VERY INDIFFERENT.

There is one thing quite sure, and that is that the United States Agricultural Department will not place tobacco experts in this county another year unless the farmers, and others interested in growing tobacco, show a little more enthusiasm within the next few weeks than they have shown in the past. Every paper in the county has been talking on the subject of tobacco growing since the crop was harvested last year; the results of the farmers who kept a record of their crop and as published in The Sentinel has not only been reproduced and commented upon by papers in this section but in the state papers. All were of the opinion that the records as were printed were highly flattering, and called the attention of the farmers in their section of the state to the fact that the tobacco of East Texas was the coming crop, and advised their readers to get in position to do a little experimenting on their own account. The expert in charge of the experiment here this year informs The Sentinel that there has been but a small acreage pledged this season, and not half as much as was planted in tobacco last year. This indifference on the part of the farmers will ultimately cause the work of demonstrating the adaptability of the soil and the climate here to the successful cultivation of tobacco to be abandoned. The Sentinel may be mistaken, and the farmers may know what is best for them to do in the matter, but the paper is of the opinion that they are letting a golden opportunity pass through their fingers.

A Note of Warning.

Tyler, Texas, Feb. 9, 1906.

I want to say to some people in Nacogdoches County that I am aware of the fact that the local option law is being violated by many persons and in every instance the revenue law is violated unless the person has liquor dealers license, the proof to convict for violating the local option law is sufficient to convict for violating the revenue law. Col. Houston, the marshal is desirous of seeing all the Federal laws enforced, particularly the revenue law and more particularly in local option counties. I am in favor of all laws being enforced and did all I could to enforce the local option law when I was sheriff as I understood it, but become discouraged when I saw so many men turned loose that I had helped to bring before the bar of justice but now I occupy a different position and want to give the whiskey peddler warning that hereafter I will see that every man is presented to the Federal Court when I have proof for selling whiskey without the revenue license. I have some of you spotted now. You might think it harsh to be punished in the Federal Court for the same transaction that you was punished in the County for, but when you violate the local option law by selling whiskey, you violate the revenue law unless you have liquor dealers' license. Now if you get caught don't blame me, but take my advice now and quit. It is wrong to violate any law, and it is unprofitable to bootleg whiskey and degrading to any ones character that will indulge in it, and last but not least you are subjecting your self to be punished in both state and federal courts. If any one wants whiskey he has a right to buy it but he can always get it in a legal way. A word to the wise is sufficient.

HERE is a little special which appeared in the Galveston News of last Thursday that is a clincher. It is produced in full: A hearing which will probably attract people from all parts of the country will be begun by the House Judiciary Committee next Wednesday, the bill being that introduced by Mr. Littlefield of Maine to forbid interstate traffic in liquor when the destination is a point within a prohibition district. The measure has the support of the Prohibitionists of the country, since its purpose is to make local option laws effective. A determined effort will be made to put the measure through Congress during this session.

CONTRACTS have been signed at Abilene between citizens in obtaining railway connections and officials of the new Central Railroad covering construction of a line from Abilene north to Anson and Stamford. The terms of the contract call for a bonus of \$35,000, depot grounds, and right of way to the Clear Fork. The survey has been completed and the line will be finished within a year.

DIVERSIFICATION rotating of crops is the only salvation for the Southern farmer. Permanent independence can only be enjoyed by the Southern farmer by diversifying his crops. It is the only way in which he can hope to get a fair price for all the products of his farm. In fact, he must learn that the farm which does not furnish all the food supplies necessary to the support of the family and all on the place is a rank failure, no matter how successful the farmer may be in making money. What the farmer can grow, and does not, but buys, is surely a poor way to run a farm, and until he changes this he can never be the independent man God intended him to be.—Ex.

TAKE a little time and talk to the strangers when they arrive in Nacogdoches on a little "prospecting trip" and don't leave them entirely in the hands of the real estate dealer. The real estate dealer will tell them of what there is here, but the story told by one who has no interest in the real estate business, will be given greater consideration.

THE good roads proposition is something that every citizen in the county is interested in. The commissioners court will meet on next Monday, and that body should discuss the best methods of giving this county the roads it needs.

An injunction somewhat out of the ordinary has been granted by Judge Montross, of Greenville. The Santa Fe railway was plaintiff and J. W. Mulky, living near Celeste, also in Hunt county, was defendant. At the time the road was built through his farm, a road was recognized by the company and a crossing put in. Later they took up the crossing and stopped up the road. Mulky sued them in a justice court and obtained judgment for \$20, the amount preventing an appeal. Soon afterward he filed a second suit and again recovered judgment for \$20. The road was in a hole again. To prevent further suits which Mulky was threatening to file on the ground that closing of the road was continuing damage, the company sued for an injunction, and for the time being do more suits will be filed. Mulky may appeal.

THE Nacogdoches Fruit and Truck Growers' association should meet often and keep enthusiasm at "fever heat". This will be one the years, when the needs of thorough organization will be necessary.

THE news now comes that the double tracking of the railroad across the isthmus of Panama is progressing rapidly and it is expected that both tracks will be ready for service some time in July.

NACOGDOCHES county farmers should be the happiest people on earth. Here the people can come pretty near living out of doors 365 days in every year. Good health, good water, a fine lot of people and good schools are some of the good things that the country people enjoy in East Texas. One of the nicest things about this section of the state is that all the good farming lands here are not controlled by corporations, and the thrifty farmer can come here and get choice farming lands for just about what many farmers in the northern part of the state have to pay the landlords there in annual rentals.

MARCH TERM DISTRICT COURT.

Order of Business as it Appears Upon Minutes of the Court.

No agreement between parties or their counsel to set cases beyond the time set apart for the docket on which the case belongs will be recognized by the court unless made with the consent of the court specitly given.

Divorce suits will be heard on Friday and Saturday of the first week, and at no other time during the term unless by special order made when the case is reached for trial."

The local option question may not be an issue in the county campaign, but some of the candidates think so.

The petition to the commissioners court asking for a local option election bears the signatures of 256 voters.

Good roads through the county will do more to enhance the values of a county than most anything that could be suggested.

NACOGDOCHES county needs better roads, and should have them even if the commissioners court has to place a proposition before the people to build the roads by taxation.

TALK up the cotton mill proposition, and the mill will be a certainty. This is something the Farmers' Union could discuss with profit to themselves and the county in general.

The Farmers' Union will hold a state meeting in Dallas on the sixth of March and it is expected that they will adopt measures that will put the Union on a better financial basis and place it where it will do more good for the farmer than in the past.

THERE seems to be a dissatisfaction on the part of republicans in this state over the manner in which the patronage is dished out to the place hunters at the dictation of one man. Already rumblings have been heard and it will probably be shown by the vote when the next presidential election year comes that the people of Texas, even if they are republicans will repudiate the system of bossism in the matter of distributing places to the rank and file of the party.

SEVERAL Nacogdoches county candidates have announced for re election, stating that they believe in a two term system for county office, therefore if they are successful in the ensuing election that they will not suffer their names to be placed before the people for a third term. In many counties in the state a two term is all that a man wants, believing that there are other good men in the county who are entitled to public office, and the rule is becoming popular in those counties.

Good roads are one thing that very one in town or country ought to be interested in. Money spent in permanent improvements on the roads in and about this country will do more to cough up the country and build up the town than anything else. Laxation of the present time. The money spent for good roads could not be charged up to the expense for it would really be an investment that would pay for itself. Two dollars in land value where only one dollar was spent on the road. It is a betterment of the interest in the roads.—Big Sandy once Box 217, L.

CUT OUT THE SYSTEM.

There has been all kinds of reforms suggested in the past relative to giving the state better service at the hands of the officials, and at the same time bring in greater revenue to the state treasury. The Sentinel believes that to place every official in the state on a straight salary would bring about good results. Beginning with the constable of the precincts and going on up the roster of officials, pay each one a salary. The fees collected in excess of the salary to be paid into the general funds of the state. This system would cut down the income of some of the officials, and would raise the income of others, but in the long run would be the means of giving the state better officers in some of the remote precincts and counties than under the fee system. The sheriff should be paid a salary, and all necessary traveling expenses while running down criminals. The present system of fees is a hardship on some of the sheriffs of this state. In Nacogdoches county the sheriff recently made a trip over the country for a criminal and his actual expenses were \$55.20 and his fees will amount to about \$20. If there was some system by which the sheriffs were given assurance that their expenses would be paid when out on the road there would be fewer criminals at large. Cut out the fee system and put every county official on a salary, and the excess fees collected in some counties would soon place a surplus on the salary account page.

WHAT WILL THE HARVEST BE?

The report that Cyclone Davis is to become a democrat is not surprising, but, coupled with the statement that Dr. Cranfill will join him in leading 6000 prohibitionists into the democratic course, if these 6000 members of an anti-democratic party have become democrats, there is no reason why they should not affiliate with the organization, but their coming is credited to a determination to swing the democratic party into the prohibition camp and make it the means of carrying out the prohibition policy of extreme sumptuary legislation. Democracy and prohibition are as far apart as are the poles. Their principles are diametrically opposite. But if the prohibitionists choose to enter the democratic primaries, there isn't any way to deter them. Such is the effect of the enactment of a law controlling primary elections. The Terrell election law takes the management of party affairs away from democrats and turns the party over to any set of malcontents that may have designs upon it. The republicans, if they do desire, can do as the prohibitionists are said to have determined to do, though they may refrain because of their connection with the dominant national party, but the socialists and other political sects, which are practically outlawed by the Terrell act, are encouraged to participate in the democratic primaries. What the end will be is hard to conceive, but its contemplation

affords little consolation to genuine democrats.—Waco Times Herald.

The American farmer is receiving more attention now than he has ever received. Even the government is paying him that attention he has always deserved, and never before had bestowed upon him! Every class of business is coming to recognize the farmer as the mainstay of the country—the man who produces the necessities of life, and that which makes the country prosperous. There is some talk of extending the branches of the agricultural Department, so as to embrace several new lines of experimentation in the production of crops, the care of soil, etc. It is a good thing. There should be more attention paid to these matters, and more education along these lines. The farmer is the man upon whom we all depend. To help his condition means to better the condition of all classes of people.—Sherman Register.

The negroes of Nacogdoches county have organized law and order league. There is no special occasion for the organization, as the negroes of that county are peaceful and generally law abiding, unless politics be the incentive. It is noticeable throughout the black belt that similar organizations occur biennially and in campaign years. They are invariably inaugurated by colored preachers or school teachers seeking recognition as political leaders, who are encouraged by candidates who hope to gain the negro vote. But they don't cut much ice under the present election law, and the negro politician is an insignificant factor in political campaigns, where he formerly wielded an important influence or at least was able to induce the office seeker to think so. The day of the ward heeler and colored political boss is passed.—Del Rio Herald.

AT LONG RANGE.

Affairs In Nacogdoches As Viewed From Afar.

Del Rio, Feb. 13—1 have been asked by friends in private correspondence why I do not write a letter to The Sentinel oftener. It is because I am like The Sentinel at times, "there's nothing in it." I haven't anything to write. I have written all there is to say about this country, unless I was going in to boost it up with free advertising.

It doesn't rain here often, I came here Nov. 16, just on the eve of a wet spell that lasted a month with scarcely a fair day but I have not seen a rain since I have been here. It sprinkles sometimes for a day or two and makes the streets awfully muddy, but a real down pour of rain seldom occurs. There have been very few cloudy days and no rain here since Dec. 15th.

What farming there is here is done on the "sure thing" plan—by irrigation. There are many thousands of acres of irrigable land in Val Verde county, but it would take the price of a 100-acre farm in East Texas to buy ten acres of this land. Most anything can be raised here, but the predominant crops are corn, hay and ribbon cane. Cotton grows well but is not planted. Corn and hay are easiest produced and most profitable. An irrigation company with \$3,000,000 capital furnishes water for nearly all the irrigated farms in the county at a cost of \$2.50 per acre per annum to the customer. The irrigation system is perfect and is one of the "sights" that interest the stranger most when visiting or prospecting in the county.

The town is full of East Texas people. The latest arrivals are Dallas Foreman and his son-in-law, Dr. Hughes, who recently came from New Salem, they are too well known back there for me to say who and what they are. They are here to stay and have already entered the arena of speculators, tradesmen, etc.

We (my wife and me) tried to celebrate our 25th wedding anniversary on the 2nd inst. We had a dinner with turkey as the capital dish, and the usual accompaniment. But we had no "company" and the celebration was a failure. We could not rejoice successfully in the absence of dear friends home folks and neighbors that have always heretofore been with us on all occasions of festivity, we were glad and sad at the same time, and the "alloy" seemed to outweigh the "silver" on this occasion.

I wanted to say a word or two about politics and things as they stir me at long range but this letter is getting too long already, I was wondering if I was still in the race for re-election, or ever had been considered in. I confess that I have not been overwhelmed with letters of encouragement I am consoled, however, by so far not seeing the announcement of an aspirant for my "warm place." I see Judge Ingraham is out for State Senator, I presume that June

Harris has tully and finally determined not to be a candidate. Well there is no better nor purer man than Judge Ingraham and though I have a mighty and lasting "grudge" against him, and am committed to June Harris, if Harris is out of the race it will be a great pleasure to me to see the Judge "git thar" as well as to help him do it.

I am sorry to see another campaign coming on over local option. It will be a bitter fight, a heavy expense and no change as to results or present conditions. Local option is in Nacogdoches to stay, at least I believe it is, and these biennial conflicts will only serve to intensify the bitterness between opposing factions engendered two years ago. Haltom

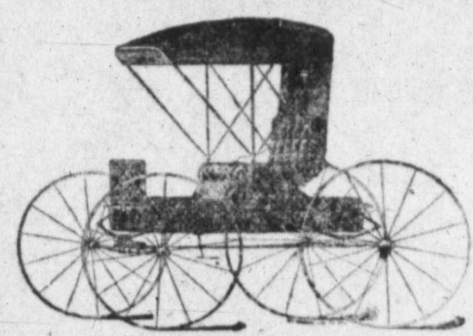

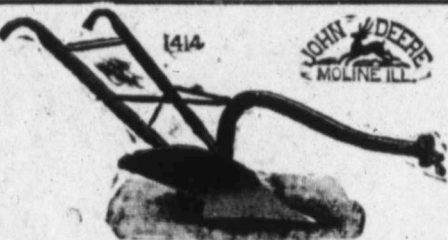

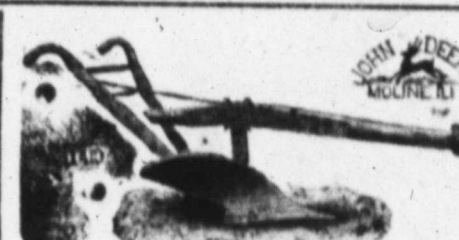

More Road Law Talk.

Decby, Feb. 12, 1906.—As I have been reading in The Sentinel a few articles submitting to the minds of the voters of the county a remedy to regulate the road laws of this county, and especially one communication that appears under date of February 8, now it is not my intention to criticize Mr. Jones, on his honest opinions, but as a voter I feel free to express my self on the road questions.

Now Mr. Editor, I ask you to figure a little and I think that you will admit that every road hand that complies with the present road law of this county, indirectly pays more than double the required road tax necessary to keep up all the public roads in the county. I ask the question "have we got any road under the present system?" Mr. Reader, you can answer. Mr. Jones favors \$8.00 instead of \$4.00 to obtain road receipts but he failed to state how this money was to be appropriated after being deposited with the county treasurer. For instance several of my neighbors have road receipts which cost them \$4.00 each, of course they are road fees. What becomes of this money? does it go to the regular funds or should it be verted back to the respec-

tive road where it originally belongs? Why not every road keep her money, I have never known our road to get one dollar back. Now in regard to a road overseer, having the power under a system of his own, I think that this would be a very dangerous law giving any one man the power to dictate the affairs of a public trust. I think it right for every free citizen to obey the laws of his county, but to concentrate the law into one man's hands, is one step to anarchy and I furthermore think that three commissioners appointed to each respective precinct of the county is just a few too many commissioners, when one can do the business and save the tax payers some pocket change. The expense of this system alone would almost equal a road tax.

Speaking of a law requiring any one making complaint before a justice of the peace for failure to perform road duty to be forced to give bond for all cost that may accrue will knock out 75 per cent of all road cases in this county. I think the law is all right just like it stands. Telling a man how to do a thing, and getting out and doing it, is a different proposition. Reader
