Hon. W. O. Crain, legal examiner of the general land office at Austin, who is here spending few days with friends and relatives, paid The Sentinel a pleasant call today. In speaking of the today. In speaking of the
bill introduced in the last bill introduced in the last
legislature, which had for its purpose the validating of the grants of land located in this county, he said: "That bill was a step in the right direction and would have become a law, but for the fact that when Mr. King introduced the bill in the house of representatives there wereonly two sentatives there were only two
or three members that favoror three members that favor-
ed it, and it was late in the session before a majority could be counted for the bill, at which time Mr: King succeeded in having the bill pass to engrossment, but the calendar was so crowded that the bill could not be considered be-
tore adjournment. Mr. King worked faithfully for the passage of this bill, and was ably assisted by Judge Robinson, cheif clerk of the general land office; and now a candidate for office, and now a candidate for commissioner of the general land office, who helped Mr.
King perfect his bill." Mr. Crain also stated that since his arrival here that he has talked to Representative S. M.
