Declared Bankrupt.

F. W. Mally, the well known orchardist of Garrison and Nacogdoches, was declared bankrupt before Hon. S. D. Reaves, referee in bankruptcy, at Tyler April 25. The amount of the liabilities and assets are unknown.

NACOGDOCHES BUILDING.

Committee Reports Favorably on Post Office Appropriation.

Report comes from Washington that the committee on federal buildings and grounds in the house has reported favorably on Congressman Cooper's bill providing for a postoffice building in Nacogdoches.

Mr. Cooper's bill as originally introduced asked for \$50,000 for the new building, but this was cut to \$35,000 by the committee as reported back to the house.

The appropriation is for a building and site, but as the city has, through its city council, agreed to donate a site in the center of the public square, hence the entire appropriation will be available for the erection of the building. Of course the bill has yet to pass the house and senate, but as this is only one small item in the bill making appropriation for buildings and sites at many places in nearly every state in the United States, the committee's recommendation is not likely to be interferred with.

It is hoped that this favorable action by congress will give some impetus to the movement on the part of our citizens to secure free mail delivery.

GOOD ROADS DEMONSTRATION.

The United States Government to Give us Lessons.

Nacogdoches county is to be favored with a practical demonstration of the fact that good roads can be made on our clay hills and sand beds.

Mr. James T. Voshell of Washington, assistant engineer in the public roads department of the agricultural bureau, is in the city with a proposition that will no doubt be accepted by the county and city authorities, as well as by the citizens and tax payers of the county.

Mr. Voshell proposes to make the demonstration on any mile of road that may be selected by the people of this county, and he asks that the test be made upon the worst character of roads in the county. He agrees to superintend the work and furnish such machinery and tools as the county and city do not possess, and to build a mile

of road which he guarantees to be permanently good.

He further asks that the county furnish the labor, which can be secured at a reasonable cost.

It is estimated that this mile of road can be built at a cost of about \$2,000, which will be not only reasonable, but money profitably spent.

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In his speech Saturday Mr. O'Neal said: "Bailey is the best man that ever lived on earth." This is a rather broad assertion, or perhaps it accounts for Mr. Bailey making such frequent comparisons of himself with Christ.

THE Monk Gibson case was affirmed Wednesday by the court of criminal appeals sitting at Austin, and the youthful murderer of the Condit family will have to pay the penalty with his life. The opinion was rendered by Judge Ramsey.

MR. BAILEY was not acquitted by the legislative investigating committee. It was a hung jury. A majority of the home committee reported in favor of him and a minority to condemn him. A majority of the senate committee voted to condemn him and a minority to acquit him.

HERE is a corker. The Palestine Herald says: "Judge Poindexter, nor any other man, undertakes to tell us why Senator Bailey went to Pierce, a trust boss, and a stranger, to borrow money, if it was borrowed, without collateral. Nor why Pierce, out of the goodness of heart, should have loaned money to Bailey, a stranger. Taking the U. S. senator prefix from Bailey's name, do you suppose he could have gotten such loans from Pierce?"

MR O'NEAL said in his speech that if there was a line to the discredit of Joe Bailey in the record of the legislative investigating committee that he would eat the book. It is strange what rash assertions men will make to give strength to their cause when they are in a drowning man's condition. The mere fact that the investigating committee did not agree and stood as a hung jury should be sufficient reason for Mr. O'Neal to proceed to eat that book.

THOSE who are inclined to patronize foreign concerns to the exclusion and detriment of home industries, should read this from an exchange: "Any man with an atom of respect for his pie pulverizer wants to be assured that the cigar he smokes was not mouthed by a leprous Chink in the making, to say nothing of ethical reasons concerning the child slaves of the sweatshops or underpaid female labor. Such being the case, the logical thing to do is to buy blue label cigars; and when this demand includes the domestic brands manufactured by local tradesmen, the smoker's hash trap is doing a boom stunt that puts the hot air brigade on blink street while at the same time safeguarding that smoker's health without incurring a cent of extra expense upon his part." There are none of these dangers lurking in a Nacogdoches cigar.

CONE JOHNSON SPEAKS.

Charges That Bailey Never Paid Back Borrowed Money.

From Saturday's Daily: The citizens of Nacogdoches county heard the first real anti-Bailey speech of this campaign when Hon. Cone Johnson of Tyler addressed more than one thousand people in the opera house Friday afternoon.

Not only was every seat in the opera house occupied, but every particle of standing room was jammed with ardent listeners. Still not half the people in the city who came for that purpose could get in to hear the speaker.

Mr. Johnson was introduced by June C. Harris in a happy speech.

Mr. Johnson began his address by saying that he was glad to see so many ladies present, as there is never anything said in his speeches that can not be said in the presence of ladies.

Among other scathing charges made against Senator Bailey, Mr. Johnson declared that Bailey could not produce the scratch of a pen to show that he had ever repaid any of the "loans" and charged that the senator got the money without the expectation of ever returning it and that H. Clay Pierce never expected it to be repaid, as proven by the fact that he had himself reimbursed by the Waters Pierce Oil Company and the sums charged off to profit and loss on the books of that concern.

Another dramatic feature of the speech was Mr. Johnson's scornful allusions to the wording of Senator Bailey's letter to H. Clay Pierce demanding New York exchange for \$1750. "My dear Pierce," read the speaker. "See how affectionate and loving a United States senator becomes when addressing the head of an outlawed concern, who himself is under indictment in our state upon a felony charge."

Mr. Johnson referred to the fact that he had repeatedly challenged Senator Bailey to meet him in joint debate in order that he might say to the senator's face the things which he was now compelled to say while he was absent. "When he refuses to stand on the same platform with Cone Johnson and defend his conduct, something is wrong with that man's heart and with his conduct," Mr. Johnson declared, and there were cheers.

"I have said nothing that any self-respecting man could not stand here on the platform with me and face and say Johnson's talk is unjust and baseless. I have torn the tinsel and the gew gaws from that so-called gladiator, and he stands out today as a political coward, afraid to face defeat.

They wanted me to meet my friend Steve Blount in joint discussion, but they are not going to get me to spank my friends.

THE VITAL QUESTION.

The present campaign against what is understood by the terms "Baileyism" has long since reached the stage of repetition. There is nothing new that can be said. The charges against the senator, especially those admitted by him before the last legislative investigating committee, have been so often catalogued in the press and told from the rostrum by public speakers, that the people by this time must be thoroughly acquainted with them. They should fully understand the only real issue involved in this unhappy controversy.

Senator Bailey and the majority of his supporters claim that the attack upon him is largely influenced by personal hate and that those who oppose him are assaulting the Democratic party.

On the other hand, it is admitted that while there may be an inconsiderable number of politicians who dislike Senator Bailey, the great army of Democratic voters in this state who are now arrayed against him, have no malice or other bad personal feeling in the controversy, but are opposing the senator because they believe that he has indulged in practices unbecoming a United States senator, and is attempting to set up and maintain a new standard of conduct with reference to the rights and privileges of a public official to acquire wealth while serving the people, by intimate financial connection with the representatives of great corporate interests that do have, or may have, vital interests involved in legislation.

Senator Bailey admits such practices, and claims that there is nothing improper in them; nothing dangerous, nothing that sets a bad precedent for men in public life, and that he proposes to continue them—that the compensation of a United States senator is not sufficient to maintain a man and enable him to leave a competency for his family, and that he must make money on the side as he has made it.

Now those who are opposed to giving their sanction to this new standard of official ethics can not understand the process of reasoning by which the friends of Senator Bailey arrive at the conclusion that those who are opposed to the senator and are against giving him the official endorsement of the party by sending him as a delegate to the Denver convention for the main reason stated, as well as many others, attacking the Democratic party and are acting in any way in an irregular manner.

The opposition to Senator Bailey is because of his violation of the ethical standards heretofore observed by high officials, especially in Texas and the South.

The senator's most ardent admirers and vehement defenders can not claim that Senator Bailey is the Democratic party. While the Democratic party in this state

is really on trial in this contest, Senator Bailey, large as he may loom up in the eyes of many, has not yet really absorbed the party.

So after all the question has narrowed down to the vital one of whether the Democratic party is willing to embrace this new proposition which, as everybody now understands, is, do we wish our representatives and senators in congress to accept favors or legal employment from the representatives of trusts and other corporations; or have any character of intimate financial connection with these representatives of predatory wealth?

If we do, then let us vindicate the past conduct along this line of Senator Bailey and cheer him along the way in becoming a multimillionaire before his term of office expires.

This is a commercial age. Too many men worship at the shrine of financial success. There is something that casts a halo around the head of a man who has accumulated large wealth that too often blinds us as to the propriety or honesty of the way in which it was accumulated. Add to the possession of great wealth unbounded political power, and you have a combination that is almost irresistible. This is Senator Bailey's great strength. With his combined wealth and political power, no wonder that many timid men who must oppose his practices were slow at first in aligning themselves against him. They knew that their political futures, yea, even their business interests, were subject to attack because of such opposition.

The claim that Senator Bailey has not represented a "public service" corporation is an evasion. The public is not concerned with nice distinctions and hair-splitting definitions. They know that he interested himself in securing a readmission of an outlawed trust, and they know that he has represented Standard Oil officers, railroad corporations, coal corporations and great financial interests. They know that he has accumulated great wealth while in office, and thousands are jeopardizing their political futures, or their business interests in unhesitatingly condemning such practices and contending for the perpetuity of those high ideals now contended for by Bryan and exemplified by the long line of statesmen who have reflected honor and glory upon Texas and upon the South in days of yore.

As to Cone Johnson, Tyler, Tex., 4-20 1908. Dr. J. N. Reeves. Cushing, Texas.

Dear Sir:—At my request last summer Hon. Cone Johnson addressed a school picnic about 8 Miles from here in a country community.

In his address he said that so far as the negro's education is concerned it ought to be divided into 1-3 moral, 1-3 industrial, and 1-3 books; that in some parts of the country whites teach the negroes but that that condition can never exist in Texas. And this was all he ever said about negro education.

He made but two educational addresses and having heard them myself I know whereof I speak.

Any cause must be miserably put to it too, to have to resort to such miserable distortions and perversions of the truth. Yours truly, A. W. Orr.

The following is an extract from Hon. Cone Johnson's speech at Corsicana in reference to the negro education taken from the Dallas News:

"I therefore advocated a change in the curriculum for the negro. I wanted to make it one-third morality, one-third manual training and one-third book learning, and that would make them as good and efficient as it was possible to make them. I said further that I understood that in some places in some Southern states they had adopted the method of securing first-class, intelligent, competent white teachers for the purpose of doing missionary work as it were.

"But I said it was no use to talk about anything of that kind in Texas for this generation at least, because we had had so much trouble with the negro that I didn't believe our folks would ever be willing to go into their schools and teach them." (Cheers.)

Important to Democrats.

The following issued to county Democratic executive committees is important to every Democrat in Texas:

To the Chairmen of Democratic Executive Committees of the Counties of Texas: From hundreds of recent inquiries received by me it is patent, that a very large number of Democrats, some of them even holding official place in the party, do not understand that unless a primary election for delegates and alternates at large is held on May 2 in each voting precinct in the state the voters in precincts in which such primary election is not held will exercise no voice in determining who will be delegates and alternates at large to the national convention, and unless, on the same day, May 2, precinct conventions are held

to elect delegates to the various county conventions, from which delegates will be sent to the state convention, the voters in precincts failing to hold such conventions will exercise no voice in determining who will represent them as district delegates and alternates in the national convention.

It is therefore highly important that each county chairman make these matters plain to the executive committeemen of the counties and that proper steps be taken to insure the holding of a fair primary election and convention in every voting precinct in Texas on May 2, according to the rules promulgated under the authority of the State Democratic Executive Committee. More About Good Roads.

The average man fails to appreciate the real benefits of good roads and so he thinks road working is an unprofitable burden. He shirks every way, dodges the work, elects overseers that help shirk, and commissioners too. And commissioners know how this is and lean the same way or lose their job. This is all a sad mistake and needs correction.

Another mistake is this: The roads are not worked the right way. The work is after all wasted. The first rain takes off all the new dirt misplaced, and leaves a bigger gully—by the overseers mistake.

Drainage is a leading point. Levelling, straightening and smoothing too; and to drain is to dry and prevent mud as well as washes. It also embraces leveling, and all this aims at lighter pulls on teams and easier travel. Mistakes in these lines are common.

The remedy: Competent and rigid management. The commissioners court should take a firm stand as a body. Then each commissioner should by personal supervision, and by proxy if necessary, put both brains and brawn upon the roads. See that it is properly attended to in every particular. head on the job that is mere figure head.

The deep, heavy sand vites study. To put clay on it is sensible; not sticky, waxy clay, but the other kind; a yellowish sandy, firm variety that is convenient everywhere. But these sandy roads ought to be located well, avoiding crooks and hills so as to stand forever and be so fixed.

TALKING FOR TEXAS. Agricultural and Commercial Convention Convened Last Night. From Saturday's Daily: "The convention of the commercial and agricultural interests of East and Southeast Texas convened last night at the opera house. The meeting was called to order by President Robert Lindsey, who explained the smallness of the attendance which he thought was due to the present political stringency. Some prominent men were on the program, but at the last moment were unable to come, which was of great disappointment to the association. Judge S. W. Blount made a short but impressive opening address, and introduced the speaker of the occasion, Mr. W. C. Welburn of the experimental department of the A. & M. college, who filled the appointment of President H. H. Harrington of the A. & M. Mr. Welburn made a 50 minutes talk, touching upon the advantages of farming by science, and predicted the day is coming when there will be scientific farming alone. He compared the soil and lands of East Texas with similar lands in Mississippi, showing the naturally fertile advantages. He also advised diversification and fertilizing, and explained the proper time, kind and amount. Several questions were asked by those present, and Mr. Welburn made everything thoroughly plain in answering them. He advises hog raising in East Texas and illustrated the importance of this industry. Arter Mr. Welburn's talk, and Col. R. E. Smith not being present, Mr. D. K. Cason read an article from the Saturday Evening Post on "Good Roads and Good Times," which was very interesting. SACRED HARP SINGING. Interest in the Old Songs Seems to be Waning. Editor Sentinel. Decoy, Tex., April 28.—With your permission I will give a partial review of the old Sacred Harp singing convention at Appleby. It convened on the 17th and continued till the 19th instant. We had a very good convention, had some excellent singing. One great drawback was the small number of lady singers. It was once so we had all the lady singers needed, both on the treble and tenor, which is a great aid to the melody of the music. One other thing that was painful to me, was that so few young people took part in the singing, which proves that the mass of the people are not taking interest in the old songs of Zion that was used by our fathers and mothers, but have departed from the rules and customs of our fathers and mothers in nearly every particular. In comparing the past with the present we are bound to admit that we have departed politically, religiously and socially. We have so far departed from the old land marks of our ancestors that we have disgraced ourselves and brought shame upon their memory. I believe that the old Sacred Harp will be forced out and down. When that is done the key to the science of music is lost. If any one understands the principles as laid down in the old Sacred Harp they can sing anything that can be sung. The Dallas News and Farm and Ranch in reporting the old Harp singing at the Dallas state fair said that they could see why those modern singers needed pipe organs—because they could not sing. They said those old Sacred Harp singers did not need any organs or any other substitute for singing, for they could sing within and of themselves. I will now come back to the convention. There is always dinner on the ground on Sunday at these singing conventions; that is why the attendance is so large Sundays. I heard that there were some there too drunk to be decent. Shame, shame to any one that acts thus. I believe that if we people would be true to our God, ourselves, our country and to humanity, that the God of Heaven would bless us, guide us, direct us and lead us to purity, justice and right by the safeguards of this righteous law. MORE ABOUT ROADS. Unknown Writer Offers Suggestions on the Subject. [The following well written article reached The Sentinel without any evidence whatever to indicate who wrote it, but it is too good to lose, and on that account the rule requiring the writer's name with every communication is broken and the article published.—Ed.] Editor Sentinel. In your issue of the 26th instant I notice that my friend M. W. Stoker says some good things concerning good roads, and I desire to add a few things to what he said. We have rather a peculiar condition on the road question, and many of us have different ideas as to the best method of building good roads, but we all agree that we should have them at most any reasonable cost, so lets put our heads together and get some practical way of building good roads. Here is my way: First, I would place the work in charge of a competent engineer who is experienced in road building, and pay him a salary to tell the rest of us how do the work the best way. Second, I would buy for present and future use a good road machine and roller, with which to build the road. Third, I would get me a lot of hands along each road, furnish them with modern tools, scrapers, etc., and then I would put the force to work building the road to the grade that the engineer said build it to. I would mix the sand and clay. I would use such rock as is available and when I got through I would have a road that would last always and it wouldn't have cost so awful much either. Probably the most important feature of good roads is drainage, and this one feature has been overlooked entirely for two reasons. First for want of a proper knowledge of building roads, and second for want of modern implements with which to do the work. You can take some of our bad roads, grade them, drain them, then roll them thoroughly, and you have as good roads as can be found anywhere. This wouldn't cost us much, and it could actually be paid back with the money that we spend annually on temporary work, which washes away with the first rains. Think what a saving it would be to us farmers. We go to town one day—it has been raining and our ground was to wet to plow—and when the trip is finished, our team is worn out, and we are actually ashamed to work them next day. So we let them rest and thus lose two days going to town after a barrel of flour. This is especially true about us fellows down about Chireno. The road from Chireno to Nacogdoches is the worst in the county, and it is the most traveled. Some places almost impassable. I go to Nacogdoches occasionally, only, but just for the per-

SPOKE FOR BAILEY.

Hon. Howard O'Neal Gives His View of Question.

Hon. H. F. O'Neal of Atlanta, Texas, spoke to about 500 people at the opera house Saturday afternoon in behalf of Senator Bailey and the ticket headed by the junior senator for delegates to the Denver convention.

The speaker was introduced to the audience by Judge George F. Ingraham, an ex-confederate, who said he had been voting the Democratic ticket since he came home from the war in 1865, and asserted that his Democratic clothes would not stay on him if he did not vote for Bailey May 2.

Judge O'Neal asserted at the beginning of his speech that the people of Texas are confronted with a condition that has not existed since the foundation of the American government. Not since Columbus discovered America has a political party been known to assail one of its public officials against whom there has been no criminal charge preferred. He appealed to those who are opposed to Senator Bailey to not be influenced by prejudice. No good citizen, he said, would align himself for or against any man through prejudice, and nine men out of ten who declare that they are so fixed in this matter that argument cannot change them cannot tell you who composed the committee that investigated Senator Bailey, or what the 42 charges were that were preferred against him by Cooke.

Mr. O'Neal was quite bitter in his denunciation of Cyclone Davis and W. L. Crawford, and asserted that every anti-Bailey man is walking cheek by jowl with them. Bailey is the only man who was ever put on trial twice for the same offense, and both trials resulted in an acquittal. If any man can show one line, word or syllable in the record of investigation that reflects on Bailey as a Democrat or an official, I will eat the book, declared the speaker.

He read from the record, page 682, to show that it was proven during the investigation that Bailey paid back the \$3,300 and \$1,500 borrowed from Pierce. He also declared that the record shows that Bailey did not only pay the money back to Francis, who paid the money to Pierce for Bailey, but that he over paid Francis \$90.17.

He further declared that Bailey repaid the \$8000 draft to Pierce, and that the record shows that the canceled draft was in the hands of the committee during the investigation.

Mr. O'Neal's speech was well received by his audience, which was largely pro-Bailey. He left Saturday evening for Timpson, where he spoke in joint discussion with Martin Dies Saturday night. Mr. O'Neal made the trip to Timpson on a hand car.
