WATER WORKS ACCEPTED.

Contract is Completed and all Bills are Paid.

At a special called meeting of the city council held last night, the city's new system of water works was formally received from the constructing engineers, and full settlement made.

After the books, vouchers and all records had been audited by Alderman Baker and Secretary Goodman of the O'Neil Engineering company, it was found that the balance due the O'Neil Engineering company on the contract was \$868.97, which was paid in full, leaving a balance of \$35 on hand to the credit of the construction fund. And this in the face of the fact that 1000 feet more of mains have been laid than the original plans, specifications and contract called for.

The city also has on hand new material to the value of \$750, and enough 6 inch and 8 inch pipe left from the old plant to make all needed extensions and repairs for the next ten years.

The city has been operating the old plant, together with the new system, since June 1, 1907, and at an unusually heavy expense, and there is now on hand from the proceeds of water rents about \$1500 in cash and good accounts.

From a close, conservative estimate it is safe to state that the income from the water works now will exceed \$2000 per annum, and in addition the citizens get free fire protection.

Col. Dick Wynne Here.

Col. R. M. Wynne, candidate for attorney general, arrived from Fort Worth over the T. & N. O. yesterday afternoon, and will be here two or three days. Col. Wynne is one of the attorneys for the plaintiff in the suit of Clinton J. Murphey against the Texas and New Orleans Railway, company who asks for \$50,000 loss for the loss of a foot.

Col. Wynne states that he is not here to talk politics, and will have nothing to say until he opens his campaign at Longview.

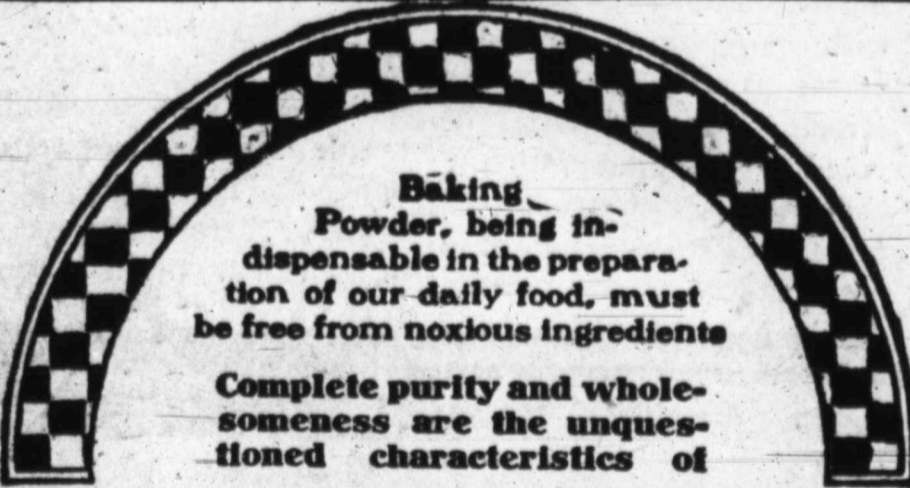

THE Sherman Democrat predicts that "when the peanut crop is harvested this year we are going to have some statistics to show the Georgia goober-grabblers." Yes, and when the Nacogdoches county tobacco crop is harvested we are going to have some statistics that will turn the face of the Kentucky tobacco raisers toward Texas.

THE annual meeting of the Texas State Press Association will be held at Mineral Wells on May 21, 22 and 23, and the indications are that it will be the most largely attended session of the press boys that has been held in the history of the organization. Every newspaper man in the state should be a member.

THE American Tobacco Company has placed a gatling gun on the roof of their warehouse at Maysville, Ky., to prevent night riders burning the building. Men will be constantly on guard to work the gun if night riders appear. No such drastic measures are resorted to in the Nacogdoches tobacco field.

THE Tyler Courier and Times makes this prediction: "The farmer who plants goobers for the market will make more money than will be made on an equal acreage in cotton. The paper is expecting cotton to sell way below 10 cents next season, but it is expecting goobers to sell for a good price." Whether the prediction comes true in every particular or not, it would be well to try a few acres in peanuts anyhow.

TEXAS TAKING A TUMBLE.

Texas has raged early and often against corporations. When Mr. Roosevelt was still a police commissioner or civil service reformer, she adorned her statute books, if we remember right, with one of those masterly anti-trust laws so brutally scorned by the courts, forbidding all trusts but those of the privileged class, laborers and farmers; and she has continued to be a severe and unjust stepmother to the railroads within her borders. Naturally many Texans who have other business than politics have grown weary of the Lone Star blight on railroads and other corporations. At Galveston the other day "representatives of the agricultural, stock raising, mining, lumber and other interests," organized the Agricultural and Commercial Association of Southeast Texas and passed some sensible resolutions, such as these:

"Ample and convenient means of transportation is necessary to successful agriculture, and as large sections of the state are but meagerly supplied with such means we favor such legislation as will encourage the investment of capital in the construction of new lines of railroads and the extension and improvement of existing lines so that all parts of the state may be furnished the necessary and convenient means of transportation. In this connection we favor such legislation as will fully protect the public against rebates, discrimination and hurtful combination, but we are opposed to all legislation which imposes upon railway companies, useless and unnecessary burdens, arbitrary, injuries, troublesome and expensive restrictions and regulations.

"We favor reasonable and fair regulation of all corporations doing business in the state, so as to secure the public against hurtful combinations, but we are opposed to any unnecessary and arbitrary regulations which are calculated to interfere with the business operations of those concerns or to impose upon them useless or unnecessary regulations and burdens. Fair and just treatment to the public should be exacted from such corporations and alike fair and just treatment should be secured to them."

It may be a dream and vain imagination as yet to expect legislators anywhere to encourage instead of discourage railroad building, but the thought of it is no longer unholy. These South Texas producers want the railroads and all other corporations to be allowed to conduct their own business without vexatious interference so long as they conduct it without favor. In short, the dormant notion that corporations have rights as well as duties is reviving in Texas. It cannot spread too far and it is not likely to spread too fast.—New York Sun.

RETURNING SANITY.

The vote was taken by the senate committee on railroads of the Mississippi legislature by which that committee decided not to report a bill for two-cent passenger fares in that state is one of the signs of the times that indicate returning sanity in dealing with railroads in this section. The action of the committee was the more significant in that it was had by the decisive vote of 7 to 2, thus clearly indicating that reaction has taken place, since it was not confined to any one state as to arbitrarily dealing with the railroads, but all southern states were seemingly equally desirous at one time of placing the most drastic laws on the statute books as to what the railroads should charge for passengers and freight.

Mississippi not only refused to pass a two-cent fare bill, but declined to pass any other that was in any way calculated to embarrass the railroads and this fact will stand out in bold relief to the credit of that state at this time when all the other states have been vying with each other as to which could pass the most severe laws against the railroads.

With the south needing 50,000 miles of new railroad trackage to properly aid in its development nothing has ever been more suicidal than those policies which have weakened public confidence in railroad investment and thus checked railroad development on which other development so largely depends. Mississippi sets an example of returning sanity on this subject that is exceedingly timely and gratifying.—The Western Contractor.

It is an interesting fact that the birthday of the two most prominent Democrats in this country should come so close together. Grover Cleveland, the only ex-president of the United States now living, and the last man to be elected to that position as a Democrat, was born March 8, 1837, and celebrated his seventy-first birthday last Wednesday. The next day, March 19, William J. Bryan, who is destined to be the next Democratic president of the United States, celebrated the forty-eighth anniversary of his birth. Just 23 years after the birth of Cleveland was born the next "lion of the tribe of Juda." Bryan is 23 years younger than Cleveland, and it has been just 23 years since Cleveland was inaugurated president. It is now "23" for the republican party. Bryan is 48, exactly the age of Cleveland when he was first inaugurated president.

THE resourcefulness of the country editor is aptly illustrated in the following from the Garrison Gleaner: "Pushing a pencil on a newspaper and pulling the plow lines over old Beck are two different propositions, but it takes the combine to make both ends meet sometimes." In which there is a lesson that will prove beneficial to every class and profession if heeded. Here is exemplified the doctrine of diversification in the amplified farm.

COTTON CROP REPORT.

The census report just issued shows the cotton crop grown in 1907 aggregates 11,261,163 running bales, counting round bales as half bales, and including linters, and showed a total of 27,577 active ginneries for 1907. This is against 18,305,265 bales in 1906 and 10,725,602 in 1905. The statistics include 127,646 bales returned as remaining to be ginned after the time of the March canvass. The total number of running bales as given is equivalent to 11,102,872 500-pound bales. The average growth in weight of bales for 1907 is 501.86 pounds. Items for the crop of 1907 are 10,608,596 square bales, 198,549 round bales, 86,798 sea island bales, linters 276,500 bales. The report by states is as follows:

When Kennedy, who is a Bailey supporter, refused to wear an anti Bailey badge while he was on the reception committee."

Bulletin No. 98, issued by the Agricultural and Mechanical college of Texas and distributed free to all interested persons, is a compilation of the results obtained from the farm, stock and garden problems studied by men connected with the Experiment Station. It includes a summary of all the bulletins issued since the establishment of the Experiment Station in 1888. It might appropriately be called a bulletin of bulletins. Each of the ninety-eight bulletins, except those which gave results that later experiments or conditions have modified, is briefly and attractively summarized. The work is given to the public with the hope that the information and suggestions it contains may be helpful to the thousands of progressive farmers, stockmen and truck growers who are now doing so much for the advancement of the material prosperity of Texas.

The range of subjects treated embraces almost every important feature of farm and stock raising industries. The bulletin contains for example, seven discussions of steer feeding and two or three of hog feeding; it contains epitomes of bulletins on the sweet potato, cabbage, the peach, the Irish potato, American grapes, the tomato, strawberries; it contains interesting accounts of stock diseases with suggestions for treatment; it also contains abstracts of many bulletins devoted to the preservation of the soil, the destruction of various garden and farm pests, and numerous treatises on the growing of the standard farm crops, such as corn, cotton, rice, alfalfa, tobacco, etc.

This information has been distributed from the college free of cost for the last nineteen years, and the published results represent the combined wisdom of all the agricultural experts who have been connected with the institution during the time. Any one may now obtain the salient facts of the ninety-eight bulletins condensed into a handy volume of 97 pages.

THE Fort Worth Record says: "When a billiardist smashes a record the newspaper devotes more than half a column to telling how it was done, but when a farmer boy

hoes two or three extra rows of cotton in a day the newspapers never hear of the occurrence, and yet some people wonder why boys leave the farm." And yet the newspapers are not altogether to blame. NEWSPAPERS IN THE SCHOOLS.

The principal of the high school in a Missouri city subscribes for a large number of newspapers to be read in the school room and the pupils are required to tell at stated times of the news they have been reading, the topics discussed and the impression made upon them by what they have read in the newspapers.

The state committee, by its action, frankly committed itself to the contention of the Bailey leaders that it is impossible to hold such a primary as this one that shall be legal, except insofar as the committee "in the exercise of its inherent power" can give it legality. The committee, against the solemn warning of Mr. Edwards of Tyler, leader of the anti-Bailey members, made this a primary by agreement outside of the protection of the Terrell election law.

The rules governing the primary as adopted by the committee, are as follows: Resolved by the democratic executive committee, state of Texas, That a general primary is hereby called and directed to be held in all the voting boxes of this state on Saturday, May 2, 1908, for the purpose of electing delegates and alternates at large to the national convention to be held in Denver in July, 1908, and that said primary shall be held as far as practicable in the manner and in accordance with the rules and regulations governing primary elections for state offices provided in the laws of Texas; provided that the presiding officer of each voting box shall appoint two judges and two clerks to assist in holding the primary, one judge and one clerk being appointed by him for each combination of candidate for delegates at large and alternates at large, and from the names furnished him by the representatives of each such combination.

STATE PRIMARY.

May 2 Fixed for Selection of Delegates to Denver.

The democratic executive committee at Fort Worth last Saturday called a primary election for Saturday, May 2.

The call bars negroes from participation in the primary. It provides that the names of the Bailey candidates for delegates at large to the national democratic convention, who are to be nominated at Fort Worth March 28, and of the anti-Bailey candidates nominated at Waco, March 7, shall be placed in parallel columns on an official ballot and shall be numbered one, two, three and four in each column.

It provides that the number one candidate receiving most votes shall be elected by the state convention a delegate to the national convention and so on with numbers two, three and four in each column.

This pits Senator Bailey against Cone Johnson personally, since Mr. Johnson is number one candidate on the Waco ticket and Senator Bailey will undoubtedly be number one on the Fort Worth ticket.

It is further provided that the presiding officer of each voting box shall appoint one clerk to be designated by the anti-Bailey men and one by the Bailey men in said precinct.

thereof to the county chairman of the respective county and the returns of the county shall be made by the county chairman to the state executive committee in the manner provided by the primary election law for state officers.

The executive committee of the various counties are hereby directed to hold the primary elections herein provided for in accordance with these resolutions and to provide for the expense of so doing.

All qualified voters under the primary law of Texas except those of negro descent and who shall take the following test shall be entitled to vote in such primary in the voting precinct in which he resides. The test shall be printed upon the ballot and is as follows:

I am a democrat and pledge myself to support the democratic presidential electors nominated by the democratic party in 1908 and the nominees of the democratic party to be nominated in the primary election to be held in Texas in July, 1908.

The name of the candidates

mittee shall meet and canvass the returns of the primary election the day prior to the assembling of the Fort Worth state democratic convention, which canvass shall be in the manner provided for by the Terrell primary election law for canvassing the returns of primaries for state officers.

The candidate or candidates who shall receive a plurality of the votes cast in such primary election over those candidates whose names bear the same number for the same office shall be declared the elected delegates and alternates at large as the case may be, by the state democratic convention to be held at Fort Worth and the chairman of said convention shall certify such result to the national convention to be held in Denver in July, 1908.

PENSION APPORTIONMENT.

Old Vets Will Continue to Get \$16 per Quarter.

Austin, March 28.—The apportionment of \$250,000 for pensions for the next six months beginning on April 1, has been made and in this connection, Captain E. A. Bolmes, chief clerk in the pension bureau of the comptroller's department, announced that there would be no change in the amount to be apportioned for the next six months from the past six months. In other words, the old soldiers will receive \$16 for each of the next two following quarters.

It was at first thought that the amount each soldier would receive for the coming six months would be less than heretofore, due to the fact that about 500 new applicants were approved and placed on the rolls, but Captain Bolmes says that the death rate which has been unusually heavy will offset this, consequently there will be no perceptible increase in the number.

On account of the restrictive feature of the pension law there are approximately 1000 applicants for pensions which have been disapproved, as the applicants could not make the necessary affidavit that they are in "indigent" circumstances. It is expected that the next legislature will take up this matter and amend the pension laws so as to let in these veterans, who, it is believed, in majority of cases are entitled to pensions.

Grand Jury Makes Report and Adjourns to April 6.

From Friday's Daily:

Judge Perkins having gone to Rusk to visit his family and look after his business affairs, the bar met this morning and elected Attorney C. A. Hodges special judge to hear cases and receive reports from the grand jury today.

There were two divorce cases tried before Judge Hodges this forenoon, and in each case divorce was granted. BRYAN IS FORTY-EIGHT.

Celebrated His Birthday With Opening Campaign Speech.

Chicago, March 19.—William J. Bryan, twice the candidate of the Democratic party for president of the United States and in race track parlance, "the one best bet" for the nomination again this year, spent his forty-eighth birthday in Chicago today. Mr. Bryan is here to speak at a meeting in the Seventh Regiment armory tonight, which will mark the formal opening of the Democratic campaign in Chicago. The Demonstration has been arranged by the Bryan league of which former Mayor Carter H. Harrison is the head. During the day word was passed around that this was Mr. Bryan's birthday and for several hours the distinguished Nebraskan was kept busy receiving the good wishes of friends and admirers.

Though it is now nearly twelve years since he received his first nomination for the highest office in the land, Mr. Bryan is still a comparatively young man. He is in the prime of vigorous manhood and well qualified physically to stand the coming campaign. Twelve years of almost constant traveling and speechmaking have made no visible inroads on his physical resources.

If he is nominated at the Denver convention next July Mr. Bryan intends to start at once on a strenuous campaign that will equal if not eclipse his wonderful record already established in this direction. Mr. Bryan is the originator of the whirlwind campaign.

Mr. Bryan's speaking campaign of 1896 lasted approximately four months and there were on an average 25 campaigning days in a month. In this campaign he made more than 2100 speeches, short and long. During the last three months of the campaign it was nothing unusual for him to make 20 speeches in a single day. Sometimes the number ran as high as 35 for the day. But at the end of the campaign Mr. Bryan apparently was in as good physical condition as at the start.

Four years later he entered

his second whirlwind campaign and, as pugilists would say, he was in the pink of condition. His first big effort was his speech of acceptance, made in Indianapolis on a day so hot that many persons were overcome in the crowd. With such a beginning, Mr. Bryan proceeded to break his speechmaking record of the first campaign. On the occasion, working westward from St. Louis, he made his first speech of the day at 5 o'clock in the morning and his last at midnight, which meant an almost continuous performance of 19 hours. And his midnight speech was said to have been made with all the vigor of a man who had made no previous public appearance during the day.
