The first that T will men ion is under what is known "Municipal ownership," which of course means tha the city will own and operate its own system. To accomo issue bonds for the purchase of material and also for the urchase of the present plant, if same can be bought for a easonable price.
If this is done, we have ssurance from our engineer, who madecareful.and exhaustive investigation of all the conditions at this place, that we can construct a com-
plete system of water works. one that will afford adequat fire protection, and which can be counted upon at all times to supply water for domestic and manufacturing purposes While at this time we do revenue from the presen system is, we conclude,
from all the evidence we are able to get from the other people of Nacogdoches are given an opportunity to pur
chase water, be able to supply at least four hundred custo homes.

A plant having this patro nage, and in which, during the required water could be automatically pumped by the hudraulic ram system, and about one third during the profit months, would yield of not less than \(\$ 3,000.00\) per annum over and above all ex penses.
