Texas Ready for Battle.

Austin, Texas, July 1.—Adjutant General Newton has received several letters from a number of the officers of the Texas National Guard offering their services should the need of soldiers along the Mexican border become apparent. The officers writing General Newton stated that they were not anxious to see the present disturbed conditions in Mexico develop to such an extent as to necessitate the calling out of the Texas guard or any portion of it, but if such a state of affairs should arise as to make it evident that the Texas frontier needed protection, they would gladly volunteer.

NEW COURT HOUSE.

Smith County Votes \$160,000 Bond Issue For Modern Structure.

Tyler, Texas, July 1.—The election Saturday held in this county to determine whether or not Smith county should issue \$160,000 in bonds for the purpose of building a new court house, was carried by a nice majority, and the court house will be built.

From the table of the returns, Tyler cast 822 of the 1206 votes. Lindale, Mt. Sylvan, Pine Springs, Red Springs, Swan and Grange Hall giving a majority for the issue, while the rest of the boxes went against it.

While the figures are not absolutely correct, and are unofficial, only about 7 or 8 boxes out of the 26 being in with the official returns. The commissioners court will meet within the next few days and declare the official vote. The four boxes to be heard from will not change the above figures but little, there being some doubt as to whether an election was held there.

Judge Bullock upon being questioned as to how soon the new court house would be built, stated that there was much preliminary work to be gone through with, but that he thought within the next six or eight months the work will have commenced, if all things worked out well.

Prosperity Has Begun.

Chicago, July 1.—Today there will be distributed throughout the United States a total of \$195,000,000, made up largely of semi-annual payments by publishing corporations, such as railroads, large industrial concerns and banks. This immense volume of money, cut loose from one end of the country to the other, it is believed, will start a great business revival. It is expected to lead to widespread investments and general improvements and will have a beneficial and bracing effect in many ways. One important feature is that railroads will have no trouble in getting funds for improvements, and work is in sight for thousands of idle men. At the present time the situation is peculiar in not only the United States, but in all the great monetary centers of the world. Money has never been more plentiful. A large part of the money is in gold. The excess reserves in all the larger cities are now at the highest in the history of the country. Money rates are exceptionally low for any good collateral and any enterprise that is honest can be easily financed.
