TWO ACRES of tobacco equals, at least, \$200. Five acres of cotton equals, hardly, \$200. Difference, time, labor, expense. Grow tobacco.

THE trades day can be made one of the very best things for Nacogdoches, but the movement must have the co-operation of all to be the success it should.

EVERY man who owns property in Nacogdoches county would do a lasting benefit by getting a split log drag, and then use it on the roads adjacent to that property.

THE world was created in just six days and from the present air several more worlds could be created before Nacogdoches folks take up the matter of building sidewalks.

\$100,000 expended in building good roads, in Nacogdoches county would mean a saving to the farmers of \$25,000 a year and would enhance the value of property from 10 to 20 per cent at once.

A FEDERAL building, a new court house, sidewalks and street crossings, new residences, a big tobacco warehouse and a real live trades day will be traveling at a rapid rate, but that's Nacogdoches 1909.

THE farmer who causes \$100 worth of tobacco grow where \$25 worth of cotton grew before, is the fellow who will be living at home while his less fortunate neighbor is in town making arrangements to raise another cotton crop.

LET'S see now: five acres of tobacco will bring about \$750; cost \$75, leaving \$675 net profit or \$125 per acre; that's a fair average. Five acres of cotton at one bale per acre (a big yield) and \$50 per bale will bring \$250; picking \$40, ginning \$15 (if you do all of the other work) leaves a net of \$205, about \$41 per acre. Tobacco or cotton, which?

WE don't believe there is a farmer in Nacogdoches county that is an enemy to good roads. Better thoroughfares are badly needed and will result in more benefits to the farmers than any other class of people. The thing for them to do then, is to join a movement for such and get good roads at the earliest possible time.

NACOGDOCHES county needs a new court house and better roads. These are two matters that should be given of every citizen's best study and which should result in a support for both propositions. The old court house is wholly inadequate, old, unkempt and is not in keeping with the progress and prosperity of this county. There is no need of argument for better roads.

\$100,000 wisely expended in building good thoroughfares would prove one of the greatest investments ever made by a people. With an additional tax of but 12 1-2 cents on the \$100 valuation, could float a \$100,000 bond issue of 5 per cent 20 year's, pay the interest annually and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem the issue, besides making a surplus for maintenance and other purposes.

Some Things of Interest Concerning the Tobacco Industry.

The best and most convincing arguments are figures. No matter what the question at stake is and no matter how elaborate one may present reasons, facts and figures take first place. The Sentinel endeavors at all times to encourage and promote the tobacco industry in this county, believing that it will prove the best in every way—and financially especially. It is no longer a question of "experimenting." The soil is adapted to growing the finest filler in the world; the seasons are very favorable, the expense is moderate and the returns are great. The thing to do, and toward which efforts are being made, is to get more farmers interested in the crop and induce them to grow a few acres. It is a settled fact that more tobacco will be grown next year than ever—possibly five or six hundred acres—but there ought to be still more than that amount.

Tom Maroney, a tobacco man and known to most of the people, has obliged us with some figures that will surely prove of interest to all, and especially the farmer who contemplates growing a patch of tobacco next year. There are, of course, many others in the county who can show as good returns and we would be glad to have from them,

DISTRICT COURT CONVENES.

The charge delivered by Judge Perkins was not lengthy and was what may be termed a general one, though roads and road overseers, pistol "toting," possible violations of the local option law, and of the primary election law, were mentioned and the jury was instructed to make thorough investigations of all, as well as other matters.

Door—John Burrows, Sr. Most of the day was put in calling the docket, making orders, etc., but it is expected that by tomorrow the court will get down to regular working order.

AROUND THE COURT HOUSE.

Sam J. Weatherly, postmaster, merchant and gin man of Linn Flat was in the city today, having been summoned as a grand juror. Because of his duties as such he was excused and returned home this afternoon.

Robert Lindsey was excused from the list of grand jurors on account of not being well.

J. F. Gaston, summoned for grand jury service by the initials, "Frank D." was excused.

B. C. Patterson, proprietor of a gin plant presented that as a legal excuse, and was relieved of his summons to do service as a grand juror.

Judge Perkins is still carrying an arm in a sling, injured some time ago by a fall. He suffers considerably with it and says it is getting better very slowly.

District Attorney O'Quinn came in from Lufkin on the noon train and has assumed his duties in connection with the grand jury.

George Gibson, court stenographer, came in on the early morning train, having spent last night at Lufkin.

One very noticeable feature, and commented on by several, including the court, is the fact that not a prisoner is in jail awaiting action of the grand jury.

TRADES DAY FEATURE.

Mass Meeting Starts The Movement — Splendid Good Roads Talk.

The mass meeting was a decided success in every way and was enthusiastic as well. The attendance was excellent and all who were not on hand may class themselves as unfortunates. D. K. Cason as chairman, presided and after calling the meeting to order and stating the objects called on Mr. Dodge, government good roads man, for a talk. Mr. Dodge responded with a request for expressions from others on the matter of good roads, before his talk and was heeded by several gentlemen, including Messrs. John Schmidt and F. H. Tucker. Both gave vent to the opinion that they favored good roads in every sense and realize a fact of fruitless efforts at town building with out such. Mr. Schmidt emphasized the great benefit good roads would be to the farmers while Mr. Tucker gave some points in roadbuilding in Wilson county, where lands and soils are similar to those in this county, and which are excellent. Mr. Dodge then addressed the body in one of the most interesting and most instructive talks ever heard. It was full of logic throughout, plain but to the point and covered every phase of road building. The sand and clay material for constructing roads, is of course found in plenty here and is given as the cheapest and as serviceable a road material as can be found. The talk was a gem of its kind and was appreciated to the fullest extent. Mr. Dowdel, government engineer, made a short talk also prodecing statistics that proved eye openers to many with reference to the thoroughfares of this county.

The good roads feature of the program proved a treat and gives promise of rounding into a general movement in the county for better roads. The trades day matter was then taken up, and required but a few moments to be disposed of as all were overwhelmingly in favor of launching such at once. The matter was discussed at some length, or rather some phases of it, and which brought out some excellent ideas as to conducting it properly. On motion the committee composed of D. K. Cason, F. H. Tucker and Robert Lindsey, was instructed to visit all merchants and business men and enlist their support. The committee was also instructed to make up a program, select a date and make other necessary arrangements. The gentlemen expects to get busy in this matter without delay. The two movements launched at last night's meeting are two very important ones and it is safe to predict that untold benefits will be derived from both. The men who were present are heart and soul in the work of upbuilding this city and county and will leave nothing undone that will in the least add a straw to it's progress and prosperity.

Appointed as Delegate.

Giles M. Haltom of this city has been notified of his appointment as a delegate to the International Congress on Tuberculosis, which meets in Washington September 21st. The appointment was made by Dr. W. A. Brumby, State Health Officer, and who is also president of the association of Texas Health officers. The congress will be in session three weeks and some of the most prominent men of the old world and new world are on the program to deliver addresses. Among the business to be transacted will be the adoption of a memorial which will be presented to the United States Congress in December, the object of which is to have that body enact some legislation relative to checking that disease. The officers of the Tuberculosis Congress include President Roosevelt, governors of all of the states and many other prominent personages. Mrs. C. W. Butt of this city is also a delegate, appointed by the State Federation of Clubs.

Stock Law Election Proclamation.

Whereas, the Commissioner of the Court of Nacogdoches county, Texas, on the 12th day of August, 1908, granted a petition duly and legally signed and filed in said court, asking that an election be ordered by said court to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large in a subdivision of Nacogdoches county described in said petition; and Whereas, said court on the 12th of August, 1908, ordered that an election be held on the 26th day of September, 1908, to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large in said subdivision of Nacogdoches county, which is described as follows:

Beginning at the Nacogdoches and Southeastern railroad bridge on the Cariso creek thence eastwardly with said railroad to Black branch near Hampton's camp; thence up said Black branch to the south boundary line of Z. T. Mast's tract of land; thence east with said Mast's said line to southeast corner of same said corner being on the west line of the Impson survey; thence north with said Impson line to northwest corner, said corner being on the south boundary line of a tract of land known as the Pike and Mathews tract; thence eastwardly with said boundary line to the Melrose hog law line; thence with said hog law line to the mouth of the Atacosa creek where it empties into the Cariso creek; thence up said Cariso creek to the Trinity hog law line; thence with said hog law line to where it crosses the lower Melrose and Nacogdoches road; thence south to Lige Acrey's southwest corner; thence east to Lige Acrey's southeast corner; thence north to the lower Melrose and Nacogdoches road; thence down said road to Bill Crossland's west boundary line; thence south with dividing line between Bill Crossland and At Fruit to At Fruit's southeast corner; thence a westerly course with At Fruit's line to the north-west corner of Charley Chapman's tract of land; thence in a southwesterly direction to the southwest corner of a tract of land deeded for the Fairview school house; thence with Charley Chapman's west boundary line to a branch north of Charley Chapman's house; thence eastwardly down said branch to Tom Crisp's west boundary line;

thence southwardly with dividing line between Tom Crisp and Charley Chapman to said Chapman's southeast corner; thence westwardly with said Chapman's south boundary line to said Chapman's southwest corner; thence westwardly with Dr. Ford's north boundary line to said Ford's northwest corner; thence southwardly to said Ford's southwest corner on the Nacogdoches and Southeastern railroad; thence eastwardly with said railroad to George Meisenheimer's northwest corner on the Nacogdoches and Southeastern railroad; thence southwardly to George Meisenheimer's southwest corner; thence eastwardly with said Meisenheimer's south boundary line to said Meisenheimer's southeast corner; thence south to Bob Montes' southwest corner; thence eastwardly to Bob Montes' southeast corner; thence northwardly with Bob Montes' east boundary line to the Nacogdoches and Southeastern railroad down said rail road to the place of beginning.

Now, therefore, I, C. D. Mims, in my capacity as County Judge of Nacogdoches County, Texas, do hereby order that an Election be held on the 26th day of September, 1908, at Fairview School House, Nacogdoches County, Texas, to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large within the boundaries of the above described subdivision of said Nacogdoches County, Texas.

All persons who are legally qualified voters under the laws of this State, and who are also freholders in Nacogdoches county, and resident citizens within the boundaries of said subdivision are entitled to vote in said election.

G. P. Parks and R. L. Parish are appointed managers of said election, and they will select two clerks to assist them in holding said election. The judges of said election shall within ten days after said elections has been held make due returns thereof to the County Judge of Nacogdoches County.

A COTTON MARKET.

The farmer who allows himself to be persuaded to carry his cotton to other points full in the belief that he will get a better price for his product, is merely another example of "rain bow chasing." It is a well known fact that Nacogdoches has, for years and years, been the leading cotton market of this entire section and the merchants and other buyers of the fleecy staple in this city are this season making it a better market than ever. The idea of going to any other town and getting a better price for cotton than is and will be paid in Nacogdoches is a preposterous one on the very face of it and a trial in other markets proves the absurdity of such a thought. There are more buyers here than ever, competition is stronger, facilities for handling cotton are better and besides as a shipping point Nacogdoches can not be excelled. Besides that too, the compress and oil mill have some weight in making advantages for this city. If there is a farmer who has, or has had, any intention of carrying his cotton to other points, find him and explain to him the error of his way. Nacogdoches as a cotton market, or a market for all other products, is not excelled in this entire section and the farmers for a radius of a hundred miles who want the very top prices for their stuff, will do well to bring it to Nacogdoches, even if it requires an extra outlay of time.

BUILDING GOOD ROADS

Judge Mims Makes Some Timely Suggestions and Presents Facts and Figures.

Editor Sentinel.

Since the commencement of construction on the demonstration road east of town I have been gratified at what seems to be a healthy growth of sentiment on the part of the people of the county generally for better public roads. While there was, and is possibly yet in some parts of the county, much opposition on the part of the people to the building of this demonstration road, I am persuaded that much of that opposition comes from a lack of information and not because of their opposition to good roads.

While the construction of this mile of road will likely cost as much as \$800.00 (I do not now think it will exceed that sum) it is a fact that there are many miles of public road in the county that will cost less than \$50.00 to construct. I have, as closely as the other duties of the office would allow, since I have been county judge, studied the matter of making better and permanently improving the public roads of the county, and in doing so have gathered much information from reading and gone over perhaps the greater portion of the first-class, and much of the second class, roads of the county. It is my opinion from the knowledge that I have thus acquired and the observation I have made of our public roads that with proper road machinery all of the first-class roads leading out from Nacogdoches can be made "good roads" at an average cost of not exceeding \$300.00—possibly as little as \$200.00—per mile. Especially with the aid of public spirited citizens will give along the line of road construction. Last year the tax rate of the county was the lowest in the history of the county—as far as I was able to trace, and yet there was collected for the road and bridge fund—from all sources—about \$15,000.00. About the same amount will be collected for this fund from the same sources this year. It is, therefore, my opinion that we can use with the best possible results to our public roads annually 5 or 6 thousand dollars of this fund in building "good roads" and still leave ample funds with which to keep up our bridges and to (with the help of the ordinary road hands subject to road duty) keep up in passable condition as heretofore other portions of the roads not reached by the good roads crew.

In order to build the class of roads as suggested, we would have to have, in addition to what implements, stock and tools we now have, one road grader which would cost \$275.00, four wheel scrapers, which would cost some \$60.00 or \$80.00; one road roller, which would cost \$350, and four good mules, which would cost \$500.00 or \$600.00. These could all be used and operated by a force of men at an average monthly expense, all told, about \$400.00, and

we would be able, under the direction of an intelligent man—such as our present county farm superintendent—to construct on an average of two miles per month of good road. This would give us twenty-four miles of good road annually at an annual expense of possibly \$5000.00 (allowing \$200.00 for possible repairs, etc.) This would be about as fast as this class of work could be done with safety to the fund of the county. To undertake more would require a much larger outlay of money in machinery, tools, stock, etc. and open the door to extravagance and possible "graft."

Much has been said and is continually being said, especially in the newspapers, about the "split log drag." That the split log drag is a splendid tool, or implement, is a demonstrated fact, but in order to make it of practical use our roads must first be graded and put in proper shape; and at present there isn't a dozen miles of road in the county upon which this tool, or implement, could be used with any degree of success. The basic principle of good road construction lies in the proper grading and shaping of the road, supplemented by proper and efficient drainage. When our roads—outside of the sand, which must necessarily be treated properly with a clay mixture—are properly graded and drained, then the "split log drag" will be the only proper tool, or implement, to use in permanently maintaining such roads, and in my judgment, the only thing that will be necessary to use on the road.
