Paid The Policy.

The Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York, through its agent, C. C. Watson of this city, on Tuesday delivered to Judge Geo. F. Ingraham and Charles Hoya, executors of the estate of the late Judge W. G. Rateliff, a check for \$1000 in full payment of the policy on Judge Rateliff's life. This policy was issued in January, 1894, and during the thirteen years the policy had been in force Judge Rateliff had paid \$477.50 in premiums, giving to his beneficiaries the sum of \$522.50 more than had been paid out.

New Time Card.

A new time card will go into effect on the Texas and New Orleans railroad tomorrow. The change will affect the arrival and departure of both trains at Nacogdoches. The south bound train will arrive at Nacogdoches at 2:41 p. m., and the north bound will arrive at 2:55 p. m. The trains will meet at Hayward mill.

BIG TIMBER DEAL.

Ten Million Feet of Pine Changes Ownership.

One of the largest timber deals that has taken place in Nacogdoches county for a long while was consummated in this city yesterday, when T. J. and J. L. Williams and the Texas Lumber Manufacturing company disposed of their holdings near Oil City to the Angelina County Lumber company.

The deal includes all the pine timber on 2000 acres of land, situated near Oil City, in Nacogdoches county, amounting to about ten million feet.

One of the conditions of the deal was that the owners of land cede to the Angelina County Lumber company right of way through the property for an extension of their tram road from Keltys, which it is their intention to build to a connection with the Santa Fe at Chireno.

This will give Nacogdoches county another railroad.

Williams Brothers have also sold their saw mill at Oil City to J. B. Hooks of Beaumont, who will move the plant to Batson. The Texas Manufacturing company is getting its mill in shape at Lelavale, and will soon be prepared to fill all orders for lumber or ties from that plant.

Mrs. King Visits the Home of Her Childhood.

Woden, Texas, May 10.—Last Saturday morning I boarded the N. & S. E. train for Woden, the place of my childhood. We had quite a pleasant trip, as there were quiet a number of passengers on the train from Nacogdoches. And when we arrived and as the train was slowly pulling in to the little city of Woden, my mind ran back to former days when this was only a quiet neighborhood. I could but wonder in silent thought at what a change had taken place and what an improvement there was in this place, which bids fair to be one of our best towns in East Texas. It is being inhabited by a thrifty and thoroughgoing people, full of energy and integrity, and you know that is the kind of people it takes to build a good town.

There is but one of the former old land marks of this place left; that is my uncle, R. J. King, who was born in two miles of the town and is 64 years old. He is also an old veteran who served through the war. Very few of his old comrades are left, but he is hale and hearty and bids fair to be with us a long time.

Well, I will tell you of the improvements of Woden. It has three houses of general merchandise, a nice school building that would be an honor to any town, one hotel—Mrs. Allie Powers is proprietress, two boarding houses—Mrs. Lewis Teutsch and Mrs. Rose, and a saw mill near by and also a barber shop.

I am glad indeed to see this place fast coming to the front, for it is here I was born and raised and spent my happy childhood days, days gone by never to return. Yesterday I visited my old home where I was reared. Everything was so changed I could scarcely recognize my once-dear-old happy home, but there is left one tree, a magnolia, that I planted when quite a little girl. From this old tree I gathered some beautiful flowers. I brought them home and gave them to my aunt, Mrs. R. J. King. Then we went to the place where my grand father's home used to be. There is not a mark of the old home left, except a few stately old oaks which stood in the yard, and I remember so well where they stood in the old yard that I could in my imagination see the old two story house as it used to stand on the brow of the hill; and as I walked over and around this sacred spot where I romped and played in childish glee, many pleasant memories rushed to my mind. NEW INSURANCE LAW.

Live Stock Measure Does Not go into Effect till July 12.

Colonel R. T. Milner, state insurance commissioner, announces that the department has been receiving hundreds of inquiries from persons all over the state asking whether or not corporations may be formed for the purpose of carrying on a live stock insurance business under the present laws. The present legislature has passed such a law but the bill does not become effective until ninety days after the legislature. This bill provides that all such corporations shall be under the jurisdiction of the state insurance department. That section of the new law relating to the formation of live stock insurance companies is as follows:

"Sec. 3. Subdivision 46, article 642 of the Revised Statutes of Texas shall be and is hereby amended so as to hereafter read as follows: (46.) For the organization of fire, marine, life and live stock insurance companies; provided, that such live stock insurance companies may be organized with an authorized and paid up capital stock of not less than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000); and provided further, that all insurance companies mentioned in this subdivision shall be in all other respects subject to and shall comply with all of the provisions of Title LVIII of the Revised Statutes of Texas and any and all laws supplementary to or amendatory thereof."

THE USES FOR COTTON.

In extolling the benefits to be derived by the people in establishing cotton mills in the South, an exchange calls attention to the many uses for which cotton is adapted, as follows:

"You get up in the morning from a bed clothed in cotton; you step on a cotton rug; you let in the light by raising a cotton window shade; you wash with soap made partly from cotton oil product; you dry your face on a cotton towel; you array yourself chiefly in cotton clothing; the 'silk' in which your wife dresses is probably mercerized cotton; at the breakfast table you do not get away from King Cotton; cottolene has probably taken place of lard in the biscuits you eat; the beef and mutton you eat are probably fattened on cotton seed meal and hulls; your 'improved olive oil' is more likely from a Texas cotton farm than an Italian villa; your 'butter' is probably a product of Southern cotton seed; the coal you burn may have been mined by the light of a cotton oil lamp; the sheep from which your woolen clothing came may have been fed on cotton seed; the tonic you take may contain an extract of cotton root bark; the tobacco you smoke not unlikely grew under cotton cover and is put up in a cotton bag; your morning daily is printed on cotton waste paper—and even in Oriental skirmish it tells how the contending forces were clothed in khaki duck, slept under cotton tents, cotton was essential in the high explosives which were used, and when at last the war had done her worst, surgery itself called it into requisition to aid the injured and dying."

Mrs. Shindler Writes of Her Visit to The Capitol City.

Editor Sentinel.

Austin, Texas, May 12.—I left San Antonio with a pleasant party of ladies Friday evening, arriving here at 5:30 o'clock comfortably and expensively domiciled at the Driskill.

We met several friends and sat around the parlors chatting till ordinary bed time; previously we had been sitting up till extraordinary hours warned us that "Nature's Sweet Restorer" was about to desert us entirely. We were beginning to look "tagged," we knew there was heavy work before us that would need a clear brain and steady hand.

Yesterday morning at 10 o'clock the Executive Board of the United Daughters of the Confederacy and Trustees of the Woman's Confederate Home met in joint session in the U. D. C. room in the Capital Building. Fifteen women were present and thoroughly in earnest in their business council. At the close of the meeting, 11:30 o'clock, we went in a body to visit the Home. To say we were pleased is stating it lightly; we were delighted with the beautiful building, which is almost completed—a very little carpenter's work to be done and painting the window blinds. There are fifteen bed rooms, a reception room, hospital, nice entrance hall, large dining room and comfortable kitchen with the usual closets and several handsome galleries. The building is put up in cement blocks and presents a very handsome appearance from either approach. The fifteen bed rooms are to be furnished by private individuals, already promised, and the U. D. Cs. express their desire to have them all furnished alike as in that way there can be no thought of favoritism, and really a home of that kind would be much more attractive to be thus furnished. Kentucky and Tennessee will each furnish a room, to be called by their names; a New York Chapter has already sent a contribution for furnishing a room. There remains the reception room and other rooms and halls to be suitably furnished. Contributions will be gladly received for the whole or parts of furnishings; for instance, you may send a table or chair or lounge with your name on it as the donor. I think it would be very nice to assist in furnishing the hospital room. The grounds around the building are beautiful with forest trees which hold their great limbs aloft giving protecting shade.

Returning to dinner we met again at 2:30 o'clock—the Executive Board in one room, the Trustees in another—at the Driskill, coming together later on to complete the conference. This is the first Board meeting I have attended, though it is the fourth held this year, and I am congratulating myself all the time that I came.

After our U. D. C. work

was over, Mrs. Stone, Mrs. Dibrell and I took an automobile and went out to the Capitol to see the senate and house. There was nothing exciting going on in either place.

Supper over, we went to the University to see "Twelfth Night" played by some of the University girls. The costumes were fine, the acting cleverly done, and altogether we were well entertained till 11 o'clock.

From there we went to the Capitol again and witnessed the adjourning of the state's legislature. The members were sitting gaily chatting, some singing; in fact, they sang four hymns, Jesus Lover of My Soul, Rock of Ages, Sweet Bye and Bye and God be with You till we Meet Again. Senator Kellie rehearsed a sermon on the Garden of Eden. Mrs. Stone and I joined in the singing, though, listen, we did not make ourselves conspicuous.

I met several distinguished gentlemen, among them Attorney General Davidson, who gave us each a beautiful rose from a bouquet on his desk. Mr. Kellie shook hands with me, calling me "Miss Emma," saying he saw me when a little girl. I met Mr. Oscar Crain in the house, a mutually pleasant surprise. As he didn't ask me what I was doing out that time of night I refrained from questioning him. He is looking well. The clock was set back about forty minutes to make believe it wasn't Sunday. We saw the act of setting back done with our own eyes, so we can testify to it.

Well, we got home early in the morning and after what I have told you I am sure you will think we had a strenuous day. I consider it a Red Letter Day. But I'm taking life easy this morning. I am going out just after dinner to call on Mrs. O. M. Roberts, an old friend of my mother's, and at 5:30 will take the train for San Antonio. That sounds like going backwards, but my home ticket begins there, and I will be home as soon as the Southern Pacific will bring me, if not sooner. The railroads have been most liberal and kind and the newspapers, of which you stand first with me, most courteous in assisting their correspondents in attending the Texas Women Press Convention. Fifteen members took advantage of the excursion to Monterey, but I resisted that attraction, and am really glad I did. They will return to San Antonio tomorrow and go home. Goodbye, dear Sentinel. I will see you again soon.

MAYOR SHINDLER'S MESSAGE.

An Interesting Resume of the City's Affairs.

The following message was submitted to the city council by Mayor R. T. Shindler at its meeting yesterday afternoon:

To the Council, Gentlemen: Conditions in Nacogdoches are rapidly changing, and with them a like change in the administration of the affairs of the municipal government. The demand for more and better improvements fourteen months ago prompted the council at that time to raise the rate of taxation ten cents on the \$100.00 valuation, and the rate this year has been raised fifteen cents more making in the past eighteen months a net raise of twenty five cents, which will give quite an additional revenue for the making of these improvements. In view of the fact that these demands are made, and the further fact that they are now becoming an actual necessity, I beg leave to submit the following for your consideration:

STREETS AND SIDEWALKS.
The matter of improving our streets and sidewalks is one that requires the utmost care and attention, for upon the condition of these depends the ability and ease with which to get about in following our different vocations. I recommend that the street and bridge committee at once investigate the feasibility of securing material, tools and such other things as are necessary for the laying of permanent streets and sidewalks, and if after careful investigation they think it can be done, begin to put down streets that will stay and that need only an occasional repairing.

SANITATION.
As the summer is approaching with its dangers from disease and epidemics, I suggest that the sanitary committee, in company with the city health officer, make an inspection of the entire city, and report their findings, in writing, to the mayor, whose duty it is to see that these matters have attention. The strict letter of the law should in these matters be enforced, and the health officer has a responsibility here that he can in no wise shift, and the citizens generally should be asked to become familiar with the requirements and help the authorities in looking after this, one of the most difficult departments to handle.

RAILROAD CROSSINGS.
The conditions existing at the railroad crossings in the city do not and have not received the attention they should have. The danger to loss of life and vexatious delays in waiting to cross when they are blocked with trains at times, I think fully justify the passage of an ordinance requiring them (The R. R. Co.) to keep flagmen at all crossings while trains are passing or switching. If this does not prove effectual, then I would favor the placing of a policeman in that vicinity to enforce the present law, which denies them the right to block a crossing for more than five minutes at a time.

CIVIC CLUB.
I have the assurance from a number of ladies and gentlemen that they will be glad to organize a civic club, having for its purpose the improvement of our city both in sanitary, beauty and cleanliness. I recommend that the council give both moral and financial help to this organization if it is organized, as it can and will be of vast im-

portance in helping to beautify and improve the general looks and conditions in the city.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP OF WATER WORKS.
This is a very important step which the city is about to undertake, and is so full of matters of detail that I do not feel it proper to try to formulate at this time any line of policy to pursue, but rather that we should at another time take the matter up in detail.

SEWERS.
The city has in the past three years laid something like 3,500 feet of eighteen and twenty-four inch sewers, but this is not all that is needed. Now that we are to have a system of waterworks covering almost the entire city, we will necessarily be asked to lay more lines to accommodate the new customers that will be added to the present users of water. I recommend that we at once take steps to determine if it is possible to extend the sewer on Fredonia street northwardly in a manner such as will give those living on that and other streets in that portion of the city the benefits of sewerage connections, and that as fast as we are able, give all the people that which I think is most essential to the general health of the city, first class sewerage facilities.

STREET SIGNS AND NUMBERING OF HOUSES.
This is a matter that we should by all means take up as soon as possible, as the benefits to be derived are far more than we, as casual passers, would think. The stranger in our city finds it hard to understand our way of directing him to where a certain party lives, and again, the boy who comes to the city to work in the stores is told that he will have to learn where everybody lives before he will be worth very much to his employer, but if we had the houses numbered and the streets named and signs placed at the corner, all this would be avoided. This is also a requirement in the securing of free mail delivery for any city.

VAGRANCY LAWS.
This section of our criminal laws is one that should have careful and full attention by those charged with the enforcements of the laws of our city. It sometimes seems very hard indeed to convict persons under this law, that we know beyond a reasonable doubt are such as the statute says shall be classed as vagrants, but I believe we can, by conviction or repeated trials in the recorder's court, force these characters to leave the city or go to work and earn an honest livelihood.

CITY PARK.
I feel that the time has come when we should as a city have a nice park where we can go and sit in the cool and enjoy ourselves, as the case may be, in the cool shadows of the beautiful trees, or congregate for the purpose of listening to some public speech, or the music of the Nacogdoches Brass Band (which we must have.) We have a beautiful plot of ground for that purpose at present and by cleaning it up and building a few nice walks through it and building a nice little pavillion on it we would have one of the nicest parks in East Texas.

CITY MARSHAL, ASSESSOR AND COLLECTOR.
At this time it would not be lawful, nor proper, but I feel that to give the city and the citizens the full benefit to be expected from this department it will be necessary to increase the salary of the

marshal and create the office of city assessor and collector. I think the added revenues to the city by reason of a more thorough assessment, and more diligent attention on the part of the police department, will pay the extra raise in the salary of the marshal, and have a tendency to curb the breaking of the law in our city.

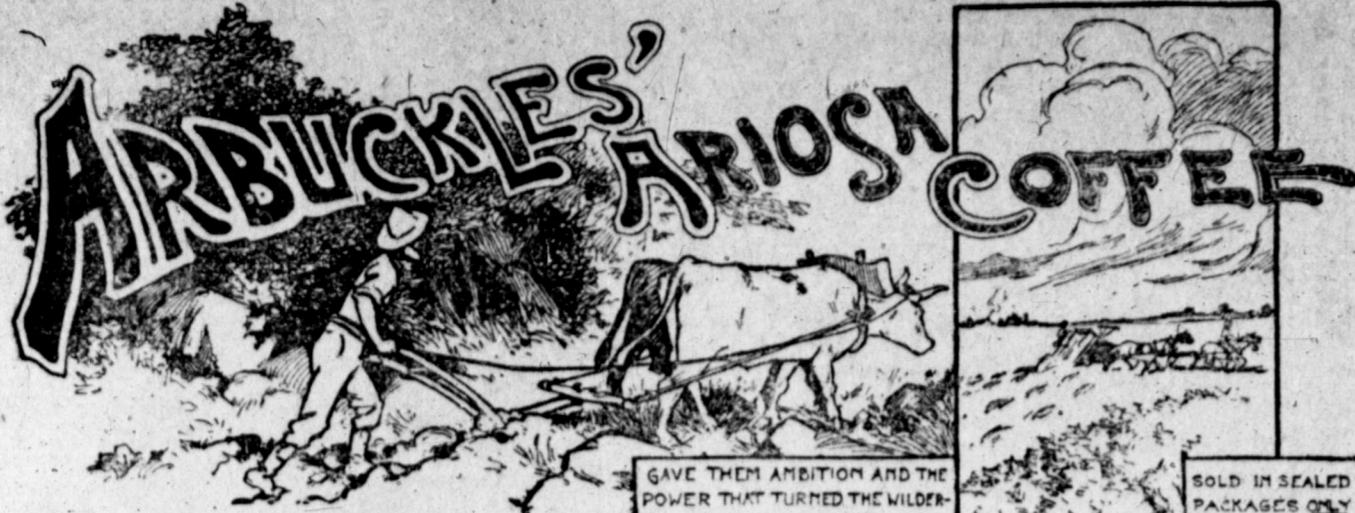

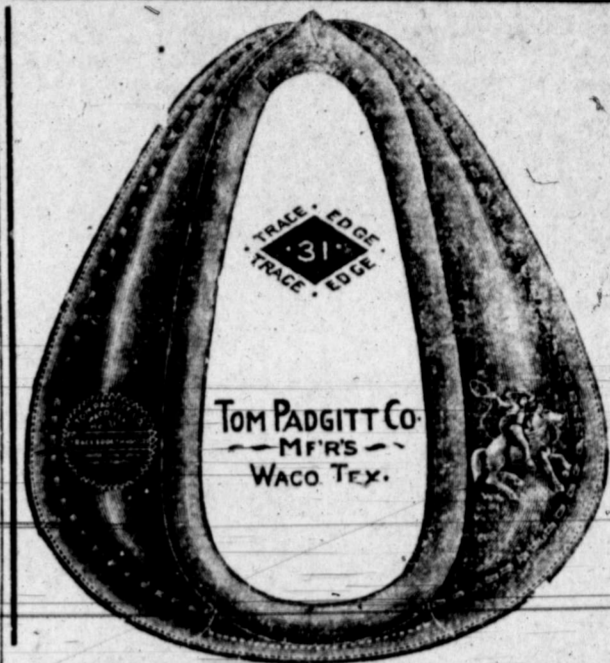

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing for the Creation of Improvement Districts in Certain Cities.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the creation of improvement districts in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants, and charging the cost of certain improvements made therein against the abutting property.

SECTION 1. *Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:* That Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the hundred dollars valuation, except for payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25, A. D. 1891, and for the creation of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property-taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

In addition to the foregoing, cities of more than five thousand inhabitants may lay out within their corporate limits, improvement districts in which they, by and with the consent of a majority of the taxpayers owning real estate therein, may build sidewalks and charge the cost thereof against the abutting property, and may build sewers and pave streets and charge one-third of the cost thereof against the abutting property on either side of the streets upon which such improvements are made in such district, and the amount charged against all such abutting property shall be deemed and held to be a tax against a lien upon such abutting property, and the Legislature is required to enact laws prescribing the means for ascertaining the amount properly chargeable against each parcel of abutting property, and providing for the enforcement of its collection.

Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday in August, A. D. 1907, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution, permitting property owners in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to create improvement districts, one-third the cost of which to be charged against abutting property on either side of the street." And the voters opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution, permitting property owners in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to create improvement districts, one-third the cost of which to be charged against abutting property on either side of the street."

Sec. 3. The lateness in the session, the crowded condition of the calendars of both houses, and the importance of this proposed amendment, create an emergency and an imperative public necessity demanding that the constitutional rule, and Senate Rule No. 37, requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended, and the same are hereby suspended.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing the Salary of Members of the Legislature.

AN ACT to amend Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the compensation of members of the Legislature.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

SECTION 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not to exceed one thousand dollars for each year in which a biennial session of the Legislature is held under the provisions of this Constitution, and five dollars for each day of any Special Session held during the subsequent year, and in addition thereto, they shall receive mileage in going to and returning from the State Capitol, not to exceed three cents per mile; the distance to be computed by the nearest railroad route, and the Comptroller shall prepare and preserve a table of distances for each county seat now or hereafter to be established, and by such table the mileage shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the

Journalment of a Regular or Called Session.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday in August, 1907, at which election all voters favoring the proposed amendment, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: "For the amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution relating to the salary of the members of the Legislature," and all those opposed, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words, "Against the amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution, relating to the salary of the members of the Legislature."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State, and the sum of \$1000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general revenue of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a State Printing Plant.

JOINT RESOLUTION authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amendment of Section 21, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to printing, publishing, stationery, paper and fuel, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 21. All printing and publishing, and all stationery, paper and fuel for the various departments, and for all offices, whether created by this Constitution or by law, shall be done and supplied as may be provided by law, and for the accomplishment of these objects and purposes the Legislature may provide and establish all requisite means and agencies, invested with such powers as may be deemed adequate and advisable.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday in August, A. D. 1907, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "For the amendment to Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution, relating to stationery, printing, paper and fuel," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "Against the amendments to Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution, relating to stationery, printing, paper and fuel."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Levy of a Road Tax.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 9a, increasing the amount of tax that may be voted for the purpose of improving public roads, and to allow counties or political subdivisions of counties by a majority vote of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county or subdivisions thereof, of voting at all elections, to be held for that purpose, to adopt same.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 9a, which shall read as follows:

Section 9a. A majority of the property tax paying voters in any county or one or more political subdivisions thereof, in this State, voting at an election held for that purpose may vote a tax for road and bridge purposes not to exceed 30 cents on the \$100 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county or political subdivision of such county, or may issue bonds not to exceed 20 per cent of the assessed value of the real property in such district, for such road and bridge purposes, provided that such tax, or proceeds of such bonds, shall be expended in the territory in which it is voted, and no other, and this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case any previous election shall be had in the State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified tax paying voters. And the sum of \$2000, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the treasury of the State of Texas for the purposes of submitting this proposition to a vote of the people of the State of Texas.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Creating the Office of Commissioner of Agriculture.

JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article four (4) of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 27, providing for a Department of Agriculture, with a bureau of labor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article four (4) of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto Section 27, when a majority of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature of Texas at an election for that purpose shall vote in favor of the amendment, shall read as follows:

Section 27. The Legislature shall provide for the office of Commissioner of Agriculture, who shall be either elected by the qualified voters of the State, or appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate, as the Legislature may provide; whose term of office, duties and salary shall be prescribed by law; in which department there shall be established by the Legislature a bureau of labor, when required by the public interest.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas, as an amendment to the Constitution of Texas, to be voted upon on the first Tuesday in August, 1907. All persons favoring said amendments shall have written or printed on their ballots, as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor." And those opposed to said amendments shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor." And the sum of (\$2000) two thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publications, proclamations and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing for the Establishment of a Home for Confederate Widows.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1893, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

SECTION 1. *Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:* That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1893, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3, Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations or individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers anterior to March 1, 1880; provided said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided the grant-to-aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas on the first Tuesday in August, 1907. The sum of \$5000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.


