LAND TITLE BILL.

Crain Talks About the Bill Perpetuating Land Titles.

Hon. W. O. Crain, legal examiner of the general land office at Austin, who is here spending a few days with friends and relatives, paid The Sentinel a pleasant call today. In speaking of the bill introduced in the last legislature, which had for its purpose the validating of the grants of land located in this county, he said: "That bill was a step in the right direction and would have become a law, but for the fact that when Mr. King introduced the bill in the house of representatives there were only two or three members that favored it, and it was late in the session before a majority could be counted for the bill, at which time Mr. King succeeded in having the bill pass to engrossment, but the calendar was so crowded that the bill could not be considered before adjournment. Mr. King worked faithfully for the passage of this bill, and was ably assisted by Judge Robinson, chief clerk of the general land office, and now a candidate for commissioner of the general land office, who helped Mr. King perfect his bill." Mr. Crain also stated that since his arrival here that he has talked to Representative S. M. King with reference to this bill, and that Mr. King stated that notwithstanding the fact that he was not a candidate for re-election, to the office of representative, he intended to give our next representative valuable aid in securing the passage of a similar bill, and that Mr. King said that it was necessary he would go to Austin at his own expense in behalf of the bill, but suggested that the bill be made applicable to Nacogdoches county only, and that it be advertised in accordance with the requirement of the constitution provided for local bills, and that he felt sure that with the work done in the last legislature along these lines, its passage could be effected, and that it could become a law, by February, 1909.

GROVER CLEVELAND DEAD.

Dies of Heart Failure at His Home at Princeton.

Ex-President Grover Cleveland died at his home at Princeton, N. J. yesterday morning at 8:40 o'clock. In his death America loses one of the ablest men she has ever produced and one who will be sadly missed. He has been in bad health for some time but to all appearance had passed the crises, but yesterday morning he was attacked with heart trouble and died in a very short while.

Five Negroes Lynched.

News reached here this morning by phone from San Augustine of the lynching of five negroes in Sabine county.

About a month ago a young man by the name of Hugh Dean was assassinated and these five negroes were in jail at Hemphill charged with complicity in the killing.

Saturday night a man by the name of Arie Johnson was assassinated and an old negro who had been in his employ was arrested and confessed that a man by the name of Wright had given him five dollars to kill Johnson. This aroused the people who took the five negroes from the jail and hung four, and the fifth ran and was shot.

Wright and the negro who killed Johnson are said to be in the custody of the sheriff and a military company and is being transferred to Rusk for safe keeping. Excitement runs high and there is likely to be more trouble, and some of the negroes are leaving.

Taft Resigns as War Secretary. Washington, June 18.—Secretary Taft will tender his resignation as secretary of war in President Roosevelt's Cabinet tomorrow. He will remain at the War Department until about July 1, as he is anxious to leave a clean slate for his successor. He will then go to Cincinnati, where he expects to receive the formal notification of his nomination after the Democratic National Convention. Secretary Taft was at the White House from 9 o'clock until 11:30 this evening, where he and President Roosevelt, Secretary Root, Assistant Secretary Bacon discussed political and other business.

Poisoned by Ice Cream. Fort Worth, Tex., June 16.—Nine Fort Worth boys, members of a Y. M. C. A. camping party at Benbrook, were brought in today suffering from ptomaine poisoning. They said they became sick after eating ice cream last night. Automobiles were sent to carry them home. Although in a serious condition, none of the victims are dangerously ill, and all will probably recover.

Blount on the Tax Decision.

The very recent decision of the supreme court of the state in the Baird Independent school district case is of far reaching consequence and involves the validity of some \$3,000,000 of school bonds and impairment of nearly every independent school district in the state.

The principle decided is simply this: That the several acts of the legislature authorizing independent school districts to levy a greater tax than 20 cents on the \$100 valuation of property for maintenance of schools and erection of school buildings are unconstitutional and therefore null and void, art. 7, section 8 of the constitution reading as follows:

"One-fourth of the revenue derived from state occupation taxes and a poll tax * * * shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of such an amount, not to exceed 20 cents on the one hundred dollars valuation as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this state for a period of not less than six months in each year; and the legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts within all or any of the counties of this state, by general or special law, * * * and may authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such school districts for further maintenance of public free schools and the erection of school buildings thereon, provided two-thirds of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year, twenty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property subject to taxation in said district, but the limitation upon the amount of district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts."

This section of the constitution was adopted in 1883. In 1891 the legislature passed an act authorizing towns and villages not incorporated or not desiring to incorporate for municipal purposes, to incorporate for free school purposes only, by doing certain objections. And when so incorporated for free school purposes only, authorized them to levy a much higher rate of taxation than 20 cents named as the limit for districts in the constitution. Under this statute perhaps a thousand independent districts have been incorporated for "free school purposes only," and have levied taxes in excess of 20 cents and many have issued bonds, and levied additional taxes for buildings. Now the Attorney general of the state for 17 years, and the state authorities, have held that these "towns and villages" incorporated under this act, for "free school purposes only," were within the constitutional proviso of "incorporated cities or towns," constituting separate and independent school districts.

The supreme court simply holds that the constitutional language as above quoted was used in said constitution as adopted in 1883 with reference to incorporated cities and towns as then understood for municipal purposes, and not such an incorporation for

"public free school purposes only" and hence that these 1000 independent districts, organized under the act of 1891, while legal and valid as school districts, yet have no greater power to levy taxes than the common school district—on 20 cents on the one hundred dollars—and all taxation over that vote is null and void—and down goes the splendid progress of the public schools in Texas for the past 15 years, except in the large cities.

How does this affect us in Nacogdoches? In my opinion it absolutely invalidates the \$36,000 in building bonds we have issued, (held by state and county permanent school fund) and restricts the levy of 24 cents on the hundred dollars we have been levying for maintenance of schools, to 20 cents on the hundred dollars, this shortening the public term full one month.

What can be done to remedy this condition? The only remedy possible seems to be a constitutional amendment increasing the permissible tax vote, and validating the bonds already issued. It will take 18 months at least to accomplish this.

Martin Dies' Speech. Judge Martin Dies, candidate for congress, spoke here Thursday evening at the court house at two o'clock to a fair sized audience. Mr. Dies is filling a lot of appointments that were made by himself and Hon. S. B. Cooper jointly, but on account of the illness of Mr. Cooper's daughter, Mr. Dies is forced to fill the appointments alone.

Among the points raised by Mr. Dies, one was that Mr. Cooper had been in office so long that, as was natural for a man in such a case, Mr. Cooper would probably go along as one asleep and not notice the important legislation that was needed and thereby let the country suffer for a lack of watchfulness on his part.


Mr. Dies also stated that he was opposed to the appropriation of a \$200,000 building for Port Arthur and a \$50,000 building for Nacogdoches when they were towns of very near the same population, and should be treated alike.

He stated that Mr. Cooper was like a man riding two horses, one going forward and the other going backward, or in other words, advocating the spending of money lavishly and at the same time telling them he must be very economical. He seemed to think Mr. Cooper favored some parts of his district in preference to others.

He also objects to our county being the dumping ground for foreign immigration, when we had plenty of laborers of our own. Mr. Dies speech was a good one, and well taken, and he will probably meet Mr. Cooper here at a later date.

WILLIAMS QUILTS AS LEADER.

Champ Clark Will Doubtless Be His Successor in the House of Representatives.

Washington, June 18.—The retirement of Mr. Williams from the minority leadership of the House of Representatives will occasion general surprise. Although it was reported at the beginning of the last session of Congress that Mr. Williams had indicated that this would be his last term of services as Democratic floor leader, it was said at the conclusion of the last session of the Fifty-ninth Congress that an agreement had been reached through which the support of the faction which favored Champ Clark for leadership would go to Mr. Williams on the understanding that Mr. Clark should be the leader after Mr. Williams has served one more session.

Since Mr. Williams will not serve in the lower house longer than next session, having been elected to the Senate for the six-year term beginning March 4, 1911, he probably thinks it wise to hand over to another the leadership in a body which he is so soon to quit. There is believed to be no doubt Champ Clark will succeed to the place of Democratic leadership.

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SCHOOL LAW INVALID.

Supreme Court Passes on Independent District Tax Question.

Austin, Texas, June 17.—In answering the certified questions today in the case of Snyder et al vs. Baird Independent School District, from the court of civil appeals at Fort Worth, the supreme court held to be unconstitutional the law authorizing independent school districts embracing city and rural property to levy a tax of more than 20 cents on the \$100 valuation for all school purposes.

The law authorized the levying of a tax of 25 cents for school building purposes, and 50 cents for maintenance, and over \$3,000,000 of bonds have been issued under this law, which law the supreme court now says is unconstitutional. All these bonds are thus rendered invalid in the event any taxpayer wants to take advantage of this decision. These bonds are owned by persons all over the country.

The court held that independent school districts created with boundaries beyond the limits of the town are limited to a 20-cent tax rate for all purposes under article 7, section 3, of the constitution.

It is estimated, there are approximately \$3,500,000 of school bonds involved in this decision. The attorney general's department has also a large number of independent school district bonds which were held up pending a determination of this question.

Two Old Coins.

Two of the rarest specimens of the American private gold coinage are to be offered for sale at an auction of old coins which began here today. The first of these is a five-dollar gold piece struck in Colorado during the Pike's Peak boom days by a firm of jewelers and bankers, at a small mining camp in the famous Georgia Gulch district. So far as known there is only one other of these coins in existence and that is in the collection at the United States mint at Philadelphia.

The second coin is a ten dollar gold-piece issued by the Cincinnati Mining and Trading company in California in the days of 49, and bears an Indian's head surmounted by a chaplet of feathers. Though the design is crude, this ten-dollar piece enjoys the distinction of having brought the highest premium ever given for a specimen of private gold coinage, \$1,109 being paid recently for a similar specimen at a sale in London.



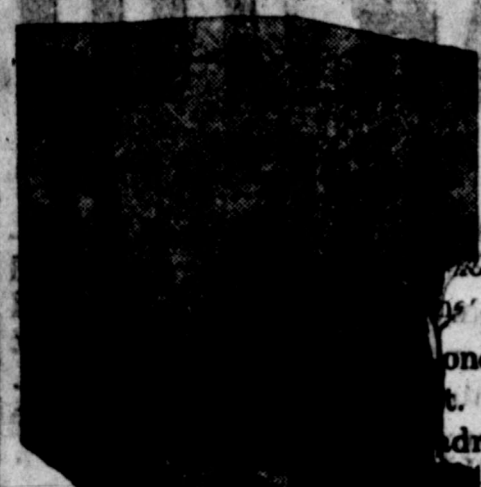
