Mr. Robert Scott still lingers under the baleful effects of rheumatism.

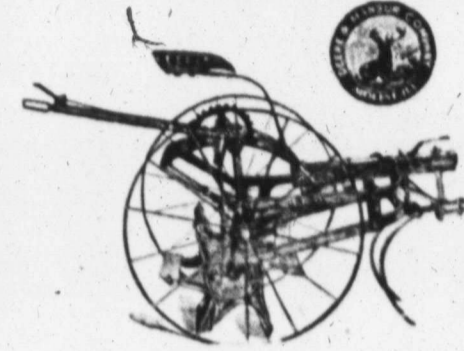

Washington, Dec. 10.—Congressman Ransdell today introduced a bill which is interpreted as a slap at Bailey. The bill specifically prohibits United States senators and members of congress from serving as officers, agents or attorneys for any trust or public serving corporation under the penalty of fine, imprisonment and forfeiture of office.

MILNER'S APPOINTMENT.

Will Cause Vacancy in Southern Cotton Association.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 11.—The appointment of Judge R. T. Milner, by Governor elec Campbell, to be insurance commissioner, will cause him to resign the position he now holds as president of the Texas division of the Southern Cotton Association. The association will hold its annual meeting here early next month for the purpose of electing officers, and as Judge Milner will not be a candidate for re-election, there will likely be a scramble for the place. The salary is fixed annually and the position pays in the neighborhood of \$1800 to \$2200 per year.

CULBERSON TAKES A HAND.

Starts Opposition to Confirmation of Bonaparte.

Washington, Dec. 10.—It is understood when the senate meets in executive session today that Senator Culberson will attempt to reconsider the favorable report of the senate judiciary committee on Bonaparte's nomination for attorney general because of a speech which Congressman W. R. Smith dug up on Bonaparte. In this speech, delivered at a St. Louis trust conference in September, 1890, Bonaparte said "trusts should be allowed to regulate themselves and that attempts at state regulation only lead to blackmail."

Smith has aired the matter in the fight on Bonaparte in the Washington papers and believes that the trusts are helping Bonaparte to stop far-reaching prosecutions. Culberson, it is said, will start an opposition to Bonaparte on the same grounds in the senate.

LOOKS like Senator Bailey has met his Waterloo in the person of Attorney General Davidson.

BETTER buy you a home in Nacogdoches now. Real estate both town and country, is cheaper now than it will be again.

WITHIN the next three years the farmers of Nacogdoches who own tobacco land will see the values of the land jump up in price.

THE answer of Senator Bailey to Attorney General Davidson was a very flimsy document, and was not even satisfactory to the most ardent Bailey man.

THERE is a future before the tobacco farmers of Nacogdoches, which if The Sentinel was authorized to make public, would set the entire county a fire with enthusiasm.

A MAN or woman to become a teacher in Texas should be required to take a thorough course in a normal, or training school, for teachers and in addition to the branches that they are now required to take, every teacher for any kind of a certificate, should be required to take a thorough course in mental science or psychology. How can they train the mind properly when they know nothing of its laws of growth?

OUT AT AUSTIN.

There are some interesting doings on at the State capitol. The biennial State house-cleaning is soon to take place and there is activity everywhere in the Capitol city. The Campbell broom is going to prove a clean sweeper, and, like the birds in the fable, the great horde of present incumbents are preparing to move from the cornfield, for they well know the old man is coming with his scythe. There have been some changes in local politics too, and the old clerk of the district court, who had only served 26 years, was beat out of "his" office. Then there is the Joe Bailey sore, gaping and bleeding from a fresh incision at the hands of the attorney-general. Just as Senator Bailey had concluded that the "incident was closed," the new "developments," have started the fire afresh, and Austin being the arena in which the renewed fight is to be fought all interest among the Bailey portisans, pro and con, is centered in the Capitol city. The anti-Bailey leaders held a caucus a few days ago, and just as they stepped out a crowd of Bailey men dropped in. They expected to meet the immaculate Joseph there, but Joe missed his train in St. Louis and didn't show up for two days. Joseph has a habit of missing his trains in St. Louis. It is probably a habit his friend Clay Pierce has gotten him into. Nothing yet has come of either the anti-Bailey nor the Bailey caucus. There were probably some mines laid for a great explosion to take place later on. Folks on the outside think there will be a big "investigation" when the legislature meets. Folks on the inside are saying nothing that affords definite information. Lukewarm folks say Bailey will be "whitewashed," while Bailey says he'll be "vindicated" or the whole State of Texas will be damned. The postponement of the Waters-Pierce ouster case places it up to the legislature entirely to open up the investigation upon the new developments. And what will the outcome be? The people tied the hands of the legislature in the primaries

and unless there is a regular stampede to the bolters, Bailey holds the trump card and will win out. We will wait and see what we will see.—Del Rio Herald.

A Visit to Red Field.

Yesterday morning Messrs. H. Wineborg, D. R. Reed, Otto Olson, and The Sentinel man took a trip to Red Field to make an investigation of the famous farm for the purpose of raising tobacco.

A pleasant half hour was spent on farm and the land pronounced to be par excellent by the experts for the purpose of raising shade tobacco. The fifteen acres selected is the famous Orangeburg red loam, and is situated upon a fine rolling divide.

The matter of selecting this land is now passed up to the committee of the business men, and they will probably act upon the advice of the experts.

While out on this trip The Sentinel man saw some roads that is in need of working, and that badly. Just as the road turns to enter the red field farm there is one of the worst little places on the entire road, and if not put in good repair will soon be in such condition that it will require quite a lot of work and money to get it in good shape. The commissioner in that beat could make the road from the city limits to Red Field one of the finest in the state, and at very little cost.

Judge G. abbs Resigns.

The resignation of Judge V. W. Grubbs as president of the State Board of Industrial Education of the Farmers Education and Co-Operative Union will no doubt result in the abandonment of that important work by the organization. Through his well directed efforts the state democratic convention was induced to incorporate his views on education and other kindred matters in its platform and it also gave to him a strong personal endorsement.

He will in the future devote his energies to the organization of an independent force to push the educational reform of which he is the recognized leader in all portions of the state. It is understood that he has borne practically all the expenses of the great educational movement which during the years he has given to it has amounted to many thousands of dollars.—Bonham Herald.

BORDER TRAGEDIES.

Del Rio Furnishes Several Pages of Bloody History.

Del Rio, Dec. 3.—The week just past has been one of terrible tragedy in Del Rio and vicinity.

On Tuesday night a Mexican deputy sheriff was killed in the Mexican annex to the city by a party of young Americans who were out "just for a lark." There were four in the party, ranging in age from 16 to 25 years. These boys were strangers in the city and were linemen in the employ of the Western Union Telegraph Company, and were repairing the line between San Antonio and El Paso. The working car was sidetracked here for the night and the rowdies of the force went out for a spree. They visited the tenderloin district, which is located in the Mexican annex, tanked up on beer and fighting booze, shot things up promiscuously and wound up by killing an officer who attempted to arrest them. They are all in jail now meditating over their awful misdeed. They are a goodlooking set of young fellows and appear to have been well raised, and their conduct since the killing has elicited some sympathy among the best people here.

Wednesday a young white man, giving his name as A. R. Sibley, bought \$5,000 worth of sheep from J. R. Ralston, a ranchman in Edwards county. The two men started for Del Rio together to consummate the deal, this being the nearest banking point. Ralston has not been heard of since, although his team and buggy were found straggling over the prairie. Sibley showed up in Del Rio and awaited the arrival of the sons of Ralston, who were instructed to drive the sheep to Del Rio for shipment. When they arrived Sibley told them he had paid their father in full for the sheep and that he had gone to Kerrville on important business; that he had not been able to get cars for the shipment of the sheep and that he had sold them to B. M. Cauthorn, a sheepman of Del Rio. The Ralston boys who

were camped near the city, seemed satisfied with Sibley's story, but afterwards became suspicious and when Cauthorn went after the sheep they refused to give them up. Cauthorn then started back to town and met Sibley on his way. Cauthorn was afterward found dead in his buggy with a bullet hole through the body. Friday the team driven by Sibley was found straggling about. Friday night Sibley slipped back to Del Rio and went to the home of friends who knew him well as Putman, but did not know that Putman and Sibley were the same man. Here he remained secreted until Saturday evening, when the sheriff and rangers discovered his whereabouts. The house was surrounded by rangers and the family were told to leave for safety. Sibley, or Putman, was sent word by the women to come out and surrender, and upon his stubborn refusal the rangers proceeded to shoot into the house. The house was riddled with bullets and Sibley was shot in the head and was lying dead upon the floor when the officers entered the house.

Sibley had never paid Ralston a cent for the sheep. He sold them to Cauthorn for \$4,500, Cauthorn giving him a check on a local bank for the money. Sibley drew \$500 cash and took a certified check for \$4,000. The \$500 cash has been recovered but the check has not been found.

Excitement is at fever heat over the week's bloody events. Sibley's crimes are the most horrible ever witnessed in this vicinity. His body has been embalmed and will be held as long as possible under the belief that there is a large reward for him. It is said that he was sent to the reformatory at the age of 14 for felony. He is well known to some people here and was raised in an adjoining county, but had not been heard from in ten years. Haltom,

Judge Robertson says that he called to pay his respects, but the subject of voting for Bailey was never mentioned in his presence, in fact it was not mentioned at all.

Takes Issue.

Editor Sentinel,

I must take issue with you in your advocating compulsory normal training of teachers. Teachers are born, not made, and there are many who might graduate in a half dozen schools of Pedagogy and then be comparative failures as instructors. Helpful as all of the sources of instruction are to aid teachers, per se, it cannot create teachers. The tact of imparting knowledge and developing character is a natural gift. The most eminent teachers in America never had any normal training. Book learning of itself is not practical, whether it be medicine, law, theology or pedagogy. It is theory and it the individuals who are blessed with much theoretical love, have no natural turn, they will be practical failures in any of the professions. School teaching being no exception to the rule.

If your views were enacted into law and extended into their rational course, then no lawyer could practice, law unless he graduated from a law school, no preacher could preach unless he completed a course in theology, et cetera.

This is not carrying your theory to extreme, it is a national deduction. Yes it would be unwise to compel every naturally inclined teacher to spend from 2 to 5 years in a normal college and as few of them would have the cash many of our schools would be without teachers.

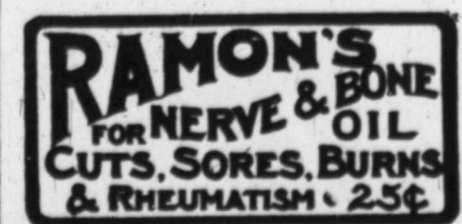

ESTIMATE OF COTTON CROP

Government Figures Caused Terrific Slump in Futures.

Washington, Dec. 11.—The department of agriculture estimates the total production of cotton in the United States for the present year at 6,001,626,000 pounds, equivalent to 12,546,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight.

The following is the estimate by states: Virginia 13,000, North Carolina 537,000, South Carolina 875,000, Georgia 1,578,000, Florida 54,000, Alabama 1,242,000, Mississippi 1,484,000, Louisiana 930,000, Texas 3,944,000, Arkansas 791,000, Tennessee 260,000, Missouri 43,000, Oklahoma 380,000, Indian Territory 405,000; total 12,546,000.

New York, Dec. 11.—Never since the wild Sully days has there been such an uproar in the cotton market. The publication of the government crop estimate, placing the total cotton crop this season at 12,546,000 bales, caused a perfect pandemonium to prevail on the exchange in this city at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

When the figures were flashed to the traders a scream went up that was heard throughout the block.

Men fought to sell the stuff

they had been so eager to buy the preceding day. Prices broke all to pieces, the staple scarcely having a friend in the ring.

The January option closed yesterday evening at 10:10, and eased off during the morning hours in anticipation of a report close to 10,300,000 bales. Immediately after the figures were flashed the option slumped to 9.85, thence to 9.70 and again downward to 9.60, still nobody cared to purchase. Down to 9.50, and another tumble to 9.40 before profit taking by satisfied bears caused a halt in the slumpy market.

In New Orleans the market slumped \$4 per bale. After the big decline there was some reaction. The trade here is entirely upset by the figures and the market of tomorrow will reflect the full import of Secretary Wilson's figures as there was more hysteria than judgment in today's trading.

ORDER FOR ROLLING STOCK Has Just Been Placed by the Southern Pacific.

San Francisco, Dec. 6.—The Southern Pacific has just ordered the construction of about six million and a half dollars worth of new rolling stock and placed aggregating \$4,000,000 with different locomotive and car manufacturing concerns so its equipment may be augmented as quickly as possible to meet the growing demands for more cars and more facilities for transportation. Compared with rolling stock now in commission, the prospective addition will amount in some cases to an increase of 25 per cent.

TREATMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS.

Rules for Patients Used by Samaritan Hospital in Philadelphia.

The following are the rules for tubercular patients applying for treatment to the Samaritan Hospital, Philadelphia:

First. Don't spit on the pavement, on the street, nor into any place where you can not destroy the germs which you spit up.

2. Do not swallow any spit which comes up from your lungs or when comes out of the back part of your throat, as it exposes you to complications.

3. Spit into a spit cup when it is possible to do so.

4. Always use a spit cup with a handle to it, so you can hold it close to your mouth.

5. When you use a china or earthenware spit cup, always keep chlorinated lime and water in it, and scald out the spit cup once or twice a day with boiling water.

6. When you use a tin spit cup with a paper spit cup inside, burn the paper cup at least once a day and scald the tin cup with boiling water.

7. Never use a handkerchief or a rag or any material other than paper to spit in or to wipe your mouth with unless it can be immediately burned after using.

8. When you can not spit into a spit cup, spit into a paper napkin.

9. Always use a paper napkin to wipe your mouth with, after spitting, and be careful not to soil your hands.

10. Always carry a cheap paper bag in your pocket or caba to put paper napkins in which you have used.

11. When you have used a paper napkin, either to spit in or to wipe your mouth with, fold it up carefully and put it away in a paper bag.

12. Every evening before going to bed burn your paper bag together with the napkins you have deposited in it.

13. Do not let any spit get on your clothing or your lips or hands, or your bedclothes, or carpets, or furniture, or on anything about you, wherever you may be.

14. If, by accident, any spit should be deposited anywhere else than in your spit cup or in your paper napkin, take pains at once to destroy it, either by taking it up and putting it in the fire or by putting chlorinated lime and water on it.

15. If you have a mustache or beard, shave it off or chop it close.

16. Always wash your lips

and hands before eating or drinking, and rinse out your mouth.

17. If you have a running sore, take up the matter which is given off with absorbent cotton and burn it.

18. Don't blow your breath on to hot milk or any other food substance in order to cool it before giving it to others to take.

19. Avoid handshaking and kissing. These customs are dangerous to you as well as to others. They may give others consumption; they may bring you colds and influenzas, which will greatly aggravate your disease and may prevent your recovery.

20. Do not cough if you can help it. You can control your cough to a great extent by will power. When you cough severely hold a paper napkin to your mouth so as not to throw out spit while coughing.

21. Sit outdoors all you can. If you have no other place to sit than the pavement, sit on the pavement in front of your house.

22. Don't take any exercise except upon the advice of your doctor.

23. Always sleep with your windows open, no difference what the weather may be.

24. Avoid fatigue. One single fatigue may change the course of your disease from a favorable one to an unfavorable one.

25. Go to bed early. If you are working, lie down when you have a few minutes to spare.

26. Don't take any medicine unless it has been prescribed by your physician. Medicine may do you harm as well as good.

27. Don't use alcoholic stimulants of any kind.

28. Don't eat pastries or dainties. They do not nourish you and they may upset your stomach.

29. Take your milk and raw eggs whether you like it or not.

30. Keep up your courage. Make a brave fight for your life. Do what you are told to as though your recovery depended upon the carrying out of every little detail.

31. Always keep in mind that consumption can be cured in many cases and that it can be prevented in all cases.

32. If your own disease is too far advanced for you to recover, console yourself with the idea that you can keep those who are near and dear to you from getting it.

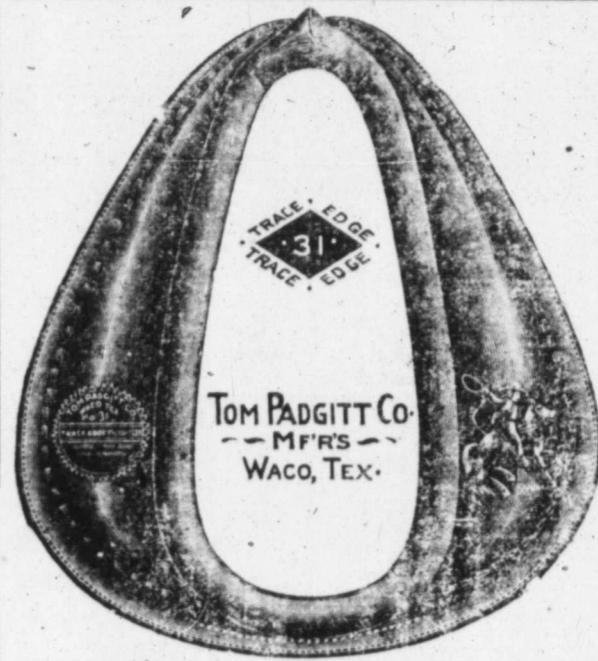

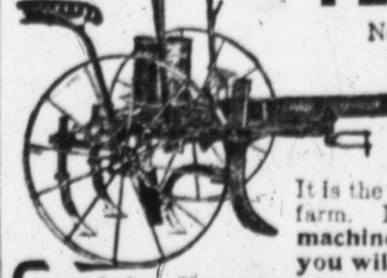
