"BROOKS MADE GOOD"

His Bill Went Through With One Dissenting Vote.

Washington, D. C., June 4.—When the house opened today Representative Moses L. Brooks conducted his first fight on the floor of congress and put through the Port Arthur port entry bill practically unanimously.

Floor Leader Payne, in a spirit of levity, pitted Representative Kennedy of Nebraska, also a new member, against Brooks.

The whole house entered into the spirit of the fun and the big guns on both sides were drawn into the fight, some in fun and some in dead earnest.

Brooks made a brief speech and handled the fight so much better than his Nebraska opponent that Payne and Grosvenor jumped to the Nebraska's defense. Madden of Illinois, Burgess of Texas, McCleary of Minnesota and Sulzer of New York spoke for Port Arthur.

Only one "no" vote was heard.

From Race for District Attorney at Recommendation of Physicians

THE dear people never know exactly to what extent the country is going to ruin until the candidates for office begin to bob up.

THE common people will be the ones who will be heard from on the 28th of July, and they will stack up the votes for Tom Campbell for governor.

THE reason Judge Brooks and Mr. Colquitt do not resign, is because they know that they will need their present position after the next election.

CHICKENS are commanding the best of prices on the Nacogdoches market, and every good housewife in the country could realize no small amount of pin money by sending her chickens and eggs to this market.

NACOGDOCHES county can well afford to issue bonds for the erection of a new court house and a jail. The old building now being used is unfit for the purposes for which it was originally intended, and besides is in an unsafe condition. The commissioners court should at its next regular term take up the matter and discuss the proposition of submitting the question to the voters of the county.

CENTER is to have an "old fiddlers' contest" on Saturday, June 9, and an invitation has been extended to John Henry Kirby to take part in the deliberations. It is said that John Henry will be there with the merchandise on this occasion and will come with the expectation of taking off first honors. Once upon a time Nacogdoches had the honor of entertaining the old fiddlers, and the affair was the finest event in the way of a fun making proposition ever held in the Stone Fort City.

THE Farmers' Union owns a splendid site in Nacogdoches for a cotton warehouse, and The Sentinel hopes that they will provide ways and means to have a building erected in time to take care of the crop this year. A large sum of money is lost to the farmers every year on account of the fact that cotton has not been properly housed during the bad weather. If the Union is not able to finance the warehouse, no doubt the bankers of Nacogdoches would lend assistance. Nacogdoches needs the warehouse because it will be the means of saving the cotton raiser many dollars every year on damaged cotton alone.

IT'S UP TO THEM.

Under the caption "Is It Right? Is It Fair? Is It Gratt?" the Tyler Courier goes right down into the milk of the coconut and figures up the situation in the gubernatorial race. The Sentinel reproduces the article so that the readers of The Sentinel can figure a little for themselves before the primary election in July. The Courier says:

Judge Brooks and Mr. Colquitt were elected Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals and Railroad Commissioner, respectively. They are holding those offices now and are supposed and ought to be in the constant service of the people therein. Their salaries are large and constant—\$4000.00 per year each. As such servants they owe all their time, labor and thought to the discharge of their duties. The tribunals of which they are members are burdened with a great accumulation of business—business of the people—the tax payers who furnish their salaries. The Court of Criminal Appeals is known to be so crowded with cases and so far behind in its work as not to have been able with all the judges working overtime to give that thorough investigation and consideration to each case demanded by every requirement of justice, while men all over the state are languishing in the jails at the expense of the public awaiting their long delayed turn in that court. Yet these officials are now and have been for at least three months devoting their time to traveling, planning, speaking being interviewed, etc., not as public servants and in the interest of the people, but in their own individual interests and for the furtherance of their ambitions to be governor, and the state—the people, are actually paying them for such work. Their salaries are as large as that of the governor and amounts to \$12.78 each for every working day in the year, or \$25.56 per day to both. Yet this is not all. The state expects to receive a quid pro quo in service for its \$25.56. When this service is not rendered and the money is still paid out the state loses both the service and the money or twice the \$25.56 equal to \$51.12 per day, or, counting eight hours for a working day for an official—a liberal estimate, \$6.39 an hour for the entertainment in seeing two of its highest and best paid officials make a steeple chase race for governor.

Is it right? Is it fair? Is it just to the people or to the other candidates for the same position? If canvasses for public office are to be made at the state's expense, why not give an equal showing? Why not make an appropriation for Campbell, Bell and Moore, instead of forcing them to run under such a handicap. The truth is there is only one term to cover such a condition as is presented in the candidacy of Brooks and Colquitt, and that is gratt. They should either withdraw, resign or renounce their salaries for the time they are not serving the state in which they are serving them-

selves. What honest man can gainsay this?

But this is not all; Colquitt by virtue of his office, has passes on all the railroads in Texas. They are required to be given him to enable him to fully discharge the duties of his position and for no other purposes. Every mile he travels on them in pursuit of governor constitutes a use of his office for self-serving purposes, not only without benefit to the state but to its actual injury. Presumption is strong that Judge Brooks also has railroad passes. If he has not he is a notable exception among Texas Judges. It is quite probable that Judge Bell also has them as he is an ex and the pass privilege usually somewhat outlives the incumbency, especially where the office is a prominent one and the man aspiring. Campbell pays his fare at the regular rate. He must needs make as broad and diligent canvass as the rest. This the people expect. What a difference this makes. They may ride free, not to speak of telegraph and telephone trunks, while he, in the language of Governor Roberts "must pay as he goes" and the sum must necessarily amount to thousands of dollars before the primaries. Is this right? Is it just? Would it be right or just to himself or to the people for Campbell to solicit, accept or use passes and trunks with the implied obligation that always accompanies them? Certainly not. If not, then it can not be right for the others to do so. The American people like above all things "an even break" and a "fair fight" and the voters of Texas will not stand for anything else.—Tyler Courier.

NACOGDOCHES is shipping a few Irish potatoes this year and the prices received are satisfactory to the growers. It will be remembered that The Sentinel suggested to the truckers early in the winter that the prospects were exceedingly bright for good prices to prevail this year for potatoes. Before making this suggestion the writer carefully looked into the surplus stock from last season, and saw that there was a great shortage. Those farmers who have acted upon the suggestion are now realizing a fair profit for their potatoes.

HOUSTON is a hard place for the young men of that city, and the good people should come to the rescue and help the young men build a suitable Y. M. C. A. building. The Sentinel hopes that the business men of that city who have the welfare of the young men at heart will respond liberally to the call for subscriptions.

CONGRESSMAN BROOKS cannot afford to take a leave of absence from his duties as congressman and conduct his campaign for re-election, but as soon as congress adjourns he will pay his district a visit and then—well it will be different. Brooks is the choice of the people of the district and they will see that he is returned to congress.

STUDY THIS.

If either Brooks or Colquitt is nominated for governor in the July primary the people will not be consulted about who will succeed him to his present office. Judge Brooks went before the people and plead for a position on the Court of Appeals bench at a salary of \$4,000 a year, and they made a trade with him giving him the office for 6 years and agreed to pay him \$24,000. They made at his request, a similar trade with Mr. Colquitt agreeing to pay him the sum of \$24,000 to serve them 6 years as railroad commissioner. Both these gentlemen are now asking these same people to cancel this contract by giving them another one and at a time and in a way which takes from these very people the right to name a successor. Should either Colquitt or Brooks be nominated for governor, his successor to his present good position will be named, not by the voters of Texas, but he will be named by Governor Lanham. The reason these two officials did not, in the beginning of the campaign, resign and let the people choose a successor is because if they fail in the nomination for governor they intend to fill out the contract they made with the people some time ago. They seek to turn over their present office to Lanham with whom they have no contract. They propose to take away from the people the right to elect a judge for the state Court of Criminal Appeals or

for Railroad Commissioner and to put this authority into the hands of Lanham. Having made the contract for the office with the people they should have carried it out in good faith or else turned it back to its owners who gave it. The Courier is not willing for Governor Lanham to name a railroad commissioner for Texas; it does not want him to name a successor to Judge Brooks. It helped elect these gentlemen and it wants them to live up to the contract until the people themselves have the opportunity to name a successor. It wants no one-man power in filling positions of great trust where the rights and liberties of the people are to be determined.—Tyler Courier.

C. H. Strong of Dublin (Erath County) has shipped, since Feb. 1, thirteen solid car loads of eggs. The average price per car paid the farmers was \$1,200, or a grand total of \$16,600. In addition to the above, Mr. Strong has shipped from ten to fifty cases every few days. And a good feature of the matter is the fact that the eggs are there to be bought and shipped. Poultry raising in Texas is developing rapidly. The farmer is finding that it takes no more to raise and feed the best fowls than it does to feed those of inferior breeding. He is also finding that \$4 or \$5 each week derived from the sale of eggs alone is a big item by the end of the year. This, taken in connection with the

poultry sold, butter, vegetables, fruit and melons, that he may raise, will relieve the strain on the cotton money at the end of the year considerably.

Installment of Colquitt hot air published in the Houston Post under a Beaumont date will give those familiar with political conditions in this city an insight into the remarkable Colquitt wave of popularity which is engulfing the state. In the Queen of the Netches the prominent supporters of Colquitt's campaign for democratic nomination will not aggregate twenty-five, and by inquiry it can be developed that the supposedly loyal are prompted because of an official favor extended by the railroad commissioner. In Jefferson county the contest is between Campbell and Bell, with Brooks a probable third.—Beaumont journal.

CONGRESSMAN ADAMS of Pennsylvania committed suicide Friday by shooting himself in the mouth. In a letter to the speaker of the house the following language is used by the deceased: "The fact that my personal obligations exceed my resources is my only excuse for abandoning the responsible position I occupy in the house. I am willing to be buried at its expense, but I ask that no committee be appointed or memorial service be held, as I have never been in sympathy with the latter custom. SHIPPING IRISH POTATOES.

Nacogdoches Truckers Received Good Prices for Their Tubers.

Two carloads of Irish potatoes were shipped to the markets, and the prices received were entirely satisfactory to the truckers. The first car was sold to Houston parties on the track here and bought 85 cents. The second car was sold to Jacksonville parties, and for this the shippers received 90 cents.

There will be several more cars made up for shipment the first part of next week, and it the same good prices prevail the farmers here will have no cause to complain of their experiment with the potato crop this year.

CONCERNS COUNTRY EDITORS.

Another Trap Set for Them by Fake Publishers.

Del Rio, Texas.—I see that those Maine and Indiana publishers of fake papers are again sending out "bait" to the country press with a Macedonian cry to "come over and help us," and the chances are that a big lot of suckers will be caught. This last move is brought forth by a late ruling of the Assistant Postmaster General that papers without a bona-fide subscription list cannot be passed through the mail as second-class matter. The ruling was for no other purpose than to reach that class of publications that flood the country with free reading matter and are published only for circulating advertising matter. These publications are sent free to anybody whose address the publisher can obtain and are really a menace to the country press. For years the Post-office Department has been making a strenuous and a laudable effort to suppress this class of publications, all the while being handicapped by the country editor who almost invariably falls into the trap and rushes to the rescue of his worst enemy. There is no law nor any ruling of the P. O. Department detrimental to the publication of legitimate newspapers, but there are laws and rulings the purpose of which is to suppress "bastard" sheets, which are the greatest enemy to country newspapers. I sincerely hope the newspapers of Texas, and particularly East Texas, will not fall into this last trap set by fake publishers and will refuse to sign their petition to amend the law as it now stands.

NACOGDOCHES Woodmen are making preparations to have a big time here on the tenth of next month.

WHILE the peaches being marketed are not as large as they should be, yet the quality is all that one could wish for.

THE withdrawal of Hon. E. H. Carter from the race for the office of district attorney, leaves the field to Hon. Beaman Strong of this city.

WELL what do you think of the way Tom Campbell of Palestine is running for governor? Some of the boys say he is a "two-to-one shot" against the field.

SO far as the people of Nacogdoches county is concerned there is only one candidate in the field for the nomination of Governor and that gentleman is Tom Campbell of Palestine.

ONE thing is very certain, if the boll weevil does begin its work on the cotton crop within the next few weeks, the farmers can turn it under and raise June corn and peas.

NACOGDOCHES potato shippers are receiving good prices for their potatoes this year. The shipment from this point will not be very heavy, but the shippers are well pleased.

THE senate committee on postoffices and post roads agreed on an amendment to the appropriation bill, adding \$88,735 to the amount to be expended for the extension of the pneumatic tube service.

"GIVE the boy a chance" the voters of the second congressional district did, and the "boy" made good. It may be a bitter pill for some to swallow—but be good and give honor to whom honor is due.

CONGRESSMAN SHEPARD believes that the department expenditures should be investigated, and to this end has introduced a resolution in Congress asking that a committee be appointed to look into the department affairs and see where the money is being expended.

BROOKS MADE GOOD.

It will be rather a bitter pill for those who have been fighting the re-election of Congressman Brooks, to know that his bill to give East Texas a port of entry at Port Arthur passed the house yesterday with but one dissenting vote. He has only been serving this district his first term and this bill is one in which every citizen of East Texas should be more or less interested. When the voters of this district elected him to congress, they expected to hear from him in the halls of congress. Brooks has made good, and the people will hardly forget him on the 28th of July. He has done a splendid work for a first term man, and it is doubtful if this district has ever had a congressman who has made good the first term. It usually takes about two terms for a new member to get acquainted, but Brooks butted into the game like an old timer and succeeded in getting a very important measure through the house at his first session.

IT will not require the services of an auditor to determine the number of convention votes that Tom Campbell will receive for governor. His vote will be so large that it will not be necessary to figure it out—it will be told at a glance.

THE Washington correspondent for the New York World says that New York state is a mere cipher in the United States senate, "Depew being in a sanitarium and likely never to return, and Platt a tottering nonentity seldom seen."

MONTA MOORE has with drawn from the race for governor and has announced that it is his intention to throw his support to Tom Campbell of Palestine, as he believes him to be the proper man for the place. Campbell's vote on the 28th of July will be a veritable landslide for the position to which he aspires.

NACOGDOCHES county will give Campbell a vote that he will be proud of for governor. The other candidates may possibly get a few scattering votes, but from a poll of the country people on the streets Saturday, there was only two Brooks men found and one for Bell. Colquitt was never mentioned.

EVERY body get ready and attend the Woodmen log rolling here on next Tuesday, July 10. The Woodmen are getting things in shape to have a good time on that day, and will have some of the best Woodmen speakers in the country here to talk to the visitors at the log rolling about the excellent objects of the order.

No finer soil for the successful cultivation of fruit and vegetables, can be found anywhere in the South than in Nacogdoches county. This being true the farmers and truckers should vie with each other in making this county the banner fruit and vegetable county in the state.

THE SENTINEL regrets to announce to the readers of the paper that M. E. H. Carter has been forced to withdraw from the race for district attorney on account of sickness. It became necessary for Mr. Carter to do this upon the advice of his physicians. The Sentinel hopes that he will soon be restored to health.

CALPBELE will not only carry Eastern Texas solid for governor, but he will mix it up pretty freely with the boys in the black land counties. He is the choice of the common people and they are about to resume the reigns of government again—as they did when the late Governor Hogg as a candidate before the people.

BOTH Judge Brooks and Mr. Colquitt are neglecting the offices and the duties they were elected to look after. Is it not reasonable to suppose that they would neglect the duties of the office of governor should the people of the state make the mistake and elect either of them to the high office to which they aspire?

THE SENTINEL is reliably informed that the business of the Criminal Court of Appeals is being sadly neglected on account of Judge Brooks being absent from the sitting of the court in his mad race for the nomination of governor. Judge Brooks is making a campaign at the expense of tax payers of the state and is neglecting the duties of the office to which he was elected by the people of Texas at the last election.

The candidates includes the precinct candidates all over the county as it will be determined at this meeting in the manner in which the names of the candidates are to appear upon the ticket at the primary election.

THE SENTINEL'S Oak Ridge correspondent states that the boll weevils have made their appearance in some of the fields in that section of the county in such quantities, that some of the farmers are plowing the cotton under and planting peas instead. The weevil is making its appearance earlier this year than for some years past and if it is as numerous as some of the correspondents report, there will be little hope for a cotton

crop in Nacogdoches county this year. The crop of last year will not exceed seven thousand bales in this county and if the crop is cut down proportionately this year as that of last, there will not be enough of the fleecy staple raised in Nacogdoches to make a medium sized handkerchief.

THERE are many cases on appeal before the Court of Criminal Appeals, and if Judge Brooks would attend to the duties of the office, the tax payers would be relieved of a great burden. Because while the prisoners are in the county jails the tax payers are burdened with their support. If the cases are affirmed the prisoners are sent to the penitentiary and instead of being a burden to the taxpayers, they are in a large measure bringing a revenue to the state. If the cases are reversed, the prisoners are then allowed to give bail and then released from the jails and the burden upon the tax payers ceases for the time. The Judge should either resign his position, or else quit the race for the nomination of governor.

The State Board Reports A Total Value of \$161,579,594.

Austin, Texas, May 29.—The state tax board has completed valuing and apporportioning the valuations of the franchises and intangible property of corporations in this state. The total was \$161,579,594.

Of this amount the following is given to Nacogdoches county, which totals \$1,514,537.

Nacogdoches: Houston East and West Texas, \$1,060,072; Cotton Belt, \$3036; Texas and New Orleans, \$435,552; Wells-Fargo, \$14,537; Western Union, \$1340.

RUMOR ABOUT COTTON BELT.

Gould Line Is Said to Be About to Take Over H. E. & W. T.

Houston, Texas, May 30.—Rumors are in circles that the Cotton Belt would soon enter Houston over its own tracks.

From sources which while not official are yet authentic it is ascertained that the Cotton Belt is negotiating with the Houston East and West Railway, and that there is a fair chance that the deal will go through.

Two weeks ago, as published in The News, a report went the rounds that the Cotton Belt sought to enter Houston over a more direct route from the east than the International and Great Northern, which is also a Gould road. At that time it was not given out that open negotiations were in progress for the East and West, but subsequent developments have given additional confirmation to the story.

The Cotton Belt at one time had an option on the East and West, but this was allowed to lapse.

Within the past three weeks, however, the matter has been revived, and is now believed to be in a fair way to consummation. It is pointed out that the Cotton Belt could better than any other system tie up with the East and West. The two systems touch at Shreveport and again at Lutkin, and the arrangement would give the Cotton Belt a fine St. Louis route to the Gulf and would strengthen it vastly in both freight and passenger business.

The Cotton Belt is a Gould property and indirectly gets into this territory over the International and Great Northern, but with the Rabbit Route appended to it, it would have a direct and powerful hold.

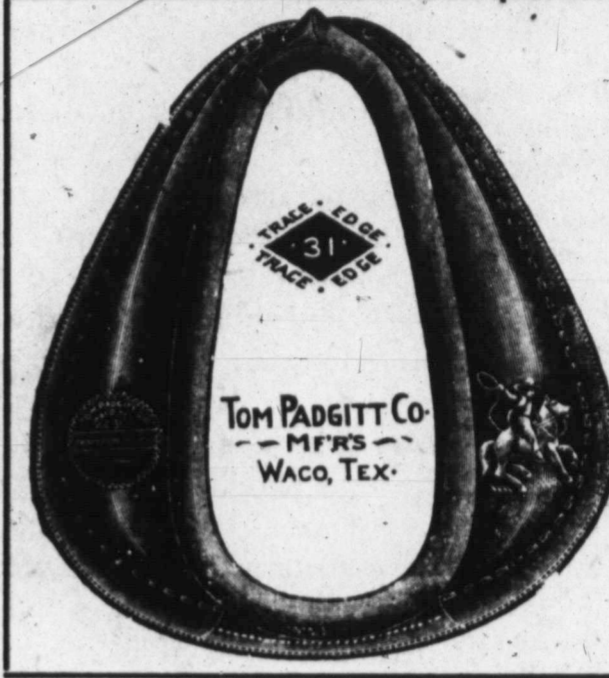
The Houston, East and West Texas is a growing property and is becoming one of the best paying of the Sunset group in Texas. It, however, along with the Dallas division of the Texas and New Orleans, has for years been something of a thorn in the side of the Sunset management, in so much as the two lines are held to be partly competitive.

The Dallas division has long been on the market, but there have been no takers. The sale of the East and West Route, it is asserted, would do much to clarify the whole situation for the Sunset line in Texas.

NEW PLANT IN OPERATION.

The Nacogdoches Ice and Cold Storage Ice Factory.

Of the manufacturing enterprises located in the valley, the factory of the Nacogdoches Ice and Cold Storage Co. is one that the people of Nacogdoches should feel proud of. Since the plant has passed to the management of Mr. Arthur Marshall it has been overhauled and new machinery throughout put in, and the new plant is now in operation, and while the machinery is new and stiff, yet a very fair quality of ice is being turned out.

Mr. Marshall stated to the reporter yesterday that within the next ten days or two weeks that the factory would be turning out a very high grade of ice and would also make enough to furnish four towns the size of Nacogdoches.

Frank Segers, is the chief engineer at the plant and is said to be one of the finest ice men in the south. A trip to the plant and an inspection of the machinery will satisfy the consumers of Nacogdoches ice, that Mr. Segers is a man who believes in cleanliness in his engine and ice making rooms.

The plant has a making capacity of about thirty tons per day, and it will be running the full capacity about the 15th of the month, and then Nacogdoches will be able to take care of all orders for ice that may be sent in.

From Friday's Daily: A quite pretty home wedding occurred last evening at the home of Mrs. Mollie Baker where Miss Ida, her only daughter, became the bride of Mr. Harry Wilson. Rev. A. J. Mr. Wilson who has been connected with the cigar factory as cigar maker, since he came here eighteen months ago has proved himself a capable business man and his gentlemanly manner, demands all confidence and friendship of those whom he meets.

Will Cut Tobacco.

The tobacco farmers will begin to harvest their crop of 1906 tobacco within the next few weeks and parties who offered prizes yearly in the spring for the best tobacco grown should begin now to make their selections of the best fields grown here. The planters are working hard to receive the prizes, and as a result of the prizes the crops have been carefully and scientifically worked and the fields are reported to be in finer shape than at any time in the past. There will be a good yield, and with several buyers here at the time the weed will be placed upon the market, the prices this season should be some better than they have been heretofore.

CAMPBELL ON HOMESTEADS.

The Palestine Herald recently used the following as an editorial leader, in that excellent paper, and The Sentinel reproduces the same for the benefit of the democracy of Nacogdoches county, and East Texas:

There are two classes of objections which are urged to candidates and to their speeches. In one class are real, honest objections, founded on what are thought to be, good grounds, but often made through misinformation, or misapprehension of a candidate's true position. Objections in this class are always by honest, well-meaning men.

In the other class are objections not made with any honest or patriotic purpose, but originated by the inventive genius of unscrupulous politicians for the purpose of injuring the candidate whom they do not happen to favor and to forward the success of their candidate. Of the latter class is the rumor and misrepresentation circulated by those who favor other candidates than Mr. Campbell that he is in favor of exempting homesteads from taxation. Now, what is the truth about it? Mr. Campbell said in his opening speech, in connection with the subject of taxation:

"Our entire taxing system should be overhauled and remodeled; new fields of revenue should be explored that property now escaping taxation can be uncovered and placed on the tax rolls and ultimately all funds necessary to meet the state's requirements can be had and at the same time the state ad-valorem tax rate can, I believe, be reduced materially and in a short while every homestead actually occupied by a family can be and should be exempted from all taxation for state purposes. Lay the lightest possible burden upon the homestead that the people may acquire homes and love their country more."

This is all he has ever said on that subject.

Can it be necessary to enforce, by argument, on any intelligent man that Mr. Campbell, in using this language was looking forward to some good time when, by reforms in the tax laws, the revenues would be so great, and the rate of taxation so low that the people could, if they wished, exempt a home actually occupied by a family from taxation for state purposes. He says that he looks to this condition "ultimately," that he believes it can be done, and should be done in the course of time, but only in case the conditions which he looks forward to shall be realized, and even in such case, he would favor exempting the home from state taxation.

Most evidently, not taking any such position as that under any conditions the relief should be from county and school tax.

He limits it also by saying: "Actually occupied by a family," having in view, conditions which might exist at some future time which would authorize the people to make the exemption as an encourag-

ment to the people to acquire homes. Mr. Campbell understands, and understood when he used the above language, and such exemption could not be made by him, as governor, but, and only through a constitutional amendment submitted by a two-thirds majority of the legislature and carried by a majority of the voters, and he of course, assumed that the people whom he was addressing, and that all the people of the state of Texas understood that such exemption could be made in no other way. And his statement was simply to indicate that, when low taxation and prosperous conditions would warrant the adoption of such an amendment, he would be for it.

It will be found impossible, as heretofore, to deal specially with and expose every professional distorter of truth in political campaigns. Their fertility is too exuberant: "Age cannot wither nor custom stale their infinite variety."

It is curious to note that the objection to Mr. Campbell's speech alluded to is being circulated by some men who favor Colquhoun when their man is unequivocally in favor of exempting all property except that belonging to the railways and corporations from state taxation.
