The County Organization Met in Woodmen Hall Yesterday.

Yesterday afternoon, after the barbecue, the delegates to the Log Rolling Association met in the Woodmen hall on the north side of the public square.

The meeting was called to order by W. E. Thomason president of the association.

Roll of officers was called, and the minutes of the last meeting held in this city were read and approved.

THE GARRISON BARBECUE.

Congressman Brooks Answers Unsigned Circular in Plain Language

After the dedication of the new castle hall of Greenwood Lodge Knights of Pythias, the assembly was dismissed and invited to follow the band the famous red springs in a beautiful grove near the town. Arriving at the picnic grounds, the assembly was called to order and the crowd invited to come near the speakers stand and hear what the candidates had to say.

Judge Ingraham was called to the speakers stand and was introduced as the candidate from Nacogdoches county for state senate. Judge Ingraham, that statesman and democrat, and all round good man in any position in life, told the people present language in unmistakable where he stood upon the questions now before the people. He also referred to the three amendments to the constitution, and stated that he was in favor of levying a tax upon the taxable property of the state for the purpose of paying jurors; that he was in favor of exempting the property acquired by institutions of learning for a period of years as set forth in the printed amendments which appeared in the several papers of the state and that he hoped the voters of the state would pass these amendments, but the third and the last amendment wherein the proposition was made to increase the pay of the members of the legislature was one that the voters of the state should show under by their ballots at the general election. He told them where he stood upon the matter of the local option question, and what he favored in the way of pensioning the old Confederate veterans and also providing a home for the good wives of the old veterans. His views upon the matter of choice of candidates was plain language and he said that he wanted to be elected on his merits and qualifications, and not from a matter of sectional pride. That if his friends in this county did not give him the nomination because they thought him well qualified and worthy of the trust that he would step down and out of the race.

After the close of Judge Ingraham's address he introduced Hon. E. B. Pickett of Liberty county who is a candidate for the same position. Mr. Pickett paid a high compliment to Judge Ingraham and to the county and stated that he was not here for the purpose of trying to change a vote from Judge Ingraham, but that in every county there was a few scattering votes that would go to someone else, and if such was the case in this county that he would like to be favored with the vote. He then turned the limelight upon the action of the executive committee of Hardin county in permitting the negroes to participate in the democratic primary election, and then stated that Mr. Dies who was a candidate for the senate had been a party to the agreement.

After the remarks of Pickett, Judge Ingraham introduced Hon. W. W. Dies of Hardin county. Mr. Dies also paid Judge Ingraham a high tribute, and said he was also after the few scattering votes, if there should be, any in this county, that Judge Ingraham would not get. He then took up the charges

made by Mr. Pickett in regard to the negro problem in his county. He said that he had nothing whatever to do with the matter as it was wholly a matter that the executive committee had to deal with; that he had informed his friends that it would take all his time in explaining to the voters in the district how it happened. That when he saw that they would permit the negroes to participate in the primary election that he suggested that the words "I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this primary."

The dinner hour having arrived the people were invited to partake of the finest dinner ever spread at a public gathering in this or any other county in the state. The good ladies of the town of Garrison and vicinity vied with each other in preparing good things in the way of chicken pie, baked chicken, fried chicken, pies, cakes, custards, etc., while the chief of the barbecue tried to out do the ladies cooking the meat he had prepared. The Sentinel man was permitted to have the freedom of the grounds and the dinner table, and can vouch for the fact that the good things were not put in one place, but were all over the long tables prepared to feed the multitude. There was enough for all and a lot left over, just how many baskets full was left after the feast. The Sentinel is not prepared to say

After dinner the people were invited to the speaker's stand again, and Judge Ingraham introduced Hon. W. B. O'Quinn of Lutkin, who was present to present to the voters the claims of Mr. Tom Campbell of Palestine, the great commoner of Texas, and a candidate for governor. The platform of Mr. Campbell was fully explained to the voters; the taxation proposition as presented to the public by Mr. Campbell in his opening speech was reviewed, and the speaker made it so plain that all could understand Mr. Campbell's position. The rebate story that the opponents of Mr. Campbell were circulating was taken up, and the people were convinced from the position Mr. Campbell occupied as general manager of the International & Great Northern railroad, that it would have been impossible for him to have authorized the rebates in question. The matter of granting rebates was a matter that came under the care of the general freight agent of the roads, and that the circulators of the report knew this to be a fact.

When Mr. O'Quinn closed his address, Hon. Moss Adams introduced Congressman M. L. Brooks. In substance he said:

"I am indeed grateful to the good people of Nacogdoches county for the honors they have bestowed upon me in the past, and shall ever feel grateful. I am also grateful to the ladies for their presence here on this occasion, while they are not voters, yet they wield a great influence in all matters pertaining to the homes of the country. The ladies of the South would not vote if they had an opportunity.

"My history as your public servant in congress is before you, and for these services I would like to be returned as your servant again. From the time I received the nomination I was hampered to a great degree; after having been elected I was served with notice of Mr. Houston's intention to contest my election, and before being sworn into office Mr. Cooper had announced his intention to be a candidate at the next election. I did

not feel worried over the contest, because I knew the election had been fair.

"While in Washington as your congressman, I conscientiously done my duty as your representative, and when important questions were presented, I was there to perform the duty you sent me there to perform. The Philippine Tariff, the Statehood Bill, and the Interstate Commerce Bill, were some of the measures that came before congress, and I voted solidly with the party upon these measures, and those of you who are readers of the newspapers have no doubt kept up with these measures as they were reported. On the Statehood bill the republicans were against the admission of New Mexico and Arizona as states, fearing that it would increase the democratic representation in con-

gress. While the Interstate Commerce bill was favored by Mr. Roosevelt, yet he had borrowed it from the democrats. On every issue that came before congress I was there to represent you.

"I introduced a bill appropriating \$500,000 for the improvement of deep water at Sabine pass. I used every effort to have the available funds for the deepening of the canal from the Neches river to the mouth of Taylor's Bayou, but I do not claim this honor of having the money appropriated, but did diligently work for the expenditure of the available funds.

"Introduced the Port Arthur Bill of Entry. The Port Arthur canal is a magnificent body of water, 183 feet wide at the top, 75 feet wide at the bottom, and is 24 feet deep, with slips and turning basins.

Before the ways and means committee. I delivered a speech in behalf of the bill. This measure assures to the people of Southeast Texas a port of entry where the markets of the world will be open to the people of this district. The government will receive in exchange for making a port of entry at Port Arthur the canal that connects Taylor's Bayou with the deep waters of the Gulf of Mexico.

"In securing appropriations for the improvement of deep water at Sabine Pass, my opponent may claim the honors of securing these, but to Col. Herndon of Tyler is to be given the honor of first laying the foundation for securing appropriations. When he was the congressman of this district he secured the first appropriation, amounting to \$22,000 for the improvement of

the pass at Sabine Pass. Then when Hon. John H. Reagan was your congressman, he secured an appropriation of \$500,000 for the improvement of deep water. When Mr. Stewart was congressman he secured an appropriation, which with the others made an aggregate of \$1,800,000. Since the discovery of oil and other commercial developments have taken place throughout the district and this section of Texas has been advertised as it was never before, the Government has been very liberal in appropriations for the improvement of deep water on the Texas coast. In reference to the Port Arthur Bill of Entry, my opponent will tell you that I was assisted in securing the passage of the bill by Mr. John W. Gates, but he will not tell you that the firm

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Certain Exemptions from Taxation.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to certain exemptions from Taxation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same shall read as follows, to-wit:

"All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by churches or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages; that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The governor of the State shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and County officers.

Section 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas shall vote upon this amendment on the day of — at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to section 2, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 2, Article 8, of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes."

Section 4. The sum of \$5000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing Salaries and Per Diem of Legislators.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amendment of Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others, by members of the Legislature of free passes, franchises, privileges or advantages from certain persons and corporations.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That at the next general election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had or ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their approval or disapproval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

Sec. 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not exceeding one thousand dollars for the year succeeding their election, payable in equal installments, on the first days of January, February, March and August of the year succeeding their election, and five dollars per

day for each day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning to the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed three cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session. It shall be unlawful for any member of the Legislature during his term of office to accept any free transportation over any railway line or lines in this State, and any member of the Legislature violating the provisions of this Act prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded to the general public from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons, firm or corporations acting as a common carrier in this State. Any member of the Legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of this Article.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Levy of a Tax to Pay Jurors.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents, on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

Sec. 2. The governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1906, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "For the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors." The voters opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors."

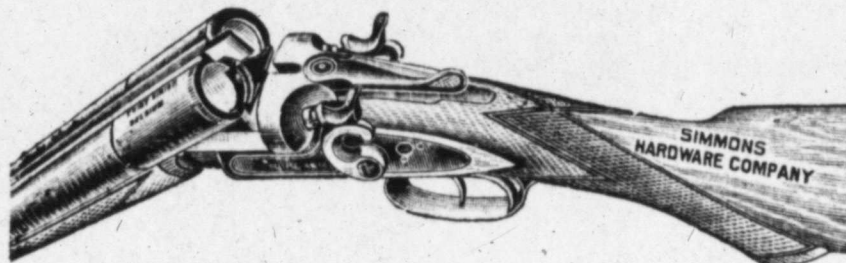

of Kountze Brothers who are bankers of New York, assisted him in securing appropriations of large sums for the improvement at Sabine Pass. Mr. Luther Kountze told me this himself, and said that he had assisted Mr. Cooper in securing the appropriations. The firm of Kountze Brothers own practically all the water front at Sabine Pass.

"While your congressman I went before the ways and means committee and spoke in favor of the bill stopping C. O. D. shipments of whiskey into prohibition districts. The matter was then referred to the judiciary committee, but the republican members would not report upon the bill.

"There are live issues in the Cooper and myself, and I want you to take me literally for what I say. I believe that I am capable and honest, and I would not accept the nomination at your hands otherwise, and I invite a comparison of the records while your congressman as to my ability to represent the district. A comparison of the Congressional Record the last two years of Mr. Cooper's term in congress and the term I have served you and you cannot fail to see which one is better fitted to represent you in congress.

"It is said that Mr. Cooper is making this race to vindicate his friend, John Henry Kirby. Mr. Kirby was at the head of one of the greatest trusts or corporations the state of Texas has ever known the Houston Oil Co. and in this corporation Mr. Cooper will tell you that he (Cooper) was a member of the board of directors.

"Mr. Cooper's record on important measures before congress, shows that he was never there to take part in the proceedings but was always paired, paired, paired.

"In referring to his record in congress, Mr. Cooper will tell you that when he was first elected to congress that he delivered a speech on the tariff question and also a free silver. When congress decided to expend \$3,000,000 of the peoples money for an office building there was only one dissenting vote against the measure, and that was a representative from Panhandle district of Texas, and Mr. Cooper cannot tell you that he voted against it—for he did not. For he was not looking after the interests of the people. He was probably attending to business for the Houston Oil Co. of which he was a director.

"Mr. Cooper's record shows that he was in favor of Sabine Pass as a port of entry against Port Arthur, when it is a fact that the Houston Oil Co. had large interests in that place.

"It returned to congress as your representative, I will endeavor to secure the passage of a bill by which the land titles of the people of East Texas, can have their rights protected. The Houston Oil Co. has options on thousands of acres of land in East Texas, and the farmers cannot make any disposition of their land and timber, and when they do they are dragged into court at Houston. I am informed that there are four hundred cases on the dockets of the court concerning the lands of the farmers of this part of the state.

"As to the unsigned circular which has been circulated, Mr. Cooper knows that it was done to injure me and prejudice the people. He is here and he knows it to be a contemptible and willful falsehood. He would have you

believe that I favor social equality. While I was a member of the legislature, I may have made some blunders but I can assure you that I was honest in everything that I done. At that time this part of Texas had but few railroads, and the district I represented had none, and in the stock and bond law I believed that it would work against the interest of the people of the district I represented. Since it has been a law I am convinced of the fact that it was a good thing, and the honest railroad company is also convinced that it was a good law. As to social equality I refer you to the acts of Mr. Cooper while he was a collector under the Cleveland administration. For several months after taking charge of the office he had a negro clerk in the office, Joe Coney, and kept him there until the people demanded that the negro be removed, and a white man be given the place.

"The power behind Mr. Cooper's candidacy is Mr. Kirby of Houston. He is a large owner in some newspapers and through this means these large papers are writing editorials and the little papers in the district are reproducing them.

"Mr. Cooper tried to sell to the government the Port Arthur canal and for the sale, if the price was agreeable to the owners, Mr. Cooper was to receive a commission of ten per cent.

"Mr. Cooper will tell you that I appointed Capt. Truitt of Shelby county as my secretary and will say that it should have been given to a young and ambitious man. The young and ambitious young man while Mr. Cooper was serving you as congressman was his son. Why did he not give to some other young man in the district? Capt. Truitt is an honorable and a good citizen, and for the fact that I made him my secretary Mr. Cooper should not bring reproach against him."

At the close of Mr. Brooks speech Mr. Adams introduced Hon. S. B. Cooper who replied to the remarks of Congressman Brooks. His talk was principally in trying to show the people that he was running for office strictly upon the errors which are alleged to have been committed by Mr. Brooks while a member of the legislature. While he frequently referred to his record as congressman, he had no record to show why he should be chosen as the representative of the people of the second district. He mentioned the fact that he had delivered a "tariff speech" and a speech on "free silver," but further than that, if he had accomplished anything in congress he did not have a record of it. Close attention was given Mr. Cooper's speech and his admirers say that it was a great effort.

Mr. Brooks had fifteen minutes to reply to the remarks of Mr. Cooper, and he went into the spirit of the occasion and without gloves. It was largely a Brooks crowd and the Brooks badges indicated which way the political matters in the district were blowing.
