### ARREST OF FELIX POWELL.

This may Change Entire Prosecution in Monk Gibson Case.

San Antonio, Texas, June 12.—District Attorney Baker says that he has not yet received any official notification of the arrest at Edna of Felix Powell, a negro witness for the state in the Monk Gibson cases in connection with the murder of the members of the Condit family. He said that he was not surprised to hear that Ranger Captain McDonald had arrested Powell, but he does not believe that the arrest is the result of any new evidence being developed. Some time ago Captain McDonald was in San Antonio and took an impression of the bloody finger prints on a board that was found in the Condit house. Captain McDonald always held the belief that Powell knew more he had told about the killing of the Condits. Mr. Baker said that the arrest of Powell might change the entire prosecution in the Condit murder cases.

### PURE FOODS SCARCE.

Average Man Takes Poison at Every Meal.

Kansas City, June 11.—Fifty per cent of the deaths that occur in this country are the direct result of impure and dishonest foods. The packers are not alone to blame. It is practically impossible to get any pure food in this country," said Harry B. Walmsley, champion of pure food in the last legislature, and for fifteen years inspector for the Missouri underwriters. He has been in every room of every packing house in the State, not once, but many times.

"I took up a bill of fare in a restaurant not long ago and studied it," said Mr. Walmsley. "I found that the average man takes forty two doses of poison at every meal he eats. The butter is colored with coal tar dyes. The meat has more or less embalming fluid. The bread is full of alum. The tea and coffee contain copper. The vegetables have different varieties of coal tar dyes. You can't get any pure pepper. It is full of coconut shells, sawdust and clay."

WHAT has become of the canning factory enthusiasm launched a few weeks ago?

Now what do you think of the elegant lunch preparations put up by the packing houses?

GET in the habit of paying for what you buy, and do with out if you are short of funds.

THE Woodmen of Nacogdoches county will be here in large numbers on the 10th of July.

IN the primary election a vote cast for Tom Campbell is a vote cast for good government, by a good man.

WACO is a good convention city and the next state democratic convention should be held in that city.

WHEN the inspectors made their rounds of the packing houses, many had the appearance of being suspiciously clean.

IN supporting Mr. Colquitt, the Post seems to have a white elephant upon its hands. Colquitt enthusiasm is at low ebb.

THE citizens of Bryan and College station are making an effort to raise funds to build a trolley line between the two towns.

SINCE the packing house scandal, the sale of lunch preparations will not be so large for a few months. Yet the matter will be forgotten when a lazy cook fails to show up, and the tin can habit will again be fashionable.

BROOKS is making new friends every day in his race for re-election to congress from this district. By staying at Washington and attending to the duties for which he was elected the people consider him worthy of re-election.

THE brethren of the Cumberland Presbyterian faith in the city of Dallas do not propose to submit to the union of the two branches of the Cumberland church, and a news item from that city states that they are making preparations to bring suit in the courts to recover the property.

THERE are four candidates in the race for Governor three of them are members of the political trust of Texas, Bell, Brooks and Colquitt. Tom Campbell is not a chronic politician and is a native Texan and in addition to this possesses also the necessary qualifications to make the state a splendid chief executive.

ACCORDING to the Terrell election law every candidate for county office must file with the chairman of the executive committee an application to have his name placed upon the primary ticket by the 10th of June. Candidates wishing to continue in the race must comply with the requirements of the law otherwise their names will not appear upon the ticket.

### A VERY LOOSE SYSTEM.

Nacogdoches county has a very loose system of keeping the county convicts on the poor farm. The superintendent of the farm should provide safe guards around the county convicts and see that they are made to serve out the time for which they were sent to the farm, and in the event he cannot provide these safe guards he should make a requisition on the county for the necessary paraphernalia to keep them there. Instead of letting the prisoners sleep in the same room on the farm, cells should be provided so that only one prisoner should be allowed therein at night, and if the superintendent is short of guards during the day the convicts could be "hobbled" and thus preventing them walking off during the day. The present system of keeping the convicts is a farce and a remedy should be provided. It costs the tax payers money to pay the sheriff to capture law breakers and then have them turned loose on the farm to leave at their pleasure. The Sentinel believes that the farm is a good thing for the county and it will be a source of revenue to the county if the convicts are made to work out their fines, but the present system will prove to be a burden. The commissioners court should make an investigation of this matter and provide way to prevent the escape of convicts on the farm.

MONDAY, June 18, is the date for the meeting of the Democratic executive committee of Nacogdoches county to meet in this city for the purpose of arranging the ticket for the primary election. All candidates for office in the county and every precinct office, should be here on that date and take part in the deliberations.

WHAT do you think of the way Judge Brooks and Mr. Colquitt are conducting their campaign? Every reader of this paper, and every citizen of Texas is assisting these gentlemen to pay their campaign expenses. These gentlemen were elected to perform certain duties for the people. Are they performing these duties, or neglecting them?

JUST at the time when the newspapers of East Texas were anticipating a good cotton crop, and visions of a long line of delinquent subscribers standing at the office door waiting their turn to pay up arrears, appeared to them in their dreams, now comes the news of the boll weevil, is playing the dickens with the crops. Well it "mought have been" is one consolation.

MR. COLQUITT was elected by the people of Texas to serve the state as railroad commissioner. The office he is now using to make the race for the nomination of governor. Instead of remaining at his post of duty, he is making a "steeple chase" over the state and at the expense to the tax payers. He draws his salary for the time that he

is making the canvas. He should do the square thing by the people who elected him, and refuse to accept the salary or resign. The Sentinel can see no reason for him continuing in the race unless it is for the purpose of taking a little vacation and make the tax payers of Texas pay the bill.

EVERY voter in Texas will say that Governor Lanham is a good man, but has made the state a very poor governor. Mr. Bell upholds the acts of the present administration and the administration is supporting Mr. Bell. The people of Texas do not desire a continuation of the affairs of the state along the same lines as the past, and believe that the state should be governed differently. Tom Campbell is not a member of political trust; he is a free lance and the voters of Texas recognize in him the proper man for governor and will give expressions of their regards for him as a man and a democrat on the 28th of July.

COMMISSIONER STOREY has rendered a dissenting opinion on the order as was signed by Mr. Mayfield and Mr. Colquitt. He says that it is a case of discrimination and one that will prove harmful to not only the other roads in the state, but that it may lead to the roads being forced to put on mixed trains and thus impair this excellent service some of the roads are giving. The Sentinel believes that it was gotten up for a little piece of political thunder on the part

of Mr. Colquitt in order to boast his candidacy for the office of governor. If so he will be badly fooled. The people read quite a lot these days and they are capable of reasoning a little themselves.

THE United States Steel corporation's statement of business for the first three months of 1906 shows that the net earnings were \$36,634,490, an increase of \$13,608,594 as compared with the first quarters of last year. Unfilled orders on hand are 7,018,712 tons, an increase of 1,421,152 tons over a year ago. The directors declared the regular quarterly dividend of 1 3/4 per cent on the preferred stock. No dividend was declared on the common stock. The directors organized by re-electing President William E. Corey and all the retiring officers. The net earnings for the quarter are a new high record for any first quarter in the history of the corporation.

AT the meeting of the Texas Press Association in Corpus Christi, S. J. Thomas of the Comanche Chief was assigned the subject "Is the Crusade Against Patent Medicines Justifiable?" Mr. Thomas handled the subject in a manner that would have been a credit to Mark Twain. In speaking of the mysterious manner in which prescriptions are prepared the following is given as an example: "In Collin county excessive rains have fallen, still it is very dry there, and for one of the native drought sufferers a doc-

tor prescribed the following: "Spirits fermenti 1 gallon, spiritus vini recti 1 quart, aqua distillata one-half gill. Mix Sig: Take one one wine glass full every fifteen minutes until quieted. Translated this prescription reads: Whiskey one gallon; alcohol one quart; water one-half gill. The sufferer in question is Tom Perkins of McKinney, and he can vouch for the truth as I have delivered it unto you." In concluding his paper Mr. Thomas says: "If the people so vehemently and even violently demand same kind of physic to pour into their stomachs, these days of local option, shall we not let them have it? A bottle of patented physic costs them a dollar and there is nothing in it but water; a doctor's prescription costs a dollar and perquisites, and there is nothing in it but Latin and hieroglyphics. Leave the bars down, let the people have their choice, and let the fittest of the two survive the competition; and let the people survive the dope if they can."

### WILL NOT CUT DOWN OFFICES.

Supreme Court Decides District and County Clerk Case.

Austin, Texas, June 7.—At a special session of the supreme court held here today it was held that the names of candidates for district and county clerks in counties polling less than 1600 votes can be placed on the official ballot.

This opinion reverses the ruling of the attorney general on the subject.

This is the case of A. G. Brooks, appellant, vs. B. G. Dalaney et al, appellees, a certified question from the court of civil appeals. First supreme judicial district. Brooks is chairman of the county democratic executive committee of Panola county and refused to place the names of the appellees on the official ballot, under the attorney's ruling. The appellees sued out a writ of mandamus in the district court of that county and it was granted, and the decision of the supreme court today sustains that mandamus.

Over 50 counties in the state are affected by this holding of the supreme court.

## CANNED TRADE DEAD.

Effect of Exposure of Packing Houses Felt at San Antonio.

San Antonio, Texas, June 8.—Exposure of the methods of putting up tainted meats in the big packing houses of Chicago has practically killed the trade in canned meats in San Antonio. Retail dealers say that the sales of canned goods, except in some of the very fine grades, have fallen off to practically nothing. This is the season of the year when the trade in canned meats is usually largest on account of picnics and light housekeeping, and the exposure by the president caught the retail dealers with big stocks on hand, which they can not dispose of. Wholesalers have not yet felt the effect and will not feel it for a month or more. Their summer trade in canned meats is heaviest during the cotton season, when so many laborers in the fields have to be fed. The time for this trade is fully a month off, and wholesalers are hoping and praying that something will be done to allay public suspicion of canned goods before that time.

THE Bell papers would have their readers believe that Colquitt was the dog in the manger, and the Colquitt papers would have their readers believe that Bell is the scallawag. All the candidates for the high office of governor are splendid fellows, but Tom Campbell of Palestine is the best of all, and the people will say so when their votes on July 28.

## FOR PRESIDENT.

It is rather early to begin the campaign for the presidency of the United States, yet many papers in the north, east and west, are beginning to boost the cause of William Jennings Bryan, of Nebraska. The paramount issue in the next campaign will be that of the tariff. The present high protective tariff has been the means of the Government of the United States seeking foreign markets for material for the construction of the Panama canal. The prices of the trust made goods were so high that even the Government could not stand to be skinned. Mr. Bryan favors a tariff reform and while he has not announced his intentions as to whether he will be a candidate, yet the pressure may be brought to bear upon him doing so that he will have to permit his name to go before the next democratic convention. From a recent issue of the Galveston News the following paragraph is reproduced to show what some of the big papers are saying about Mr. Bryan:

"Henry Watterson in the Courier-Journal, under the caption, 'Hurrah for Bryan,' comes out squarely for the Nebraskan as the logical and legitimate candidate of the Democratic party for the Presidency in 1908, saying that there is good reason to believe that long before the assembling of the National Democratic convention of 1908 William Jennings Bryan will be put in nomination by States enough in their separate and several conventions to leave to the larger body only the business of confirming an agreed candidate, the selecting of his yokemate and the building of a platform."

### WHAT WILL THE ISSUE BE?

The impression that Mr. Bryan will be the nominee of the Democratic party for the Presidency seems to be growing, and this renders important his views with reference to the "paramount" issue. These views we gather from the Commoner, which declares in so many words that the increased supply of gold has solved for the present the money question, and that the tariff is more important than imperialism, and is really the paramount issue. So much for the position of the man mentioned in connection with the first place on the Democratic ticket.

President Roosevelt, who is referred to as "the man to beat Bryan," has not said a word about tariff reform since he suppressed his message upon the subject in 1904. The New York Evening Post quotes Secretary Shaw, a member of the Cabinet, as the authorized spokesman of the President. "Standpatism" is daily mounting to new heights of unreason, resembling mania. Like the defenders of slavery just before the war, protectionists are making a religion of practice, and every man who dissents from it is an infidel and a heathen" says the Post and adds that in that spirit Secretary Shaw denounced Governor Cummins of Iowa for daring to say that a single

Dingley schedule might be revised. The whole tariff has now become sacred. Any rash Uzzah who dares to lay a hand upon it may expect to fall dead. But Mr. Shaw's proof of the inviolate nature of the tariff was bizarre. He appealed to the President, as a sort of high priest of protection. Not once since his election in 1904, solemnly averred the Secretary, has Mr. Roosevelt lisped a syllable about tariff revision. The inference is that any Republican who does is no better than a traitor. Of course Secretary Shaw would not have said that unless he felt fully authorized to say as much for his chief.

What Secretary Shaw says is true, however, then President Roosevelt was a "traitor" when he delivered his ardent tariff revision speeches of 1902, and wrote his suppressed tariff reform message of 1904. The tariff is one question on which President Roosevelt seems to have surrendered completely. If he is the candidate against Mr. Bryan the tariff will be the paramount issue, and the man who argued for revision even as a standpat of the Cannon and Shaw stripe.—Galveston News.

Good horses, good hogs, and good stock of all kind is as easy to raise as the scrubs, and the expense of raising good stock is not as great as that of the proper kind. Begin to improve the farm stock and when you have something to sell you can always rest assured that there will be a good market for same. A good horse will sell in Nacogdoches today for \$150.00, while the "nag" usually sells for about \$35. All the care and attention give the nag will not increase its value and the same care and attention give to a well bred horse will put it on the market at about four times the price of the scrub stock. "A blind man can see the difference." Begin to improve the stock of East Texas, and bring money from other sections here for good stock.

THE people invite a discussion of laws and measures by those who are capable of discussing the same, but not approve of saying mean things about the character of any candidate. In the campaign of Colquitt and Bell, each of the gentlemen are saying things that is hurting the cause for which each is advocating. The fact that a man twenty-five years ago voted a prohibition ticket, or voted an anti ticket has no bearing upon the race for the office of governor. Yet some of the candidates are defending the position they took on the questions before the people at that time. It's the now and the future that the people are interested in.

THE Woodmen Log Rollers Association of Nacogdoches county will hold their first event in this city on July 10. Every Woodman in the county should try and make it convenient to attend the gathering. Prominent Woodmen speakers will be present to address the people on that day on the aims, object and the benefits of the order.

## CLIP AND COMMENT.

We are in receipt of a copy of the famous "Circular No. xxv" from the post office department, about which such a great howl is going up all over the country, and having read it carefully, see no reason why any legitimate newspaper should howl about such a ruling. Any ruling that bars a large percentage of fake publications from the mail, and requires a newspaper to show a legitimate subscription list is a good ruling for the newspaper that is conducted on business principles, and so far as we are concerned we say "go it, Mr. Madden," and knock out all the dead loads of trash the United States is paying for hauling.—Caldwell News Chronicle.

The News Chronicle has the correct idea. Legitimate publications are in no wise effected or injured by the ruling of the Third Assistant Postmaster General and the only howl heard so far is from the fakes of Indiana and Maine.

In an article on "Senatorial Wealth," Ira E. Bennett, a Washington correspondent, catalogues Senator Joe Bailey of Texas as being worth \$1,000,000 and is therefore eligible to membership in the millionaire's club which supposedly controls the American house of lords. There was an impression in Texas that Senator Bailey had been exceedingly thrifty in late years, but few credited him with having an accumulated million plunks since he entered public life.—Beaumont Journal.

Why should it be surprising that Senator Bailey is now a Millionaire. True he was a very poor man when he was elected to Congress but his brilliant career there soon attracted big clients to him and that eighty-five thousand dollar fee he received from the Waters-Pierce Oil Co, for representing them in Texas soon after his election to Congress marked the turning point in his fortune. He has been piling up the ducats ever since. More than five years ago he owned bonds against the Houston Oil Co, or some such concern, amounting to more than a quarter of a million dollars. Senator Bailey lived a poor man long enough to learn the value of wealth and he is not in Congress altogether for his health.

The Sentinel's Oak Ridge correspondent states that the boll weevils have made their appearance in some of the fields in that section of the county in such quantities that some of the farmers are plowing the cotton under and planting peas instead. The weevil is making its appearance earlier this year than for some years past, and it is as numerous as some of the correspondents assert, there will be little hope for a cotton crop in Nacogdoches County this year. The crop of last year will not exceed 7,000 bales in this county, and if the crop is cut down proportionately this year as that of last, there will not be enough of the fleecy staple raised in Nacogdoches to make a medium sized handkerchief.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

The Sentinel is not discouraged, but adds that "one thing is very certain, if the boll weevil does begin its work on

the cotton crop within the next few weeks, the farmers can turn it under and raise June corn and peas."—Dallas News.

**NATIONAL LIQUOR DEALERS.**

Association Issued Address to People of the United States.

Louisville Ky., June 6.—The National Liquor Dealers' association, which opened its annual convention here issued an address to the people of the United States, in which the belief of its members in temperance is expressed. Obedience to the law is indorsed; the work of the various temperance societies is commended, and the statement is made that intoxication should be considered a crime. The address says, in part:

"The white ribbon movement, the blue ribbon movement, and the anti-saloon movement were causes for protests on the part of good men and women against two of the greatest evils, drunkenness and those saloons which are conducted in a disreputable manner or else in such a way as to demoralize rather than to elevate those who patronize them, and we, the delegates to this convention of the wine and spirits trade, desire to express our entire sympathy with efforts that have been put forth to exterminate the evils and our willingness to lend co-operation and assistance.

"We believe that wines and spirits are blessings per se, intended by an all-wise Providence to bring health and happiness to mankind.

"We believe that the legal manufacture and sale of wines and spirits is an honorable trade and one that should be respected by society and by the laws.

"We believe that the saloon can and should be so conducted that men would not hesitate to visit them accompanied by their wives and children, and that the atmosphere of such places should be beneficial to both mind and body."

Agreed Judgment Entered for Mrs. Birkmeyer for \$4000.

Houston, Tex., June 6.—An agreed judgment for \$6400 was entered this morning in the fifty-fifth district court in the suit of Mrs. Louise A. **ELECTION LAW CONFUSION**

More Trouble Arises in Connection With the Measure.

Austin, Tex., June 6.—It appears that considerable confusion has arisen as to the construction of sections 111 and 115 of the Terrell election law, which it has caused State Chairman Andrews and others considerable worry.

Judge Claud Pollard, office assistant general, who has the task of interpreting the Terrell election law, yesterday afternoon authorized the following statement on the matter:

"Section 111 of the Terrell election law provides for a meeting of county executive committees on the third Monday in June for the purpose of deciding how the names of candidates shall be placed on the official ballot. Section 115 of this law refers to a meeting of the county executive committees which meets the second Monday in June. This is beyond doubt a clerical mistake and refers to the meeting provided for on the third Monday in June. There is no necessity for the meeting of county executive committees on the second Monday in June."

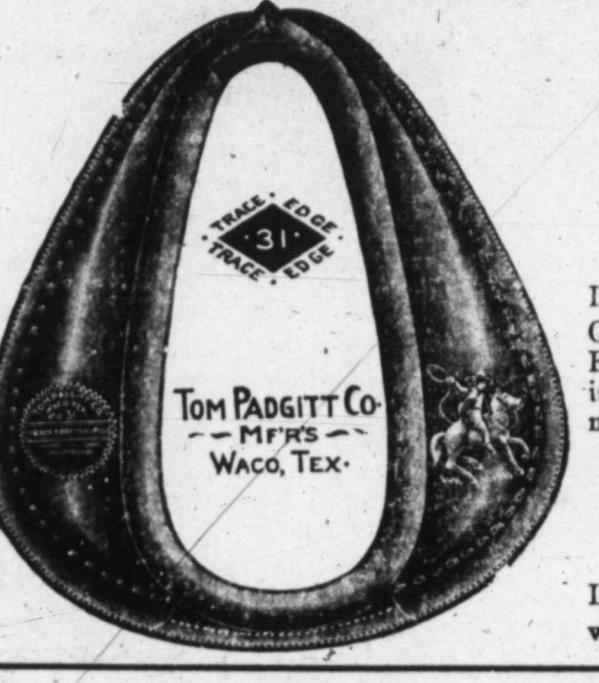

**Dedicated to Mossbacks.**  
Del Rio, Tex.—"Woodman spare the moss." I read a newspaper article yesterday, from the New Orleans States, that is covered all over with moss. Truly, it is the mossiest document I ever read and I want to reproduce it and dedicate it to the mossbacks of Nacogdoches. Just think of the work and toil we have undergone for twenty centuries to keep the wolf from the door, when we could have stood on the front door step every morning and gathered rations for the entire day with no effort save the reaching forth of the hand. The States seems to be a little skeptical and refuses to believe that moss is more palatable than potatoes or more toothsome than tomatoes and will not be convinced until it sees a trust formed to gobble up all the moss producing timber in the country. "We are told," says the States, "that a new and great discovery has been made. A number of newspapers in the north have announced that moss is destined to become a popular food for the masses of the people on account of its great nutritive value. It is said that a sumptuous meal sufficient for six healthy people can be provided at a cost of only two cents. But we refuse to put our faith in this interesting story until the fact has been established that a trust with big capital has been organized to corner the supply of moss and fix the price. There is not the least doubt, however, that it moss is really native food for the people that it will soon be placed further from the reach of the masses than the limbs of the trees on which it now grows. At the present time the eating of moss is confined almost exclusively to the frolicsome goat and the pensive cow, but it is probable that they are several centuries in advance of man in discovering that moss is a good thing. If it be true that moss is a food upon which we can live and wax fat, then there is nothing for us to do but sit down and weep volumes of brine as we think of the years of beef trust extortion we could have avoided had we known the beautiful truth. It will be in order, however, when we have dried our swollen eyes, to burst into another fit of lamentation at the thought that the discovery will prove of only fleeting benefit to the struggling masses of humanity, for the trusts will gobble up all the lands and timber producing moss and that which generous nature has furnished for the use of man will be held and sold at steadily advancing prices. However if the fact is established that moss is actually more nutritious than potatoes it will be time for us all to stand on our feet, and rejoice mightily because conditions in this country have long been pointing ominously to the day when the patient and helpless multitude, stripped of all share in the nation's income, would be compelled to eat hay, hence there is for them a glimmer of hope in the fact that moss is more delicate and toothsome and nourishing than stewed hay. If the people are wise,

as we think they are, they will profit by the example of the busy bee, which improves each shining hour, and lay up a goodly supply of moss while the woods are open, for as certain as fate, it moss pans out to be an excellent article of food, that such eminent "Christian gentleman" as Ryan, Rocketeller, Morgan and Harriman, to whom God in his infinite wisdom has intrusted the business interests of the country," according to so good an authority as Mr. Baer of the coal trust, will soon have a moss trust operating at full blast in this land of the freeboater and the home of the tariff brigand."

Just imagine what a vast waste of wealth and labor has been going on in East Texas for a hundred years in the clearing of the woods and the tilling of the soil, when we could have fared sumptuously on the moss from the trees we cut down. Its enough to make a lazy man sick to think about the labor he has been forced to perform to get a living by the sweat of his face, when he could have laid in the shade and eat moss, with no care for the morrow. I dreamed of moss all last night, and the first thing I saw this morning was twenty Mexicans raking moss from the irrigation ditches that run through the town.

That changes the subject, though the theme is still moss. There is a kind of water moss that grows in the beds of the streams of this country and sometimes gets so rank as to almost obstruct the flow of water. It is particularly troublesome to the Irrigation company and fills up the ditches so bad that at least once a month the water has to be shut off and the moss cleaned out.
