### FIRE AT BIRD'S MILL.

Lumber Valued at \$3,000 Destroyed Last Night.

About 11 o'clock last night fire destroyed 250,000 feet of lumber at J. W. Bird's mill, four miles north west of the city.

The fire originated in a dry klin, but it had gained such headway when discovered that it was beyond control. The flames spread rapidly to the stacks of lumber on the yard and it was with difficulty that the mill was saved.

The loss is estimated at \$3,000, with no insurance.

The mill is running as usual this afternoon.

### THE LEGISLATURE.

Resolution to Increase Salary of the Governor.

In the state senate yesterday Senator Meachum's motion to recall the full crew bill as passed was tabled and the bill was signed by Lieutenant Governor Davidson. The bill as passed and signed is a signal victory for labor interests, as its recall would have meant death or "serious bodily harm" to the amendments.

The committee reported favorably the Grinstead tuberculosis sanitarium bill. The bill carries an appropriation of \$150,000.

Resolutions increasing the salaries of the governor and lieutenant governor passed to engrossment.

Senator Harbison introduced a bill making it a felony to conduct a gambling house and applying a heavy fine or jail sentence on persons convicted of gambling.

The house passed McCallum's bill amending the corporation law authorizing fishing and boating clubs to incorporate and issue bonds.

A resolution was adopted by a vote of 55 to 48, to hold night sessions from 8 to 11.

During this session, Gentry's dog show parade passed around the state house and the tooting of the calliope caused members to stam pede to the windows and business was suspended until the calliope got out of hearing.

The Gaines anti-cook fighting bill was passed to engrossment.

Passed finally the bill fixing the pay of veniremen at \$1 per day during attendance on court.

Mr. Dean called up his anti-gambling bill and moved that the house do not concur in the senate amendments, and that a free conference committee be appointed. This prevailed. Mr. Dean stated that his purpose in making this motion was to correct the wording of the bill.

### RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT.

A Worthy Tribute to the Late Judge Ratcliff.

At a meeting of the bar of Nacogdoches, held in the district court room yesterday afternoon, the following resolutions were adopted:

To Honorable Geo. F. Ingraham, chairman, and the members of the Legal Profession, and more especially the members of the bar of Nacogdoches, Texas:

We, your committee, appointed by your honor at a meeting of the bar, held Tuesday, March 19, 1907, to draft resolutions relative to the death of our fellow barrister, Judge Wilton G. Ratcliff, who was called to his reward on the first day of March, 1907, at the age of fifty-seven years, beg leave to report as follows:

Resolved, First. In the death of Judge Ratcliff, the bar has lost one of its most honorable and able members, the profession a man worthy of his calling, who loved the law for its beauty, its purity and its justice. We have all lost the association and counsel of a lawyer who was unassuming in his conduct, towards his fellow man, unsuspecting in his practice and dealings with his fellow barristers, a lawyer in whom was no guile.

Second. Nacogdoches county has lost an able, an honest and a thoroughly competent, conscientious chief executive; one who had filled the county judge's office in his younger days with honor to himself and with a high degree of satisfaction to his constituency; an officer who dared to execute the law in accordance with his legal convictions, and render his judgements without fear or favor; his motto: "Let Justice Prevail."

Third. His family has lost an amiable, discreet and upright head; his bereaved wife a loving and loved husband; his children an affectionate and provident father; his brothers and sisters have lost an honorable and honored member of the family, one who has sacredly kept unsullied the escutcheon of his tribe.

Fourth. Our entire citizenship mourns the death of Judge Ratcliff. We loved and honored him as a citizen, believed in his judgment and sound discretion, and do now deeply deplore his death; but it has pleased the Great Judge of the final court, the Almighty God, to call Judge Ratcliff hence, and with reverence we surrender unto Him that which He gave, with an unflinching trust, knowing that he doeth all things well, and at the last great day in the Resurrection Judge Ratcliff's body shall come forth as incorruptible as his soul.

## VALUE OF SCHOOLS.

Denton invested more wisely than many of us knew when we secured first the Normal and then the College of Industrial Arts. Not a day passes but Denton is benefited in more ways than one by the presence of these two institutions. They get, for the next two years work, between them \$289,000 if the appropriation bill as reported by the committee goes through.—Denton Record-Chronicle.

No money is lost that is spent in securing schools. It is like bread that is cast upon the water—it will return again, and will not be long about it. Too many people regard schools and education as luxuries, rather than necessities. A little more education along this line will remove the greatest obstacle in the way of securing more schools and better schools for any community.

## LAW KNOCKED OUT.

Yesterday was opinion day with the court of criminal appeals at Dallas, and the court in rendering its decisions silenced another section of the Code of Criminal Procedure. Article 572 of the code provides for the holding of special terms of county courts to accept pleas of guilty, and for that purpose only. The court of criminal appeals, in an opinion handed down yesterday, declares that article unconstitutional. Still there is more to follow.

The free pass bill is now a law so far as the legislature is concerned, requiring only the approval of the governor. And it is one of the most sweeping and drastic anti-pass measures ever enacted by any legislature. Under this law, it is claimed, a railroad conductor can not carry his mother's picture on his train. There seems to be some doubt, however, about its prohibiting newspapers and the railroads exchanging advertising for transportation. In that case the newspapers and the railroads should be given the benefit of the doubt.

When the editor of the San Angelo Press wrote these few lines he wrote with a full quarter million good democrats in Texas feel: "If Governor Campbell Jacks weight necessary to secure the enactment of platform demands, the people will make good at the next election."—Austin Statesmen.

And he also wrote what the people of Texas will not do, except as a reiteration of the same demands in convention assembled. Nine tenths of the present members of the legislature will go back if they want to on the "second term" hobby.

## THE RURAL SCHOOLS.

Their Greatest Needs is Better School Houses.

Editor Sentinel,

One of the greatest needs of the country schools of this county is school houses. There are not more than a dozen comfortable school houses, outside of independent districts, in Nacogdoches county. This shows that less than 107 of our rural school buildings are comfortable. Many of these houses are mere shells. Some close to Nacogdoches, too, that do not look like window panes had been put in for years.

I visited a school in a populous, wealthy district that had two teachers, a stove in each room, about eighty pupils in attendance, with great holes in the floor, and it seemed half the window lights were out. I wore an overcoat and over shoes in that house, and yet was cold. How children can study under such conditions, I can't see. Fact is, they can't study much. No child can study when he is cold. The body must be comfortable for the mind to be active.

Why patrons will go ahead and let their school house go to rack is more than I can see. We should have more interest in our school than that. Every citizen should put his shoulder to the wheel and push with all his might any movement that will be for the betterment of his school, tax or what not.

Besides, the desks and benches used in many of our schools make good school work impossible. No teacher can do effective work in an old open shell of a house and old straight-backed rickety benches. The best teacher on earth must have facilities to work with.

Good teachers know this, and that is the reason that some schools don't get as good teachers as they wish. The best teachers do not want to make failures, and it is impossible to make a success under above conditions. As a parallel, the best cook on earth must not only have something to cook but something to cook a good meal. A farmer must have implements to work with. So must a teacher. Will you build a school that is comfortable? Will you seat it comfortably? Patrons, trustees, are you going to build or are you going to tear down. Answer which? And remember that future generations will hold you responsible for this year's work. Yours for good school houses, R. W. Tillery, County Supt.

## Counting the Cost.

Report comes from Austin that the official stenographers in the Bailey investigation have just turned in a big account for their work. The account is for 2526 pages of typewritten record, averaging 335 words to the page or a total of 836,210 words. They received 15 cents per hundred words for the first copy and five cents per hundred words for seven additional copies, making a total of fifty cents per hundred words. The entire amount to \$3,381.81.

## LOSE MILLION TREES

Peach Crop Dead From Beaumont To Tyler.

Palestine, Texas, March 20.

"One million peach trees will die this season in East Texas," is the startling statement made by Colonel D. H. L. Bonner of Arp, who is known as a veteran fruit grower. Colonel Bonner was in the city yesterday and further stated that this condition exists from Beaumont south to Tyler north. In from Tyler to Dallas on the Texas and Pacific and Cotton Belt the Elberta trees are in good condition. In Smith, Cherokee, Anderson, Nacogdoches and counties south trees in the lowlands are apparently going to give a good yield of fruit, but strange to say, the trees in the upper lands are either dead or dying.

To save his trees Colonel Bonner is going to cut off all tops and the new growth this season will put the trees in prime condition for next season. This, he says, will save his trees, but he will lose this season's crop entirely. When asked for an opinion as to the cause of this condition he stated: "Many are under the impression that the heavy freeze about one year ago is the cause, but not so.

"It must be kept in mind that the past winter has been a remarkably open one. Hundreds of trees that bore a big crop last season bloomed again or formed buds in the fall. I attribute the lack of vitality among the trees to this fact."

The Post representative examined an acre containing some 100 trees. Only six were found in bloom. Some thirty or forty were out in leaves, with no indications of buds. The balance were sickly, with partially developed buds; or the trees to all appearances had no life. Small branches were dead, the trunks showing but little sap. This acre is on a hill overlooking the city of Palestine. Among fruit growers there is much concern and many are loth to accept Colonel Bonner's statement, but all admit that the trees are unusually backward in development.

Nacogdoches has started in to help the Texas five million club in earnest. The building of a solid block of business houses, installing a new and complete system of water works, securing a big Baptist college, accepting from the postoffice department a system of free mail delivery, enlarging and improving the city sewage system, are some of the enterprises—secured and unsecured—that are bound to attract people to this city who have scarcely ever thought of the town before.

By a bare majority in each house, the legislature adopted a resolution to adjourn this afternoon until next Monday, in order that the members may attend the fat stock show at Fort Worth. Pleasure comes high, but the law makers must have it.

A SHOOTING 'SCRAPE.

A Well Known Farmer is Placed Under Bond.

Henry Rhodes, a colored man who resides about 14 miles from Nacogdoches, in the southeastern portion of the county, was brought to the city Saturday night suffering from the effects of gun shot wounds.

A physician was summoned to dress the wounds, which are said to be not necessarily fatal.

Rhodes was driving along the road in his wagon when, he says, a white man whom he recognized stepped out from behind the corner of a fence and fired two shots at him from a shot gun. One load of buck shot took effect in the shoulder and the other at the base of the skull behind the ear.

Upon information obtained from the wounded man Hamilton Davis, a well known young farmer residing near Dot glass, was brought in this morning by Constable Rogers of Douglass and complaint was filed against him for assault to murder.

Mr. Davis waived examination before Justice F. D. Huston and he was released on \$500 bond.

FRANK SMITH KILLED.

He Had Several Relatives in Nacogdoches.

The newspapers Sunday morning contained an account of the assassination of Franklin E. Smith, a prominent young real estate dealer in San Antonio.

The shooting was done by E. J. Wilson, a former real estate man, and the tragedy occurred about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

The particulars of the killing are thus told by the San Antonio Light of Saturday afternoon:

"In a shooting affray at the Moore building this afternoon A. Beversdorf, clerk for Franklin E. Smith, was killed and Mr. Smith himself shot three times by E. J. Wilson.

Mr. Smith was shot in three places—in the right shoulder, the left leg and through the throat. The clerk, Beversdorf, was shot through the heart and instantly killed.

"The shooting, it is said, arose over some land transactions. Mr. Smith was conscious at all times. Asked what caused the shooting, he said he did not know.

"The shooting took place at 3 o'clock. Mr. Wilson would not make a statement. Mr. Wilson was formerly in the real estate business here. Mr. S. B. Brundage states that the trouble arose over a real estate transaction in which Wilson was interested. Mr. Wilson had a tract of land in the hands of Mr. Smith for sale. Mr. Smith and Mr. Brundage were on a trade for the property and earnest money had been put up. For some reason the trade did not go through and hard feelings resulted.

Witnesses state that Mr. Smith and Mr. Beversdorf were sitting at their respective desks when Wilson walked to the door with a pistol in each hand and commenced shooting. Beversdorf was shot dead, but Mr. Smith rose and grappled with Mr. Wilson and the two were out in the hall when Mr. Smith sank from exhaustion, and outsiders interfered.

"Eugene J. Wilson, Jr. is the son of Eugene Wilson, Sr., a prominent lawyer of Brazoria. The family is originally from Virginia. Eugene Wilson, Jr. is a graduate of the University of Texas. Mr. Wilson is afflicted with consumption. While attending the University of Texas he was frequently obliged to resign away for days on account of ill health. After graduating from the university he decided not to take up the practice of law, but to go into the real estate business. He built houses and sold them, confining his operations largely to the Tobin hill district. He is a man of means and has always been successful in his speculations. He spent quite a lot of his time in California.

"Franklin Edward Smith, the second victim of the tragedy, has been identified with the real estate business in

Letter to W. G. Reid, Nacogdoches, Texas.

A SPECIAL from Austin to the Houston Chronicle says that Representative O'Beirne in a statement to the House denied the report that the Bailey special train cost him \$3,300. He said that he had charge of the train and that it did not cost a cent. Just a few days ago the legislature passed a very rigid and stringent anti-pass law and before the ink is hardly dry on the bill, the members accept for themselves free transportation on a junketing tour. That is a poor example of consistency.

THE Houston Post asserts that the legislators work better on \$2 a day than when getting a larger amount. Then why not reduce the pay of the members rather than raise it.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

You know the old saying: "Do not ride a free horse to death." May be if beginning with the first day of the session they were allowed \$2 a day until all bills for the session were introduced, and \$5 a day thereafter, still better results would be accomplished.—Houston Post.

In other words, let the boys begin the session at the little end of the horn of the dilemma. But the Post's comment suggests an idea. How would it do to fix the compensation of a member at \$2 per day for a week for every bill he introduces? This would cause the legislators to introduce fewer bills, and would no doubt shorten the sessions.

### AFTER ASSESSORS.

State Revenue Agent Striving to Increase Revenues.

County Tax Assessor A. Y. Donegan is in receipt of a lengthy letter from Captain Bill McDonald, state revenue agent, calling his attention to the provisions of law requiring all property to be assessed at actual value, that all improvements on farm and other lands must be properly signed and sworn to, also calling attention to the time when the law requires the tax rolls to be finished and demanding a compliance with the law by assessors and citing penalties to be assessed against them for failure to do so. He also stated his intention to make personal inspection of assessors' offices to see if the laws are being complied with.

Similar letters have been sent to all the assessors in the state and answers thereto requested.

Mr. Donegan says that he has invariably required all inventories to be properly signed and sworn to as provided for by law, that he is endeavoring to do his duty as he understands the law and cordially invites Captain McDonald to visit and inspect his office at any time.

Mr. Charles H. Felt, manager of the Angelina Orchard Company's large orchard at Manton, was in the city yesterday afternoon. Mr. Felt stated to The Sentinel that during the past few days he had been convinced that he would have to change his opinion as to the prospects of the peach crop.

"Fortunately," said Mr. Felt, "we have only 200 acres in Elberta trees, but from those trees we will not ship a peach. We have 800 acres in early fruit that promise a yield of a fair crop."

Mr. Felt also stated that there is an insect working on his orchard which he has not yet been able to name, but it is similar to the insect that infests the orchards in California. So far, however, it has done very little damage, and Mr. Felt states that he expects to destroy it by spraying his trees next fall.

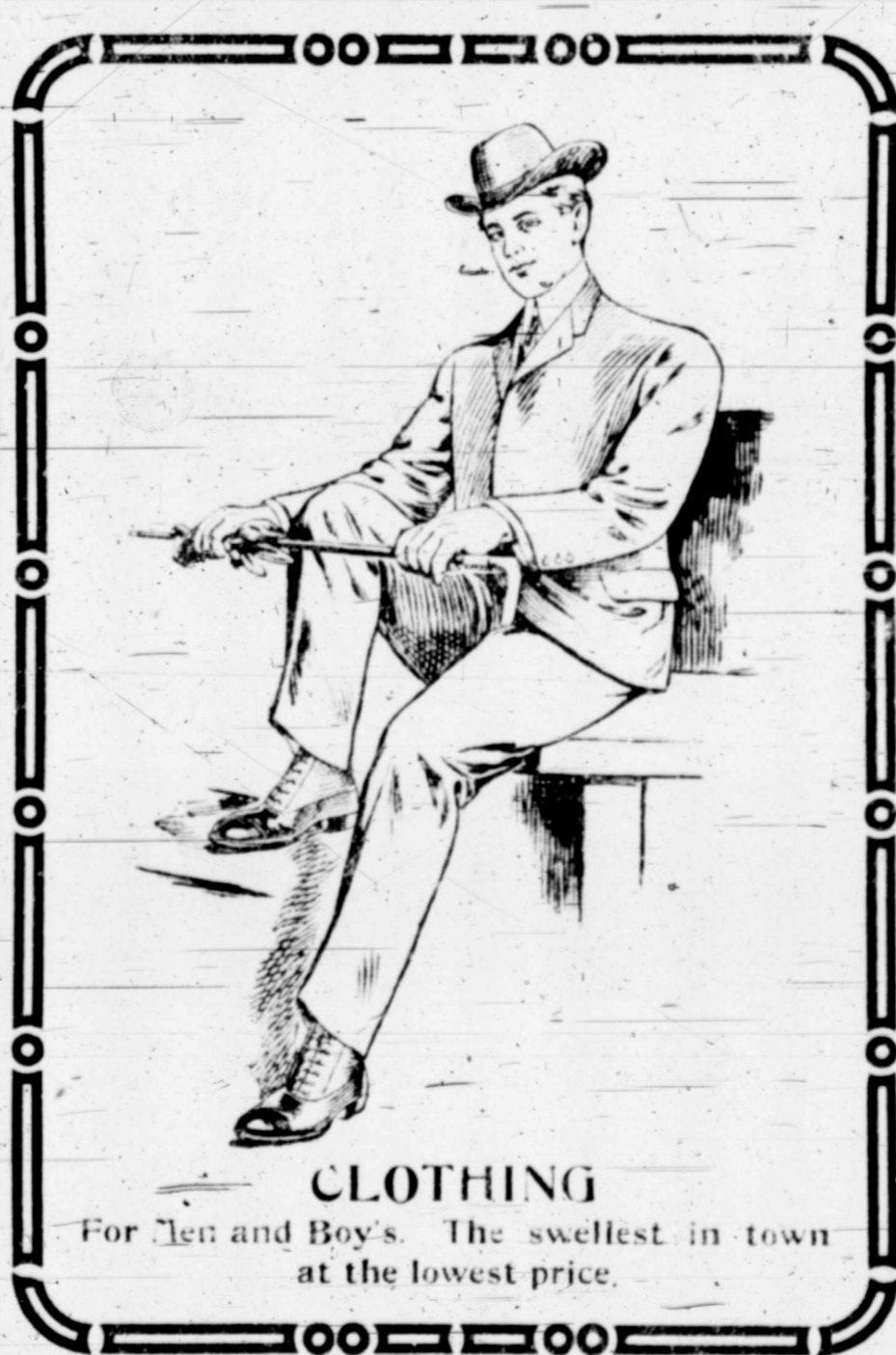

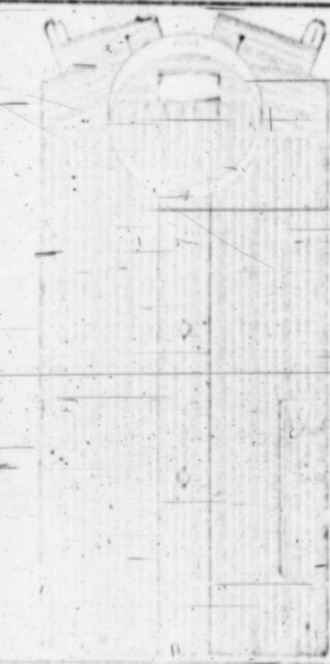

**THE CASE DISMISSED.**

Slayer of Editor Jim Truitt Must be Reindicted.

A few days ago the Timpson Times published an excellently written story about the capture of one William Mitchell, the supposed assassin of Editor Jim Truitt of the Timpson Times 21 years ago. It now transpires that the case against Mitchell, who was indicted at Center soon after the murder, has been dismissed and if he is ever tried he will have to be reindicted.

In commenting on the Times article, the Center News says: "Unfortunately, the case against this fugitive from justice was dismissed a number of years ago, and the only evidence that can be secured for re-indictment would be circumstantial.

"It is not now known why, nor how the case was dismissed, but is supposed to have been a mistake, the result of confusion in the names of the parties. As recited above, Sheriff Sims has done some fine work in the matter and is much worried that so much labor should thus come to naught by the carelessness of others who should have been equally interested. 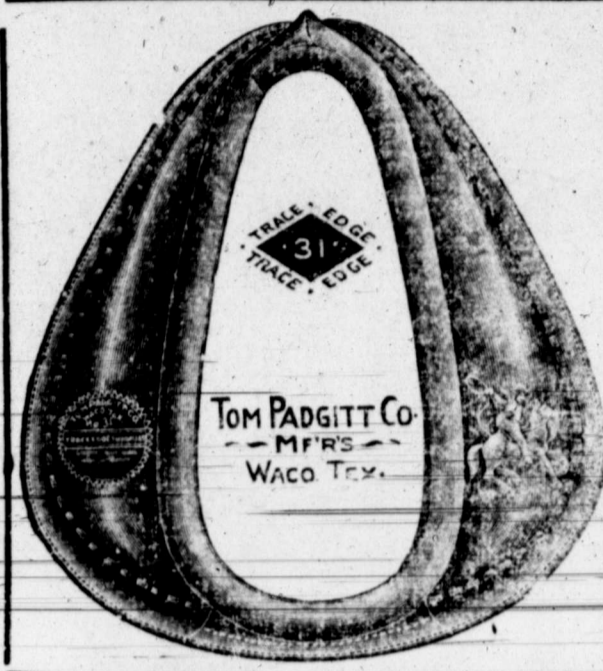

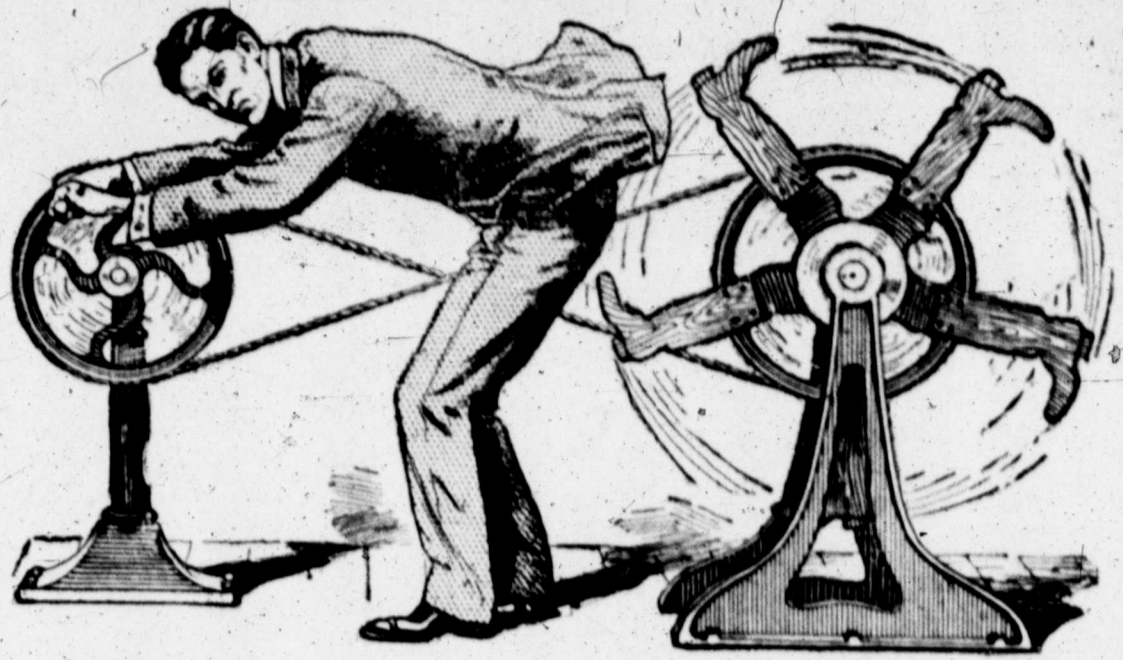

The debating society meets every Saturday night. They had a good house last Saturday.

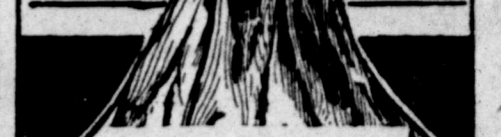

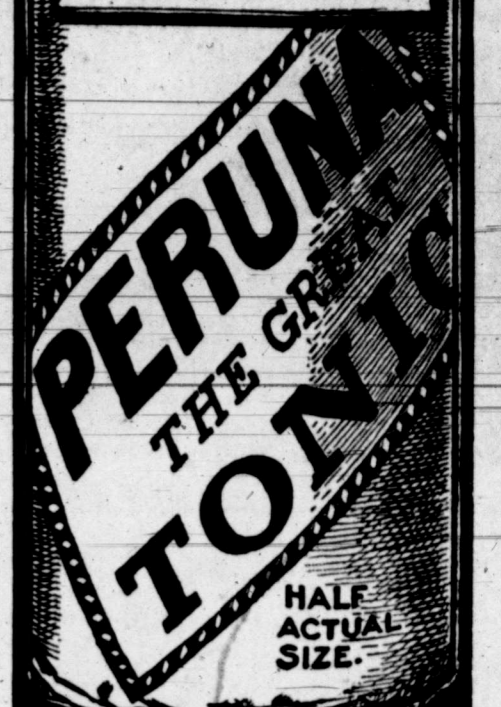
