Saturday afternoon the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers' Association met in the court house in regular session, with a very good attendance.

All the officers of the association were present and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Several new members were added to the roll and the acreage increased, so that the crop in Nacogdoches county this year will be quite respectable after all, in fact at the season is anything like favorable there will be raised something like 2,000,000 pounds of filler tobacco, and 3,000,000 pounds of wrapper tobacco. Indeed the outlook for the tobacco industry is exceedingly bright.

Hon. and Mrs. S. M. King leave tomorrow for Austin where Mr. King will represent Nacogdoches county in the next session of the legislature.

PROSPECTS are bright for an early settlement of the strike of the firemen on the Southern Pacific.

It is now a settled fact that the tobacco industry in Nacogdoches county is now upon a firm basis.

TRUCK growers should maintain a thorough organization just the same as any other business.

THINKING of some new changes since our bad burn we are reminded of the noted question "where are you at?"

AT the close of the next tobacco growing season there will be established in this city packing houses to handle the tobacco crop.

NACOGDOCHES county will grow thirty acres of shade tobacco this next season as a starter. Not a very bad beginning, and with a minimum yield the planters will receive about \$12,000.

THE way that our burned out business men are hustling for stands and for stocks is wonderful. In a short while the whole machine will be running again as if the burned section had never been disturbed.

TEACHERS should bear the fact in mind that if they fail to attend the meeting of the teachers' institutes that the county superintendent has the power to cancel their certificate. The school laws of the state vest this authority in the county superintendent.

THE Southern Cotton Growers' Association and the Farmers' Union have accomplished wonders for the cotton planters and the farmers of the south during the few brief years of their existence, and with a thorough understanding on the part of the people as to the aim and purposes of the organizations in a few years the farmers of the south will be the most independent people on earth.

AN Associated Press report under Chicago dating says "Dr. Whaler of the Chicago health department, has begun an investigation following the discovery of a turkey intended to grace a Christmas dinner table in the last stage of consumption. J. Inwood purchased a live turkey on Christmas eve from Charles Klohr, a butcher. The gobble was fat and apparently in good health, but when killed peculiar white spots were found on the heart and liver. The matter was taken up with the health department and two doctors held an autopsy over the diseased organs, reporting the deceased fowl in the last stages of consumption. Efforts are being made to discover the farm from which the turkey came." The Sentinel is glad the Doctor did not make the discovery in time for the news to reach this city before turkey killing time.

TOBACCO COMPANY ORGANIZED

Will Engage in the Growing of Shade Wrappers.

The future of the tobacco industry in this county is now assured. Yesterday afternoon, a meeting of the business men of Nacogdoches was held in the Business League Parlors and the Nacogdoches Tobacco Growing Company was organized, and will be chartered under the laws of the State of Texas, with a capital stock of \$6500 fully paid up.

Fifteen acres of land on the Red Field farm will be planted under shade, and wrapper tobacco will be grown under the supervision of the government experts. The fact has been demonstrated that a cigar filler tobacco of a very superior quality can be grown here, and at a very good profit to the farmers. This tobacco has been grown here for the past three years, and at 15 cents per pound has proven to be a very valuable money crop. The growing of wrapper tobacco has been experimented with on a small scale and has proven very successful. There is now a market here for all the shade grown tobacco at 40 cents per pound, and as the wrapper tobacco yields from 1000 to 1400 pounds to the acre it can be readily seen that there is a good thing in it for the man who plants wrapper tobacco.

The meeting yesterday was called to order, and Mr. E. A. Blount was elected chairman and Robert Lindsey secretary of the meeting. The purpose of the meeting was stated to be the organization of the Nacogdoches Tobacco Growing Company, and that an application for a charter be filed with the secretary of state, and that plans for the next crop be discussed.

After discussing the plans as suggested by the superintendent of the farm, the meeting went into permanent organization, by the election of five directors of the company, as follows: E. A. Blount, D. K. Cason, Robert Lindsey, Wm. Taussig, and D. R. Reed.

After the meeting of the stockholders in the company had adjourned, a meeting of the directors was held and the first officers of the company were elected as follows: E. A. Blount, president; Wm. Taussig, vice-president; Robert Lindsey, secretary-treasurer; J. L. Gill was elected superintendent of the farm.

Robert Lindsey and D. R. Reed were appointed by the president as a committee to prepare suitable laws, rules and regulations for the company.

The organization of this company means a great deal for Nacogdoches county as well as all of the tobacco growing territory adjacent. The people of the south and the north are watching the developments in this county, and the failure to push the wrapper proposition through would have been a setback to the industry in Texas. The business men, however, saw that it was a good thing and have invested their money into this venture hoping that the farmers in Nacogdoches county will be

the gainers, and as one of the heavy stockholders stated to the reporter, "I would gladly donate my \$500 stock just to get the industry started. Not that I need the dividends that will be returned, therefore I have not gone into this for profit alone—but to show the farmers that I have faith in the industry."

He longed for whiter fields and greater opportunities. He wanted to get out and do something and thought it such a pity that a man of his capacity did not have a larger field to work in. 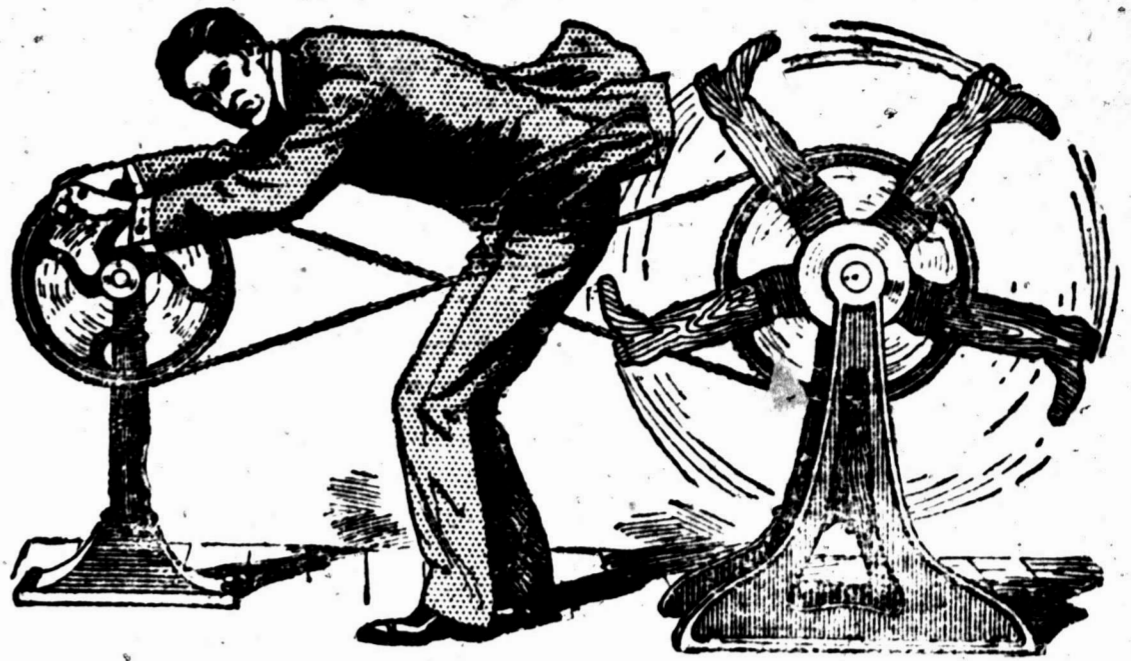

BISHOP SMITH WITH THE DEAD

Second Southern Methodist Pre-late Within the Past Six Weeks.

Nashville, Dec. 28.—Bishop A. Coke Smith of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, died at Asheville N. C., at 7:45 last night. Mr. Smith was elected bishop at the general conference in Dallas, Texas four years ago. He has been in failing health some time. Pleurisy was the immediate cause of his death.

Bishop Smith was born September 16, 1849, near Lynchburg, S. C. and his father was a Methodist minister of note. He graduated from Wofford College, Spartanburg, S. C., and for some time held the chair of moral philosophy in that institute. Later he occupied the chair of practical theology in Vanderbilt University in this city. Norfolk was his home at the time of his death.

Dr. Smith is the second Southern Methodist bishop to die recently, Bishop J. J. Tigert having passed away about six weeks ago, and Bishop Galloway of the same church is in failing health.

A dispatch to the Banner from Asheville says Smith's remains will be taken to Norfolk, Va., where the funeral will be held tomorrow.

ROBERT E. LEE CENTENNIAL.

New Orleans Will Observe the Date on Elaborate Scale.

New Orleans, Dec. 28.—Preparations for a holiday celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the birthday of General Robert E. Lee on January 19, were begun last night by a general committee representing all Confederate societies in this city. MAY RELIEVE CAR SHORTAGE

Railroad Commission Issues an Order Effective January 1.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 27.—The railroad commission today issued an order which is intended, in a measure at least, to relieve the car shortage in Texas. The order is inspired by the fact that many railroads of Texas refuse to let their cars go off their own lines, and many times cars are left on sidings for weeks when application has been made by shippers for cars. The text of order follows:

If any person, firm, company or corporation desiring an empty car or cars to be placed at any station, siding, spur or other point on a railroad in the state of Texas where it is usual and customary for freight to be received and discharged, to be loaded for shipment and transportation from such station, siding, spur or other point to any other point on said line of railway or to a point on any other line of railway in this state, shall make application in writing for such car or cars to the agent of said railway company at the station, spur other point where it is desired to load such car or cars, or if there be no agent at such point then to the agent of the railway company at the station nearest to such point, it shall be the duty of such railway company to whose agent such application is made, and such railway company is hereby ordered and required to furnish and place, within the time prescribed by law and at the point designated in said application, the car or cars so applied for, whether such car or cars are intended, when loaded, for transportation to a point on the line of such railway company or to a point on the line of another common carrier in the state of Texas. Effective January 1, 1907.

DECLARES FOR STATE RIGHTS

Justice Harlan Opposes Increase The Federal Power.

Chicago, Dec. 26.—A patch to the Record-Herald from Washington says:

Justice Harlan yesterday signalled his golden wedding anniversary by an emphatic declaration against an increase in federal over state power. The venerable jurist said:

"I served in the civil war as a colonel and have been on the bench 29 years the 10th day of this month. I can say now what I have said in many judicial decisions, and such has been the uniform doctrine of our court, that the federal government has no powers except those delegated to it by express grant or by necessary implication from express grants.

"I think the federal government has all the power it need have for the purpose of accomplishing the objects for which the government was established, and that any tendency to enlarge its powers by loose construction of the word of the constitution ought to be restricted.

"I think the preservation of the states with all their just powers is essential to the preservation."

SPEAKING AT COURT HOUSE.

Hon. J. D. Neal State Lecturer Delivers Address.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Nacogdoches County Farmers Union met here yesterday and transacted quite a lot of business pertaining to the organization, none of which can be given to the public at this time.

This morning Hon. J. D. Neal, state lecturer and organizer of the Union delivered an address to the public at the court house. The speaker was introduced to the audience by Mr. H. F. Marr, who stated the work that Mr. Neal had undertaken was a great one and that his efforts were being crowned with success.

Mr. Neal addressed the chairman and the gentlemen and for an hour delivered one of the best talks ever delivered to the farmers of Nacogdoches county on a subject in which every farmer in the county should be deeply interested in.

The speaker referred to the fact that on an occasion about six years ago he visited the town and was indeed glad to have the pleasure of returning again.

The Farmers Union he stated had brought about a great transformation among the farmers of the southland, and had inspired them to do things by doing and was teaching them to be dependent and not bow in humble submission to the practices of the past wherein the farmers was caused to bear the brunt of the cotton gamblers. The farmer had awakened to a realization of the fact that they could best care for themselves by organizing for the purpose of mutual protection.

The purposes of the Union was to better mankind where ever there was a Union organized; the Union's aim was to uphold every business and not to destroy, as many were of the opinion.

The warehouse proposition was discussed at length, and the speaker stated that there were 300 warehouses in Texas and 500 in the cotton growing states. The membership of the Union in Texas numbered 200,000 members, and in the southern states 700,000.

The agricultural department was given considerable attention, and the speaker said it would be far better for the country at large if the whole department was dumped into the Patomac river, and he felt sure the time was coming when that department of our government would be abolished.

It is not what Senator Bailey has said and done in Congress that the people are concerned about. It is what he will say and how he will vote for the next six years that has them guessing.

JAPAN is spending \$25,000,000. increases in her naval equipment. Wonder what that's for? She is also going to spend \$400,000. to send a squadron to the United States next summer. Japan may be hunting trouble.

A GOOD Business League is essential to the material development of all towns. Nacogdoches has a good organization, and it is doing a good work for the town. There are a number of men in Nacogdoches who should become members of the organization.

A SMALL bond issue would build Nacogdoches a good waterworks system, and it would be a source of revenue to the city and it would be a source of revenue to the city and at the same time give the people cheaper water. Other Texas towns own their own system of waterworks. Why not Nacogdoches?

WITHIN six years Nacogdoches has lost half a million dollars that might have been saved with adequate fire protection, to say nothing of the loss in increased insurance rates because of the lack of such protection. Why is this thing so long delayed, with so many sad experiences and lessons of warning?

THE old saw says that the first day of the new year usually governs the weather for the first ninety days. If it is cloudy and bad the weather will be severe, but if the day is pretty and warm the remainder of the winter will be pleasant. If the old saying is true, the prospects are that there will be some bad weather in this part of the state during the next three months.

WITHIN the past month the railway world has suffered the loss of the heads of two great railway systems in the death of President Spencer of the I. C., who was killed in a wreck on his own road, and the death of President Cossatt, who died of heart disease, the latter being the head of the Pennsylvania System. But the trains run on just the same and the world is still suffering from car shortage, strikes and congested freight traffic.

WE don't like the idea of the Texas legislature having to whitewash Senator Bailey every time it sends him back to Washington. There are plenty of clean men, amply qualified for Senator, whose records are not so bespattered with oil and other things that "smell to heaven" that there must be an "investigation" and whitewashing every six years to keep them in Congress. There are thousands of better men in Texas than Joe Bailey; maybe not so "brilliant," but truer to the people.

THE investigation of Assistant U. S. Attorney General Purdy, who is now at Brownsville, will bring to light some parts about the Fort Brown muddle that will land a solar plexus on the frisky Mr. Foraker. Photographs of the houses shot into have been taken, bullet holes have been counted, bullets extracted from bedroom walls and a preponderance of testimony secured to prove that the negro troops committed the outrages of which the people of Brownsville complained. There is no doubt but that when Mr. Purdy returns to Washington and makes his report congress will sustain President Roosevelt in his peremptory discharge of the negro troops and his stubborn refusal to reconsider his order of dismissal.

THINGS are looking pretty good around Nacogdoches these days, in spite of cotton bugs, fire bugs, and other pests and calamities. The people are undaunted and the enterprise seems only to be whetted and sharpened by misfortune. The tobacco move is going to make up for a large part of the drawbacks during the next year and the diversification spirit is also among the farmers and will help a long way. The country is abreast with the town in progress and enterprise, and, best of all, there is harmony between the country and town that is growing stronger and more gratifying as the country progresses. There is unity of effort between the town and country that has never before existed, and is going to make Nacogdoches the banner county in point of progressiveness in the state.

AS USUAL, it turns out that the race riots in Mississippi have been greatly exaggerated by the newspaper reports. Where scores of deaths were reported a half a dozen covers the entire list of killings. The trouble was caused by mean Christmas whiskey and "bad niggers," finally involving some good, sober people, white and black. Gov. Vardeman, in discussing the bad nigger and whiskey combination, expresses a sentiment that ought to take root all over the South, and congress ought to be urged to put it into a law. Gov. Vardeman says that considering the Indian is of a much higher grade of intelligence than the negro, he cannot understand why it is the same prohibition laws are not applied to the black man that are applied to the black man in the West. He is of the opinion that much trouble would be avoided if such was the case.

CHRISTMAS IN CALIFORNIA

Christmas in a Land of Sunshine and Flowers.

Los Angeles, Cal. Dec. 25.

Editor:
Christmas in California! Never before have I seen a Christmas in a "land of sunshine and flowers" with the trees and grass and flowers as green as it were springtime. Such a thought sounds like a dream to those who have seen only frigid climes, and even to me there was something of the imaginative in it until I came and saw. Not so however, for Southern California can actually produce the spectacle of Christmas with pleasant sunshine, balmy breezes, the rare perfume of orange blossoms, verdant parks and blooming rose gardens.

Nor are these all the drawing cards played at this season. On the one side are the mountain ranges, easily and accessible, with their snow mantles in full view, while resting at their base are towns, vineyards and ripening oranges. On the other is the beach with its numerous towns and fine surf bathing. Today the city has been relieved of many thousands of people who have gone either to the foothills and mountains or to the beaches. Those who think that Christmas is not real without snow have gone to the mountains while those who desire a plunge in the surf as a diversion at this season have visited the beaches. The inter-urban electric car service, which boasts as the best in the country, has been taxed to its utmost to accommodate the pleasure seekers.

It should be remembered in this connection that this is tourist season and that there are people here from all parts of the country, the number being 75,000 or 100,000. These people come largely for their health and to enjoy a mild climate such as is found here. During business hours and until late at night the streets are thoroughly congested by the immense throngs which have nothing to fear from the weatherman or the iceman.

To me it does not seem like Christmas. This is partly because I am 1400 miles on an line from my old home with its endearing bonds, but mainly because of the changed surroundings. For the last preceding six years Christmas has found me in school with an opportunity for two weeks vacation, but this year it is different. Then, too, the method of celebration here is entirely different from that of Texas. Here no fireworks or hurrahing is in evidence, simply a quiet, reverent attitude with the festival of gifts and good wishes. It is the fourth of July which is celebrated like a Texas Christmas.

I have found the same difference in the celebration of Christmas and Fourth of July in the East. In New York state where I chanced to spend two years, Christmas is quiet and impressive while the Fourth of July is the holiday for fireworks and general hilarity. There, however, the winter festival is accompanied by falling snow flakes, gling sleigh bells, and the ringing tones of steel runners upon the ice, none of which are ever known in the Angel City.

It is now more than six months since I left Texas for Los Angeles. I am still in the service of the government being with the U. S. Geological Survey. While headquarters are here and I am in the city most of the time, I have had the good fortune to travel over a large part of the state, reaching as far north as San Francisco and Sacramento and as far south as San Diego and even into Mexico. Such trips present a variety in the landscape, varying from arid deserts and fertile plains with vineyards and orange, lemon and olive groves on the one hand, to towering mountain chains with snow covered peaks on the other. I have no time to describe any of these interesting scenes at this time, but hope that I may do so in the future.

While I am so far away from East Texas I have not lost interest in her welfare, especially my own county. It is with eagerness that I grasp a county paper and read the happenings of the week. Unfortunately they do not reach me until far into the following week, but it is a case of better late than never. I wish to say in this connection that if any Nacogdoches people chance to come to the Angel City and care to look up the U. S. Geological Survey I should appreciate it very much.

I am not going to make any New Year's promises but I am contemplating the idea of writing to the home papers a little oftener in the future. Perhaps I may be able to say something of interest to nearly everybody. Here's to be a Happy New Year to one and all. May you have a long lease of life and renewed prosperity. Respectfully,

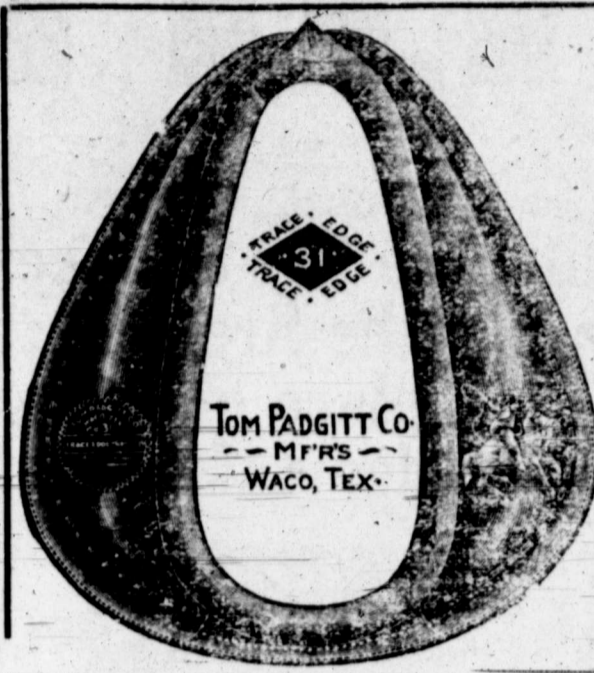

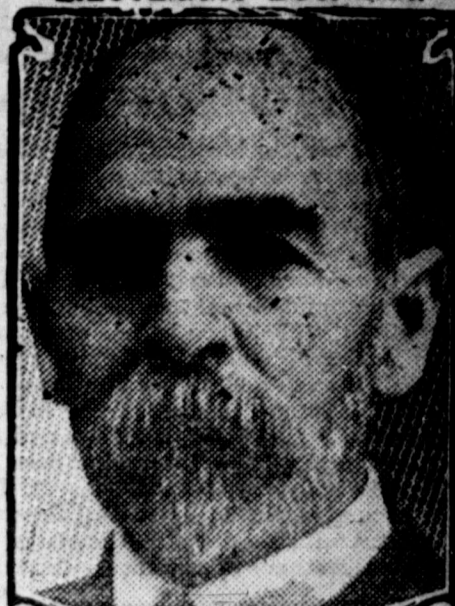
