#### MAYOR PERKINS INSTALLED.

Brief Session of City Council Yesterday Afternoon.

The city council met in called session yesterday afternoon with all the aldermen present and Mayor Protem Floyd presiding.

Secretary Ben T. Wilson was absent on account of sickness and Alderman Baker was appointed to act as secretary.

The vote cast at the special mayoralty election was canvassed by a committee consisting of Aldermen Baker and Blount, who reported that W. U. Perkins had received 114 votes for mayor, and he was declared duly elected.

Mr. Perkins appeared before the council and took the oath of office as mayor, the oath being administered by Acting Secretary Thos. E. Baker.

A proposition from the H. E. & W. T. railroad company, in regard to contract for furnishing water for their engines and for other purposes, was submitted to the council, but action was deferred till the regular meeting of the council.

An ordinance defining the duties of the city marshal, assessor and collector, city treasurer and city secretary, in regard to the collection and disbursement of moneys, was read and adopted, and also approved by Mayor Perkins, which was his first official act.

Mr. Fred B. Ruddock of Dallas, chief inspector for the Texas Fire Prevention Association, was present and made a verbal report to the council in regard to the water works system now under construction by the city, and of which he had made an inspection. Mr. Ruddock also made some very material and important suggestions pertaining to the construction of the plant, which he agreed to put in writing.

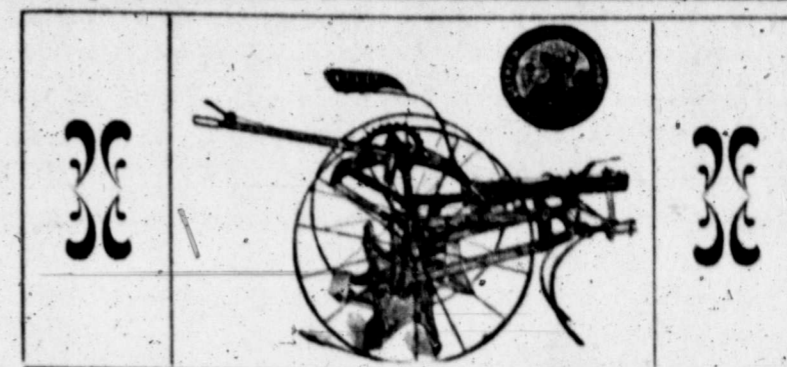

"Dr. Robt. L. Murph was re-elected county physician, he defeating his opponent, Dr. J. D. Richardson, by a vote 28 to 10. Dr. Murph has served the county in this capacity for the past two years, and the large vote he received plainly shows how well his services have been appreciated by the county court. Or to put it in the words of one of the members of the court, his large vote 'was not due to his personal popularity or to any political pull,' but on account of his qualifications to rightly fill the office and his official record as county physician."

In explanation of the above, The Sentinel will state

that Dr. Murph was elected by the county court of Dyer county, which is composed of the magistrates of the county—38 in number—and which performs the same functions as the commissioners courts in Texas.

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## FAVORITISM CHARGED.

Senator Culberson is hot on the trail of Secretary Cortelyou. On January 14 Mr. Culberson brought up the question of the recent bond issue and asked the senate to adopt a resolution calling on the secretary of the treasury to inform the senate of the amount of circulation notes issued by each bank to which was awarded new Panama bonds, on which notes were issued in consequence of such awards. Mr. Culberson called the attention of the senate to the fact that the act of congress provides "distinctly and unequivocally" that the bonds may be disposed of at not less than par value under such regulations as may be prescribed, "giving to all citizens of the United States an equal opportunity to subscribe therefor."

"The circular of the secretary," Mr. Culberson said, "contains this statement: 'In considering the bids, the bidder offering the highest prices will receive the first allotment.' I desire, continued Mr. Culberson, "to submit to the senate one or two facts which indicate that the secretary of the treasury has violated the law in issuing the bonds he has awarded."

In consequence of the charges it was reported that Secretary Cortelyou had resigned, but this has been denied.

The senatorial contest in Kentucky is deadlocked. Some of the legislators contend that there is too much Beckham and not enough democracy in the contest.

Don't forget that the qualified voters of Nacogdoches will be required to elect a mayor next Monday. There is only one candidate, but he should be given your vote.

The Enterprise says that one of the needs of Beaumont for 1908 is a biscuit factory. Beaumont can furnish the biscuits and Nacogdoches county will continue to produce the ribbon cane syrup, and eventually peanut butter.

Bryan is reported to have said that if the democrats of the country do not think he can be elected, he will favor the nomination of either Gov. Hoke Smith of Georgia, Senator Culberson of Texas, or Gov. Johnson of Minnesota. In that event, let it be Culberson.

## COUNTY COMMITTEE.

Prof. R. F. Davis is Unanimously Elected Chairman.

The Democratic Executive Committee of Nacogdoches county held a called meeting in the city council chamber Saturday afternoon.

There were present W. S. Beeson, G. M. Haltom and P. M. Sanders of Nacogdoches; R. H. Blackwell of Melrose, J. Y. Baugh of Alazan, T. B. Jordan of Martinsville, G. W. Dennis of Shady Grove, John Weatherly of Appleby and R. W. King, proxy for J. J. Watkins of Douglass.

W. S. Beeson was elected temporary chairman of the committee, and G. M. Haltom temporary secretary.

Chairman Beeson explained the object of the meeting to be to elect a county chairman to fill out the unexpired term of Hon. W. O. Crain, who had resigned by reason of his removal to Austin, and to fill vacancies in the membership in the committee caused by death, removal from the county and disqualification.

The first business of the meeting was the election of a chairman, and Prof. R. F. Davis was unanimously elected to that position. Prof. Davis is superintendent of the Nacogdoches public schools and was recently appointed by Gov. Campbell as a member of the text book board. He is an enthusiastic and energetic democrat, and a better selection could not have been made for the responsible position of chairman of the county democratic executive committee.

Giles M. Haltom was elected secretary by acclamation, which completed the official reorganization of the committee.

The following vacancies were then filled. A. K. Layton elected committeeman for Attoyac, vice W. E. Sanders, deceased; B. L. Jopling elected committeeman for Garrison, vice A. V. Simpson removed from the county; Robert W. King, elected committeeman for Douglass, vice Jesse J. Watkins, appointed justice of the peace.

The committee then adjourned, subjected to call of the chairman.

NACOGDOCHES is boasting that its tobacco industry for this season is now under good headway and that the prospects are bright for an increased output this year. In the meantime, the demand for Texas-grown tobacco and Texas-made cigars is growing.—Beaumont Enterprise.

Yes, our tobacco industry is in better shape than it has ever been, and the largest acreage in the history of the industry in this county will be planted to tobacco this year. And there is a growing demand for Nacogdoches tobacco, which has been classed by United States government experts as being superior to that grown in Cuba.

The Atlanta Journal wonders why churches are raising salaries. With no more saloons to fight in that state it thinks that the ministers

should have an easy time henceforth.—Beaumont Enterprise.

That is not the popular theory. It has always been contended that the elimination of the saloon will give the ministers more work, in that it will increase church attendance. And the larger the congregation, the larger the salary.

NACOGDOCHES has been very unfortunate in the way of fires the past few months. Another fire occurred last week, resulting in damage to the extent of \$170,000. One third of that amount would have put in a first class water system. While of course it is now too late to save the property that has gone down in flames the past year, it is not too late to provide protection for the houses that remain and for those to be built in the future.—Hemphill Leader.

Perhaps the Leader has forgotten it, but in order to refresh its memory and to keep the record straight, The Sentinel will remind its esteemed contemporary that the citizens of Nacogdoches voted a \$50,000 bond issue last March for a municipal water system, and the plant is almost completed. We are providing the protection suggested, and have been at it for some time.

L. E. Stout has retired from the editorial management of the Jacksonville Reformer to accept a position with the Jacksonville Townsite Company. Mr. Stout is succeeded as editor by Mr. C. F. Drake, late of the Weatherford Herald.

## Will Contest Election.

The Shreveport Times today announces that it has been definitely determined by the anti to contest the recent prohibition election. John D. Wilkinson has been retained by the saloon men and brewers to make the contest, presumably upon the ground of alleged fraud. The claim is made that at some of the country boxes more votes were polled than there were poll tax receipts issued. The revised returns show that the pro majority is 70 instead of 62.

The Times advises that the result be accepted and no contest made. In any event prohibition will not go into effect until January 1, 1909.

## Worse Than Self-Praise.

One of the unusual features of the National Democratic Convention at Denver will be the interesting spectacle of Mrs. Ruth Bryan Leavett placing her father, W. J. Bryan, in nomination for the presidency.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

At first this announcement was looked upon as a joke, but now it has become serious and is believed to be a fact. Political praise from kin-folks, however, is on a par with self-praise, and when it comes from a woman relative it will be classed even lower.—Liberty Vindicator.

## THE PLOT THICKENS.

Farmers and Bankers Warehouse Company Failure a Sensation.

The Farmers and Bankers Warehouse Company, headed by David H. Shapira and with main offices in Houston, has collapsed with a startling bump, and liabilities of staggering proportions have developed.

The story is interestingly told by the Houston Chronicle as follows:

"Sheriff Anderson has already commenced to prepare for the development of the evidence adduced before the grand jury in the matter of the operations of the Farmers and Bankers Warehouse Building Association. Before the adjournment of the investigating body at noon Friday the district attorney was hastily summoned to appear, as if for consultation upon some important matters.

Meanwhile, inquiries as to the situation arising from the investigation into the accounts of the various cotton-holding companies continue to pour in. At the same time numbers of those socially affiliated with the young man who was classed as a Napoleon of finance have been active in their interest.

With accounts in a muddled condition, the receiver, his corps of expert accountants, is now attempting to secure a grasp upon the main trend of operations. This happens to be very difficult, owing to the fact that many of the records are missing altogether, while papers that are supposed to represent actual transactions can not be found. It is said that a bonfire was kindled and that in the flames documentary evidence of a material issue was destroyed.

The fact has further developed that a collection of \$15,000 was made in Fort Worth a few weeks ago that does not appear on the books.

A list of what is supposed to represent some of the questionable items has been prepared through personal investigation as follows:

Forged notes held at House bank	\$51,000

Realized from cotton sales	10,000
Overdraft House bank	38,000
Personal Shapira account in House bank	101,000

In addition, letters received indicate that material for warehouse in Mississippi and other states over the South has been delivered and used in construction, but that payment has not been made.

The matter of the Bridgeport (Wise county) oil mill and gin adds over \$50,000 to the total. Just how much is involved in that transaction can not be stated, but a company was organized, small notes taken from the farmers, and

## AMEND THE LAW.

A large note given for \$38,000 to T. W. House, upon which the amount was secured. The building was never started.

It is furthermore declared that numbers of contracts were entered into with farmers in various communities on which collections ranging from \$125 to \$800 were made. Some of these have not been started. Now it is said that the company in the hands of the receiver will not, in all probability, carry out the contracts. No funds are available for so doing.

For the reasons given no definite statement of conditions can be made. The loss will be heavy, however, and widely distributed over the entire South. Farmers whose cotton is said to have been sold; other farmers who contracted for warehouses; bankers who backed the business propositions, and creditors of the various banks holding Shapira notes, bear the burden.

A partial list of the notes held by the House bank trustee and supposed to be fraudulent has been made, among them being one for \$5000 executed at Dallas by a person who lives at Nacogdoches, Texas, which recites in the body of the note that it is secured by stock of the Texas Cotton Warehouse Company. There is no stock attached. The note is made payable to Shapira as president of the Texas Cotton Warehouse Company.

## Nacogdoches Southeastern.

In enumerating the number of miles of railroad constructed by the various lines during 1907, the Manufacturer's Record says:

"Nacogdoches Southeastern—Woden to Oil City, Texas, 4 miles; Hayward to Nacogdoches, Texas, 1 mile; total 5 miles. For 1908, not announced.

In the January number the Manufacturer's Record contains this announcement: "Nacogdoches, Texas.—The Nacogdoches Southeastern Railroad, which now has about 16 miles of line complete, is reported to be pushing its extension, and will have five miles more finished within two months. The Hayward Lumber company is back of the line."

The federal grand jury recently in session at Dallas, upon adjournment last Saturday submitted the following written report to Judge Meek:

Dallas, Jan. 18.—To the Honorable Edward R. Meek, Judge of the United States District Court for the Northern District of Texas: We, your grand jury, impaneled for the January term of court, beg leave to submit the following:

"As indicated in your charge to us, we have investigated charges growing out of infractions of the postal laws in sending postal cards of an obscene nature through the mails and we find that our efforts in this direction are limited—that the real evil lies in the publication and sale of this character of matter as perverting and pernicious, leading the youth of our land, through their suggestive influences, to lives of immorality and crime—and we earnestly advocate the enactment of such laws, state or federal, that will suppress this evil. And we would ask that news papers interested in the maintenance of civic and moral virtues lend their aid to the enactment and enforcement of such laws.

John F. Worley, Foreman."

The sending of obscene postal cards through the mail is an evil that should be suppressed, and if there is no law now providing for the punishment of such offenders, one should be passed by congress at once, and the penalty should be made sufficiently severe to make the law effective.

During the two weeks of his illness he seemed to suffer intensely, but he bore it with marked patience and uncomplainingly to the end.

His body was laid to rest in North church cemetery and the funeral service, which was very impressive, was conducted by Rev. A. J. Miller. The immense throng of people in attendance was sufficient proof that many friends were his. Our community keenly feels the loss of him for he possessed the rare qualifications that go to make good citizenship.

As a man he was honest, as a neighbor he was accommodating and willing to lend a helping hand. Kind and indulgent in his home. He professed faith in Christ in the year 1901 and united with the Baptist church, where he lived a consistent member until death.

He was born in Arkansas, June 15, 1855. At the age of ten he moved with his widowed mother and three sisters to Titus county, Tex. He came to Nacogdoches county in December, 1876, and was married to Miss Elizabeth Lily, January 2nd, 1878. Their union was blessed with nine children, eight of whom are still living.

Bereaved ones weep not for him. While the loss of him makes life's burdens heavier to bear, it behooves us to bow in meek submission to the will of Him who doeth all things well.

Like one of our poets he could say:

"Life, we've been long together, Through pleasant and through stormy weather. 'Tis hard to part when friends are dear; Perhaps 'twill cast a sigh, a tear, Then steal away, give little warning, Take thine own time, Say not good night, But in some fairer clime Bid me good morning."

SUIT FOR DAMAGES.

Editor Pyle Makes a Statement Explaining the Trouble.

On January 18 suit was filed in the Fourteenth district court at Dallas by the proprietors of the National Co-Operator and O. P. Pyle and George B. Latham, as individuals against D. J. Neill, president, and other executive officers of the Texas Farmers' union and the Fort Worth Record Newspaper company, praying for \$50,000 actual and \$50,000 exemplary damages, and also for injunction to prohibit further publication by any of these parties of charges, in substance, that the plaintiffs are conspiring to disrupt the Farmers' union or restore bucket shops to operation in Texas.

Judge Nash granted a temporary restraining order and set the hearing for Feb. 7, 1908, upon application for injunction.

In explanation of the suit, and the differences existing between the parties concerned, Editor Pyle makes the following statement for publication:

Dallas, Jan. 18. — Some time in November, 1907, Mr. Neill and myself had a conversation in union headquarters in Fort Worth about the advisability of getting Mike H. Thomas into the cotton business, it being understood that he (Thomas) had not been in the market for quite a while. We agreed that if Thomas and his friends could help us advance the market we should, if possible, influence him to get into the market. Mr. Neill wrote a letter and gave it to me to give to Thomas, in which he stated that the Farmers would stand by the minimum price and reduce the acreage on the 1908 crops, etc. Thomas refused to have anything to do with it unless Mr. Neill would give his personal guarantee in person that he would like to get him into the market. Neill saw Thomas twice in Dallas. After meeting Neill, Thomas went into the market, so he (Thomas) informs me.

A few days later Neill sent for me to meet him at his office in Fort Worth, which I did. At this meeting Neill told me that there was a great conspiracy on foot to force me out of the Co-Operator by a certain interest, putting the paper into the hands of said interest to use it and the union to elect E. A. Calvin governor of Texas for the purpose of reinstating the bucket shops in Texas. I told him that I did not believe there was such a conspiracy, but I would investigate it. I did so, and found, beyond any question, that there was no truth in the charge. Later Mr. Neill sent out a circular to a few members of the union in the state, charging conspiracy to reinstate the bucket shops in Texas. The following is a true copy of the letter:

Headquarters Farmers'

Union of Texas, Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 27, 1907. Mr. —

Dear Sir and Brother: There is forming in this state a great conspiracy that means, if successful, the disruption of the Farmers' union. This element will try to reinstate the bucket shops in this state.

They have tried to intimidate me—threatened me until my friends would not know me. They tried to buy some of our people, and will likely get some, as a number are now under suspicion.

I hereby invite you to a conference at Fort Worth, Jan. 4, for the purpose of taking some steps to counteract this plot. Don't fail to come as it is imperative that you should.

This matter should be kept strictly within the union. Get your county union to pay expenses, but come.

The meeting was held on schedule time and was a kangaroo affair. A. H. O'Keefe, B. F. Chapman, Stanley H. Watson, George B. Latham and myself were denied admittance to the meeting, until we were tried without a hearing. About 6 o'clock in the afternoon we were invited into the rooms and requested to sign a set of libelous resolutions which had been prepared and adopted during the session, in our absence, which we refused to do.

At the Memphis meeting, Jan. 9, in a meeting, or caucus, held by the Texas delegates, Mr. Calvin and myself denounced the report of a conspiracy in strong terms, and demanded a hearing. At another caucus later in the day a committee was appointed by Neill to inquire into the real truth of the matter, their decision to be final. The hearing was to have been held in Fort Worth, Wednesday, Jan. 14. Tuesday afternoon Neill phoned me that the committee would not meet. I told him that I would go over to Fort Worth the next morning, anyway. He said, "well," and the conversation ended. It is not a fact that he told me not to come to Fort Worth. E. A. Calvin came up from Houston to Dallas, Tuesday night. Calvin, Latham and myself took the 9 o'clock Interurban car for Fort Worth. It is not a fact that Thomas went to the car with us, neither is it a fact that he came back with us. We went to Fort Worth for the purpose of demanding a hearing, which we did. We did not go into Neill's private office, as charged. The unpleasantness occurred in the private office of Secretary Smith. We had no thought of having any trouble. Mr. Calvin, as our spokesman, demanded a hearing, and wanted to know why the committee had been notified not to come. Calvin and Neill had some pretty warm words about the conspiracy to make Calvin governor. Neill denied saying it. I told Neill that he surely did say it, whereupon he called me a liar and advanced upon me. I did nothing except to ward off the attack he made upon

me which I will be able to prove at the proper time.

The trouble with Neill has been that he thought Calvin had committed an unpardonable sin in taking stock in the Houston Spot Cotton Exchange. I suppose Mr. Calvin will be able to defend himself in this matter.

I have been charged with being in a conspiracy to reinstate the bucket shops in Texas. I am now, always have been and always will be opposed to the bucket shops, and I depounce the charge as simply infamous.

There is an unseen hand working in this matter to try to destroy the union. This hand will be developed in the near future and many a good union man will wake up to the fact that he has been most woefully duped.

been perfected, a number of happy speeches were made, the first to be called on being Mayor-elect W. U. Perkins, who responded in a brief but enthusiastic speech.

Mayor Gabe Bodenheim of Longview being present, was called on for a talk, and he responded cheerfully. Mr. Bodenheim told of the growth and progress of his town—Longview—and especially explained to the edification of all present the plans and methods of building and operating the water works system of Longview. He said that the citizens voted on the question of issuing \$50,000 in bonds, or so much thereof as might be necessary, to put in a system of water works. After voting the bonds it was found that only \$40,000 was necessary to complete the system. The first thing they did was to employ a reputable engineer to prepare plans and superintend the work, and then advertised for bids to complete the plant. The work was in that manner let out under contract, and the contractor was required to give bond for the efficient performance of his contract. The plant is provided with 8 inch mains in the business district, and 6 inch mains in the residence portion of the city. They have a stand pipe 125 feet in height and the system is now paying a net profit of \$1500 per annum. The flat rate to consumers is 50 cents per 1000 gallons, with a minimum rate of \$100 per month. All consumers are on meters, and

Mr. Bodenheim advised that the city of Nacogdoches adopt the meter system at once. He also urged the citizens to go to work at once and build up a good fire department. Longview has a fire department consisting of eleven men, with two paid men, and equipped with hook and ladder truck, chemical engine, 3000 feet of hose and four horses. They also have a fire station and, and each member is paid \$3.00 for attending each fire.

Mr. Bodenheim was heartily applauded at the conclusion of his talk and President Lindsey extended to him the hearty thanks of the club for the information and advice given. Other talks were made by E. C. Branch, I. J. Roberts, and others, when the club adjourned subject to call by the executive committee.

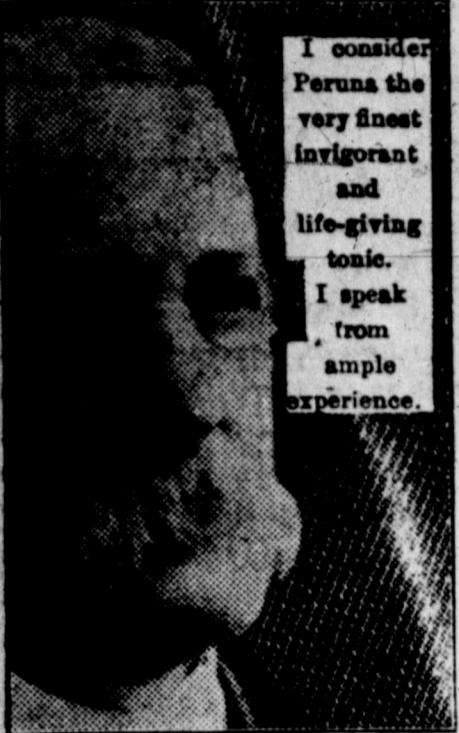
The city council of Nacogdoches has passed an ordinance making it "unlawful for any person or persons to remain in or about any public place in the city of Nacogdoches after eleven o'clock p. m. without being employed by the employer of said public place." Since when have people been seen on the streets of Nacogdoches after eleven o'clock at night?—Lufkin News.

Very few people have been seen on the streets of Nacogdoches after eleven o'clock at night, except on business, since the ordinance above referred to has gone into effect. And if Lufkin would put a similar ordinance in force no doubt her mortuary list would be considerably decreased.

Jacking up the Newspapers. Texarkana Courier.

Uncle Sam declares that newspapers who let subscribers become delinquent longer than one year shall not be allowed to mail them at second-class rates. This will make quite a change in the practices of nearly all weekly newspapers and will require a cleaning up of the books every year. Daily papers may not be mailed to subscribers longer than three months after subscriptions expire but this will affect comparatively few since not many allow any subscriptions to become delinquent. This paper and all others will have to comply with the law, whether it suits their convenience and meets their wishes or not. The excuse offered, or the only one that will hold water, is that newspapers are carried through the mails at a loss and it is said that they are responsible for the big deficit in the postal department of the government. It is our belief that the cheap story papers that are published primarily to get advertising out to their victims are responsible for the deficit. If the parcels post measure becomes a law then there will be a deficit that will make all former ones look like thirty cents. The rates paid railroads for carrying the mails have much to do with the deficits, and we believe that they will be revised when the administration at Washington is changed, pretty soon after a tariff for revenue goes into effect.

**IRON PROPERTY SOLD.**

Parties to Extend East Texas Iron Industry at Rusk.

A recent issue of the Dallas News contained the following important item:

A deal was closed in Dallas yesterday, whereby the holdings of the Star and Crescent Iron Company of Rusk, Texas, passed into the hands of W. J. Hogue of Dallas and his associates, who are Eastern capitalists. The consideration was \$250,000.

Mr. Hogue, who has opened an office in the Trust Building, said: "I have succeeded in convincing Eastern capitalists that East Texas ore produces the very finest quality of iron and steel. These capitalists are willing to expend at once a million dollars in enlarging and improving the facilities, so that the company can turn out merchants' bar and various other kinds of iron and steel. These additions to the plant will include the necessary machinery to make steel rails for railroads. The Union Central Railroad is to be extended by way of Rusk and Nacogdoches into Louisiana with steel rails turned out at our plant.

"The people who are behind this deal made a thorough investigation before taking hold of it. They have made a success of every enterprise they have heretofore undertaken. It is now their intention to develop the iron industry of East Texas.

"The furnace of the Star and Crescent company will be erected in the vicinity of the greatest iron deposits in the state. A town will, of course, spring up there at once. I have suggested Iron dale as the name of the place."

Commenting on the above the Rusk-Press Journal says:

"In reference to the above the Press-Journal has made every effort to secure other information. **CONSTITUTION**

And By-Laws of Nacogdoches Commercial Club.

Following is the constitution and by-laws of the Nacogdoches Commercial Club, organized at the opera house last night:

**ARTICLE I.**

**NAME.**

The name of this organization shall be Nacogdoches Commercial Club.

**ART. II.**

**OBJECT.**

The association shall provide a suitable place for its meetings and the purpose for which this organization is formed is to unite in so far as possible all people of Nacogdoches and Nacogdoches county in one representative body whose efforts shall be to help themselves and help each other by endeavoring to create, extend and foster trade; to build up manufacturing industries; to encourage and build up transportation lines; to entertain distinguished and other guests; to encourage the holding of conventions and similar gatherings in the city of Nacogdoches; to establish Nacogdoches as a trade center; to secure reasonable and just transportation rates; to enhance the value of real estate; to collect, preserve and distribute information in relation to our commercial, agricultural and financial affairs, and do all in our power to promote and build up our city and surrounding country. This organization shall be non-political and non-sectarian.

**ART. III.**

**MEMBERSHIP.**

The membership is unrestricted as to number. Any reputable white person, firm or corporation will be admitted to full membership subject to the approval of the executive committee.

**ART. IV.**

**EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.**

There shall be an executive committee composed of fifteen members, which shall be elected at the regular meeting in January of each year, and shall serve for one year or until their successors are elected. Any vacancies occurring in the executive committee may be filled by their own selection from the general membership of the club.

**ART. V.**

**OFFICERS.**

The officers of the association shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

**ART. VI.**

**QUORUM.**

Fifteen members shall constitute a quorum at the meetings of the association, and eight shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee. In either case a lesser number may adjourn from time to time until a quorum is assembled.

**ART. VII.**

**DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS.**

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of this

organization and of the executive committee and to call such special meetings of the organization as he or the executive committee may deem expedient, or shall be requested in writing by at least five members of the organization. He shall from time to time, as he may deem proper communicate to the organization such matters as may in his opinion tend to promote the prosperity and welfare, and increase the usefulness of the organization, and shall perform such other duties as are prescribed by the by-laws or by the executive committee.

Section 2. In the absence of the President the Vice President shall perform his duties.

Section 3. The Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the meetings of the organization and of the Executive Committee. He shall collect all dues, assessments or money accruing to the organization and pay the same to the Treasurer, taking his receipt therefor. He shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements; shall draw warrants on the treasurer which must be countersigned by the president, and shall give proper notice of all meetings of the organization and executive committee and shall conduct the official correspondence of the organization. He shall further have the general care and custody of the room and property of the organization under the direction of the president.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys accruing to the organization and shall pay them out on warrants drawn by the secretary and countersigned by the president. He shall keep a regular account of all moneys received and expended by him and shall make a monthly report thereof and such other reports as the organization may require.

Section 5. No debts shall be created except by the Executive Committee.

**ART. VII.**

**DUTIES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.**

The general business of the association shall be managed by this committee. The executive committee may enact such rules as they may deem expedient for the welfare of the association and for the guidance and control of committees provided for in the bylaws. They shall provide regular meeting rooms, pass upon the qualification of members and do any and all things as in their judgment will tend to promote the usefulness of the association and carry out the purpose of the organization.

The Executive Committee shall hold at least two regular meetings each month on dates and hours provided for in the bylaws.

If any member of this committee shall be absent for more than two consecutive meetings without having given a sufficient reason for his absence in writing, his seat shall be vacant and the board shall elect his successor. The Executive Committee

shall appoint such standing committees as are provided for in the bylaws and all special committees required in carrying out the work of the organization.

**ART. IX.**

This Constitution shall not be amended after its adoption, or in any way changed except by a two-thirds vote of the entire membership of the club at a regular meeting or at a special meeting called for the purpose, and the proposed alteration, amendment or change shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee at least two weeks before it can be acted on.

**BY LAWS.**

Section 1. All elections must be held by ballot.

Section 2. Two weeks previous to each annual election the executive committee shall give public notice thereof. In case of a special election one week's notice shall be sufficient.

**MEETINGS.**

The Executive Committee shall hold regular meetings twice each month the dates and hours to be decided by said committee. The regular meetings of the association shall be held once each month when every member of the association should be present. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be held at any time upon application of eight members to the president.

This organization shall be sustained by monthly contributions from each member of fifty cents per month.

The Executive Committee shall have the right to drop any member from the roll who is over three months in arrears for dues, or for conduct unbecoming a member of the association.

**Chapman Road Law.**

Hempill Leader. We understand that the county judge of Newton county has received an opinion from the attorney general that the commissioners court of that county will be compelled to comply with the requirements of the Chapman road law. This being the case, we have it from members of the commissioners court that Sabine county, at the next meeting of that body will follow suit. The Chapman road law was published in full in the Leader some months ago, and commented on freely. It places a tax of 50-cents of all buggies and carriages, \$1.00 on all two horse wagons, \$2.00 on all four horse wagons, and \$3.00 on all six horse wagons. It also requires all men between twenty one and forty five years of age to work the roads ten days out of the year or pay \$9 in cash toward the working of the public roads.

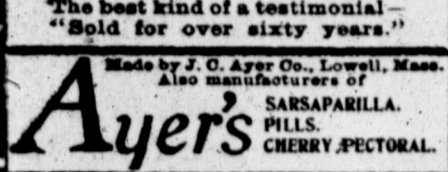

### A BLOODY BATTLE.

Murphey Hotel Scene of an Awful Conflict.

The fame of Lufkin has again been wafted to the four winds of the earth in a way that speaks anything but well for the town.

Tuesday night a drummer named LeGross who was stopping at the Murphey hotel, became involved in a difficulty with Kit Collins, the negro porter at the hotel. It is said that the negro made a remark derogatory to the character of some lady, which was promptly resented by the drummer when a scrap followed. The white man was no match for the negro, and got the worst of the encounter.

Between 1 and 2 o'clock at night it is said that LeGross, accompanied by several other parties, appeared at the hotel and demanded of the night clerk to be shown to the negro's lodgings. Protests of the clerk were useless and he led the way up stairs to where the negro was sleeping, and where the battle took place, as a result of which the negro was shot and perhaps fatally wounded, the drummer has a severe cut across the neck, Charley Beamer was shot through the fleshy part of the thigh, Roy Bonner was slightly cut in the hand. All the above named parties with Milton Mantooth and Reece Vinson, were arrested by Sheriff Watts and placed in jail and a charge of assault with intent to murder lodged against them.

It was the evident intention to take the negro from the hotel and attend to his case in the regulation style, but he resisted and the fight ensued. There was no electric lights burning at the hotel and various statements have been going the rounds as to how the battle was fought.

The negro was left lying on the up-stairs gallery, of the hotel with his head lying in the hall just inside the door, while the other wounded parties were given medical attention before being locked up.

**NO REDUCTION NOW.**

**Railroad Commission Declines to Reduce Passenger Fares.**

The hearing before the railroad commission on the proposition to reduce passenger fares on Texas lines came to a dramatic conclusion Thursday by Chairman Mayfield announcing that the proposition would be dismissed.

Chairman Mayfield said that Commissioner Storey had been opposed to a lower rate, while Commissioner Colquitt had been heartily in favor of it; that he as chairman had assumed a middle ground, not being fully decided as to the equity of the proposition. This reason, made him responsible for the hearing. That he had been of the opinion that Texas roads could not justify higher charges than were collected by railroads in adjoining states, but the opinion was based on belief rather than what he actually knew to be true; that he had coun-

seled the hearing for the purpose of developing all possible information regarding the true condition so as to enable him to finally pass on the question; that the argument made by Vice President Thorne of the Texas and Pacific, which he knew to be absolutely true, as the honesty and veracity of this gentleman is above question, had convinced him that the railroad cannot at this time stand a reduction; that it is impossible for them to make both ends meet; that the arguments made by the other railroad men have been equally convincing and that he cannot bring himself to believe that it would be just to reduce passenger fares in Texas, therefore he was responsible for the hearing being set down, he would dismiss it.

Commissioner Colquitt said that when he first proposed the reduction he believed, and his mind has not been changed, that the situation justified it; that it appeared to him that the railroads do not want the commission to fix rates but prefer to have legislature do so. He was convinced that passenger traffic has not decreased anywhere in West or Northwest Texas and he could not bring himself to force on the people a higher rate than those prevailing in other states for like service. He made this statement that his position should be known. Commissioner Storey was of the opinion and the fact was well known, that he advocated a railroad commission many years before its establishment, believing that it was best for the roads and people as discrimination had become an appalling evil and should be stopped. As a member of the commission he has always tried to be fair and when he made mistakes he was willing to correct them. He would consent to do nothing which would have a tendency to curtail railroad building in Texas, which still has about 80 counties without railroad facilities and they should have railroads and will have them if the action of the railroad commission can assist them. He said the hearing was very beneficial and if the people of Texas could have listened to the evidence adduced as he had heard it, he was sure they would justify his conclusion.

Objectionable Features. Abilene Reporter. In the "asset bank currency" plan everything is placed in the hands of the comptroller of the currency, which is one of its most objectionable features. It places entirely too much power in the hands of the administration. The amount is to be limited to two hundred and fifty millions, which means that the pets of the administration will get all the issue. Attention is called to the fact that in the issuance of the emergency currency the depositors may, and would often, be left out in the cold, for the cream of the assets of any bank that issues this currency will be put up for it, and if the bank should go to the wall they would be deprived of just so much of the assets as were thus used, and would rarely get even a tithe of their money back. Herein lies the disinclination of banks to make rediscounts, as the depositors know that this means the elimination of a certain amount of the collateral by which they are protected in case of a failure. W. J. Bryan, the democratic leader, is making a vigorous fight against the asset currency measure.
