COMMERCIAL NATIONAL BANK.

Officers and Directors Elected and Capital Increased.

The stockholders of the Commercial National Bank met in adjourned session at the office of the bank this morning and re-elected the old board of directors, as follows:

E. A. Blount, John Schmidt, Thos. E. Baker, V. E. Simpson, T. J. Williams, Geo. C. Ingraham and E. H. Blount. The directors then met and elected the following officers: E. A. Blount, president; Geo. C. Ingraham, vice president; E. H. Blount, cashier.

The affairs of the bank were found to be in excellent shape, and the officers were complimented by the stockholders upon the excellent manner in which they had conducted its business during the past year. By unanimous vote of the directors the surplus was increased from \$30,000 to \$50,000 out of the earnings of the year, thus giving the bank a

combined capital and surplus of \$100,000. This showing is indeed flattering, and the manager of the Commercial National are to be congratulated upon their success.

THE BAPTIST COLLEGE.

Nacogdoches Has Good Prospects of Securing School.

The committee selected by the Nacogdoches Business League to go to Jacksonville and confer with the educational commission of the Baptist church with the view of securing the Baptist college, returned Saturday evening full of hope and in good spirits.

There being two other applicants for the school—Tyler and Palestine,—the commission selected a sub-committee of three, composed of the pastor of the Baptist church at Palestine, the pastor of the church at Tyler, and Rev. A. J. Miller, pastor of the Baptist church in Nacogdoches, to confer with the citizens of each town, to receive propositions and to report to a full meeting of the board. This sub-committee will have full power to select the location for the school, and they will visit Nacogdoches Tuesday, January 22. They will expect to meet the citizens of the city that night at the high school auditorium, when every man, woman and child in the city is requested to be present.

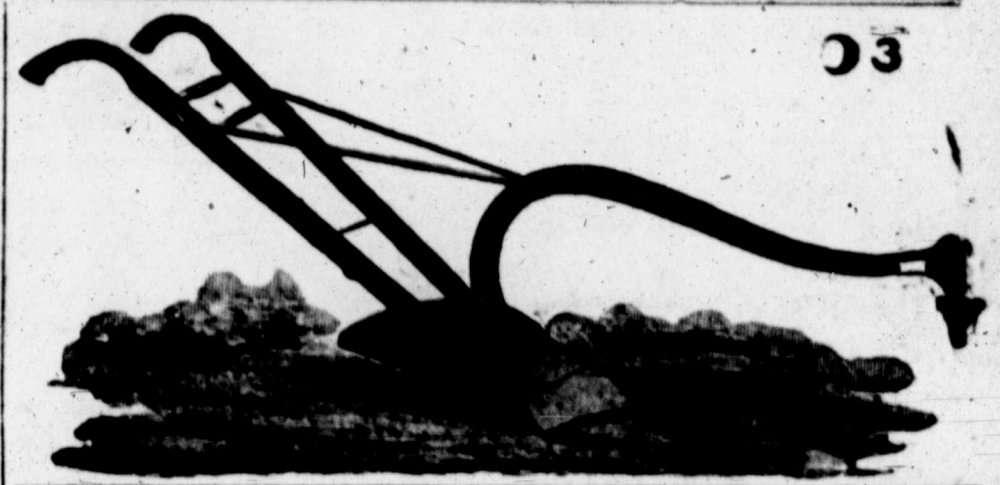

A GOOD new year resolution for the commissioners court: "We will give the tax payers of Nacogdoches county an opportunity to say by ballot whether or not they want a new court house before the year 1907 is half spent." So mote it be.

THE 52 cotton mills in Texas consumed only 40,000 bales of cotton during the year 1906, or less than 2 per cent. of the crop, yet there are people who contend that cotton factories in the south will not pay because of the danger of their becoming too numerous.

THE farewell message of Governor Lanham, which was read to the members of the legislature Thursday, was merely a review of his administration of the state's affairs during the past four years. While the message consumed some ten columns of small type, yet the governor could have told what he has done for the good of the people in much less space. Most of his message is devoted to explaining why he has been unable to do more for the good of his state.

NOTWITHSTANDING the fact that car builders estimate that 400,000 freight cars were built during the year 1906, the supply is still far short of the demand. A great many people would doubtless like to know what becomes of all these cars; but for many years they have, in like manner, been wondering what becomes of the millions of pins produced each succeeding year. The manufacturers of freight cars, passenger coaches and locomotives will probably never catch up with the demand for their products.

THE MAIL ORDER HOUSES.

To many people the success of the mail order houses is a puzzle. Like everything else that is a success, the mail order house is founded and conducted upon method. Notwithstanding the fact that the goods sold by them are of a cheap and inferior quality, yet the business of the mail order houses has grown to such proportions that it threatens the life of the little retail merchant in many sections of the country, and especially in the south. But how can their success be accounted for, is what puzzles the average man. Here is how one representative of a mail order house explained the reason of their success to a newspaper man recently: "He said the mail order business depends entirely upon advertising. He made one remark that merchants should heed. He says they took the local papers and directed their special effort to communities where the merchants are not up-to-date advertisers. If he found that any line of business in town or city was not well advertised, as for instance, furniture, he said that they flooded that territory with literature and always with satisfactory results. He said he believed home merchants could greatly cripple the mail order houses if they would advertise freely and in the right manner."

There is no doubt but that too many of our local merchants are inclined to look upon newspaper advertising as a luxury, but there is no use denying the fact that there is much truth in the statement quoted above. Intelligent advertising pays any business that depends on the public for support. It is a necessity, as has been demonstrated by every merchant, manufacturer, or producer, and even the mail order houses themselves.

A MOVEMENT is on foot, headed by the leading citizens of the three counties, to have a new judicial district created consisting of Sabine, San Augustine and Shelby counties. The matter will be brought before the session of the legislature that is to meet next week. The Leader is most decidedly in favor of the movement. There is double the amount of business in these three counties than there was in the entire present district when it was created. In Shelby county special terms of court have been held for the past two years, and in San Augustine conditions are the same. In Sabine county we have only two weeks, whereas, if we had six, it would take five years to clear the docket. This is an important matter and we trust that the representatives of this section will bend every effort to see that the new district is created, or that some other change is made to meet the demands of the people here.—Hemphill Leader.

EARLY EAST TEXAS SAW MILLS

Southern Industrial Lumber Review.

"The first saw mill built in Nacogdoches county, so far as I know," said a reminiscent native of East Texas, "was built by Major Black Hardeman, a few miles south of the little village of Melrose, in the neighborhood of Rocky Branch, a deep but narrow stream that flows through that historic region. The engine and boiler were of the old-fashioned kind and were hauled from Natchitoches, La., on a wagon drawn by four yoke of oxen, owned and driven by B. M. Hall, a sturdy wagoner and farmer who lived near Melrose. For hauling this machinery Mr. Hall was paid \$100. The trip required several days.

"When the mill was placed in operation it was the wonder of all the surrounding country, and the people came from miles around to see it, some spending an entire day at the saw mill, watching it saw logs. Every part of the machinery was of the most primitive character. One man only was required to run the carriage. The old-time iron pins known as "dogs" were used in holding the logs in place and keeping them from slipping. The sawyer started the engine by pulling a long lever which connected with the throttle. If the log to be sawed was very large several running starts had to be taken in order to get the saw through the log. There were no such thing as an endless chain for conveying the slabs away, nor was there anything to take the sawdust out of the way. The slabs were picked up by a mill helper and "toted" away, and the sawdust was shoveled into carts and hauled to a dumping place. The sap lumber, with a part of the bark on it, was called 'weather-boarding,' and generally sold at 35 cents a hundred feet. The best class of boxing was considered high at 50 cents a hundred feet.

"Major Hardeman's mill was operated for several years and served a useful purpose in the development of its locality. For miles and miles farmers came with old-time ox wagons and hauled home the lumber they needed. Some lived such a distance that they would camp at the mill over night, after loading their wagons, and take an early homeward start next morning.

"In those days there were no dry kilns or planers, and when a customer bought his lumber he carried it home and dried it out by placing the material against a rude scaffold and building a fire on the ground beneath it. These old-time kilns required constant watching lest they caught fire and burned the lumber. If the purchaser desired dressed lumber for his purpose, after it had been dried in the manner described he smoothed it to his satisfaction with a hand plane. When a man had shoved one of these old-time planes all day he could rest assured that he was entitled to say with truth that he had done a full day's work.

saw mill on Rocky Branch has about vanished from the memory of the people who lived in that neighborhood, but there are still some living who remember the old mill and its cumbersome methods.

"In the same neighborhood William Alders was another pioneer in the lumber industry, and during the twenty years or more that he lumbered he built several saw mills there and there-about. Mr. Alders is still living. He retired from the saw mill business several years ago. He was one of the first men in that neighborhood to build a cotton gin, and this he ran in connection with his saw mill.

"Another pioneer saw mill man of that region was Dr. J. D. Martin, of Martinsville, dead these five years. He settled at what is now known as Martinsville, 'way back in the early fifties, and besides being a good physician he was an energetic and progressive man. In addition to building a large water mill he built a steam mill at Martinsville, and for a number of years did a good business. The timber which was used in making lumber was brought several miles by ox teams on a two wheel conveyance called a carry-all. Only one log at a time was hauled, and this was suspended at one end by iron hooks from the carry-all while the other end was allowed to drag on the ground. It was mighty slow business logging a mill in those days, before tram roads and locomotives and steam loaders were heard of in Texas.

"A few miles from Melrose I first saw Wesley Jeans, who was at that time running a saw mill for a man of the name of Whit M. Matthews, in the capacity of sawyer. Jeans is still in the lumber business in Sabine county on a large scale, and his sons, following in his steps, are considered among the best lumbermen in that section of country. When once a man has embarked in saw milling it is one of the hardest things in the world for

him to quit it. If you print what I am telling you, and Wesley Jeans reads it, it will undoubtedly send his recollection back to the days when he first began in a saw mill and worked at that little mill of Whit Matthews' near Melrose, thirty years ago.

"The first saw mill in the section of country north of Melrose and in the neighborhood of what is now Shady Grove was run by John Farrell for a number of years, and subsequently by Bob Manning, Manning, I believe, is still living and running a mill not far from Appleby, in Nacogdoches county.

"Hiram Miller was a pioneer in the saw mill business in the country south of where the town of Garrison now stands. His was a water mill and was located on the Nacognichi creek, one of the largest water courses thereabout. In connection with his saw mill Miller ran a cotton gin and grist mill, and had the reputation of making the best meal of any miller in that part of country. He let his mill stones run slowly, and thus when the meal came out it was not injured by being heated, as is too often the case in steam mills. It was told as a joke that Miller had a little dog that used to stay around the mill, and that one morning after Miller had started the mill up and placed a bushel of corn in the hopper he went to a field to see about something, when he heard the dog barking in the mill. He went back to the mill to see what the dog was barking at, and found that the dog was eating the meal as fast as it came from the mill, and was barking because it was not coming out at a faster rate."

To Tax Express Companies.

A member of the 30th legislature has announced his intention of introducing a bill requiring express companies to pay an annual tax of \$5,000 each express office where C. O. D. whiskey packages are handled. The supreme court of Mississippi has declared a similar law to be constitutional.—Petty Enterprise.

Hon. Steve M. King, representative from Nacogdoches county, is the member referred to, and he has his bill already prepared. Though the amount of the tax stipulated in Mr. King's bill is less than the sum stated in the quotation above. This bill, if enacted into law, will settle the question of C. O. D. liquor packages and will greatly reduce the amount of liquor shipped into local option communities in Texas.

OUR sister city of Center is in danger of being afflicted with a surfeit of carnivals. There is such a thing as a town getting too much of a good thing.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

He has been employed on the Daily Journal and the Weekly Plain Dealer part of the time for the past year and is not a stranger in Nacogdoches."

OWING to the fact that two years will not have expired since the last election held in this city on the water works bonds proposition until February 14, the council cannot order another election before their first regular meeting in March. In the mean time the committee appointed by the Business League to secure information and estimates as to the probable cost of a system of water works is busily at work, and will be prepared to make an intelligible report to the city council and the people in due time.

THE first legislative act of Senator Kellie, after being sworn in, was to introduce a bill permitting the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe railroad company to acquire ownership of several short lines of road. If the bill becomes a law, it will make it possible for the Santa Fe to establish a trunk line from Galveston via Beaumont, Center, Longview and Paris, Texas, to a connection with the Santa Fe system at some point in Oklahoma. With the exception of a short gap between Center and a connection with the Windy road at Timpson, the road now has a continuous line from Galveston to Longview.

Mr. J. F. Mettauer of Aniston, Ala., called on The Sentinel today. Mr. Mettauer is an old citizen of Nacogdoches county, and was called here on account of the death of his father, which occurred at Rockland a few days ago. Mr. Mettauer left for his home in Alabama this afternoon.

FIRST COTTON BLOOM.

Remarkable Effects of This Unprecedentedly Warm Weather.

Mr. William Seelbach, an old and perfectly reliable citizen of Nacogdoches county, was in the city yesterday from his home at Caro, and stated that he had a cotton bloom on his farm.

The bloom was discovered yesterday morning, January 14, on a stalk of cotton that came up volunteer in his cow lot.

Mr. Seelbach also stated that his ribbon cane stubble had sprouted out and is now from six to ten inches high all over his patch.

Mr. Seelbach has lived in Nacogdoches county for 53 years, and he says that this has been the warmest winter so far he has ever experienced here.

Numbers of farmers report that their fruit trees are in bloom, and one man brought in peaches yesterday that were as large as the end of a man's little finger.

The universal opinion is that a freeze would now destroy the fruit crop.

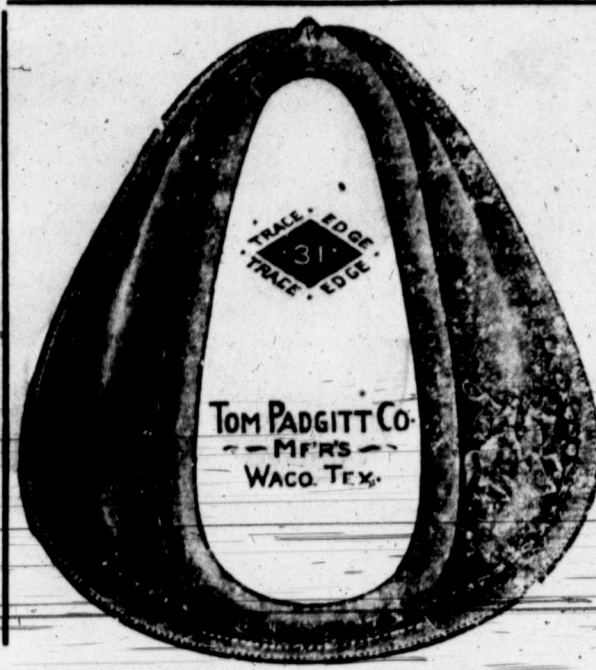

Mr. Cahal Wants People to Read the County Papers.

Nacogdoches, Texas, Jan. 5.—The teachers of this, or any other county, could learn something about how their fellow-workers get along in school, their best plan of hearing recitations, and for adjusting things that come before a teacher; in fact every thing that is taught in a Normal, or Institute, could be studied through the county papers.

I am aware of the fact that some will say, and, quite true too, that we already have plenty of school journals.

There are a number of good journals, but they don't cover the case, and if I can only get this before the house so that other people can see it as I do, I still believe there is somebody in the county that will agree that I am right.

In this thing we call schools the patrons have the same rights that should be respected. It is not reasonable to say if they want to know anything about it they should attend the Institute. The object of all this teacher manufacturing enterprise is to benefit the children. Now if this can be done without money and without price, I can't see how people can justify themselves in the neglect of such duty.

Every patron who cares anything about the social, financial, or political interest of his county must take a county paper. Through this county paper can be spread before every man, woman and child in this county, the whole secret of success in teaching. The institute costs this county something like a thousand dollars a week, and I believe as much good can be gotten out of this paper institute and the patron, and the children can know what is going on, and be benefited thereby. It would bring about a more fraternal relation among the teachers and introduce them to the patrons. At the same time the trustees would have a chance for their lives. The trustees could pick from the list and let the dregs settle to the bottom.

When trustees hold their right hand before a sin-avenging God and say they will do the best they can for the good of their community, and then employ a scapgrace, a drunkard, or an infidel—Just think of turning the young minds over to such cattle to be bent by them!

The time has been when the people could not so well help being imposed upon in this way, but there is no excuse today.

Oh yes! I know how his badge of authority reads. The holder hereof has furnished evidence of a good, moral character, etc. I have been before a number of certificate manufacturing enterprises, have been attending these many moons, and never heard of any testimony being demanded; yes, and have sundry times seen rank strangers apply.

The patrons would take part in the discussion of important questions, and no doubt offer valuable suggestions. If the County Superintendent would make a report of the schools he visits and publish in a county paper, giving a general state of things, the condition of the house, and

grounds about, it would be of some interest to others, and would be an incentive to order.
