THE STARS MUST NOT have been in the right place last Friday night for three of the four Parmer County high school teams, as only Lazbuddie opened its 1978 football season on a winning note.

The other three, Bovina, Friona and Farwell, will try to break into the winning column this week, but it may not be an easy task. The Chiefs and Steers both tackle teams who scored impressive wins opening week, while Bovina steps up in class, against a class AA team.

THE BLADE'S FOOTBALL contest got off to a roaring start, with eight (count 'em) contestants picking all 14 games on the first week's schedule correctly.

It's the first time, since we expanded the number of games to pick to 14, for that many contestants to call them all correctly. With only three weekly winners of cash prizes, it meant that five contestants picked the 14 right, and came away empty handed.

IT'S THAT TIME of the year when the temperature is likely to vary from the 50s to the high 90s.

It not only makes it hard to decide how to dress, and plan for the day, but it causes other problems, such as our business neighbor, Furne Harris pointed out Monday.

People aren't in the notion of looking at winter clothing and coats, when the temperature is 95 degrees outside, Furne says. And the stores are showing their fall and winter merchandise, with summer virtually gone.

That's part of the trauma of changing from one season to another.

At least we have the consolation of having, for the most part, a pleasant fall season, to cushion and condition us for the winter.

This isn't necessarily so in the springtime, when it often goes from winter to summer in the space of a week or two, and what spring we do have is punctuated by blowing wind and-or dust.

As usual, the cotton farmers are hoping for a prolonged spell before the first freeze, so their crop can mature, and make maximum yield. This part of the year is a critical time for farmers of this crop—and there are apparently more acres of cotton than in the past.

Parmer County is located on the northern border of the state's cotton-growing area, and many years it suffers by the reduced growing season that can result by being a few miles farther north than other areas.

Thus, those with cotton are happy to see a return of days with the temperatures in the 90s. From what we know about the crop, it has to have temperatures above 80 to do any maturing at all, and every time it dips below 60, it sets the crop back a little.

For the second year in a row, the projected price farmers expect to receive for cotton is good, especially compared to grain prices.

Even after all of the work by the American Agriculture Movement, the price of corn has been coming down as the harvest season approaches. Hopefully, this trend will reverse in time to help the farmers.

State GOP Approves Agriculture Goals

Mrs. Vernon Estes of Bovina was a delegate to the State Republican Party convention last weekend in Dallas. Mrs. Estes was one of about 3,000 people who gathered in Dallas to conduct party business.

Another county delegate, Jimmy Briggs of Lazbuddie, was appointed to the party's resolutions committee, and was instrumental in getting the platform for agriculture, including virtually all of the points that American Agriculture sponsored in the county conventions, adopted by the state organization.

"We owe Jimmy a big debt of gratitude for his hard work in getting this through," Mrs. Estes said.

Other planks in the state GOP platform include striving for local control of public schools, with proficiency testing of teachers; a crackdown on criminals, including legislation to require felons to serve at least a third of their sentence;

fixed-length sentences for specific crimes; the right to keep and bear arms as guaranteed by the constitution; a strong national defense, with a call for increased spending on military strength, and a comprehensive energy policy based on free market prices on oil and natural gas.

Mrs. Estes said that among the delegates to this year's convention were several disenchanted Democrats, and a number of young people.

Keynote speaker was Jack Kemp, U.S. Representative from Buffalo, known for his tax-cutting bill, the Kemp-Roth Bill. This bill would reduce all individual income tax rates by 33 per cent over a three-year period. Kemp said "No government in history has ever been able to do for the people what they have been able to do for themselves."

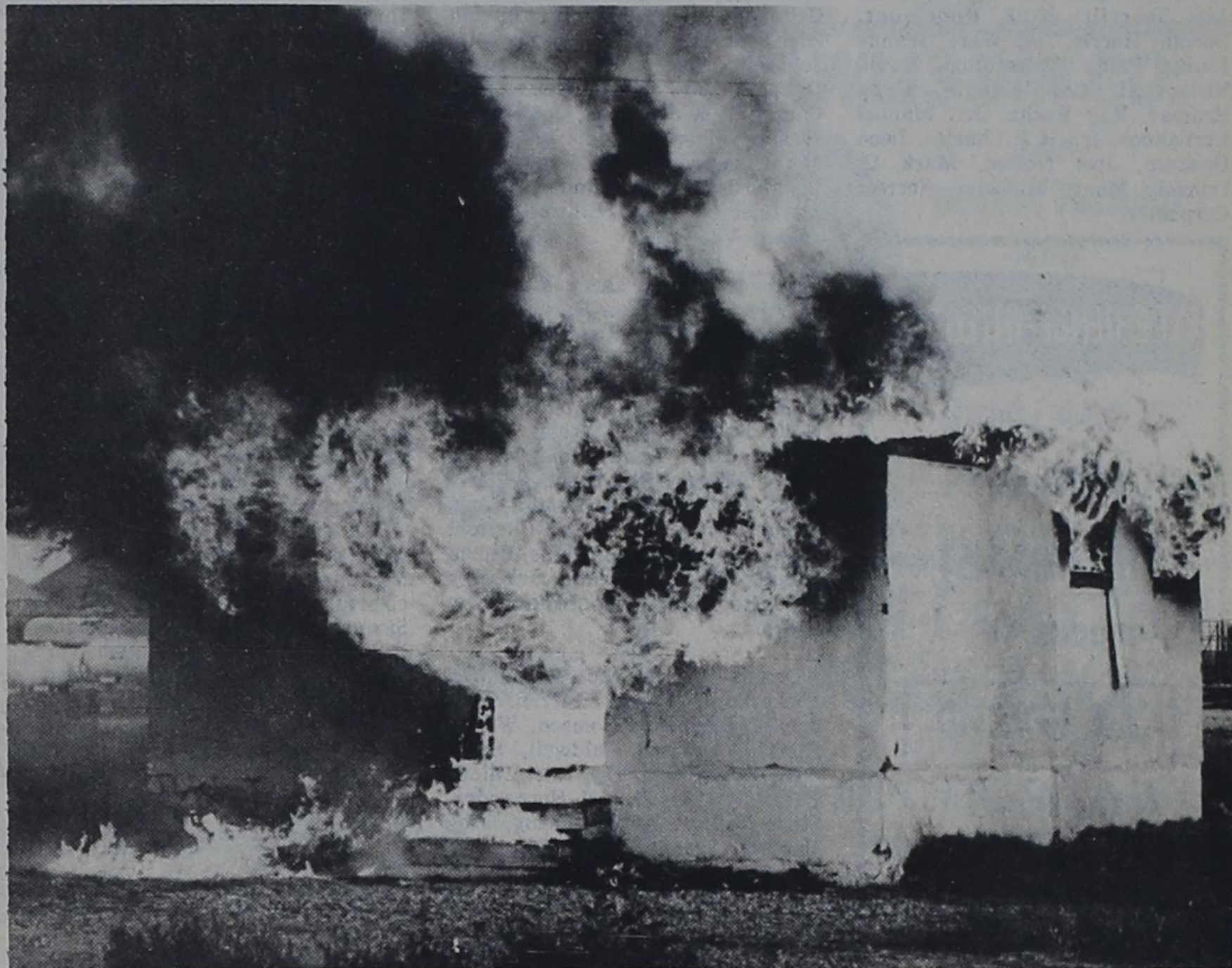

Emergency Care Course Slated

An Emergency Care Attendant's course has been scheduled to begin on September 21 according to the Rev. Dick Richards, course coordinator. The course will be held at Bovina High School. Those wishing to enroll in the class are asked to contact the Bovina City Office.

Objectives of the course are to provide the students with the necessary knowledge and skills to perform in the most proficient and conscientious manner possible when confronted with a health emergency situation. The course will also meet the requirements of the State of Texas for ambulance attendants and prepare the students for advanced training in emergency care if they desire to improve these skills.

Although the primary objective of the course is to train those who would be willing to serve on a voluntary ambulance service locally, others who are interested in this training are welcome to attend although registration will be limited. The state requires twenty-four hours of class training and practice plus another four hours for testing which will be administered by representatives from the Texas Department of Health. The following schedule has been announced:

Session I, Thursday, September 21, 8-10 p.m.; Session II, Saturday, September 23, 1-6 p.m.; Session III, Sunday, September 24, 1-6 p.m.; Session IV, Thursday, September 28,

8-10 p.m.; Session V, Saturday, September 30, 1-6 p.m.; Session VI, Sunday, October 1, 1-6 p.m.; Final Exam, Thursday, October 5, 7-11 p.m.

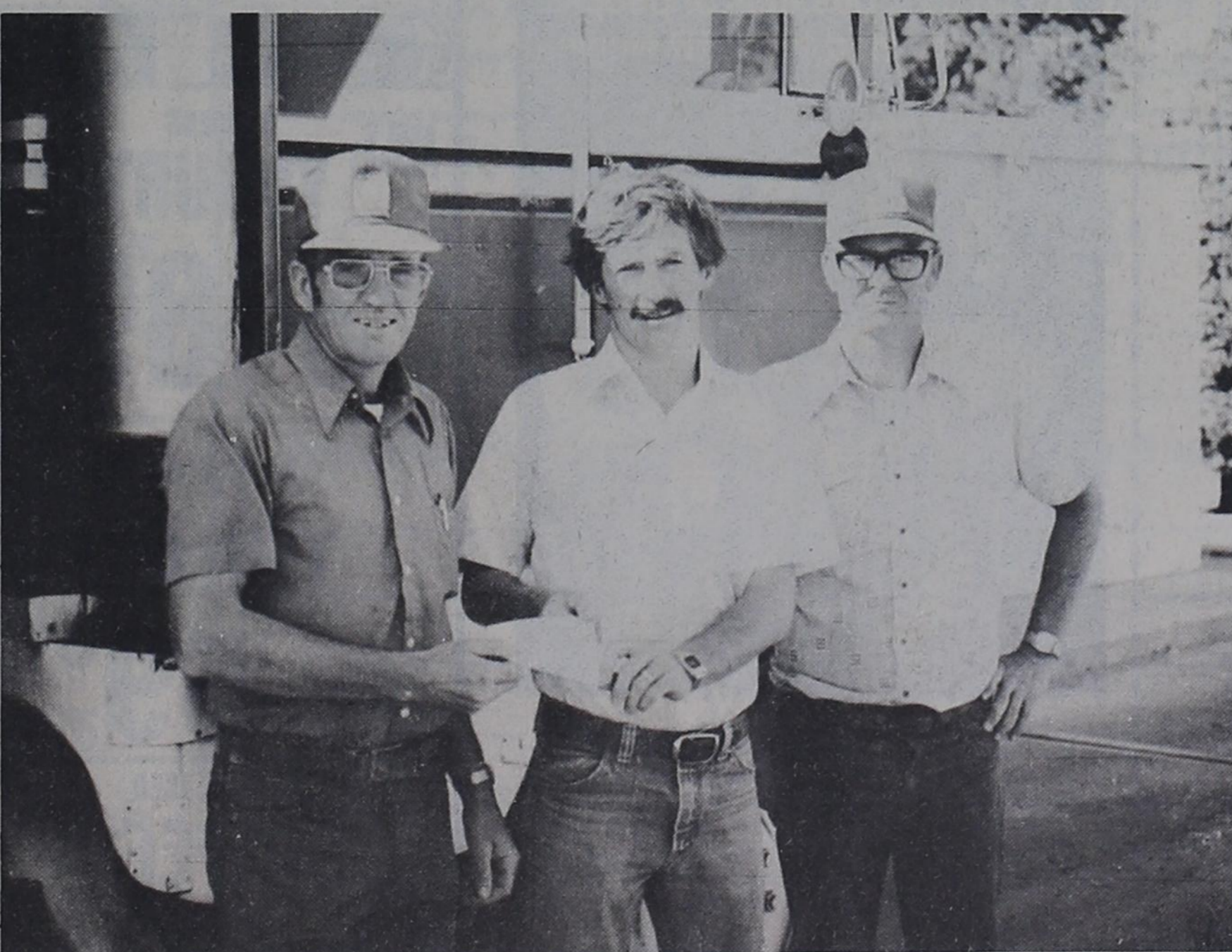

The cost of registration is \$5.00 to cover the cost of materials used in the course. In addition, a handbook is recommended which will cost \$10.00. 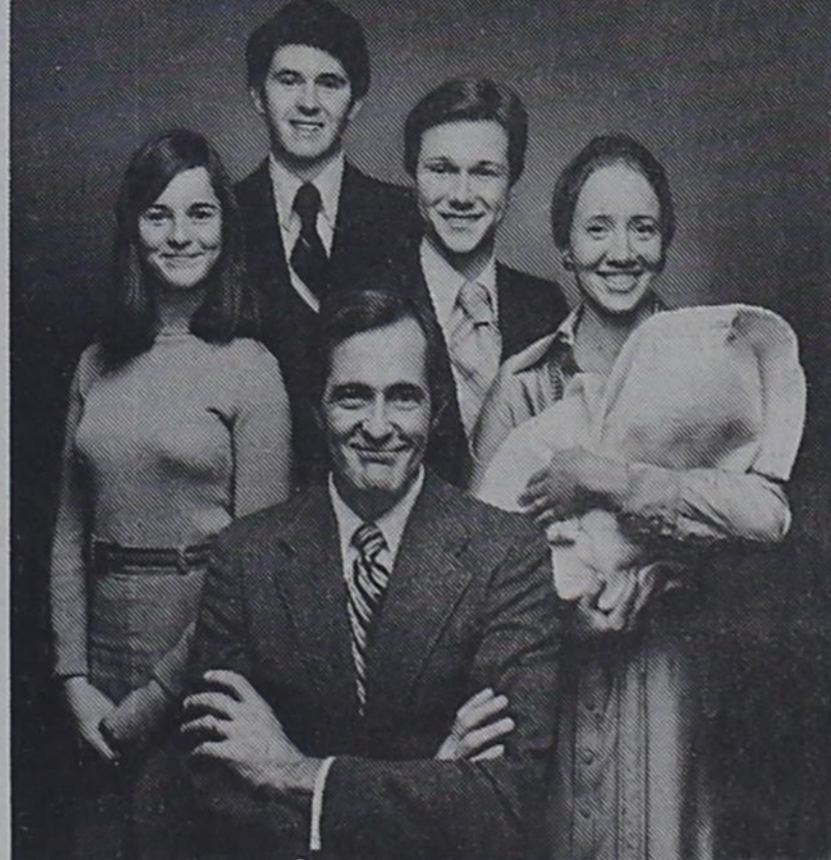

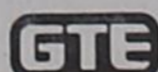

In 4-H, young people and their parents get involved. This is why 4-H is often billed as a family affair.

Ideally, the 4-H member, his or her parents, and the volunteer leader sit down together to develop a plan for the 4-H member's project. The parents provide guidance in the scope of the project and gain some knowledge of the objectives of 4-H.

Many parents become involved with their boys and girls in 4-H in a leadership role. They may become organization, project or activity leaders; but specifically, their responsibilities are directly related to the 4-H unit as a whole.

For parents, 4-H provides opportunity to work with young people, doing things they, themselves, often find exciting and rewarding.

Boys and girls have the most successful experiences in 4-H if their parents know and understand the activities that are connected with their individual experiences. Parents can provide the needed moral as well as financial support in the development and evaluation of projects. Above all, 4-H is an opportunity for boys and girls and their parents to improve themselves and have a good time doing it.

Get your family involved in 4-H. Contact the county extension office for details on the 4-H program and the learning experiences it has to offer.

The group meets quarterly on the first Monday, to discuss problems pending and encourage each other to call or write their legislators about issues they feel strongly about. 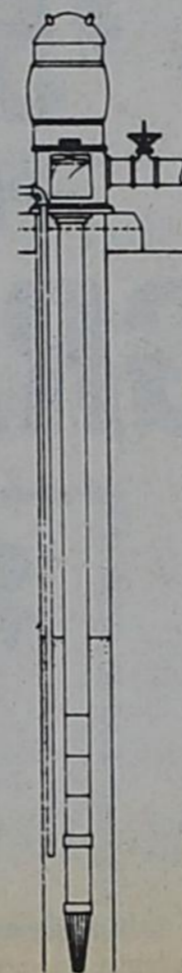

Another bright spot was that there

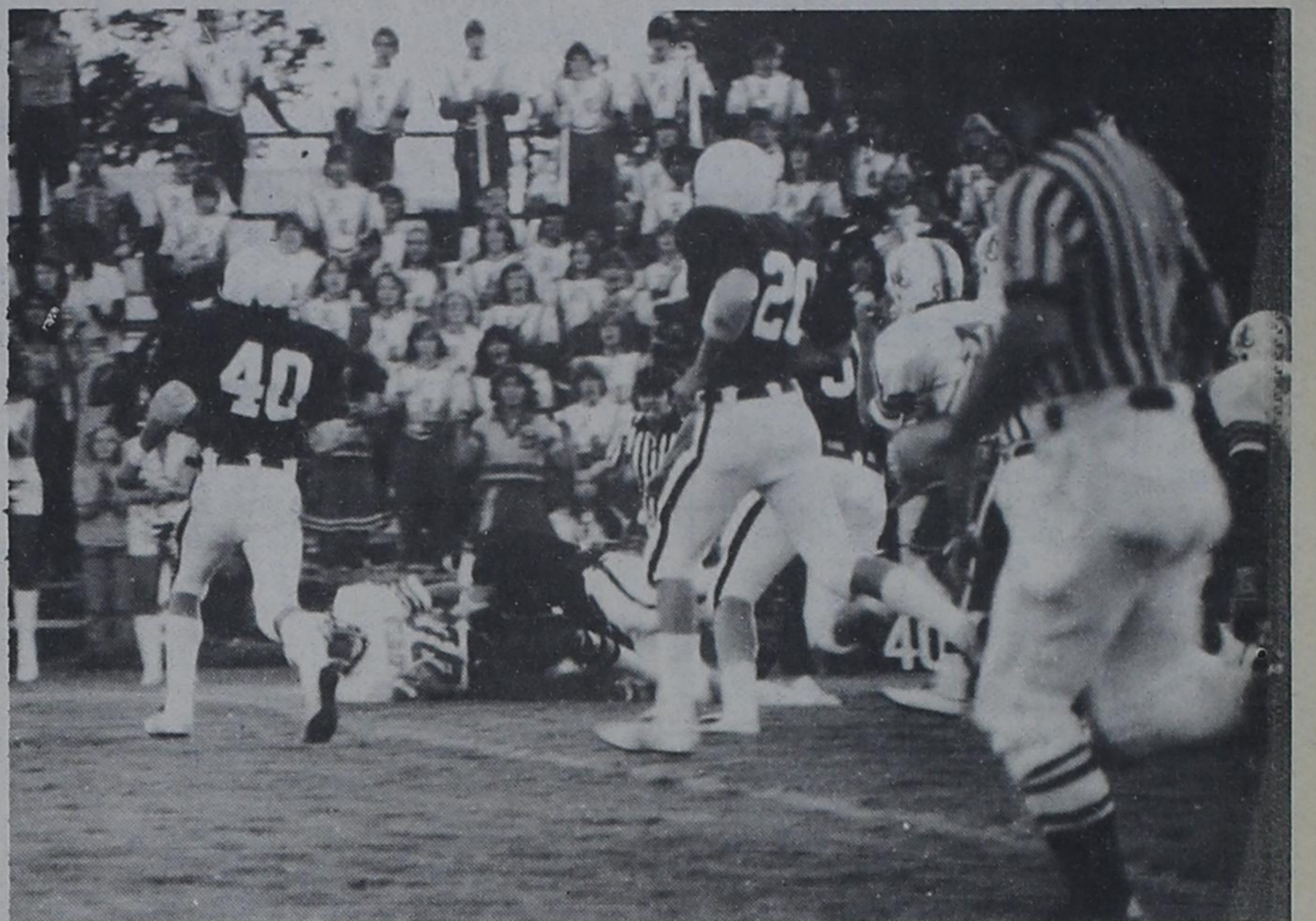
was a nice sized crowd on hand for the season opener. Not only were the Bovina fans there in force, but the Hale Center group was also there in a large quantity.

La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga la imposición de impuestos sobre tierras agrícolas y rancheras basada en su capacidad productiva en vez de su valor de mercado y permite a la legislatura que disponga la imposición de impuestos a bosques de madera basada en su capacidad productiva.

La enmienda permite a los gobiernos locales que extiendan la exención actual de no menos de \$5,000 del hogar seguro residencial para personas de 65 años o más de edad para incluir ciertas personas incapacitadas.

La enmienda concede una exención de \$5,000 en el valor de mercado del hogar seguro residencial en los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre propiedad. Autoriza a la legislatura que conceda una exención adicional de los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre propiedad de una cantidad que no exceda \$10,000 del valor de mercado de hogares seguros residenciales de personas 65 años o más de edad y ciertas personas incapacitadas. Si la persona de 65 años o más de edad es elegible para esta exención la cantidad total de los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre el hogar seguro de aquella persona no puede incrementarse.

La enmienda previene que gobiernos locales incrementen los impuestos sobre propiedad a menos que el cuerpo administrativo provea aviso público y lleve a cabo una audiencia pública. La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga por ley que cada propietario reciba aviso de la revaluación de su propiedad y la cantidad de incremento en sus impuestos.

La enmienda limita las apropiaciones de los ingresos de impuestos estatales en una cantidad que no exceda la tasa de crecimiento económico estatal que se anticipa, con la legislatura autorizada para conceder exenciones de emergencia.

La enmienda prohíbe la valuación de propiedad inmueble a través del estado para los fines de impuestos sobre propiedad. Se requiere que la ejecución de

NO. 1 (S.J.R. 50)

PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in non-profit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum," allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."

NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction.

The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction

NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."

NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to support such activities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
