ONE OF THE BIGGEST "White Elephant" projects that has come along in our congress in the past several years is the controversial senate office complex, which was begun in 1972 at an estimated cost of \$48 million.

The project is now stalled, waiting additional funding. The latest cost estimate is \$200 million. There is open division among senate members as to the actual need for such a building.

In senate debate last week, Senator Charles Chaffe argued that there was little in the new senate "palace" that the senators actually needed.

For one thing, there will be a new rooftop restaurant with 100 seats. The senate already has two restaurants with 250 seats. Chaffe pointed out that the new addition would provide restaurant service to the senators, or 3.5 seats per

They are also building a new gym, which is twice the size of the two gyms the senators already have. Senator William Proxmire of Wisconsin said he could not imagine a more galling symbol of congressional arrogance than the new gym.

The Wisconsin senator pointed out that he knew that the senate's present gym was used only by two or three senators, otherwise it stands idle all the time.

Senator John Danforth of Missouri points out that IBM is building a major office building in the middle of New York City. It will be at least 40 stories high, and will cost around 75 million dollars. By contrast, the new senate building, and its estimated cost of \$150 to \$200 million, is only five or six stories tall.

"We are building around the wildest dreams of anyone in the business world or anyone out there in the country. It is a palace that we are building," Senator Danforth

The Missouri senator, stating that the only argument advanced by proponents of the new office building is the crowded conditions presently imposed on members of the senate staff. Maybe what they should consider doing is cutting down on the staff, one congressman suggested.

For example, the capitol police department consists of 1,186 officers, hired to protect 535 members of congress, and an estimated 17,000 staff employees. By contrast, Kansas City, Missouri, with a population of over 500,000, has a police force of around 1,200. Sen. Danforth further stated that Hannibal, Missouri, with about the same population as Capitol Hill, manages with only 42 police officers.

The latest action by the senate found the body voting 45-29 against stopping work on the building, and then voting 65-13 to impose a \$135 million ceiling on its construction and "initial furnishing."

However, on August 17, the House of Representatives, which also has to pass on the financial portion, voted against providing more than the original funds, so the senate's "White Elephant" remains a big steel skeleton in the middle of

Washington, D.C. Congresmen, we believe, should have to exist on taxpayers' budgets. In fact, they should be taxpayers themselves. If they were, perhaps they would never launch such a foolhardy project.

Foul Play Seen In McKay Death

Funeral services were held here Sunday for Dannie Lynn McKay, 22, whose charred body was found in a burned pickup last Thursday on a paved county road 20 miles west and ten north of Seminole.

The sheriff's department in Gaines County is suspecting foul play in the young man's death, and has launched an investigation. The department says they are treating the death as a homicide.

McKay was last seen by members of his family about 12 hours before his body was found. He left his parent's home in Bovina Wednesday afternoon, August 16, and was to drive to Dallas to pick up a load of furniture there, return to Bovina, and then start his sophomore year at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales.

McKay had spent the summer working as a sheet metal worker in

McKay's father, Elmer McKay, said his son had stayed out of college in order to make enough money to go back to school. He says he cannot guess why his son would have been on a road near Seminole, which would have put him around 200 miles out of the way in his trip to Dallas.

McKay's body was found by a Gaines County farmer at about 6:55 a.m. Thursday on the road, which is near the Texas-New Mexico line between Hobbs, N.M. and Seminole.

"The body was burned so bad we were unable to determine if there were wounds," said a spokesman for the Gaines County Sheriff's Department. "We don't have anything saying what kind of fire it was, other than it was a hot fire," the deputy continued.



AND U.S. CONSTITUTION

Writer Sees Conflict In Aims

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

When Jimmy Carter took the above oath of office, he swore allegiance to the Constitution of the United States. It is my belief that President Carter has broken faith tee) with the citizens of this country by placing the interests of international

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agencies above our national interests. It is my contention that when he took the oath of office as President, Carter, who promised never to lie to us, told the biggest lie ++++

"We will have world government, whether you like it or not, by conquest or consent." (Statement by James Warburg before the United States Foreign Relations Commit-

"The management of foreign relations appears to be the most susceptible of abuse of all the trusts committed to a Government...." James Madison 1798.

The Trilateral Commission, an elite group of some 250 individuals from the United States, Western Europe and Japan, was established in 1973 by David Rockefeller (who is also the primary source of funding for the Commission.) Its stated purpose is, among other things, to meet semiannually to discuss topics relating to global problems, especially those dealing with economics and politics.

On October 19, 1977, a Paul Scott report revealed the real purpose of the Commission is "to influence or take over all the key policy-making positions in the governments of the United States, Western Europe and Japan." The objective is "permanent coordination of the entire free world and eventually the establishment of a loosely knitted socialistic world government." (Henry Kissinger, who holds dual membership in the Council on Foreign Relations and the Trilateral Commission, has stated he believes that a "loosely knit world government can become a reality by the 1980's.)

Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale are both "former" members of the Trilateral Commission, as are about 25 other members of the Carter Administration. (Commission members serving in the Executive branch are designated as "inactive" or "former" members).

A notable Trilateralist is Z. Brzezinski, the first director of the Commission, and who is now Carter's number one foreign policy adviser. Brzezinski's book, "Between Two Ages," formed the concept for "a community of developed nations" that would direct the world to new levels of freedom, human rights and economic progress. Or, as the Rockefel-

lers and their allies refer to it, "The New World Order." "Because his foreign policy speeches are written by men assigned to him by David Rockefeller, Carter often uses the phrase "New World Order." (Larry McDonald)

The New York Times says that, advised by Brzezinski, Jimmy Carter "has established a consistent theme in his foreign policy statements: 'We must replace balance of power politics with world order politics'." Since Brzezinski holds that the "nation-state as a fundamental unit of man's organized life has ceased to be the principal creative force," what will replace it? He gives us a hint when he states: "International corporations are acting and planning in terms that are far in advance of the political concepts of the nationstate." You can see why David Rockefeller likes "Ziggy."

Cyrus Vance (Secretary of State), Harold Brown (Sec. of Defense) and Michael Blumenthal (Sec. of the Treasury) all hold dual memberships in the CFR and the Trilateral Commission. (Their Rockefeller and CFR connections are tied in closely with their business connections. Besides being Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Rockefeller Foundation, Vance is press connected; he sits on the Board of the New York Times, the most influential newspaper in America.)

We have been told that Brzezinski will be the creative genius in foreign policy and that Vance will be the administrator. That doesn't leave much of a role for Carter to play, except as their spokesman.

Here is a bit of Foreign Policy maneuvering that perhaps you haven't heard about. Last fall, President Carter went to the United Nations in New York, in a very quiet visit, and signed two treaties, reversing 29 years of American foreign policy position.

These treaties, if ratified by the Senate, nullify your right to own private property. This is in complete disagreement with the Constitution which guarantees our right to private property (the 5th and 14th Amendments). This is the Constitution Carter swore to preserve, protect and defend.

A task force report titled "The Crisis of Democracy," written by Brzezinski and other Commission members, was issued in 1974. This

document states, "Some of the problems of governance in the United States today stem from an 'excess of democracy'...(In the Trilateralists opinion, our Constitution allows us too many rights; we would be more easily controlled if we had less freedom). The report recommended limits on freedom of the press, such as "prior restraint" of what newspapers may publish and, should this not control the press sufficiently, the "alternate could well be regulation by the government." (In other words, a government-controlled press)

President Carter was in attendance at the Commission meeting in Japan in 1975 when this report was presented to the full membership. One must believe Carter agreed with the report's recommendations since he made no protest to them in the debate that followed.

It was at this same meeting Brzezinski, speaking from the dais, praised Carter's candidacy (for President) before all the Commissioners. Every member there knew Carter was Rockefeller's (and the Trilateral's) candidate for President. A full year before he became nationally known in the United States, it was known by the "elites" in the Commission that Carter could most likely be our next President.

And here is a tidbit of news about some domestic policy. Executive Orders No. 11921 and No. 11490 can be used to establish a federal dictatorship whenever the President deems it expedient. Should he and the Congress lock horns on an issue the President feels is of vital importance, he can declare by a signed proclamation that a national emergency exists, and from the moment the proclamation is published in the Federal Register, it has the force of law. And under these orders, all food, money, credit, transportation, communications, public utilities, energy and all other facets of the lives of every citizen would be under complete control of the Federal cabinets and agencies.

"All changes toward a socialistic world government are to be brought about quietly with a law passed here in Congress, a treaty negotiated there." (W.S. McBirnie, Ph.D. in "The Trilateral Commission, Amer-

ica's New Secret Government") Though the Trilateral Commission is no longer secret, the fact remains

they are still accomplishing their

goals. "They have kidded themselves by believing that they do represent the mainstream of the American people....The Commission has published some pamphlets, but the strategy continues secretly without debate in public It's being carried out in spite of the wishes of the American people." (Jeremiah Novak in a radio interview).

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
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

Alicia Spring, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Spring, Bovina, has been accepted at Cottey College, Nevada, Missouri, for entrance as a first-year student this fall. Cottey is a two-year, residential liberal arts college for women owned and supported by the more than 200,000 members of P.E.O., a philanthropic, educational organization dedicated to providing educational opportunities for women.

Miss Spring graduated this spring from Bovina High School and will become a member of Cottey's student body of 350. The college maintains a student-faculty ratio of 10-1. The flexible liberal arts curriculum is designed for maximum ease of transfer to a four-year institution after two years at Cottey. The student body is made up of students from 38 states, Canada and eight foreign countries.

Since 1927, when the P.E.O.s accepted Cottey College as a gift from its founder, Virginia Alice Cottey, the campus has expanded to 76 acres, which includes a 33-acre wooded tract surrounding a recreation lodge located 10 blocks from the main campus. Ten buildings on



campus include a library with 65,000 volumes; a sports center with an olympic-size pool and a double-size gymnasium; three dormitories; a new academic building for classes in the sciences, social sciences and humanities; an art building with studios and a gallery; an auditorium and music building; and Main Hall, the original structure built by the founder of the college.

CITIZENS URGED. INSTRUCTED ON WRITING TO CONGRESSMEN

AN OPEN LETTER TO AREA CITIZENS:

By extending the ratification time of the ERA, the House of Representatives established a dangerous precedent in the amending process of our Nation's Constitution. From this day forth any group who wants an amendment passed cannot be denied an extension time if this is allowed to stand

The Constitution does not limit time for ratification, however the U.S. Supreme Court has held that the time allowed for ratification must be reasonable. The Court's purpose is to assure that there be a contem poraneous consensus-that is, that all the ratifications occur close enough together to show a consensus of three-fourths of the

The seven-year time limitation has been included in every constitutional amendment for the past 50 years. For every amendment in our history; seven years has been adequate to determine the will of the people. No amendment has ever taken more than four years.

Former Senator Sam Ervin, who is considered to be one of the nation's experts in constitutional law, said in an interview in "U.S. News and World Report" and a written statement to all members of the House Judiciary Committee, "It's totally unconstitutional to extend the deadline.----It is a perversion of the amendatory process as established by the Constitution." He cites Supreme Court decisions that support his reasoning. Professor Jules B. Gerard, another distinguished constitutional authority, says almost identically the same things regarding legality of the extension in his written statement to the House Judiciary Committee.

The idea of allowing states over

ten years to change their minds from "No" to "Yes"--but denying them the right to change from "Yes" to "No"--runs contrary to the American concept of fairness. Yet that is the double standard of the ERA proponents. Rep. Billy Lee Evans, a Democrat from Georgia told his colleagues: "As a member of the Georgia legislature, I favored ERA. I oppose extension because I believe in equal rights for ALL women. This includes the rights of those women who oppose ERA. I disagree with those women who were satisfied seven years ago with the limitation and who now come back on the verge of defeat and want seven more years. The time for that was then. I cannot face those women who opposed ERA and now have victory in sight at the end of a long battle, and say I'm moving that victory beyond your grasp. Yet that is precisely the 'heads I win, tails you lose' kind of scheme that the House of Representatives has endorsed."

The extension is being considered in the Senate Judiciary Committee at this time. Pam Turner, Senator Tower's legislative aide, said that it is imperative to write members of this committee and express our opinions on this vitally important issue. Also write own state Senators.

Here is what to ask these persons: 1. Vote NO on the ERA Time Extension Bill, because it is illegal. 2. Vote YES on an amendment to allow rescissions.

3. Require a 2-3 vote on any ERA Time Extension Bill. Article V. of the Constitution states: The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution-The Time Extension passed the House by a simple majority, which is in violation of our Constitution.

Once you have decided to sit down and write to your representatives, how do you proceed?

First, keep in mind that letters discussing current, pending legislation will receive more attention than general observations. Next, avoid any kind of form letter suggested by any organization, however well-meaning. You will note Common Cause does not use this technique, instead always asking members to compose their own letters, in their own words. This is because we are constantly informed by Congressional staffs on the Hill that form letters rank very low on the totem pole in influencing Congressmen and Congresswomen.

Here are some tips on writing to your representatives:

- 1. Write on personal or business letterhead (if you have it), and sign your name over your signature if you have typed the letter.
- 2. Put your return address on the letter. Envelopes get thrown away.
- 3. Identify your subject clearly, giving the name of the legislation you are writing about, and the bill number if you know it.
- 4. State your reason for writing. Your own personal experience is the best supporting evidence. Tell how the issue would affect you, your family, community, or livelihood - or the effect you

believe it would have on your community or state, or on our country.

- 5. Be as brief as you can without losing the message you want to convey.
- 6. Use your own words, and avoid stereotyped phrases that sound like form letters.

7. Be reasonable. Don't ask for the impossible or

- engage in threats. 8. Ask your legislators to state their positions on the issue in their replies. You are entitled to
- 9. Time the arrival of your letter so it reaches the Capitol before legislation is acted upon in the committee or on the floor. (See the section,

"When To Write Your Representatives.")

10. Be sure to thank your legislators if they have done something you think is right on a particu-

Letters to your representatives have maximum impact when they concern pending legislation. To know when key legislation is coming up, watch for "Action Alerts" in your copies of the Common Cause publication, FrontLine. Here, you will also find background facts and the most up-to-date information on legislation. If you require additional information and there is sufficient time, write to Common Cause's headquarters in Washington, D.C. Otherwise, telephone us collect (202/833-1200) and ask for the person handling your state in the Washington Connection. Or, if that person is not in, ask for the manager of the Washington




