Phones Will Probably be in Operation Monday.

The new plant of the Nacogdoches telephone exchange will be installed and phones in operation probably by Monday morning next.

This is the announcement Mr. Davidson, who has charge of the installation of the new plant, made to The Sentinel this morning. "You can say," said Mr. Davidson, "that if one little machine, which we are now expecting, arrives by that time, the plant will be complete and the phones ready for service Monday. Of course we may not have all line connections perfected by that time, but with few exceptions the plant will be ready."

There have been five experienced electricians at work on the new plant almost night and day for three weeks, and when completed Nacogdoches will have one of the best and most up to date telephone

systems in the country. The fact is, there is not a town in the state with twice the population that has a larger and better plant. Don't be surprised if central rings you up Monday morning.

Normal for Nacogdoches.

At the meeting of the committee of teachers in this city last Saturday it was definitely decided to have a summer normal in Nacogdoches, and formal application for recognition has been forwarded to State Superintendent R. B. Cousins at Austin.

It is desired that this normal be held in the first series, which will begin the latter part of May or the first of June.

A committee on publicity and advertising was appointed, and it is intended to make this the most successful normal that has yet been held in East Texas. Prof. J. B. Ramsey of Timpson is the conductor and an excellent corps of assistants has been selected.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

Question of Establishment of a General State Printing Office.

Representative Thomas of Fannin and Gilmore of Van Zandt, have introduced a proposed amendment to the constitution providing for the printing and publishing of state papers and works. The proposed amendment reads as follows: "All printing and publishing, and all stationery, paper and fuel for the various departments, and for all offices, whether created by this constitution or by law, shall be done and supplied as may be provided by law, and for the accomplishment of these objects and purposes the legislature may provide and establish all requisite means and agencies, invested with such powers as may be deemed adequate and advisable."

The object of this proposed amendment is to make possible the enactment, without constitutional objections, the bill offered earlier in the session by Mr. Thomas providing for the establishment by the state of a printing establishment maintained by the state. Mr. Thomas found that his bill would be unconstitutional, so now he proposes first to secure an amendment to the constitution and if this carries then his bill will become effective. He has for the present withdrawn his bill on the subject.—Austin Statesman.

First Quarterly Report of County Treasurer Edgar Thomason.

The report of County Treasurer W. E. Thomason, which has been approved by the commissioners court, shows the county has cash on hand in the different funds as follows:

Jury fund, \$89.87
Road and Bridge fund, \$8,983.20
Permanent School fund, cash, \$9,034.71; bonds, \$24,000.
Road Precinct fund, \$1,054.43.
Available School funds \$2,552.49
General fund, \$10,593.39.

It will be seen that there is a good balance to the credit of each fund, except the jury fund, and that is always short.

This was County Treasurer Thomason's first quarterly report, and the court complimented him upon its accuracy and neatness.

IF Nacogdoches fails to secure the Baptist college it will require several years' hard work for her to outgrow the odium that will come with defeat.

IN attempting to hang Moses Hill at Farmville, Virginia, yesterday, the rope broke twice and he finally died in agony on the ground. Another strong argument against barbarous modes of punishment.

THE Tyler Times remarks that "the C. O. D. liquor traffic will be nix coma aroused." The English translation of the Times' German we presume is—the C. O. D. business is nix, and consequently the liquor traffic is aroused.

THE president would have excluded from the use of the mails all newspapers that publish the shocking details of the Thaw trial. And there should be a law passed by congress sustaining the president's views on that question, not only in this instance but in every other instance of like character.

OUR Senator Kellie has very broad views on the free pass question. This fact was demonstrated yesterday when he offered an amendment to the anti-pass bill pending in the senate providing that passes be permitted to all free born American citizens. The amendment, however, was ruled out of order.

THE DENISON Gazetteer says: "The company of which Thomas Pierce Nicholls of Houston is at the head are still at work, under many difficulties, in recovering 10,000 tons of steel rails which have been in the bed of the Trinity river since before the war. Eighty tons so far have been recovered. The 10,000 tons are estimated to be worth \$400,000."

THE Center News says it is a "measly shame" how the measles "are" disturbing the people of Center, but takes consolation in the fact that the malady will soon run its course and this trouble will be permanently out of the way. The News man in this instance is unlike Alexander the Great, who lamented the fact that there were no more worlds to conquer.

AND Ballinger, way out in West Texas, received a copy of that cotton mill proposition. The Leader says: "That cotton mill proposition is one that Ballinger will go its full length on. If the parties mean business, these people will do their part to obtain this valuable acquisition. Nothing would add so much to the growth of the town, no not even another railroad would compare to a cotton mill." That is true even if the home people have to put up every dollar to build it.

A DIFFERENCE OF OPINION.

Some people and newspapers have taken umbrage at those papers which mentioned Governor Campbell's appearing at the inaugural ball in a spike-tail coat. They seem to have taken the matter seriously, when in fact it was, in the estimation of The Sentinel, a rich piece of humor, and is said to have been very much enjoyed by Governor Campbell himself. The Governor is too charitable to think for a moment that its intent was anything else, but an effusion of levity, and his sense of humor is not so dull that he did not appreciate it.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

What was humor? State Press took the matter most seriously. Governor Campbell was criticised for appearing in a dress suit as if he had done something wrong. State Press and all the Madam Editors rushed to his defense. State Press believes in a man appearing in proper costume on such occasion, and the swallowtail is the proper thing. Some of the newspapers talked of the matter as if a man should forfeit the esteem of the people if he dressed as Governor Campbell did. But what he did was not a crime and ought not to have incurred so much harsh criticism.—Dal-Gal News.

The Sentinel insists that the incident was mentioned by the press in a spirit of levity only. However, State Press, and others, took the matter seriously. So far as The Sentinel is concerned the incident is closed from this day hence.

IN relating the horrible details of the sinking of the steamer Larchmont and the loss of 138 lives at Black Island Sound Monday night, the press dispatches state that the captain of the vessel was the first to leave the sinking ship and its cargo of human freight to drown. The captain was saved.

THE Lufkin Daily News has at last found its way to The Sentinel exchange table. The News is brim full of business and the very limited space not monopolized by the enterprising business men of Lufkin is judiciously utilized by the editor in boasting his town. The prospects are favorable for the News to succeed.

IT turns out that the gusher in the Spider field at Shreveport was not a gusher; it was a newspaper fake.—Beaumont Journal.

AND nothing will tend more to create scepticism in the public mind, and retard development of the oil fields, than newspaper fakes. One of the hardest struggles The Sentinel has to contend with is to avoid publicity of fake reports.

THE Nacogdoches cigar is a combination of the long filler and the short smoker. That is to say, it smokes so well it is all too soon over. Thus, the short draw makes a long puff.—Austin Statesman.

IN other words, the Nacogdoches cigar fills a long felt want, and is growing more popular every day.

SOME of our farmers roar when any thing is said in favor of a tax for working the public roads, but they are the farmers, as a rule, who buy both corn and bacon, grown in distant states.—Tyler Courier.

That is putting the case in plain language, but it fits nine times in ten. It is also a noticeable fact that the greatest objection to increase taxation often comes from those who pay the least taxes.

THE Beaumont Journal has driven this nail in the coffin of the alleged lumber trust: "It is amusing to hear now and then that there is a lumber trust in Texas and then to read in the newspapers the reports of the building of new saw mills in every section of East Texas. There are easily ten saw mills now in course of construction for every mill owned by any company which could possibly be in the trust class."

NACOGDOCHES is to vote on a proposition to issue \$50,000 worth of bonds for water works. The sleepy old town is waking up.—Lufkin Tribune.

Nacogdoches is neither dead nor sleeping. The town and people are wide awake, though a little slow sometimes. The fact that Nacogdoches is to vote on bonds for water works is no evidence of an awakening. That question has been voted on here before.

THE next meeting of the American Anti-Tuberculosis League will be held at Atlantic City, N. J., June 1 to 4, 1907, and the mayor of each city in the United States has been requested to appoint physician delegates to represent their cities and to attend themselves. Dr. J. R. Briggs of Dallas, president of the Texas Anti-Tuberculosis League, is one of the vice presidents of the national association, and he desires that every city in the state be represented.

IN the rush of handling matter for a daily paper errors will creep in. Nothing is more exasperating to a newspaper writer than to see his "stuff" butchered. The errors that can be readily recognized as errors, and that to the reader correct themselves, do not bother. It is the "bust" that looks as if it was the product of ignorance that riles a man.—Palestine Herald.

TOM WATSON'S WARNING.

Tells Farmers' Union to Admit Only Farmers to Membership.

Jackson, Miss. Hon. Thomas Watson of Georgia delivered an address here Tuesday night before the State convention of the Farmers' Co-Operative Union. He was introduced by Governor Vardaman, and his address was along economic rather than political lines. He spoke of the necessity for farmers getting together and organizing for self-protection. He called attention to the class legislation of congress and deplored the extravagances of the government, and condemned the trusts and robber tariff in vigorous English. He spoke of the immense sums of money raised by the Government to pay annual expenses declaring that under Jefferson the per capita was only 75 cent whereas now it is \$9, an enormous tax upon the poor people, the rich being smart enough to dodge their fair share. He advised the union to keep out of politics, but to vote for measures instead of men. In 1900 there were 3,000,000 farms in this country and 10,000,000 farm laborers, a number that certainly justified organization. The farmers were entitled to a square deal, but could only get it through organization. He advised them to avoid the mistake the Southern Cotton Association had made of admitting into their ranks merchants, lawyers, bankers and a conglomerated mass of all classes, but admit only those who were tillers of the soil. He closed by paying a glowing tribute to the old South, and predicting prosperity for the new. He did not touch

upon his favorite theme of government ownership of railroads and many were disappointed thereat.

Heavy Liabilities

In the United States circuit court in Dallas the American Express company, through their attorneys, has filed a motion, which was in open court sustained, asking the suspension of the order of the court granted October 6, 1906, requiring express companies operating in Texas to receive for transportation in all districts in the State all C. O. D. packages of liquor presented to them for shipment.

Petitioners set forth in their motion as grounds therefor that the law enacted by the present legislature became effective today requiring all express companies to pay an annual tax of \$10,000 on each office maintained by it in prohibition districts to which it should carry intoxicating liquors; and that as it had in Texas 133 offices in such prohibited territory into which, under the mandatory injunction of the court above referred to, it would be compelled to carry C. O. D. packages of liquor, it would become liable to the State in the sum of \$1,300,000 in taxes annually.
