## REFUSED BAIL.

Habeas Corpus Trial of Dr. Lockhart Concluded.

The habeas corpus trial of Dr. J. J. Lockhart, charged with the murder of Ollie Branch, was concluded before Judge Perkins at noon today, and the defended was denied bail.

A number of witnesses were placed on the stand, and all the circumstances of the killing were fully detailed. One feature of the examination was the testimony of Mrs. Branch, the widow of the deceased, and the principal eye witness to the killing. Her testimony was practically the same as was her statement of the affair published in The Sentinel at the time of the homicide.

There was some new evidence not brought out at the examining trial, to the effect that Branch stated after being shot that he was trying to prevent Lockhart from shooting him when he received the fatal wounds.

The case having been transferred to Cherokee county, it will come up for hearing at the next term of the district court at Rusk, which convenes on the first Monday in December. All witnesses in the case are required to be on hand on the day set for the trial, without any further notice from the court.

The wounded man was transferred to the south bound train a few minutes later and carried back to Lufkin.

The negro who did the shooting made his escape in the darkness, but it is said he had had some trouble with the colored porter on the train, and it is supposed that he mistook Chancey for the

colored porter when he shot him.

The name of the man who did the shooting was not learned.

## NOT UNGRATEFUL.

A short time ago The Sentinel's chief, R. W., was the recipient of a letter from Senator C. A. Culberson, expressing his sympathy for the recipient in his affliction, and giving assurance of his gratitude for kindness rendered to him by the sick editor. No nobler virtue warms the heart of man than gratitude, and though feeling incapable of expressing his appreciation of Senator Culberson's tribute in words, the letter was published in The Sentinel. This letter was reproduced by the Austin Statesman, with the following comment: "Some of our public men may be ungrateful, but all of them are not. Over in the historic little city of Nacogdoches is a sick editor, a noble and deserving fellow, who has been kind to Senator Culberson. This kindness the distinguished and patriotic Texan has not forgotten and will not forget. To cheer the dejected and despondent sick man whose kindness is ever in the memory of the illustrious citizen and official whose duties take him to far away Washington, this simple but touching and thoughtful and considerate letter was written. It is not only a tribute to the worth of Haltom that such a letter by such a man should have been written him, but it is an honor to Culberson that out of an abundance of gratitude he should have thus sought to give renewed assurance of his high esteem for his suffering friend in whose breast he has doubtless in this way put a new faith and possibly a new hope. This appreciative letter touched the tenderest of cords in poor sick Haltom's tender nature, and we trust it will serve the double purpose its distinguished author evidently intended, to wit: to apprise him of his continued gratitude and esteem and to cheer his drooping spirit. The Statesman firmly believes that the God of mercy and of nature will bless the doers of such noble deeds."

THE Troupe Banner uses an old South African chesnut to illustrate a moral, and whether the story is true or false, it is quite applicable in this instance. The Banner says: "It is said that some Boer boys in South Africa played marbles for many years and used as their 'middle man' the finest diamond now in King Edward's crown—because they were ignorant of its value, of its possibilities when cut and polished. Do you know there are people all over this country who are just as ignorant respecting the undeveloped resources and future possibilities of this country. Where can a man of limited means do as well as he can in this country? Where on earth can a man find a better climate and a soil that will produce a greater variety of profitable crops than right here in Smith and Cherokee counties? The same is true of Nacogdoches county, and all East Texas, for that matter. Yet our people are slow to utilize the splendid opportunities offered,

and too often wait for the more progressive immigrant to come in and develop the natural resources for them.

A PEANUT factory in East Texas announces that it is ready to buy peanuts at the rate of 15 carloads a week, or more if it can get them. It can use 12,000 bushels a week.—Whitesboro News.

What will this factory pay per bushel and how many bushels can be raised on the average acre of ground? Let us come to figures.—Farmersville Sentinel.

The factory in Paris is now paying 85c per bushel. The yield per acre runs from 30 to 125 bushels. Rich sandy land is the best for growing the nuts. They are difficult to gather on black land.—Bonham News.

The richest sandy land in Texas is in Nacogdoches county. That it will produce peanuts at a profit has been proven. It is up to the Nacogdoches county farmers to plant peanuts.

EAST Texas will learn to eat peanut butter upon its picnic sandwiches.—Beaumont Enterprise.

More than that. East Texas will eat batter-cakes fried in peanut oil.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

You fellows are getting plum "nutty" on the goober question. We can remember when you were just as crazy over Mrs. Alice Webb Duke's tobacco patch, but the agricultural revolution she promised has not occurred yet. The fact is, tobacco and peanuts are both good things to grow as a little side line, but we will have to be shown where either crop is more profitable than cotton and corn, field peas, potatoes and sugar cane.—Center Advocate.

Mrs. Alice Webb Duke never owned a "tobacco patch" in Nacogdoches county. But others do, and they are producing the weed at a big profit. The same can be done with peanuts. The Advocate is evidently a new immigrant from Missouri or it would have already realized that there is no prospect of overdoing either the tobacco or peanut industry. By the way, how is the Flat Fork oil market?

## Many Uses of Peanuts.

The peanut industry is on a boom in Texas. Years ago we made fun of Georgia because it grew "goobers," but we are at it now, and we find we should have been in the business years ago.—Tyler Courier.

People may laugh at the goober-grower, but that does not affect his bank account. And while the industry is growing at a rapid pace, still the supply is far short of the demand. One candy manufacturer in Nacogdoches is now advertising for one thousand bushels of Spanish peanuts.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

It is now announced that a great peanut manufacturing establishment is to be erected in Greenville. This establishment is said to be contemplated by men who have for years engaged in the peanut business in Virginia. This means not only that the nuts are to be prepared for market, but are to be reduced to such forms as they appear in candy, crackerjack, peanut butter,

brittle, and in other ways in the drug and grocery stores. One of the most remarkable things of the year is the great interest taken in the peanut industry by the Texas people. There is hardly a paper which comes to the table of State Press that does not have something in it about peanut-growing, and that man who has already entered on it receives the most flattering notices and fulsome praises. One reading these papers would conclude that next year the cotton crop would be short on account of the great acreage in peanuts. As long as a farmer has hogs and other stock he can not grow too many of the nuts. The markets will never be glutted. Plant them.—Dallas-Galveston News.

## PRIVATE BANK FAILS.

T. W. House of Houston filed Petition in Bankruptcy.

Houston, Tex., Oct., 18.—One of the oldest banking houses in Texas went to the wall yesterday, when T. W. House, banker, filed a general assignment under the state laws: W. B. Chew, W. D. Cleveland and J. S. Rice were named assignees. They qualified by giving bond in the sum of \$100,000 with James A. Baker, Jr., Frank Andrews and Edwin B. Parker as sureties. The bond was presented to Judge Norman G. Kittrell and was approved. It is stated that the resources are amply sufficient to pay creditors 100 cents on the dollar. Inability to realize on securities not readily convertible into cash is considered the only cause of the assignment.

Prior to the action which placed the matter in the courts, the Houston Clearing House held a prolonged session, but nothing was given out for publication.

The House bank was established in Houston in 1838 by the father of the present banker. It has weathered successfully every financial storm since that date. It was a private bank, unincorporated and has never made a statement of any character of its affairs.

The first intimation of the embarrassment was when all the clearing house bank checks were thrown out yesterday afternoon.

At 10 o'clock last night an involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in the federal court against the T. W. House bank by J. M. Rockwell, J. S. Sweeney and T. M. Ford, creditors, the allegation being that in filing the general assignment, T. W. House committed an act of bankruptcy. He filed an answer admitting that he had made a general assignment and the matter being referred to the referee, he named W. D. Cleveland, J. S. Rice and W. B. Chew as temporary receivers. These three are the same as were made assignees. The matter, therefore, transferred to the federal court.

## Fourteen Hour Law.

The new law passed by the Thirtieth legislature regulating the time of train crews, dispatchers and operators, and providing that no such employe shall work over fourteen consecutive hours, is now in effect, having become effective on October 12. This act is commonly known as the "fourteen hour bill," and originally provided that it should become effective ninety days after adjournment of the regular session, but the railroads requested that the date

By a vote of 164 to 35 the town of Crockett has determined to issue \$25,000 in bonds for a system of municipal water works.

It is said that Lampassas nut growers have made a contract to deliver at Lometa, Texas, between November 1 and 15, 180,000 pounds of pecans at seven cents a pound.

THE Beaumont Journal says: "A Nacogdoches factory shipped out 30,000 cigars in one day, and they were all made from Nacogdoches county tobacco." The cigars were not made altogether from Nacogdoches county tobacco, but they were Nacogdoches cigars just the same.

THE Greenville Herald says: "Peanut politicians do not interest Greenville people. Peanut flour and peanut oil now claim attention over here. We are concerned about the real thing." It is hoped that State Press will catch that expression, "peanut flour." Excellent battercakes are made from peanut flour.

THE proposition to build a paper mill in Texas is a good one, and aside from the fact that such an enterprise is needed, there is no question but that it would be a paying industry. The newspapers are all favorable to it, and all that is needed to make it a go is the money. When that feature is no longer a mooted question, the matter of location will be open for discussion, and Nacogdoches will be in the field for the mill. Nacogdoches is conveniently situated, has an abundance of pure water, an inexhaustible supply of fuel, and is in the heart of the timber belt out of which print paper can be made.

THE immense forests of East Texas are a tribute from God that has proven a boon to the farmers. If it were not for the lumber industry this country would be suffering considerably at present. The saw mills furnish employment for the farmers who would have suffered much if they had been dependent upon their crops this year. But the people may yet feel the disagreeable effect of their failure to more generally diversify their crops. While the lumber industry has so far furnished employment to

the dependent farmers, there is danger of a panic in this line. The inability to secure cars for shipping is causing mills to close down, and forcing some of the owners into bankruptcy. No people can depend on one crop or one industry for sustenance.

FREE delivery of mail is to be established at Port Arthur. That will necessitate citizens going to the depot when the trains arrive to swap yarns instead of gathering in front of the postoffice to await distribution of the mail.—Beaumont Journal.

Beaumont should not get jealous of Port Arthur because she is about to put on city airs. Port Arthur is destined to be a second Galveston and Beaumont may outrival Houston.

A MINISTER—his name is immaterial—recently brought forth this gem:—"The highest conception of life is not happiness, but usefulness; not receiving good, but doing good. We desire happiness and seek it, but it is nevertheless incidental. It is a concomitant of doing good. It is quite impossible to do good to others without the reflex influence making glad our own lives. And the joy of it is not equaled by any other joy."

The Smith county grand jury has been indicting market men on the charge of slaughtering animals unfit for food. Every grand jury in the state should inquire into the matter. Many market men are particular about the kind of food they sell to their patrons, but many are not. By the way, the new law requiring that meat markets be scoured every day and other sanitary precautions taken may get almost any of them into trouble. It would be a good plan for all of the market men to read up on the law and keep it faithfully. Any grand jury may inquire into the manner in which they are kept, and in fact, it is their duty to do so. School trustees are also advised to do the same with reference to their duties.—Abilene Reporter.

### Dalhart's First Norther.

Dalhart, Texas, is a new town, or rather a new city, as it has a population of several thousand. Its hotels are crowded with tourists seeking homes in that section or farther south and southwest. The city markets show all varieties of vegetables and melons raised there this year, despite its reputation for shorter seasons and less adaptability to general farming. The first norther of the season was a cold rain, October 2, almost snow, and some snow was reported by phone from Texline. Some of the trainmen were talking about when they were snow bound in a deep cut between Childress and Amarillo for two or three days, and yet this was in the same state where the truck farmers of Alvin were shipping cabbage and fresh onions at the very time train crews were running snow plows in the Panhandle. This is the kind of State Texas is for size.

### BE ONE OF US.

#### Commercial Secretaries Plan Industrial Campaign for State.

The press agent of the Commercial Secretaries of Texas has sent out the following matter from the Beaumont office, which is the third installment along similar lines. The object is to work up interest in the assembly of the legislative committee of that body, which meets at Dallas on October 29. The cause is good, and both logic and language of the press agent makes good reading. He says:

Permit me to again call your attention to this matter. It is not me, but Dame Opportunity that knocks at your door. Twice I have spoken to you of the legislative committee of the Commercial Secretaries. This means Texas straight through. It is domestic; it is in-state; it will not send shirts to the heathen, nor formulate theories impracticable and insane.

In Texas there are about 300 commercial organizations affiliated with the Commercial Secretaries. The legislative committee is a squad of picked men detailed to be the bodyguard of Texas industry. The secretaries stand for Texas triumphant—the legislative committee will get into the big thicket at Austin with their brush hooks and mow a right of way to industrial achievement.

Do not tell me you are not interested. You are. Every man who is a Texan is interested. Every man who expects to die and be buried in the state, who expects to raise children who will be buried in the state; every man whose life is inseparably linked with the welfare of Texas is interested in the upbuilding of industry and the blunting of those statutory saws with which the official surgeons at Austin take a leg off any corporation which is fat enough.

Be one of us. This means you; and you, and you. You can't heave your cake into the sea and have it too. Industries must be invited to Texas. There must be some attraction. Don't believe for a minute that the state can bide its time and see a field yellow with the harvest from El Paso to the Sabine without putting up an effort to sow seed. Volunteer cropping is a shiftless way of farming—if you want to get your sickle into the harvest you must get out into the field with the sun.

This is what the Commercial Secretaries of Texas are doing. That is what the 300 organizations are getting up so early for; this is why the legislative committee—which is a stump-pulling machine—is working bare-armed at the impedimenta.

Be one of us! This fortifying of our campaign must be tangible. The legislative committee will meet in Dallas on October 29. It will formulate a working plan, deployment of forces, will picket the strategic points, will align the guns. This committee will probably draft you. If the recruiting agent

erves notice on you that you are needed on the firing line, take it as a compliment to your fighting ability—be assured that weaklings will not be drafted. Every man who comes into the ranks must come with the understanding that the bridges in the rear have been burned, and that the bugle which might sound a retreat has been thrown into the sea. Are you that kind of a soldier? If you are drafted in this war of conquest—conquest of industry—know that the committee has you sized up that way.

At any rate, show up at Dallas on October 29. The press agent who writes you this has no knowledge of what plans will be formulated at the meeting, but it is likely that memberships will be offered to the strong men of Texas—weakhearts are not wanted. Men who might wish to utilize the organization as a chariot in which to ride into office, the while throwing buttered sop with jam on it to the antagonistic class, would have to get off the wagon. In this regiment of peace there is no place for gold braid—every man is a private. The objective is sticking Texas so full of smokestacks that the breath of them will obscure the sun. Be one of us!

### A Change is Needed.

The Houston Chronicle has begun a campaign for the purpose of bringing out the sentiment of the people of the state upon the necessity and virtue of a railroad commission conducted as the Texas railroad commission is now being conducted. Railroad regulation in a conservative way is proper and is needful and a railroad commission can be of inestimable value to the people of a state. In fact, the railroad commission has been a great boon to the people of Texas in many ways, especially when its affairs were being guided by the hand and brain of that great statesman, the lamented John H. Reagan, but it has deteriorated from the exalted position it held under his direction and seems now to have become the tool of designing politicians, to be used as a club over the heads of railroads that do not grovel and fawn at the feet of some of its members. The railroad commission, in its proper place, is a good thing for the state and for the people, but the railroad commission in politics is entirely out of place, and it is certainly to be hoped that an agitation will be started that will grow in volume until it encompasses the entire state and the people will rise in their might and relegate the politicians to the back ground and restore the railroad commission to its high plane as a guardian of the rights of the people and at the same time the protector of the railroads and the industries of the state.

### TWENTY-SEVEN CENT

#### Proof That it Pays to Buy Staple Cotton

In its advocacy of the nut industry The Sentinel has no desire that the peanut should supplant cotton as a money crop. The Sentinel's ambition is to encourage the farmers to diversify, and in doing this they should adopt such crops as will yield the greatest profits.

One of these is tobacco; another is peanuts; still another is potatoes, and there are other varieties of truck crops that yield good returns for the time and labor expended in their production.

Still the fact is, cotton will always be the leading money crop of the south, and when properly managed, there is always money in it to the producer. Yet the farmers have much to learn, and one important lesson is they should plant none but the best varieties and make every effort to secure the full value of his staple.

Along this line the following from the Yazoo City, Miss., Sentinel will be of interest. The Sentinel says:

"Two weeks ago The Sentinel reported the sale of a large lot of cotton by Mr. Calvin Stubblefield at 24 cents, involving a total of about \$7,000. Up to that time this was the largest single deal reported locally this season. The deal has now been eclipsed by Mr. E. W. Britser, of Deasonville, in the eastern part of the county, who Thursday brought in seventy bales of long staple cotton, which he sold at 27 cents per pound. This cotton was contracted for last June, and was delivered last week, L. G. & J. T. Montgomery being the purchasers. The total amount of money received for the cotton was \$9,867.70, the total weight being 36,510 pounds.

"Mr. Britser raises nothing but long staple cotton, and usually has several hundred bales to sell every season. His cotton usually brings the top price, and though the lot sold Saturday was a pretty good one, he still had a good deal of cotton which will be brought in later. He installed a modern Murray system gin last season, and all this cotton was ginned on his gin, which contributed no little to securing the top price.

"Other good sales have been reported since last issue. Mr. T. B. Peaster, of Pluto, one of the largest and most successful planters in the northwestern part of the county, sold twelve bales last week at 24 cents and twenty-four bales at 19 cents.

"Mr. M. C. Brister, of Thornton, sold nine bales Thursday at 22 1/2 cents, and Mr. G. L. Shepard, of Free Run, reports the sale of one bale at 24 cents and three bales at 20 cents.

"Thus it will be seen that notwithstanding the decline in the price of cotton, the splendid grades that are being raised in Yazoo County continues to bring a good price. The crop, on the whole is very good, and old Yazoo is

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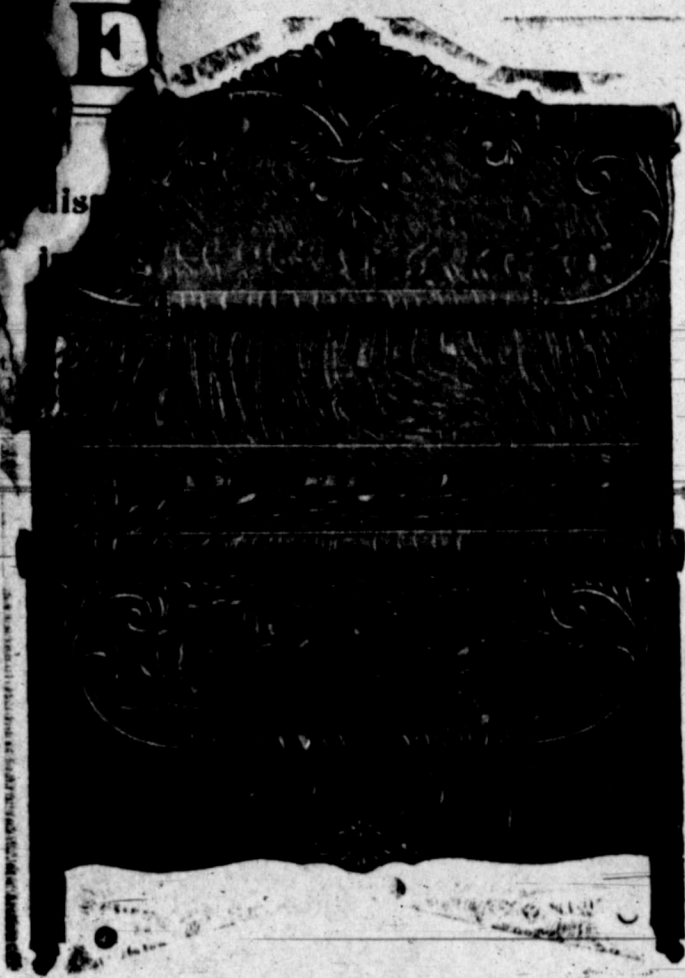

Growth of the Peanut Trade. The following figures furnished by the New York Sun will convince the farmers of Nacogdoches county that The Sentiuel is justified in insisting that they raise peanuts: "Peanuts have become an important article of American foreign commerce in the last six years, especially on the import side, in spite of the fact that we produce about 12,000,000 bushels a year. Peanut imports have grown in value from \$6,000 in 1900 to \$500,000 this year, while our exports thereof will approximate \$300,000. When this fiscal year closes we shall have to list peanuts for nearly \$1,000,000 of our total foreign commerce for the year according to the Bureau of Statistics of the Department of Commerce and Labor.

The peanut acreage in this country increased 150 per cent and production 233 per cent between 1890 and 1900. There are under cultivation now 517,000 acres, producing 11,905,000 bushels. The crop is concentrated in a few southern states, Virginia supplying one-third of it. North Carolina another third."
