#### DEDICATION EXERCISES.

Eloquent Address by Judge J. R. Blades of Athens.

The new hall of Liberty Elm Camp No. 210, Woodmen of the World, was formally dedicated last night with imposing ceremonies.

On Dec. 23, 1906, the hall of this camp together with all its paraphernalia and other lodge property, was destroyed by fire. With that undaunted courage characteristic of loyal woodmen, the camp at once began to plan for another and more modern forest. The exercises last night was a most happy culmination of that zealous undertaking.

The beautiful hall had been brilliantly and appropriately decorated, and in addition to the handsome oak seats provided for the accommodation of the sovereigns, a large number of extra chairs had to be provided to seat the guests, among whom were many ladies.

The exercises were opened by the camp singing the opening ode, when Rev. J. M. Robinson delivered a short welcoming address.

Other short talks were made by E. H. Blount, W. E. Thomason, J. M. Robinson and Arthur Seale, when Consul Commander W. F. Summers introduced Judge J. R. Blades of Athens, the orator of the evening.

Judge Blades, in an ordinary occasions, a most pleasing speaker, but on this occasion he did himself credit and captured the crowd. For more than an hour he held the attention of the large assemblage in an address which was rich in rhetoric and replete with oratorical phrases. In fact it was one of the most beautiful dissertations on the beauty and benefits of Woodcraft that has ever been delivered in Nacogdoches.

At the conclusion of Judge Blades' address refreshments of cake and fruits were served, and the audience was dismissed with the closing ode.

THE announcement of Col. Bill Sterett for congress is said to have caused some commotion in Washington. If his announcement will cause commotion, what will happen when he is elected?

**SENATOR DAVIS** of Arkansas has made his maiden speech in the United States senate, and indeed it was more like the spiteful utterances of an unsophisticated maid than that of a statesman.

THE Fort Worth Record says that a great many people are earnestly hoping that that little boy born to Mr. and Mrs. Richmond Pearson Hobson will take after his mother. It may be so. But if he follows in the footsteps of his illustrious daddy it will not be many years till all the other women will be taking after him.

THE announcement of President Roosevelt that he will under no circumstances be a candidate for another term has given fresh impetus to the booms of the real aspirants for the republican nomination. In fact Secretary Taft is said to have buckled up his surcingle another hole and Vice President Fairbanks let off a considerable quantity of cold air.

UNTIL recently the Rusk Press Journal has been edited by a minister, but the following from the most recent issue of that splendid journal is proof positive that its present editor is no preacher. For instance: "Heavenly Houson" is ridiculous enough, but "Lovely Lufkin, O, hell." A few more breaks like that and the esteemed Press Journal is likely to see its town referred to as "Ridiculous Rusk."

THE Timpson Enterprise is responsible for the statement that Hon. J. T. Bogard will not be a candidate for re-election to the legislature from Shelby county, and that Editor J. D. Ford of the Timpson Times will make the race for that position. No doubt that it is gratifying news to Col. Ford's many friends in Shelby county, as well as to those of his numerous admirers throughout the state. The Sentinel moves that nominations close and that the Times editor be elected by acclamation.

## WHAT PEANUTS WILL MAKE.

There has been much said by the newspapers of late about what peanuts are good for. The following concise enumeration from the Bonham Favorite lends interest to the list:

"Some days ago a citizen of Bonham asked the question if peanuts would make chicken pie, this being his favorite dish. Right here we want to tell you what you can get out of peanuts. You can have parched peanuts, salted peanuts, peanut candy, peanut meal, peanut hay, peanut oil, which is sold as olive oil, peanut butter, peanut sandwiches. It will make your horses fat, make your cows increase their butter capacity threefold, make your hens lay more eggs, fertilizes the ground on which they grow, fills the pocketbook of the man who raises them and makes the community prosperous. If our friend could ever have chicken pie made out of chickens that had grown fat on peanuts he would never eat any other kind."

SOMETIMES the supersensitiveness of a contemporary forces The Sentinel to resort to explanation. The Beaumont Journal gives us this dig in the ribs: "Our congressman" is the way The Nacogdoches Sentinel speaks of Mr. Cooper these days, but there is a touch of sarcasm in the "our." Not long since the Center Advocate took The Sentinel to task because we mentioned the fact that Mr. Cooper has failed to pay Nacogdoches a visit since he received the democratic nomination for his high office at the hands of the democratic convention in this city in the summer of 1906, and in doing so the Advocate referred to Mr. Cooper as "our congressman". Since then The Sentinel has felt that it had as much right to speak of Mr. Cooper as "our congressman" as any one else in the district.

NOTWITHSTANDING the fact that State Press of the Dallas News says there are no robins in Texas, a large number of these birds were seen Monday by the Herald man, which old weather prophets like Sam McGary, of the Beaumont Journal, say indicates an early and unusually hard winter.—Alto Herald.

This reminds us of the incident related about the boy who on Christmas morning ran into the house and gleefully announced to his mother that it was snowing outside. "Law me," exclaimed the mother, "I have been afraid we were going to have an early and severe winter."

AND Col. Bill Sterett has announced as a candidate for congress to succeed Congressman Beall of the Dallas district, and has resigned his position as state press editor of the Dallas-Galveston News, effective the first of January. We opine that if the people of the Fifth district should gratify the colonel's ambition they will never have cause to regret it, even if they do have to spoil a mighty good newspaper man to get a better congressman.

## WHAT IS A CREOLE.

A lady friend of The Sentinel asks the editor to "explain editorially" the meaning of the word "Creole," and what a Creole is. Now, frankly, we don't know. We have seen many persons who claimed to know, and we have seen many persons who were called Creoles, but if called upon to identify a Creole as such we should have to confess our incompetency as a witness. We don't mind quoting a few supposed authorities on the subject, however, in the effort to accommodate our fair correspondent.

According to the Standard Dictionary a Creole is "a native of Spanish America or the West Indies of European (originally Spanish parentage) distinguished from a negro, aboriginal, or person of mixed blood." Also: "In Louisiana, a native descended from French or Spanish ancestors by either parent, or a white native who speaks French."

2. A native-born negro as distinguished from one brought from Africa." Webster's International Dictionary gives this definition: "One born of European parents in the American colonies of France or Spain, or in the states which were once such colonies, especially a person of French or Spanish descent, who is a native inhabitant of Louisiana or one of the states adjoining, bordering on the Gulf of Mexico." These are rather comprehensive definitions, but there are others. Here is one from Brother Bartlett's Dictionary of Americanism: "In the West Indies, in Spanish America, and in the Southern states, one born of European parents; but as now used in the South it is applied to everything that is native, peculiar to, or raised there. In New Orleans market, one may hear of Creole cows, Creole chickens, Creole cattle and Creole horses. In that city, too, a Creole is a native of French extraction, as pure in pedigree as a Howard; and great offense has been given by strangers applying the term to a good looking mulatto or quadroon."

One encyclopedia gives this information: "In general an individual born in the country but not of indigenous blood, a term applied, especially in the former Spanish, French and Portuguese colonies of America, Africa and the East Indies, to natives of pure European blood (sangre azul) in opposition to immigrants themselves born in Europe, or to the offspring of mixed blood, as mulattoes, quadroons, Eurasians, and the like." Another authority says: "A Creole is a person born in the West Indies or South America of European parents. The name is often erroneously applied to persons of mixed white and black parentage."

We might quote a half dozen other authorities, or alleged authorities, few of whom agree, but of the definitions given our fair correspondent can take her choice. We don't know what a Creole is, any more than we know the origin of the Malungeon, and we have devoted some time in trying to trace him.

## ESTIMATE OF COTTON CROP.

The crop reporting board of the bureau of statistics of the department of agriculture at Washington on December 10 issued a report estimating that the total production of cotton in the United States for the year 1907-08 will amount to 5,581,958,000 pounds, (not including linters), equivalent to 11,678,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight.

The estimated production in 500 pound bales by states is as follows:

THE Orange Tribune shows its appreciation of the efforts being put forth by Congressman Cooper to secure favors for the Second district as follows: "Congressman Cooper has demonstrated that he expects to let no grass grow under his feet in congress at this session and that if his district fails to get all that is coming to it, it will not be his fault. He has already introduced bills appropriating money for the improvement of Sabine Pass harbor, for the completion of the Sabine lake canal to a depth of twenty-five feet, for a federal building at Port Arthur, for a federal building a Orange, for the establishment in this section of a United States naval station, and for the reimbursement of cotton planters for cotton confiscated by the government during the war between the states. Mr. Cooper will not stop at the mere introduction of these bills, either, but will push them through to the limit of his ability and his influence. The Second Texas district has a live wire at Washington and things are already beginning to happen." To the above list of bills should be added one providing for the erection of a public building at Nacogdoches, which is published in full in this issue of The Sentinel. For this he has the thanks of every citizen of this city.

THERE is another industry right in the grasp of East Texan if they would only grasp it; that is the Christmas tree industry. "Ten thousand Christmas trees were shipped into Pittsburg last week and 40,000 more are on way," says a report. The forests of East Texas are full of the most handsome Christmas trees on earth, and what is more, they are all loaded.

**Banks and Their Depositors.**  
How depositors may close a bank and hurt themselves, while they bring distress to an entire community, is shown by the case of the National Bank of Commerce of Kansas City.

The whole story is told in the statement that the bank's deposits have decreased since last August from \$35,000,000 to \$16,000,000.

No bank can possibly reduce its loans in any such ratio. A deposit is a demand obligation upon the bank; a loan is a time obligation upon the debtor. If depositors demand their money all at once the bank must close and await the slow process of making collections as they may mature, with such extensions as may be necessary to preserve the assets, before it can resume business.

It is so plain that a wayfarer man, though a fool, ought to be able to see it.

Meanwhile, every customer of the bank is inconvenienced, and the whole country is sympathetically affected—simply because a crowd of excited people did not have the sense to let their money stay in the bank.

Vice President Winants aptly remarks that the bank was murdered by talk, and it is a kind of murder that is more far-reaching than actual homicide.

Assurance is given that the depositors will be paid in full. All assets and twice the capital stock are behind them, and no doubt after a few weeks the institution will emerge again as the closed New York banks have done and are doing.

What absolute folly it all is, and what a lesson it should be to bank depositors elsewhere.

This is the only discordant note in the general news of recurring confidence. Banks elsewhere, even the other banks in Kansas City, report more cash than when the stringency began, and it is easily seen that conditions are vastly improved. Indeed, there is no real reason today why business should not resume its normal activities. In fact, it is resuming. With a rare exception, like this Kansas City case, here and there, sanity and safety have already been restored.

Texas enjoys the advantage of having greater resources for which the world is now paying cash than any other state in the union. Her banks have more cash than ever before, and her people

have proved themselves to be more self-possessed. With \$450,000,000 of products bringing money to this state, because the world must have what we have to sell, with seasons already assured for a grain crop, with cattle wintering in excellent condition and with immigrants pouring in to the state, nothing can stop or materially retard our substantial and increasing prosperity.—Fort Worth Record.

After reproducing the above terse and timely article from the Record, the Abilene Reporter makes the following pointed and pertinent comment:

"The Record makes one statement too strong, however, and that is the last, in which it says that 'nothing can stop or materially retard our substantial and increasing prosperity,' for one thing can materially retard it, and that is for depositors to withdraw their funds from the banks and thus take it out of circulation. With a hoarding policy the progress of Texas would be retarded ten years. Money is absolutely necessary to the development of all our interests, and with the many millions in the hands of Texas depositors taken out the many industries would languish, and some would die. We are not a prophet of evil, for we trust that this course will not be followed but we sound the warning as to the result if it should be done. Let the depositors see that they are safe, of course, but let the man who has money also see that it shall not be hidden out and remain idle."

## Farmer's Gift to His Daughter.

A farmer in a nearby county, while in a generous frame of mind, gave his daughter a hen and a rooster and bade her run away and be a good girl, promising her that if she would look after them he would feed the increase for four years. The girl, as it were, planted those two chicks and the results, according to her father's report, is astonishing. He says she has 504 in the bank and has 200 chickens which he had to feed last winter. According to the farmer's best calculations, his daughter will own the farm at the end of four years and will be charging him rent for living on it.—Ex.

## COOPER MAK'NG GOOD.

Has Introduced a Bill for Nacogdoches Postoffice.

The following bill for the erection of public building at Nacogdoches was introduced by Congressman Cooper on December 5, and referred to the committee on Public Buildings and Grounds and ordered printed:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to acquire, by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, a site and cause to be erected thereon a suitable building, including fireproof vaults, heating and ventilating apparatus, elevators, approaches, and other necessary appurtenances, for the use and accommodation of the postoffice and other Government offices at Nacogdoches, Texas, the cost of said site and building, including said vaults, heating and ventilating apparatus, elevators, approaches, and appurtenances, not to exceed the sum of fifty thousand dollars, which sum is hereby appropriated for said purpose out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated."

## FINDS TREASURE SHIP.

Remarkable Discovery Made by a Nacogdoches Citizen.

The following interesting story is from the Alexandria, Virginia, Gazette:

The recent shifting of the Trinity river at a point a few miles above Pacific, Texas, has solved the mystery of the disappearance of a British yacht, which has been missing for seventy years.

The hull of this vessel has been brought to light, and upon the deck are three brass cannon of ancient pattern. The discovery of the vessel was made by Dr. John M. Sparks, a well known citizen of Nacogdoches, Texas, who was making a trip down the river when his attention was attracted to the wreck.

A rise in the river washed away the sand which had covered it for nearly three-quarters of a century. The importance of the discovery lies in the fact that according to tradition the hull of the yacht contains English gold coin to the amount of \$150,000.

The yacht was said to have been character by the Mexican government to bring arms, ammunition and money to Santa Anna, for use in his campaign against the Texans in the war which finally gave Texas her freedom. The vessel was proceeding up the Trinity river when it struck a snag and was sunk. The officers and crew of the vessel were said to have joined Santa Anna and were all killed a few days later in the battle of San Jacinto. Sparks claims whatever treasure the vessel may contain by right of discovery.

It must not be understood that these yields are presented as "common" or "average" yields, but only as possible yields in this territory, where climate and soil are exceptionally favorable to truck and fruit growing.

Table with 2 columns: Crop, Value. Includes items like Brown-skinned Creole onions, Tomatoes, Cabbage, Sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, Spanish peanuts, Strawberries, Radishes, Watermelons, Alfalfa, Corn, Sugar cane, Cotton.

Total acres, 32: total value \$10,202

To this should be added some hogs, some good cattle, some sheep or goats, some horses or mules, chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese, with a range of about 8 acres for pasturage and care; \$1,000 would be a small estimate for proceeds from these

Total possible proceeds from a 40-acre farm \$11,202

The only object in including the three acres of cotton on a farm of this size is merely to demonstrate comparative care required in cultivation, and relative value of crop.

Why Men Stay Away from Church. Brownwood Bulletin.

An attendant at one of the local churches last Sunday said that he heard a fine sermon and would have enjoyed it much more if he could have seen the preacher occasionally. He was seated on a bench just behind one that contained six ladies and each of these had on one of the large hats of the season that turns up in front, down at the back and is surmounted by a half dozen or more plumes of one kind and another. Each hat obscured about two feet of the vision in front. Just in front of these six ladies sat five ladies on a shorter bench, the arrangement being such that they obscured completely the little glimpses of the pulpit that might otherwise occasionally have been had by artful dodging. There was nothing left for the man to do but to gaze at the ceiling or down at the carpet. The sermon would have had about the same effect if it had been heard through a phonograph, hardly as good perhaps as the attention would not have been diverted from the phonograph by the shaking and moving of the phalanx of hats and plumes. These conditions exist in every church in the land every Sunday in the year, and yet the churches appear to be puzzling over the fact that men do not go to church. Most men like to see the person who is talking to them, a thing that is rendered almost impossible in our modern churches. The Bulletin realizes that the time and space given to this article is wasted, for styles will be followed, though the heavens fall and the earth perish.

Favors Unappreciated.

According to the official records, the railroad companies operating in Oklahoma and Indian Territory brought in to those territories in the seven years from 1900 to 1907 six hundred and twenty-three thousand, seven hundred and eighty-six immigrants, doing all the advertising and paying all the costs, besides cutting their rates to less than half the regular fare as an inducement, and nearly doubling the population, and making Statehood a certainty yet, the first thing the politicians did in framing a constitution, was to arbitrarily cut down the revenues of the railroads below a figure where they could make a legitimate profit from the work in establishing these immigrants in a new and prosperous territory. Every citizen who was brought to the two territories and thus enabled to purchase lands and homes, profited from five hundred to a thousand per cent (in the case of town lots) on their investments, yet they voted at the behest of the politicians and tax eaters—the drones and trouble makers of every clime and nation—to deprive the transportation companies, the authors of their prosperity, of the legitimate reward of their beneficial and patriotic work.

AMONG THE SCHOOLS

From Bonaldo, the last school mentioned in last write-up, we go to Harmony. The house here is nearly new, large and roomy, with good benches, but it is intirely unceiled and has no desks at all. With the addition of desks and ceiling Harmony would compare favorably with any school in the county.

At Spradley conditions are poor, though I have since learned that a new stove had been purchased. This is a move in the right direction, but we should keep moving. There were only 12 pupils present, but it was a cold morning, and few children are anxious to leave a warm fire to go to school where it is impossible to be comfortable.

At Union Springs the house is nearly new but is not ceiled. Good stove and stove pipe goes out at top of house. We hope the old way of putting the stove pipe out at a window light will vanish. School was small on account of measles and—that greater reason—carelessness of some parents. In leaving this school we overtook a lad of a boy seeming about 16 years old. We questioned him carefully about his attendance at school and while we have not space to give the conversation, we wish every parent could have heard that conversation and looked into that boy's eyes. Teachers, go to the parents, and if they will not send their children to school, then go to the children and try to inspire them. In talking to these boys you yourself will be inspired to noble deeds.

At Lone Pine the conditions are bad. The house was clean and so was the yard. The teacher was doing her best. The well was out of fix and water had to be carried several hundred yards. This should be remedied now.

At Pleasant Hill (Bogg) school, the house is ceiled and Mr. Wratten, the teacher, has just installed new home-made desks. These are shaped very much like patent desks, and add a great deal to school facilities. The teacher himself made these desks and declared that the well must be cleaned out if he had to draw the mud out. This kind of energy and determination means success to the teacher. School tolerably full.

A Modest Request.

The Tax Assessors association provided for the publication in the local newspapers of every county of a statement explaining the full rendition law. One of the assessors expressed the opinion that the newspapers should perform this service free, but said that if they were public-spirited enough to do it free, then the commissioners courts should not hesitate to appropriate the money to pay for same. It is rather remarkable that free service should be expected of the newspapers in this matter, especially by the assessors whose commissions would be largely increased by a change to full renditions,

and who, it seems, are dissatisfied, and with some reason, because the famous Thirtieth Legislature laid upon them the duty of collecting crop statistics, but made no provision to pay for same. If the assessors are entitled to pay in that matter it seems that the newspapers are entitled to compensation for service which would lighten the burden of the assessors. However that may be, speaking for itself, the News will publish free any reasonable address prepared by the assessors, and it believes its contemporaries will do likewise.

Thousand-Acre Peanut Field. Shreveport Times.

The owners of a large tract of land near the city of Shreveport are now arranging to cultivate a thousand acres of Spanish peanuts in one body next season. It is not known at this time whether or not it is the intention of the owners to grow any other crop in advance of the peanuts, but it is very probably that something else will be grown on the same land, as it is not necessary that the peanuts be planted earlier than the first or fifteenth of June. But, suppose that only the peanut crop is grown on this 1,000 acres: The yield on this land will very probably not fall below an average of forty bushels to the acre—40,000 bushels—which will bring 75 cents, or more, per bushel—\$30,000. Peanut hay is now definitely quoted at \$20 per ton, and three tons to the acre is the estimated yield. As the estimated yield of peanuts here used is far below the possible yield, suppose the hay yield is treated likewise and placed at one ton to the acre—1,000 tons, at \$20,000. Total value of the 1,000 acres of peanuts, \$50,000!

According to the report of Frank P. Sargent, commissioner general of immigration and naturalization of the United States, there were landed in America during the eleven months of 1907, ending November 30, 1,199,953 immigrants, and the total amount of money brought into the country by these aliens was \$25,599,893, or an average of almost \$20 per person.

**Cotton Mills Prosperous.**

Abilene Reporter.

The Bonham News recently contained an article concerning the cotton mills there which will prove to be interesting to the those who want to see Texas become the great manufacturing state of the union, as it should be. The News says:

"Some of the cotton mills in the state have closed down temporarily, some of them are working but part of the time, but the Bonham cotton mills are not only running all the time, but are now working three hours a day extra time in order to fill their orders for goods. This is indeed a most gratifying condition.

"Not more gratifying to the management are the large orders ahead than is the revelation of the spirit of the employes as shown by a request for longer work. When Manager Saunders saw that it would be impossible to fill his orders without working longer each day, he assembled all the operatives and plainly stated the matter to them. He told them that it rested with them as to what would be done. If they were willing to work until 9 at night, the mills could fill their orders; if not they would run behind. When asked how many were willing to do this, every hand went up. They said to Mr. Saunders, 'We are ready to stand by you and will not only work until 9 o'clock, but will work until 10 o'clock if necessary.'

"Such a spirit as that is commendable, and reveals clearly the feeling the operatives entertain for the manager and superintendent. It reveals a condition that is an ideal one, and proves that the mill management has always considered their best interests, and they repay this by working for its best interest. Where the management and employes have such a regard for each other, there is every chance that the mill will always prosper and be contented."
