# School Board Signs Additional Teachers

Two new faculty members for Bovina Schools have been named following a Thursday night meeting of the school district's board of trustees.

Selected by the board were a vocational agriculture teacher and a teacher to be assigned to a class at a later date.

The new vocational agriculture teacher is **Monroe Gates, a graduate of West Texas State University at Canyon.**

They are in the process of moving to Bovina where Gates will begin his assignment here Sunday.

One, and possibly two, positions on the faculty remain vacant, said Jacobs.

Trustees named a tax equalization board consisting of Don Murphy, Edward Isaac, Thomas Rhodes, Robert Read and Tom Bonds.

Mrs. Monroe [Mildred] Gates was also elected as a teacher for the 1973-'74 school year, subject to assignment.

A graduate of Eastern New Mexico University at Portales, she also attended West Texas State University at Canyon. She has taught at Claude, Canyon and Silvertown in different subject areas, said Superintendent L.F. Jacobs.

Mr. and Mrs. Gates have one son, Jim, who will be an eighth grade student in Bovina Junior High.

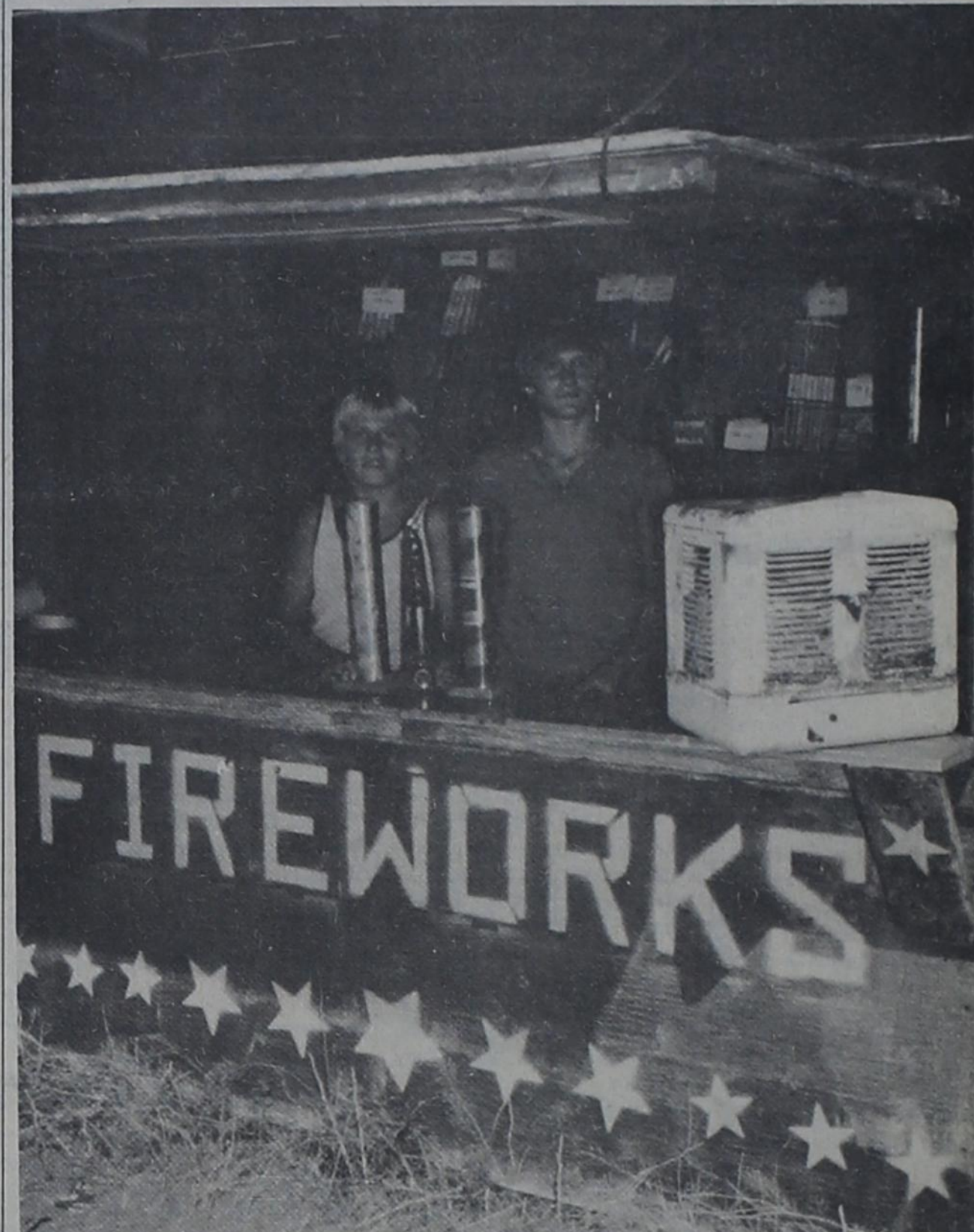

# Bovina Blade Wins Plaque, Certificate

The Bovina Blade won a first place plaque and a third place certificate at the Texas Press Association convention in Houston this weekend.

The plaque to be received by The Blade this year will be in the category of "Appearance" in Division VI (under 2,000 population) of the annual contests.

The third place certificate will be in the category of "News Writing" in the same division.

The Blade won the "General Excellence" award in 1971, making the newspaper ineligible for any awards in 1972. In '70, the newspaper won the news feature contest, in '69 the news writing, and in '68 the news pictures event. It has

previously won the appearance and news writing another year.

Farwell's State Line Tribune received third place in the appearance contest in the same division as The Blade, VI.

Entries sent by The Blade this year in the appearance contest—which is judged on the readability of the publication, originality in use of type and general makeup and typography throughout the entire issue—were dated March 8, 15 and 22. Judging this event was Ray Kimball of DeQueen, Ark.

Entries in the news writing contest were dated July 5, 12 and 19 with judging based on the front page of those issues. Judge was Cone Magie of Cabot, Ark.

**CROP REPORTS FROM FARMERS NEEDED**

In early July, over 23,000 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry--agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Rounding out the program, beginning at dark or around 10 p.m., will be the fireworks display at the football stadium, under the direction of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department.

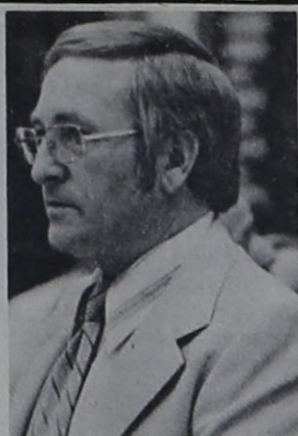
This is the fifth annual patriotic program and fireworks display. A "bigger and better" display has been promised for the occasion.

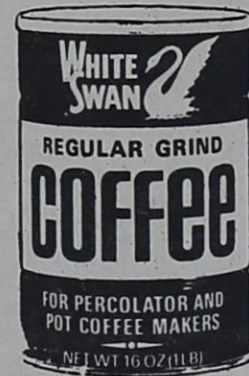

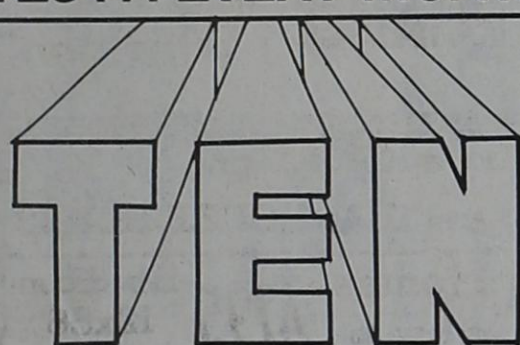

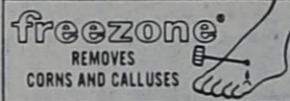
