### ROPER KILLED HIMSELF.

Prisoner Who Slew Fellow Prisoners at Lufkin Committed Suicide.

Lufkin, Texas, Aug. 20.—John B. Roper, who killed two fellow prisoners in the county jail here on the 15th instant, ended the chapter of his heinous crimes by hanging himself in his cell last night, using a strip from a blanket.

He acknowledged a few days ago that he was a member of the Dalton gang of bank robbers at Longview, Texas, in 1892. Sheriff Watts also has positive evidence that Roper is the man wanted in Arkansas for the murder of Sheriff Boyd in 1892, and for which a reward of \$1000 is offered.

Roper has acknowledged to various crimes in Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas.

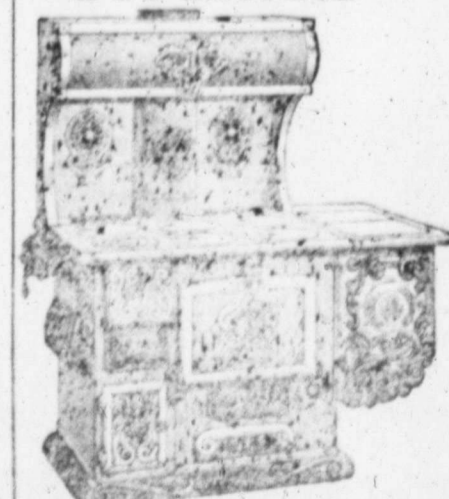

THE DEMOCRATIC TICKET.

The democratic convention which just adjourned at Dallas, confirmed the will of the democracy of Texas by nominating the officers selected by the people at the July primary election.

The following is the democratic ticket.

J. W. Bailey, U. S. senator.  
T. M. Campbell, governor.  
A. B. Davidson, lieutenant-governor.

R. V. Davidson, attorney general.

J. W. Stephens, comptroller.  
J. J. Terrell, land commissioner.

Sam Sparks, treasurer.  
R. B. Cousins, superintendent public instruction.

L. J. Storey, railroad commissioner.

R. R. Gains, chief justice supreme court.

John N. Henderson, judge court criminal appeals.

The supreme judicial convention of the first district will convene Saturday, August 25, and will nominate W. H. Gill for chief justice court civil appeals, and T. S. Reese associate justice, of the same court.

THERE can be no mistake but that the present tariff law enables a number of the trusts to rob the people.

THE platform of Dallas convention is the best platform the democrats have had for a number of years.

THE republican state convention in session at El Paso has re-elected Hon. Cecil Lyon as state chairman. Mr. Lyon has been instrumental in building up his party during his term as chairman, and it was to show their appreciation of his efforts on behalf of the party that the delegates re-elected him as their chairman.

THE "coon" soldiers got their stinking hides full of Mexican booze the other day at Brownsville and got on a rampage, and proceeded to shoot up the town. If Uncle Sam must have "coon" soldiers he should send them to the Philippine Islands where they can mix up with people of their own color and cussedness.

IN the general election in November the blanket ballot will be about the size of a town garden and will contain the tickets of the following parties: Democratic, Republican, Prohibition, Socialist, and Re-Organized Republicans. The latter party is "Goose neck Bills" wing of the party and is the "black and tans."

THE plank in the Texas democratic platform demanding a blanket primary is one of the planks that Mr. Campbell, will readily endorse. The last campaign and painful wait between the primary election and the date of the nominating convention has converted 99 per cent of the voters of Texas that the blanket primary is the proper method of selecting nominees for both state and county.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

1. We indorse and commend the present administration of Governor S. W. T. Lanham as faithful to the interests of the people of Texas, and return the thanks of the democracy to our state officials for their faithfulness and efficiency in office.

2. We demand that the next legislature enact such a law as will define and prohibit lobbying.

3. We favor the enactment by the next legislature of a law prohibiting the issuance of free passes or the giving of free transportation, franks or privileges, in any form, by railroads or other corporations within this state, except to those employed by said corporations and their families, the indigent poor, for whom application is made by religious or charitable organizations, sheriffs, rangers and other peace officers whose duties are to execute criminal process; and we request the next governor of this state to keep the legislature in session, if necessary, by extraordinary call until the law as is herein demanded has been passed.

4. We demand the enactment of a law prohibiting corporations from contributing to the campaign expenses of any party or individual or to secure the adoption or defeat of any measure submitted to the vote of the people.

5. We demand the enactment of a law, or, if necessary, the submission of a constitutional amendment to the people of Texas, defining insolvent corporations and prohibiting the same from doing business in this state.

6. We demand the passage of a law compelling telephone and telegraph companies to transmit each other's messages and to make connections necessary therefor at common points.

7. We demand such amendments to our laws regarding private corporations as will require the payment of at least 50 per cent of their capital stock before the filing of a charter and within two years the additional 50 per cent of the capital stock, and that will insure greater publicity and a greater measure of protection to creditors and stockholders.

8. We oppose nepotism and demand the passage of such laws by the next legislature as may be necessary to eliminate the same from the public service in this state.

9. We demand the enactment by the next legislature of a uniform text book law.

10. We demand such early amendments and additions to our present drainage and irrigation laws as will enlarge their scope and generally benefit and render them effective.

11. We recognize that our laws are inadequate to properly deal with youthful offenders and we demand that the legislature enact laws conferring necessary power in courts of competent jurisdiction to the end that youthful offenders may be corrected, reformed and more suitably dealt with.

12. We expressly demand of the next legislature the enactment of such amend-

ments to the Terrell election law as may be found necessary to simplify and perfect the same; and we further demand the adoption of an amendment thereto providing for a uniform test, and such an amendment to the election law as will by a blanket primary enable a majority of the voters of the respective parties to make nominations by direct ballot of the voters without the intervention of conventions.

13. We favor the democratic policy of making ample provision for all of our eleemosynary institutions in order that we may still continue to provide for our helpless wards.

14. Recognizing the importance of good public roads to all of the people of Texas we recommend to the next legislature the enactment of such laws as may be deemed necessary to attain that end.

15. We suggest such legislation as will simplify the procedure in both civil and criminal trials and recommend such reform as may be practicable in our jury system.

16. We recommend that the next legislature submit an amendment to the state constitution authorizing the erection and maintenance of a home for indigent or decrepit wives or mothers of Confederate soldiers and sailors.

17. We recommend that occupation taxes on useful occupations be removed.

18. We believe that the owners of all property which is not exempt from taxation by the constitution of the state, should be compelled to contribute their just proportion toward defraying the expenses of the government, and to the accomplishment of that result we pledge the democracy of Texas to the enactment of such further laws as will secure the just rendition of all property for taxation at its full value, and compel the payment of taxes properly assessed against it, and to the enactment of such laws as will secure the taxation of all property intangible and tangible, including the franchises or intangible assets or property of those corporations which, by reason of the nature of character of their assets or property under the present laws escape their just proportion of taxation.

19. We recommend that a state department of agriculture be established and the same be separate and apart from all other departments and interests and that the same be adequately supported; that there be provided adequate agricultural equipment and teaching force for the state normal colleges, the college of industrial arts for girls, and the A. and M. College, and that industrial thought in the schools be encouraged by teaching the elements of agriculture and of the industrial arts; that the A. and M. College, the college of industrial arts for girls and the state normal colleges, be authorized to grant diplomas having the force of state teachers' certificates to all who complete the necessary course of studies and are graduates in the industrial branches. commend that liberal support be provided for the A. and M. College, the experiment stations, the farmers' institute, the college of industrial arts for girls, and the Texas state university, for the teaching and the training of our youths and the more liberal education of our citizenship. We recommend that the principle of county taxation for school purposes be adopted. We demand that the constitutional requirement for at least six months' time for free school for each child in each year be complied with.

IN The Sentinel of Wednesday there was a little clipping and comment from the Center News relative to the merits of the two towns. The News claiming that good citizens of Nacogdoches and other towns were moving to Center, while in an adjoining column The Sentinel published the arrival of a good citizen of Center who had engaged in business in this place. As The Sentinel has said before, the schools, health, and society of this place is attracting widespread attention, and good people are moving here to make this place their home. Business enterprises here are not overcrowded, and the territory surrounding the town, and the various manufacturing enterprises here will maintain a much larger population than the town has at present.

THE will of the people has been complied with, and Hon. T. M. Campbell of Palestine has been nominated governor of Texas. The nomination of Mr. Campbell is a demonstration that the large dailies have lost their prestige in the matter of making governors, and that the country press is closer to the homes than the big dailies. The country press of Texas was practically a unit for the nomination of Mr. Campbell and when the returns from the July primary election were all in the verdict was that Mr. Campbell was the choice of the common people of this state.

MORE FACTORIES.

There is not a town in Texas but what is a good location for a manufacturing enterprise, and also that the citizens would gladly subscribe to bonuses to get a factory of some kind. Especially is this so of East and Southeast Texas. True it is that large lumber manufacturing concerns have located, and are locating in Eastern Texas, but these concerns are just skimming the fortune that awaits the saw backed by capital. Throughout East and Southeast Texas are many kinds of hardwoods, which, if properly prepared for the manufactures would give to the man, or corporation, placing hardwood lumber on the market handsome dividends on capital invested. That East Texas hardwoods are quite superior to the same specie of timber found elsewhere. Nacogdoches has two hardwood manufacturing concerns and each has a fine line of business. Nacogdoches needs more factories, and especially a cotton mill. This place is an ideal location for one. It is high and dry and is one of the best watered towns in the state. Two mountain brooks wend their way through the town to the Angelina river some twelve miles south of the city. These brooks are fed by springs of the purest free stone water to be had anywhere and the springs are everlasting. Then, too, fuel can be had as cheap here as anywhere. Fuel oil, coal and wood are here in abundance, and last, but but by no means least, is that Nacogdoches is surrounded by a rich farming

country that produces many thousands of bales of cotton.

The cotton mill in the south, and especially Texas, is no longer an experiment. Texas has several cotton mills that have been in successful operation for a number of years, and the report from every mill has been flattering in the way of paying handsome dividends. Besides being a profitable investment to the stock holders, cotton mills employ large numbers of working people and the money paid out in wages finds its way to the merchant, doctor and banker, in fact every business is benefitted. The money paid out for help is not received from the town in which the mills are located, but from other states and foreign countries. Outside money is paid for the product of the mills and this in turn is paid out for help.

The proposition for a cotton mill is one that capitalists should investigate, and The Sentinel columns are open for discussion as to the location of factories in Nacogdoches and the best way to secure them.

A Cabbage Snake.

A few days ago Mr. Prince brought to town a real cabbage snake. He found it in the heart of a cabbage. Desiring to know whether it was poisonous or not, he turned his snakeship over to Dr. Adams, who sent his royal highness to the State Entomologist at College Station. The following is his answer:

College Station, Aug. 6, 1906.—Dr. E. S. Adams, Garrison, Texas. Dear Sir: In the absence of Prof. Conradi, I acknowledge receipt of your cabbage snake. We are very glad to receive these specimens, but as you say it is very familiar. It is not poisonous, and is often found in cabbage, because it breeds in the cabbage caterpillars as a parasite, and crawls from them to the cabbage.

TALK up the democratic rally to be held here in the fall. Nacogdoches should do the proper thing in the way of a celebration.

THERE will be a good crop of cotton raised here this year and if there was a cotton mill here the farmers would get a better price for their crop.

THE pessimist and the knocker are two individuals who should be given an invitation to seek headquarters in some other part of the state.

EVERY one is now satisfied that the Dallas convention busted the governor making machine when Hon. T. M. Campbell was nominated for governor.

THE judicial convention will be held here Saturday for the purpose of confirming the nomination of Beeman Strong as the democratic nominee for district attorney.

NOW then political song writers should write something as successful as the "Campbells are coming", for the presidential campaign for Mr. Bryan.

THE farmers of Nacogdoches county are sleeping on their own rights if they do not put the cotton warehouse through and get it in operation for this season's crop.

SO far every time a farmer leaves this county and goes to the far west looking for a location, he generally returns to Nacogdoches county and is satisfied that it is really the best place for the poor man to live.

EVERY time you write a letter to some of the folks in the old states tell them what a good country this is and what a fine place Nacogdoches county is for the man of moderate means to get a start in the world.

SATURDAY the democratic congressional convention for the second congressional district will convene in this city. The city will be full of delegates and a good time should be shown the visitors while they are here.

If you are thinking of buying Nacogdoches county real estate, you had better hurry and close the deal. Property is cheaper now than it will ever be again. This is not a matter of guess work but a fact that every citizen of the town and county is aware of.

## "LET US REASON TOGETHER."

Is it because the farmers think that if the cotton warehouse is built here that it will be of especial benefit to the merchants? and is that the reason why the farmers are not taking more interest in the matter of subscribing to stock in the enterprise? It looks as if the farmers were thinking along these lines, else the stock would have been oversubscribed long ago. If it is possible that they are thinking along these lines it is about time for them to remove all such thoughts and do a little thinking for Mr. Farmer. In the first place it would be of but little benefit to the cotton buyer as a rule. The cotton buyer turns the cotton over just as fast as possible, and it never remains in the yard long enough to damage while he is holding it. It is the farmer who is the loser. Many times the farmer comes to town with a few bales of cotton and finds that the market is not right and leaves it in the cotton yards exposed to all kinds of weather for several months waiting for the advance which usually follows a very low market. During the winter rains this cotton remains exposed and begins to rot, and when the market reaches the point where the bale can be sold at a profit, lo and behold, there are several pounds taken off on account of the rot. Does the merchant lose this? Not on your picture, but it is the farmer. The Sentinel reporter saw several bales of cotton that was cut fifty pounds, on account of the rot. This amount lost on one bale of cotton would pay for one share in the warehouse. If there were three bales of cotton belonging to the same man on that date and the cotton had all lost the same way there would have been enough lost to buy three shares of the stock. It is the desire of the Union to sell the stock in shares of \$5 each and only one share to the member or farmer, and as the Union has something like 2000 members in this county it certainly should be a small matter to build the house. There are several members who are willing to take a hundred share and more, but the Union wants to place the matter with all the members so that all may share equally in the profits from the proposition. Now then the matter is up to the farmers themselves. They are the ones to be benefitted and if they do not take advantage of the opportunity they will have no one to blame but themselves. If the proposition is lost for good they will in after years think of the fact that they through prejudice—or the lack of business judgment—let the warehouse slip through their fingers. Reason this matter for yourselves and then conclude as to who will be benefitted by the erection of a warehouse where receipts can be issued against the cotton while you are waiting for higher prices. When the cotton is protected and insured a better advance can be secured than if it was left in the rain and weather for a few months. This is a fact that the farmers know, and thus knowing they should act.

THE peanut hay crop is reported good this year from farmers in this county. The farmers have awakened to the fact that diversification of crops is a good thing for the land as well as the purse.

THE new cotton crop in this county is moving at a good rate, and the prospects are that there will be a fine crop if the wet weather does not cause too much of the grown bolls in the low lands to rot on the stalk.

PRECINCT chairmen should confer with the county chairman in regards to the democratic rally. Hon. T. M. Campbell, Senator Bailey and Senator Culberson—will be extended invitations to be present and address the people. It is the intention of the committee to make the rally a general one and all of East Texas will be invited to be present and take part in the festivities.

THE SENTINEL admires the way the correspondent at Mt. Moriah talks about the schools and general progress of that community. This is something the people in every community should do. The county papers would be glad to get the neighborhood news and the more the correspondents brag about the good schools and churches, and what the people are doing just that much good advertising is sent out to the world regarding Nacogdoches county.

TALK up the matter of building a cotton mill in this part of the state and then have the mill built here. Nacogdoches is the very place for the erection of a mill and there is sufficient cotton raised and marketed here to keep a good mill running all the year and then the farmers would have the advantage of getting a better price for their cotton than they do at the present time. To say the least of it they would save the price of transportation.

THE editor has just returned from a trip through a portion of Louisiana and Harrison county (this state) and can vouch for the fact that the crops in this county are far ahead of the growing crops in that section. The farmers here are in better circumstances than they are in the section of the country visited and the stock in Nacogdoches county is in better condition. Fact of the matter is there is no section of country that can compare with old Nacogdoches county.

PEOPLE are prone to think because a few public spirited men take the lead in the matter of securing factories for their town that they are the ones directly benefitted. Such is not the case. There are men in Nacogdoches who have taken the lead in every thing that is proposed for the benefit of the town, who have not directly received a dollar in return for the money, time and labor devoted for the bettering of the town, and yet there are men who have been benefitted directly who will take pleasure in knocking everything the town ever had.

It was announced that it would be built in time to take care of the cotton crop this year, but so far nothing has been done on the building. The Sentinel believes that the farmers are sleeping on their rights by not pushing the warehouse for Nacogdoches county. It will be a good investment to the stockholders as well as be a blessing to every farmer who brings cotton to Nacogdoches. There is enough cotton lost every year in Nacogdoches to pay the cost of construction. It is not yet too late for them to push the matter, and get the house in shape to care for bulk of the crop this year. If there is any thing that this paper can do to help the cause of pushing the warehouse let the fact be known, and the paper will advocate anything that is reasonable to get the house in operation.

Every now and then the report reaches this office that a farmer has gone to some other section on a prospecting trip, with a view of bettering his condition. This is one of the privileges accorded every man who lives in Texas—he can go whenever he gets ready, provided he has the funds to pay his way. But after carefully reviewing the situation it does appear strange that a man would look for a better location than Nacogdoches county—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

**\$10,000 FREIGHT DEPOT.**

The Houston, East & West Texas Making Improvements.

Nacogdoches will soon boast of having one of the finest freight depots in this section of the state. The Houston, East & West Texas is making preparations to erect a handsome building on Main street opposite the union passenger depot. They not only suffered from the flood and the downpour of rain, but Mr. Gans was bitten by the centipede on the leg below the knee, which made a painful sore six or eight inches

Many other parties have gone out from here and returned with poor luck, and altogether the present summer has been put down as the worst in the history of Del Rio for pleasure outtings.

The Nacogdoches party may congratulate themselves that their disappointment was a small matter compared to that met by some who have come since they were here.

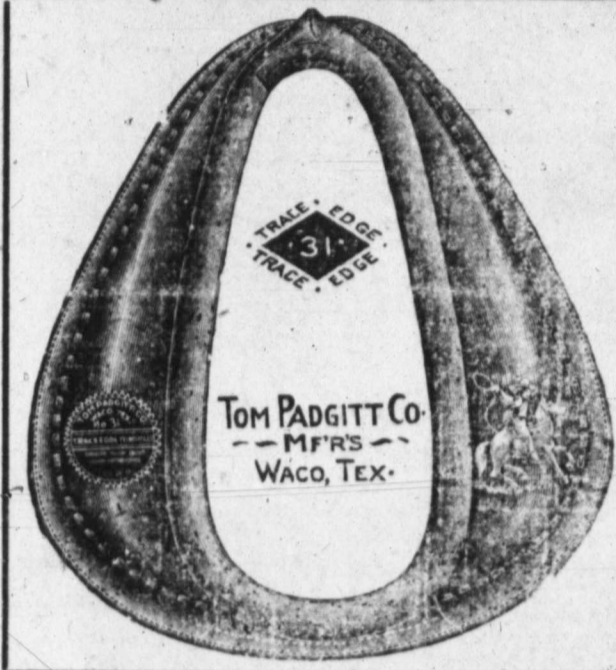

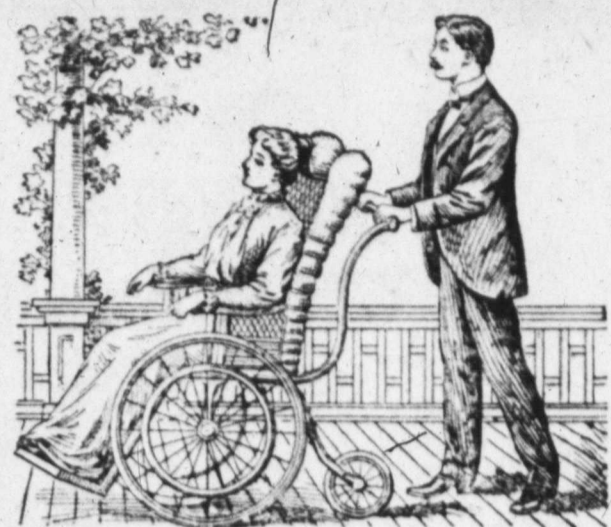

## The School Taxes.

To the Board of Trustees of Nacogdoches Independent School District: You have notified the undersigned to appear before your honors as an equalizing board for said district. I deny your authority in the premises and also your right to attach special taxes other than the 25c on the \$100 for school house bond already outstanding and I object to your unwarranted interferences with my tax list legally rendered by me. In defending them several objections to your authority in the premises it is in order to review some facts applicable to this position taken. Remember that the effort in the first instance to incorporate this district failed because of the fact that Nacogdoches was already incorporated for municipal purposes and in order to accomplish your present incorporation this municipal corporation was abolished and while thus abolished your school district was duly and legally incorporated under "Chapter 15 free schools in towns and villages and declared no desire to incorporate for municipal purposes" and under this law article 3995 you levied 25 cts on the hundred dollars to build your school houses and outstanding bonds given and accepted by the state as a good investment and so it is, and this is the limit of taxation authorized by this law "Chapter 15 public education."

This school corporation stands alone, separate and apart from a municipal corporation of either city or town and your authority to levy taxes under the next chapter 16. Free schools in incorporated towns and cities is not warranted under the facts and premises hereintore stated. Then as you are in the list of town and villages incorporations for school purposes only Art. 4000 said chapter 15 directs you to the board of aldermen in incorporated towns and villages Chapter Eleven, Title XVIII page 149 R. S. Art. 608 of this law reads thus: The corporation shall be assessed and collected by the marshal and if the same be not voluntarily paid he shall have the power to make the collection in the same manner and with like effect as prescribed in chapter six of this title for collection of taxes in cities so far as applicable. Chapter 6 refers to Art. 517 reads in part: If any person fail, neglect or refuses to pay the taxes imposed on him and his property within the time, etc.

Now I have not failed to render my property for taxation to your collector and I have not failed to pay taxes to your independent school district and I find no authority in these laws for your assumption of right to entertere with my tax list. Acting as a board of equalization and I also find no authority to levy and collect more than 25c on the \$100 annually to pay school house bonds and until paid your corporation must stand apart from any municipal corporation entanglement.

The right to blend the two corporations in one is subject to the paramount right to hold the taxpayers to their ob-

ligation as an independent school district, and apply the whole 25c per \$100 value already voted and bonded for your school houses for subsequent municipal corporation cannot impair this obligation. So it is and so it must remain to the end because a merger of these corporations with these bonds imposed would impair this obligation as a municipal corporation must have other public buildings with school houses included.
