### THE LOCAL OPTION CAMPAIGN.

#### The First Gun in The Real Battle was Fired Yesterday.

From Tuesday's Daily:

The local option campaign Nacogdoches county was opened yesterday afternoon when Rev. Granville Jones delivered his lecture at the big tent on the corner of Hospital street and North street.

The meeting was called to order by Rev. J. T. McClure who called upon Rev. Leland Malone to offer prayer for the success of the campaign. After prayer Judge Geo. F. Ingraham took the stand and stated to the people that he was a candidate for state senator and that he was a prohibitionist, and that if he was elected to represent this district in the senate that he would do all that was in his power to further the cause of local option. He stated that the present local option laws were rigid enough, but the law enforcing the local option law were not properly enforced. If elected he would be found ready to champion any measure looking to the enforcement of the local option law. At the close of Judge Ingraham's remarks he introduced Rev. Granville Jones.

Mr. Jones prefaced his talk by saying that it was a pleasure for him to be on this holy ground. That he had addressed the people here two years ago, and perhaps some of the same people were in the audience who were present at the last time. "Two years ago it would have been something wonderful to have heard a candidate for either openly announce that he was in favor of local option; fact of the matter was, they did not want it known that they favored local option. These conditions were different and that there were men of backbone who were not ashamed to let the fact be known that they were on the right side of the question."

"Two years ago the argument was that the pros a law being set to have called for an election, as it would be the cause of raising a question which old friends necessarily be divided upon, and that hard feelings would be the result. Now in all seriousness who is it now that has called for an election."

"The saloons two years ago were bad and they are worse today than they were at that time. You all know what they are—they are bad all the time, and the only saloon that is a good saloon is the dead saloon and it is my intention to kill the saloons as fast as I can."

"Two years ago it was the cry of the anti element that the brewers were furnishing the money for the local optionist to carry on the campaign, but who is furnishing the money to carry on this campaign this year for the

antis—it is the outside liquor dealer. They may say there is more whiskey sold here or as much as before local option—take it for granted that it is so, why are the outside liquor dealers using their efforts to have the open saloon in this county again? There is not the same amount of whiskey sold here."

At night Mr. Jones addressed the people on the same subject, and the tent was crowded. He is a splendid speaker and never fails to get a good crowd. The crowds were somewhat mixed at both meetings, a good number of the antis being present.

C. A. Jones who has been doing a general merchandise business in this city for the past several years filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy yesterday afternoon. The attorney for Mr. Jones furnished The Sentinel reporter with the following:

Assets \$8074.50. Liabilities \$6687.81. Of this amount there are secured claims amounting to \$2100. Stone Fort National Bank holding a deed of trust for \$1650.

The trustee in bankruptcy will arrive in the city this afternoon to take charge of the stock.

## MURDER AND SUICIDE.

Millions of American people are committing murder and suicide annually by the use of adulterated food, nostrums and various poisonous productions, either canned or bottled. In the great culture of population the most appalling discoveries have been made and the people are alarmed and aroused. In Chicago recently more than forty grocers and retail dealers were indicted for selling adulterated foods. Formaldehyde in milk, colored distilled vinegar, glucose and aniline dye in jelly and preserves, illegal flavoring extracts and fraudulent spices are enumerated among the charges. Incidentally comes the announcement from Washington that more than a million infants have been sacrificed to various concoctions known as soothing syrup and pain-killers, and over twice that number have been killed by impure food. The author of this declaration is Pro. Riley, chief of the Chemistry Bureau of the Department of Agriculture who makes the statement further that "we do not know anything about the milk we have left at our homes or the conditions under which it is produced." There are a thousand and one possibilities, says the Professor, "which might have combined to make what nature intended for food the most virulent poison that chemistry can produce. I have found that foods we daily consume are so fraught with germ life of a harmful nature that I am almost afraid to go to the table. Butter is painted, there is little other to be found anywhere. Canned goods are kept for years. I speak particularly of condensed milk. If we knew nothing of fresh milk, surely our knowledge is more limited in regards to products that are put in cans. The food intended us to resort to cans only to tide us over one season until green fruits could be had again, but the canneries don't know this. There is no law requiring them to stamp the date upon their goods. If they did it would kill the sale." This startling declaration should open the eyes of the people and bring such an influence to bear upon our legislative bodies that will force them to enact laws for the relief of a public that is sacrificing millions of precious lives to a vicious and murderous industry. Better that the sale of every bottle, can, jar or package of the vile and poisonous stuff, for which "chemical science" in dishonest hands is responsible, now dumped upon the market and consumed by an unsuspecting public, should be killed, and every manufacturing concern from whence they are produced should be closed, than to continue to subject hords of human beings annually to death by poisoning. It is time the strong arm of the law was being extended and enactment of measures that will

destroy this terrible blight. If American industry will not deal honestly and justly with the public, let the public, through its law making bodies, destroy such dishonest industry entirely or hold it criminally responsible for every impure and poisonous article manufactured.

The Texas legislature, at its last sitting made provision for dumb animals by passing a pure stock feed law, requiring the name, brand and trademark to be legibly printed on the outside of every package offered for sale and prohibiting adulteration of all feed stuff. Why not protect human life as well? Are our horses and cattle more precious than our people?

### The Tobacco Crop.

The tobacco crop in this section of East Texas this year bids fair to have a larger acreage than that of last year. While there will only be about ten acres in shade, yet the field grown tobacco will be represented by an increase of five or six acres, and there is yet a few days in which the farmers can make preparations to plant an experimental crop.

The government expert says that the farmers who are engaging in the work this year are going into the proposition and with a vim.

The Sentinel is pleased to note that the farmers are getting interested and hope that there will be several more enter their names on the list before it is too late to get in a seed bed. This county could well afford to plant two hundred acres in tobacco, since it has been proven that the matter of raising tobacco here is now no longer an experiment.

Of the samples of the crop of last year was sent to a hundred of the leading manufacturers of high grade cigars, and the government is now besieged with inquiries as to where they can get the Nacogdoches tobacco, that they were well pleased with the samples and that if the stuff is grown in quantities they will at once enter into the market of the tobacco grown here. Now this is the condition of affairs as they now exist, and if the farmers do not take advantage of the opportunity, they will certainly be sleeping on their own rights.

There is no section of the great southeast attracting greater attention at the present time than Nacogdoches and it is the purpose of The Sentinel to set forth the advantages contained in this section in a manner that will not only do credit to the business interest, but result in some substantial good to the community. The East is overcrowded with industrious farmers, capable artesans and meritorious manufacturing enterprises which are seeking more extended fields for their operations and now is the time for Nacogdoches to secure her pick of this immigration. No section of the world contains greater or more diversified resources than Nacogdoches and it will be the purpose of The Sentinel to present these acts in a manner which they cannot be contradicted.

### Tobacco Some More.

The Sentinel learns from Mr Otto Olson, United States tobacco expert stationed here for experiment work in growing in this year, that the acreage is by no means as large as was expected.

What a fine opportunity the farmers are missing, and how strange. It seems to be about as hard a job to make a fine tobacco grower out of a common cotton rooter as to make a fine berkshire hog out of a common piney woods razor back.

W. M. Hinson, state tobacco expert and Geo. T. McNess, general superintendent of the tobacco belt are here today. To encourage the industry of tobacco growing, and especially to develop the production of superior quality, which is already a demonstrated reality, and a profitable vocation.

Dr. Mayfield, president of the cigar Co., says that he has facilities in the new factory for sweating tobacco. The market price this year will be good because of short crops every where last year.

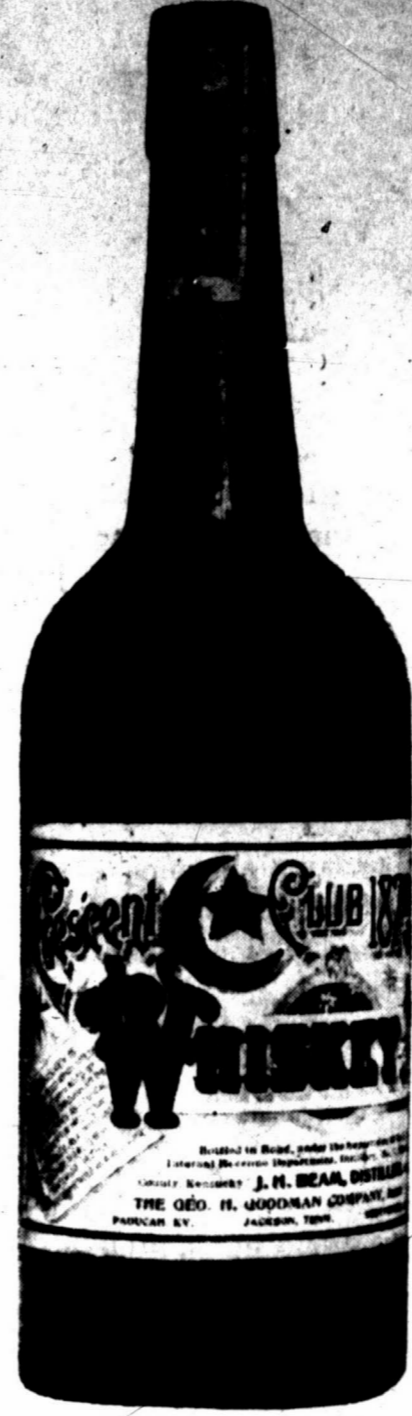

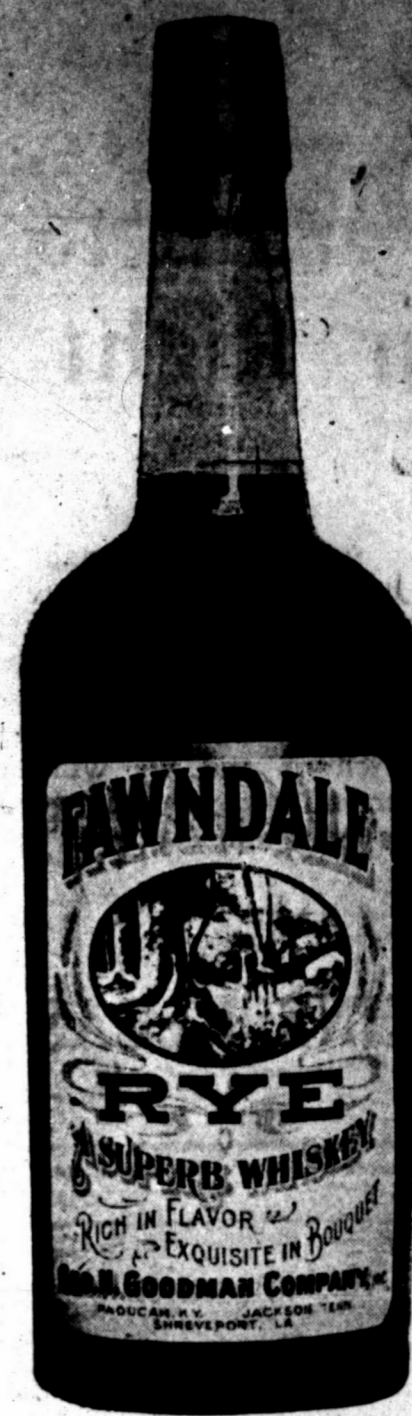

### Getting a List of Poll Tax Payers.

The managers of the local option campaign are making preparations to see that the voters of this county are supplied literature, and have employed Miss Irene Craine to make a copy of the list of the poll tax payers, with their postoffice address so that they may have a clean list of those who are entitled to vote in the elections this year.

The United States tobacco experiments in Texas are intended to show what can be done in the cultivation of the weed. Hundreds of samples of the East Texas crops have been submitted to the best judges among dealers in different cities and factories and the opinions are nearly all agreed that the red lands here can grow the very highest grade filler tobacco. High grade wrappers can be also grown under shade. All this has been done repeatedly. Such filler material sells at from fifteen to twenty five cents a pound and such wrappers at about ten times as much.

Oscar Crain went to Houston yesterday to be present at a meeting of Emigration Agents now in session there for the purpose of organizing an Association under that name for the purpose of advancing the growth of the state generally.

## JUDGMENT FOR BANK,

Against the Nacogdoches Warehouse Company.

Tyler, Texas, Feb. 12.—After three days' hearing the National Bank of Commerce of New Orleans was given a verdict in the Federal court this afternoon for \$6828.96 against the Nacogdoches Compress and Warehouse company. The suit grew out of the failure of the Wettermark bank some years ago. This was the third trial, the defendant winning in the first, but the higher court reversed the verdict. MANUFACTURING enterprises of all kinds are needed in this section of state, and Nacogdoches has some pretty inducements to offer to manufacturers looking for a location.

The truck growers of Nacogdoches county are overlooking a mighty good thing by not getting their organization in working order before the time arrives for the shipment of fruits and vegetables to the north.

Last year the truck growers went pretty heavy on Irish potatoes and a goodly number lost money by the venture. This year, however, the prospects are that there will be good money in Irish potatoes, and the farmer who plants for commercial purposes this year will no doubt make some money.

CAPT. E. I. KELLIE of Jasper has announced as a candidate for senator. Capt. Kellie is a fine old gentleman, but our friend Geo. F. Ingraham of this county has some claims upon the people of this district, and The Sentinel believes that the people will consider the claims of the Nacogdoches candidate at the proper time. ## FACTS AS THEY ARE.

The next time you hear a man or a woman speaking about this part of the state being sickly, invite them to take a stroll with you to the cemetery and there count the graves, tell them how long the cemetery has been used, and that it is yet large enough for another hundred years, and then ask them if they are yet of the opinion that Nacogdoches is a sickly place?

GOVERNOR LANHAM has decided to call a special session of the legislative for the purpose, it is presumed, of performing a legislative surgical operation upon bleeding section 120 of the Terrell election law. The extra session will be held some time next month.

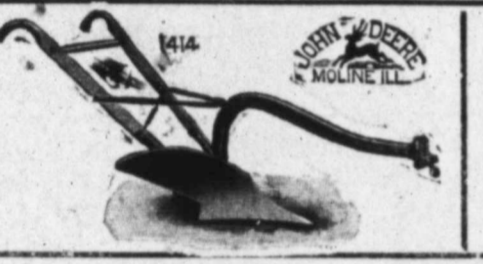

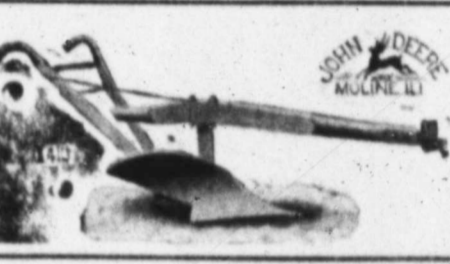
