



NACOGDOCHES TOBACCO.

Interesting Interview With Mayor R. T. Shindler.

On his return from a recent trip to Austin, Mayor R. T. Shindler stopped off in Houston, and while there is quoted by a Chronicle sreporter to ave said:

"We are raising more tobacco there this year than ever before, and there is no question about the fact that the tobacco raising industry has gone beyond the experimental stage and is now an assured thing. This year there are about 135 acres of land under cultivation for tobacco, as against 15 acres last year. This is quite an increase, you see. We have a government expert, Otto Olson, on the ground, and he looks after the tobacco, going from one farm to another, giving advice and help wherever needed. It is his opinion and the tests made of the samples of tobacco raised around our city last year show that the grade of tobacco produced is as good as the best Havana leaf. Of course some s. wis just as any imported leaf on the American market today.

"One good feature of our district down there is the fact that the percentage of inferior or medium grade tobacco is so very small as to be of no great account in the whole crop, while the high grade leaf is all that could be desired, and, as I say, in the greater percentage.


