He was notified of the board's action in electing him, and this morning Superintendent R. F. Davis received a letter from Mr. Burnett with his acceptance.

Mr. Burnett will teach the sciences and other higher branches in the High School.

DEE OWENS ASSASSINATED.

Dead Body Found by a Party of Searchers.

From Friday's Daily:

One of the most cold blooded assassinations in the history of Nacogdoches county was committed in the vicinity of Linn Flat a few days ago, but was not discovered until last night.

Last Saturday D. D. Owens, a well known and popular young man residing in the Linn Flat community, came to Nacogdoches and secured license to marry Miss Maggie Wilkerson, the daughter of a prominent farmer of that neighborhood.

The wedding was to have been consummated at the home of the bride last night, and a number of the friends and relatives of the young couple had assembled to witness the ceremony. The bride was attired in her wedding garments, and the minister was in waiting to officiate.

At the appointed hour the groom did not appear. Some time passed and still young Owens did not come. The unsuspecting bride and her friends became impatient, and finally their impatience developed into apprehension that some mishap had befallen the intended husband.

At last it was decided to send a party of friends to search for him. They did not go far until they met a man who informed the party that on Wednesday morning early he saw young Owens in company with a negro named Dock Bailey who was trying to buy Owen's horse and saddle. He said that the negro had told Owens if he would go with him to Henry Day's house where his money was he would buy the horse and saddle. That was the last seen of Dee Owens alive.

The searching party went in the direction Owens and the negro had gone, and after traveling the distance some distance they came to where one of the most foul and heartless murders in the history of Nacogdoches county had been committed. There were evidences of a struggle, and there was blood on the ground. There was also evidence of some object having been dragged through the woods, and after following trail for about 200 yards the body of the murdered man was found.

He had been shot through the heart and his head had been horribly beaten with a club or some blunt instrument.

There is a true saying that murder will out, and it proved true in this instance sooner no doubt than the murderer anticipated.

A negro went to the town of Rusk yesterday and offered to sell a gray mare and

saddle at a very low price. He excited the suspicion of the officers at Rusk and he was placed under arrest pending an investigation. When arrested the negro had in his possession a pistol, a part of which had been broken off. A significant fact is the part broken off the pistol was found where Owens was murdered. Another fact is, the horse and saddle suited the description of Owens. Still another fact is when arrested the negro gave his name as Dock Bailey.

Sheriff Blackburn was notified of the murder, and he left this morning for the scene of the tragedy. From there he went to Rusk this afternoon, and will likely return with the prisoner tomorrow.

Dee Owens was a very popular young man, about 24 years of age, and the citizens of Linn Flat community are very much wrought up over his cold blooded murder.

Maggie Wilkerson, who was to have been married to him last night, is almost prostrated with grief.

DOCK BAILEY CONFESSED.

Slayer of Dee Owens Admits He Committed Crime.

From Saturday's Daily:

Nacogdoches has been filled with citizens from the vicinity of Linn Flat and Trawick since yesterday afternoon, who came here with the hope of getting an opportunity to see Dock Bailey, the slayer of young Dee Owens.

They have had little to say about the tragedy, but their every appearance foretold determination and suppressed excitement.

When it was learned this morning that the negro Bailey had confessed to Sheriff Blackburn that he committed the crime, it has been conceded by all that the courts would be relieved of the trouble of trying the case if the prisoner should be brought to Nacogdoches.

Bailey is confined inside the walls of the penitentiary at Rusk, where he will remain until it becomes necessary to bring him here for trial.

From Constable A. A. Biggs of Cato, who came in this afternoon, it is learned that a bloody shirt was found under a dresser at Bailey's home, and other evidence has been secured to convict him of the murder beyond a doubt, even if he had non-confessed.

An inquest was held by Justice Creel of Cushing, and the body of the murdered man was buried yesterday afternoon.

It was composed by James Ryder Randall, who was born in Baltimore in 1839. He wrote this song called the Marsellaise of the South, of which he says: I wrote it one sleepless night in '61, in a second story room of Poydras college, seated at a little old desk. He was then professor of this college, upon the House river in Louisiana. It was first published in the New Orleans Delta, says Miss Orgain. He is now in New Orleans, publishing the Morning Star, a paper of high purpose, she says, where she recently met him. I have filed this short sketch of Mr. Randall's life by Miss Orgain, with his picture among my records for my future reference. I hope some of my young Southern friends, if this should come beneath their notice, will remember a certain earnest argument as to this question, and will prepare and govern themselves accordingly by making it read, "The despotic heel is on thy shore," etc. All contemporaries catch on and accommodatingly copy, if they can conveniently, or cut up some kind caper at the kankered contort of this cherished contribution.

Letter to Mayer & Schmidt, Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Sirs: Ten years ago there was one pure paint and 200 adulterated; there are now eight pure, 20 adulterated and half of the latter short measure besides.



I can think of but one plan that would give our towns more safety; that would be to rule out all friction matches inside of the corporation and use the match that can not be set only by another composition.

TEXAS GINNERS' REPORT.

Number of Bales Ginned Up to September 1, 1907.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 10.—Commissioner of Agriculture Milner today announced that the total number of bales of cotton ginned by Texas giners to September 1 to be 107,009. This is in accordance with the new giners' law, which requires them to make monthly reports to the agricultural department. The above figures represent all cotton which has been ginned this season to September 1. The above number of bales is 38,000 behind the government reports for Texas, which has just been made public. Commissioner Milner says that this discrepancy is due to the fact that a number of giners in that state have not reported, not being familiar with the provisions of the law. He is preparing a statement which will show the number of bales ginned in each county.

The gum tree seems to be the most rapid of growers. There is one in Florida which shot up forty feet in four years and another is reported from Guatemala which grew 120 feet in twelve years. This is at the rate of one foot a month, or ten feet in a year. The highest tree in the world is an Australian gum of the species of eucalyptus regnans, which stands in the Lake Otway range. It is 415 feet high, which beats the sequoia gigantia, or big trees of our California coast. Those who desire quick growing trees for city streets, parks and yards would do well to get a supply of these gums. They are probably not hardy enough for our northern latitudes, but would doubtless do well in many parts of the south.—American Farmer.

To Widen the Bridge.
The commissioners met Monday morning with commissioners Muckleroy and Satterwhite present and Judge Mims presiding, but owing to the unavoidable absence of Commissioners Sitton and Patton, very little work has been accomplished. Commissioner Patton is reported quite sick, and Commissioner Sitton is also kept at home on account of sickness.

About the only matter of importance done by the court so far is to agree to appropriate \$500, or as much of that sum as may be necessary, on condition that the city of Nacogdoches spend as much or more, to widen the bridge over LaNana creek on East Main street.

It is proposed to widen the bridge to 25 feet, with a 20 foot drive way and a five foot walk on the south side.

Texas' Buried City.

Three feet below the soil level in Rockwall county, thirty feet to the northeast of Dallas, lie twenty miles of Cyclopean wall which have given the county its name. The existence of the wall has long been known, and the folk thereabout have aimlessly discussed whether it is of natural or artificial formation. Now, however, an organized effort is being made to find an answer to the riddle. A regular stonewall exploration has been formed, and it is reported that depths of forty feet have been uncovered, the lines of the great wall well established and hope roused of the rescue of a great archaeological prize. There is no reason why a vast walled city should not have been set up long, long ago in Texas. That the ancient races of Mexico built south of the Rio Grande there is marvelous proof; that some adventurous race of builders pushed north of the river is quite possible. But one fatal weakness lies back of the hope that we, too, may attain the dignity of owning a buried city. The Dallas people assert that the wall which is uncovered is of a very fine building sandstone. That settles it. Inside of six months the Texas Baal-ber will be in the hands of a quarrying syndicate.

MELROSE MATTERS.

Long Drouth is Worst in Nearly Fifty Years.

Editor Sentinel.
Melrose, Sept. 7.—The year 1860 was the 'driest'—said to be by the oldest citizens living here at that time—that was ever known before, but the heat was not as intense as it is now and has been this summer. The rays of the sun seem to evaporate moisture earlier after rain than ever before. In former years a month's drouth did not burn and wither vegetation more than a drouth of two weeks duration does now. Rain now in quantity to saturate the earth sufficiently for fall crops would damage the crops now maturing.

The yield of the crops of every kind in this part of the county will be distressingly short.

The problem of building a warehouse to accommodate the handling and marketing of the farmer's cotton is solved for this season; not enough cotton made to warrant the effort.

The protracted meeting, conducted by the ministers of the Baptist and Methodist denominations in and near this place, have just closed. Each service was attended by unusually large congregations and earnest religious devotion was manifested. In the service rendered by the Methodist denomination, Rev. Frank Luker was assisted by his father, and Rev. Jarrard was assisted by Rev. Harlem Matthews in the Baptist service. Each and every sermon that I heard—preached by Revs. Jarrard, Matthews and Luker were based upon appropriate texts and intelligently elucidated in impressive language. Rev. Matthews is a native of this vicinity; his ancestors were pioneers of this country and they were prominent and useful citizens. Several accessions to both churches.

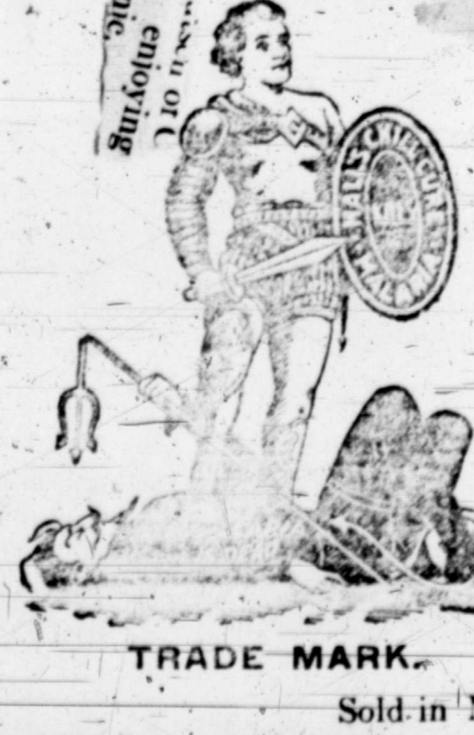

The following are the official documents of Major General Sam Houston, commander in chief of the Texian army, together with the names of the brave men who participated in the celebrated battle of San Jacinto.

Documents to His Excellency David G. Burnett, president of the Republic of Texas. Headquarters of the Army, San Jacinto, April 25, 1837.

I have the honor to inform you that on the evening of the 18th inst., after a forced march of fifty-five miles, which was effected in two days and a half, the army arrived opposite Harrisburg...

Up to School Board and City Council to Move.

Speaking of the proposed improvement of the school campus on Washington square, while in conversation with The Sentinel man this morning, President June C. Harris of the Civic League said:

"You ask me when the work of improving and beautifying the school grounds will begin? Well, that is a question I cannot answer until the school board and city council take definite action in the matter as they agreed to do at our recent joint meeting of those organizations with the executive committee of the Civic League.

"At that meeting I proposed that if the school board would put in sanitary closets, and the city council would extend the sewer to Mims avenue and put in water mains and pipes throughout the school grounds, the Civic League would bear the expense of beautifying the grounds. I am still prepared to make that good on those conditions. However, I learn that both the school board and city council have met since that proposition was made, but if any action was taken by either of them I have not heard of it. It is up to them to act first and do their part as suggested and the Civic League is ready to do the rest. I feel perfectly safe in guaranteeing that ample funds are at the disposal of the Civic League to make the desired improvement on the school grounds, but none of this sum is available for that purpose until the donors can be assured that the school board and city council will do their part."
