APPEAL OF PATRICK.

Federal Judge Refuses to Grant Writ of Habeas Corpus.

New York, June 15. The application of Albert T. Patrick, who is serving a life sentence in Sing Sing prison for the murder of William Marsh Rice, an aged Texas millionaire, for a writ of habeas corpus was denied today by Judge Lacombe in the United States circuit court.

Patrick set up the claim that his conviction and sentence to death, which has been commuted to life imprisonment, was the result of a conspiracy to plunder the millions. The motive, he asserts, was to prevent him from enforcing Rice's will, leaving the greater part of the Rice fortune to him.

Trains Collide at Kiethville.

Kiethville, La., June 11.—Last night a crossing collision occurred here between a Texas and Pacific freight train and eastbound local freight No. 24 on the Houston East and West Texas.

The Texas and Pacific engine struck the third car from the caboose on the East and West train. Three cars were thrown into the ditch and turned over. The Texas and Pacific engine was turned over. No one was hurt. The East and West train was taking water and was not in motion at the time of the accident.

The crossing at this place is not protected by interlocking safeguards. Two years ago in a crossing accident here Fireman Daniels was killed and a number of fine race horses perished.

Austin, Texas, June 16.—Railroad Commissioner Colquitt today addressed a letter to L. Benedict, a clerk in the bridge and building department of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio railway, San Antonio, in which Commissioner Colquitt advises him that in his (Colquitt's) opinion, the anti-pass law does not prohibit free transportation of ice and fresh meat to bridge men or other bona fide employees of railroads, although it is a proposition over which the commission has no jurisdiction.

BLIND TOM PASSES AWAY.

Famous Negro Musician Dies in Poverty in Hoboken.

New York, June 14.—"Blind Tom," the famous negro musician, marvel of three generations of playgoers, died yesterday in Hoboken, N. Y., where he had been living for years in retirement and subsisting on charity.

Thomas Wiggins is the name given in his burial certificate. He was born a slave near Columbus, Ga., about 1850. In early childhood Tom, who was born entirely blind and more than half idiotic, showed himself remarkably imitative, frequently stealing into the house of his master to reproduce on the piano, pieces he had heard played by others. In 1861 he became so proficient on the instrument that he was taken to New York and exhibited as a phenomenon and later was heralded in the United States and Europe.

DEATH OF OLIVER BELMONT.

Well Known Capitalist Is a Victim of Appendicitis.

New York, June 10.—O. H. P. Belmont died at his home in Hempstead, L. I., at 6:34 o'clock this morning. Mr. Belmont had been seriously ill less than two weeks, but his condition was not such as to cause alarm until appendicitis developed on June 1.

The previous Saturday, although the day was rainy and raw, he went down to Belmont park to witness the running for the Belmont states. At that time he appeared to suffer no ill effect from exposure and enjoyed the sport thoroughly.

When his physicians called on Monday, however, and diagnosed his illness as appendicitis, they found his heart in such condition that there was much hesitation before a decision to perform an operation was reached. On Thursday, however, it became apparent that the only prospect for recovery lay in operation. He rallied nicely after operation and it was believed he would make good his recovery, but late that night there was a severe sinking spell followed by unconsciousness. That night peritonitis developed, and from that time until his death there was little hope that he would survive.

It would start with a two story brick 60 by 100 feet and grows as tobacco culture grows, beyond limit. Let our town get busy and capture this enterprise. We need it, must have it.

Sudden Reappearance After Most Unusual Experience.

Temple, Texas, June 11.—Mr. J. T. He has notified his wife and will at an early date visit Nacogdoches and endeavor to explain his absence to his wife and children.

DEMONSTRATION ROAD AGAIN.

The Cushing Enterprise continues to complain about that mile of demonstration road and in commenting on the position of the Sentinel says:

"The commissioners court, or those, composing it who supported the 'demonstration road' proposition recently passed by the court and commented upon by the Enterprise, at the time have an apologist in the editor of the Nacogdoches Sentinel. He tries to make the people believe that the one mile of good road to be built on the other side of the county will be a benefit to every citizen of the county, notwithstanding the fact that it is hardly probable that one in a hundred citizens will pass along that road in a decade. He tries to say that this short piece of road, which is to cost \$2,000, will add to the comfort of all, and goes on to say 'every citizen in the county really ought to favor the demonstration of good road building.'"

The Enterprise misses its guess in stating that the Sentinel is an apologist for the commissioners court. They need no apologist. Their action is commended by the Sentinel and the public spirited citizenship of the county. If the Enterprise happens to have a little longer growth of moss and a little thicker layer of selfishness than the public spirited citizen the Sentinel can't help it. The Enterprise says that the mile of demonstration road is to cost \$2,000 which is pretty good evidence that it has not thoroughly investigated the matter. It is not known just how much of the two thousand dollars, appropriated for the purpose, will be needed, in fact, if there happens to be a lot of convicts on hand, it will not cost the county a cent, and if there are no convicts only just so much as will be necessary to employ labor will be used. Every dollar paid for labor will be paid to citizens and tax payers of Nacogdoches county. The man sent here to have charge of the demonstration work will be paid by the U. S. government instead of taking one single dollar out of the county, that man's expenses will be left here. If the road is a success the people can tell whether they want to be taxed to build more road like it or not. If it is a failure they will be getting off mighty cheap. What if we were to vote a bond issue to build good roads and contract for

just such roads as this mile will be, and after the money was all spent the kind of road was not a success for this section of the country, what would be the result?

Nacogdoches county has been spending about \$15,000 per year on roads and bridges besides the work done by road hands, and there is not a first class mile of road or bridge in the county. It looks as if it was about time we were finding a way to get something for our money.

The public will likely want to know why the commissioners appropriated two thousand dollars for the mile of demonstration road. The United States government never undertakes anything without knowing first that it can be carried through and as it has been supervising these demonstration roads in all parts of the country they have found that two thousand dollars will cover the most expensive mile, therefore the appropriation will meet any emergency. More people will pass over this mile of road than any other mile in the county, and as it is the worst mile known in the county why shouldn't it be used for the demonstration purpose? If Cushing can produce a worse mile and one more suitable for demonstration purposes, just trot it out, Bro. Carter, and the Sentinel will support a proposition to use your mile, instead of the one already selected.

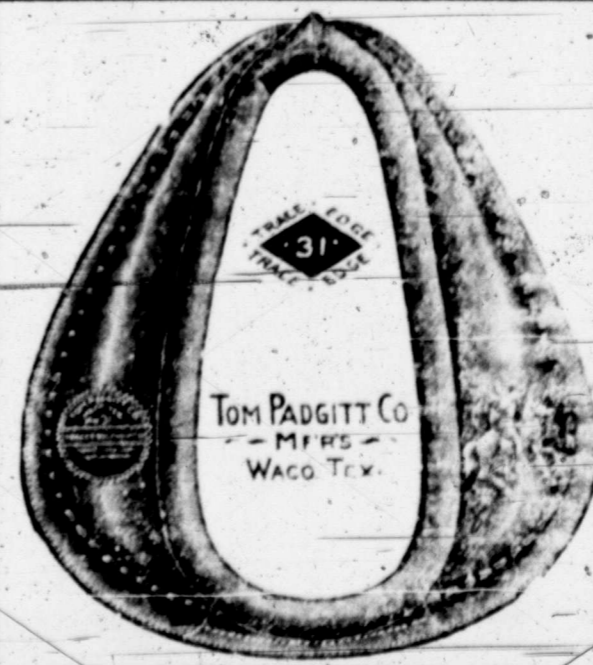

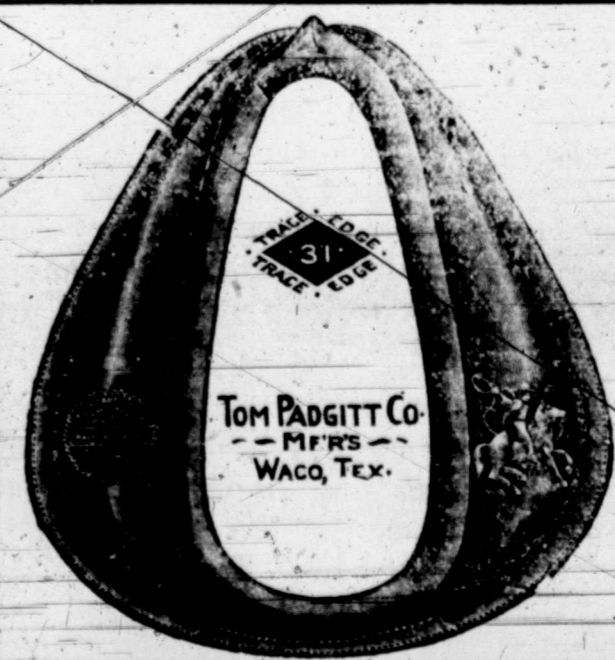
