#### Nacogdoches Not in It.

Washington, D. C., April 6.—News in homeopathic dribbles coming from the public buildings committee indicates Texas fared exceedingly well in the sub-committee's report on projects for Texas. This report is subject to revision by the entire committee. Among the items as recommended are San Antonio \$100,000; Corpus Christi, \$70,000; Del Rio, for site, \$7,500; Brownwood, \$50,000.

#### Finally Got the Money.

Austin, Texas, April 6.—The Texas Company today paid into the state treasury \$27,579, which is the full amount of the tax due the state under the old gross receipts law and which covers a period from April 17, 1905, to August 12, 1907. The company contested payment of this tax through all the courts, but Attorney General Davidson won at every turn and forced payment.

Several other companies joined the Texas Company in contesting this law but have paid up, the amounts not being near so large as this one.

#### SCHOOL BOOK CONTRACT.

Wheeler & Co. Will Contest Award Made by Board.

Austin, Texas, April 2.—W. O. Fidler, representing Wheeler & Co., the publishing house that lost its contract for primers and readers by a technicality during the recent adoption, today informed R. B. Cousins, superintendent of public instruction, that documentary evidence in substantiation of the contention that the Cyr Primer of Ginn & Co., the substitute book, was offered in Indiana at 10 cents, although it was adopted in Texas at 20 cents would be filed before the text book board, which reconvenes to hear the attorney general's report on the American Book Company respecting the charges that it is a trust. Mr. Fidler's information consists of affidavits, it is understood, from the superintendents of education, the attorney general and other officials of the state of Indiana, showing that the price asked on the Cyr Primer in that state at its recent adoption of school books was 10 cents. Apparently it is believed that this charge, although it be substantiated beyond a reasonable doubt, will not interfere with the contract awarded Ginn & Co. inasmuch as it presents a situation that does not conflict with the letter of the law at least. The law forbids the text book boards awarding a contract for a book at a price in excess of that for which it was "furnished and distributed" in any other state. It does not apparently prohibit an award of contract for at a greater price than for which it may have been offered in any other state. The board will reconvene May 5, probably to hear the attorney general's report, and at that time will doubtless consider the present situation. It is also understood that other book concerns have begun to work against the award of contract for geographies to Ginn & Co. in the event the American Book Company loses the contract. Charges have been made and filed with Superintendent Cousins as secretary of the board that the Frye Geography offered by Ginn & Co. had been furnished and distributed in other states at even exchange, whereas it is offered in Texas at 88 cents approximately and 40 cents exchange. Affidavits have been furnished, it is understood, supporting this allegation by several concerns, including Scribner & Sons.

THE Maria commercial club, located away over near the Rio Grande in an arid district, has decided to finance an experimental alfalfa farm, and the first thing you know that section of the state will be getting homeseekers by the score. That club will bring eagles to the town for every dollar they spend in the development of the agricultural possibilities of the section. It is a very poor commercial club that does not bring in big returns for all investments made.—Abilene Reporter.

There is no way of estimating the good that a commercial club can do toward the improvement and development of any section, but too often such organizations fail to receive the support and encouragement of the citizens most interested in the progress of their town or county.

GARRISON BROOM FACTORY: A Plant That Will Open a New Industry

Sometime ago Mr. H. A. Gray, at that time superintendent of a plant for the manufacture of brooms at Tenaha, came to Garrison with a view of operating a like plant here. He soon had W. Y. Garrison interested in the proposition and as a result, Garrison can today boast of an up to date broom manufacturing plant, with a capacity of 25 or 30 dozen brooms per day. Mr. Garrison is owner of the plant and installed new and up to date machinery. Mr. Gray has been employed as superintendent and is an expert in this line. A car of broom corn, was unloaded Wednesday. This plant will open up a new industry around Garrison, that of growing broom corn. Mr. Gray says there is no reason why this county will not grow as good broom corn as any, and the farmer will find a market for his corn at home. Mr. Garrison will furnish seed. Investigate this proposition.—Garrison Gleaner.

This is the same factory which Nacogdoches had an opportunity to secure a few months ago, but which she did not secure because it required a few paltry dollars to secure it. Garrison is indeed fortunate in having an enterprising citizen like Mr. Garrison within its confines. Nacogdoches needs a few men like him.

"Brawley, March 24.—Eileen Margaret Lloyd, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Lloyd of Hollywood, was literally roasted alive by the burning of the Lloyd ranch house early Sunday morning in the West neighborhood, ten miles northeast of Brawley. The house and contents with a considerable sum of money were a total loss. The father of the dead girl escaped with only his night shirt, after having dragged his daughter's body from the burning house. Miss Lloyd, who was 23 years of age, had been spending two years on her father's Imperial Valley ranch, keeping house for him while there. The family has a home in Hollywood and Mrs. Lloyd spends most of her time there.

"Miss Lloyd had an incubator in her room, and before daylight Sunday morning arose to look after a lamp which heats the brooder. She let the light fall and the burning oil flew over her night dress. Her father, who had been irrigating most of the night, was in a deep sleep and was not aroused until his daughter's calls had almost ceased. Rushing to her rescue, he found her locked in the burning room. It was necessary to break in the walls, and by that time the girl was literally roasted alive.

"Dr. J. A. Miller of Brawley hastened to the relief of the fire's victim and preparations were made to take her to Los Angeles, but not a mile of the journey had been completed when she died. The body was brought to Brawley and later was taken to the Hollywood home."

Miss Lloyd, the young lady who met such a horrible fate, was a niece of T. J. Lloyd of this city, and was born in Nacogdoches.

### Letter to Gatlin & Chadwick.

Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Sir: Clear pine and pine full of knots are two different things; they are both called pine.

Clear paint and paint adulterated with whitening, china-clay, ground stone, brytes, benzine and water, are different things; they are both called "paint."

It takes less labor to work clear pine than pine knots, and costs less money.

It takes less labor to paint clear paint than half-whiting or half china-clay or half ground stone or half brytes. These mixtures make more gallons, not more paint. There's no more milk in two quarts of milk-and-water than in one quart of milk. If you paint two gallons for one you pay double for labor; and labor cost more than paint.

You know how it is with clear lumber and knots. It's the same with all paint and half-paint.

A day's-work is a gallon of paint or half paint.

Apply it to business. Suppose you have two houses, same size; paint one Devoe, the other prominent paint in your town.

It takes 10 gallons Devoe, \$1.75 a gallon, 17.50 for paint; \$3 a gallon for labor, \$30 for labor; whole job, \$47.50.

### Fertilizer Experiments.

Eleven rice farmers, four corn and cotton growers, and four vegetable growers are now co-operating with the chemical division of the Texas Experiment Station in tests upon their soils by means of co-operative fertilizer experiments. The experiments on rice will be made with Thomas phosphate powder, a fertilizing material carrying phosphoric acid, which it is believed may prove of value to rice soils. The test will show the value of this fertilizing material, and it will also show whether the soils in question need, for rice, plant food carrying phosphoric acid. The field tests will be supplemented by pot tests in the plant house of the division of chemistry.

The experiments on cotton and corn are with different mixtures of fertilizer and are designed to ascertain the best proportions of plant food to use for these crops on the soils in question. The soils which are to be tested represent soils that have been subjected to analysis by the Experiment Station in the course of its investigations on Texas soils, on those that will be analyzed later. These experiments will not be of value to those who actually conduct them, but will also be of value to those who are living upon this particular kind of soil. The experiments upon vegetables are chiefly for the purpose of testing the effect of nitrate of soda in forcing early maturity.

It is believed that these tests will be of great value not only in ascertaining the needs of the many kinds of soils which occur in this state, but also in finding out the fertilizer and soil treatment best adapted to the different crops. More of these experiments will be instituted before the close of the season, and the work will be extended as far as the means of the chemical division of the station will allow.

**Sam White Dead.**

The death of Sam H. White was a shock to his many friends and acquaintances in this county. His health had been fairly good of late. He passed through Douglass last Saturday at 3 p. m. and stopped over night at Dick Parrishes, near Alazan, complaining next morning, Sunday, of a pain in the shoulder and a slight indisposition saying that he did not feel like eating breakfast, but would drink some coffee. He died in his chair at the table before any one thought of it, and before he had drank coffee. He was buried at Lilbert next day where his father and other relatives are buried, that being where he was born and raised. He was about sixty-five years old and was always a good and active citizen, and a member of the church during his later years. He served bravely and earnestly in the Confederate army from the first to the last, being a member of Lewelling's Co., Young's Regt., Walker's Div., which was conspicuous in the Trans-Mississippi department, notably at Mansfield and Pleasant Hill, La., and Jenkins Ferry, Ark. He was also a noted participant in what we call "The Linn Flat War," in 1874, when the State police of the E. J. Davis administration created so much disturbance in this and other counties. R. D. Orton was sheriff at the time and commanded a posse of about five hundred men. Sam White was taken prisoner by the renegade forces commanded by the noted reconstruction police leader, Marion Hazlett. M. G. Whittaker and others were also prisoners and several persons were slain.

Time brought permanent peace, and Sam White and nearly all of the participants are now at rest. He afterwards married a widow Fulcher, nee Skillern, and lived many years near Chireno. After her death he married Miss Maggie Philleo of Rusk, Tex., and lived in and near the town of Nacogdoches. Mrs. W. A. Skillern is his sister, and H. H. White of Lilbert and Wm. T. White of Wise county are his surviving brothers.

**FIRST TO CONVENE.**

Populist National Convention in Session in St. Louis.

St. Louis, April 2.—St. Louis has the honor of entertaining the first national political convention of the 1908 campaign, the national session of the People's party opening here today. Scores of prominent Populists arrived yesterday and the hotel lobbies are filled with talking and gesticulating delegates. Unlike most political conventions, lawyers are in a minority among the delegates, the larger portion of whom are farmers and men engaged in small business. The convention was called to order in the Olympic Theatre.

A lively discussion of the probable candidates for the presidency is in progress among the delegates, among those mentioned being Bryan, Watson, Hearst and La Follette. Nebraska's delegation is instructed for Bryan, and several other State delegations apparently favor the Nebraskan. Thomas Watson of Georgia, has hundreds of admirers and his chances of again being selected to head the Populist ticket are apparently very good. There is much talk of the nomination of Senator Robert La Follette of Wisconsin, with the understanding that he would be endorsed by the national convention of the Independence League. It is unlikely that such action will be taken, however, as it is stated on good authority that La Follette would refuse the honor.

The Populist platform is forecasted in the convention call, which makes the following announcement:

"Hope cannot be placed in the promises of either of the two old parties. Both have entangling alliance with the enemies of the government and cannot make substantial progress for reform in this generation. Thus, an independent party, free from predatory affiliations, become necessary if the power of monopoly and privilege is to be taken from the banks and stock jobbers; if the rule of the people is to be resorted in our time. The People's party opposes any system permitting any class of citizens to paralyze the industries and bankrupt the industrious millions. To this end the convention has been called."

**AMENDMENT PROPOSED**

Beaumont Banker Offers Suggestion to Congressman Cooper.

Beaumont, Texas, April 8.—In a letter to Congressman S. B. Cooper, Colonel W. S. Davidson, president of the First National bank of this city, asks that Congressman Cooper introduce an amendment to the Aldrich bill now before congress. The bill as it stands would prevent local banks from investing in Jefferson county or Beaumont city bonds as a basis for emergency bank note circulation in case of a panic or financial stringency. This is due to the fact that the bill fixes the census of 1900 as determining the population of a city or county.

Colonel Davidson's point is that the county and city, though not showing in the 1900 census as of sufficient population, are now large enough to permit of the privilege.

**Saw Dust as Fertilizer.**

Some one asked the Farmers Mail and Breeze as to the value of sawdust as a fertilizer. The question was referred to the Kansas experiment station and the following is the reply:

Sawdust has practically no value as a direct fertilizer. A chemical analysis shows that it contains about 1 per cent nitrogen, 1 per cent potash, and .05 per cent phosphoric acid. A ton of sawdust would be of no more value as a direct fertilizer than a ton of fertile soil, in fact a soil which contained as little potash and phosphoric acid as sawdust, would be considered deficient in these elements of plant food and in need of fertilization.

Sawdust can often be used as a bedding. It is excellent for bedding cows, keeps them clean, is light and easily shoveled, and when dry will absorb three times its own weight of liquid, thus absorbing large amounts of liquid manure. There has been some objection to sawdust for bedding horses, since it is supposed to make their hoofs dry and brittle, but for cattle it is satisfactory, although if cattle manure, mixed with sawdust is left standing in piles it loses plant food rapidly, due to rapid fermentation.

It is doubtful if sawdust would be of any value on wheat or alfalfa. It would possible be some value as a mulch to prevent the loss of moisture but its application would hardly be practicable for this purpose. As a mulch for fruit trees and strawberries, sawdust is often used, and for this purpose is quite satisfactory.

Upon certain classes of soil sawdust may have some value as a means of physical improvement. The water holding power of sandy soil may be improved, or a clay soil deficient in humus might likewise be improved by the application of sawdust, but the value of sawdust for the physical improvement of soil does not equal that of straw.


