. 24.—Hon. H. G. Lane, a well known attorney of Fort Worth, passed through Tyler en route to Cherokee and Nacogdoches counties to investigate some land matters.

Mr. Lane is representing the defendants in a land suit now pending in the federal court sitting at Tyler, and the enormous amount of land involved is five leagues, being situated in Nacogdoches and Cherokee counties. The suit has been on the federal court docket for about three years, being postponed from time to time, and the now dissolved law firm of Duncan & Jones are counsel for the plaintiff. The style of the suit is Allen vs. Dexter and there is likelihood that a trial will be had at the February term of the court in Tyler.

Mr. Lane expects to become better equipped to represent his client after making the investigations on this trip.

AN EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

Fifteen Acres to be Planted in Cotton, Forage Crops, Etc.

We wish about fifteen acres for this farm, and will devote five acres to cotton, five to corn, and the balance to forage crops, cow peas, pea-nuts, etc. I will call on you when I come to Nacogdoches, which will be in the near future, and explain more in detail as to the work. If you or some good farmer near the place would like to undertake this work I would be glad to make arrangements with you.
