Section 1. Be it Resolved by the delature of the State of Texas: That Section 9, Artic' 8, of the Contitution of the State of Texas, be so mended as to hereafter read as fol-

SEC. 9. The State tax on property. exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free phools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valution; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five for city or county purposes, cents not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors. on the hundred dollars valuation, except for payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendnent September 25, A. D. 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, lewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in an one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dolars valuation, of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.



Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing for the Establishment of a Home

for Confederate Widows. JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 51

of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation. SECTION 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Consti tution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to here after read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legisla ure shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations or individuals, municiprovided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers anterior to March 1, 1880; provided said aid shall not exceed eight dollars.per month and provided further, that no appropri- ing or qualifying themselves ations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for poverty. any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of home for said soldiers and sailors their wives and widows and women aided in the Confederacy,
