Little did Godtrey Cheal nder think, one Sunday morning early in June, 1905 when he sat in the lobby of the Golden Gate Hotel, at Nome, that an idea which came to him would grow till t reached the proportions a great world's fair.
Chealander was reveiving the trip he had just mãde, as commissioner for the United States government, gathering exhibits for the Lewis and Cark exposition. Although this trip was a successful one in its way, Chealander knew that his work could have been done better had he hadmore time. He got his commis sion and started out from Skagway as soon atter as pos ible, March 29, 1905, to be exact. This gave him two monts in which to cover a large territory which he did
