DR DENMAN DEAD.

Prominent Physician of Lufkin
Fatally Injured by Train
Died at Noon.

Dr. A. M. Denman, one of the most prominent physicians of Lufkin and who has resided there practically all of his life, was fatally injured this morning about two o'clock, by a switch engine from the effect of which he died today about noon. The particulars concerning the accident as we learn them are about as follows: Dr. Denman and one of the nurses at his hospital were returning from a professional call about 2 o'clock. On approaching the railroad crossing at the yards, a switch engine passed. As it did so, the Dr. who was in his auto, attempted to cross, only to be crashed into by another train that was backing up.

The auto was completely wrecked. Dr. Denman sustained broken legs, being also hurt internally and the young lady had her clothing almost entirely stripped from her, but escaped bodily injury. The doctor was immediately removed to his sanitarium and treatment given, but never revived from Lufkin, just after noon stated that he considered Dr. Denman has been a resident of that city all his life and has built up a very large practice. He was president and manager of the Denman Cannon Hospital and also manager of the local telephone system there.

PRESIDENT NEILL ADVISES.

The president of the Farmers Union has advised a strike. Whether or not it will be heeded is yet to be seen, but presumably not. His method of carrying on the strike is simply, "plant less cotton." This free will offering tastes of the pail, as K. Lamity expresses it; it is old --one of the most antiquated pieces of advise since the conflict of '61. The farmers union is a great institution and has been the cause of more good than any other organization of that class of people. It has caused a reading, studying and an investigation. It has, and is now, causing the man who guides the plow to think and reason as he never did before. "Plant less cotton" is all right and would prove a wonderful thing in getting the people on the right trail. But will they do it? The only way in the wide world for the farmer to eliminate himself and his product from the oppressive power of the moneyed speculator is to "diversify." That is an old song too, but it's one that becomes more "truthful" as it grows older. If every farmer in Nacogdoches county would not include cotton in their next year's program--would not begin a crop with the first purpose of seeing how much cotton they could raise, a brightening up might take place. Instead, put in the 1900 crop with the sole purpose of growing more corn than they need, more forage than they can feed, enough

potatoes, peas, and other stuff of that nature to supply home use, plenty of hogs for meat and lard, lots of chickens, cane for syrup, etc., and then --not until then--they may consider planting a few acres of cotton. They would have their livings at home; would not have to depend on the cotton crop for it. The few bales of fleecy staple could then be marketed as desired and not because it had to be. And they would not have to sell it all unless they wanted to. The solution of the cotton question is one for the individual farmer, for each man, and can and will be successfully solved by diversification--raising the living at home. President D. J. Neill's advice to "strike" by planting less cotton is good but a heeding of that advice would be better.

BIG TOBACCO CROP.

D. R. Reid Gathers 30,000 Pounds From 40 Acres—Builds New Barns.

During the past few years probably the greatest progress made in any line in the state of Texas, has been made here in Nacogdoches county, in the tobacco industry. And it is an assured fact too, that even greater strides will be made in the growing of that crop the next four years than were made in the past same length of time. The tobacco industry in this county is yet in its infancy in many respects, though in others it has a full grown. In reference to the last statement it might be mentioned that a great number of the men that are growing tobacco and are interested in its culture are men of many years experience and are earned in that line. One of these captains of industry and pioneer, is D. R. Reid, who has made a most gratifying success in every way; one worthy of close study and emulation. The fertile rangeburg soil is not an accident, but for a purpose and at purpose is "growing tobacco." Mr. Reid has demonstrated beyond all shadow doubt, as many others have done, that the famous lands have grown, are growing and will continue to grow the finest tobacco in the world and just as prolific as. Another feature of great interest in connection with this is: Mr. Reid has, as far

as we can learn, the largest individual tobacco farm in the entire state. There were forty acres of tobacco grown on that place this year, thirty of which were Mr. Reid's and ten were grown under the shade and belonged to the Nacogdoches Tobacco Growing Co., a firm organized about two years ago and incorporated with a capital stock of \$6500. Mr. Reid is also president of this company and has the management of the business. There are now four large barns on this place, two, 40 by 100 feet and two, 40 by 160 feet. The latter ones are recently built and are not only the most commodious in the state but are strictly modern in every particular. The season's crop is now in those barns and they are all full, almost to overflowing, the gentleman estimating, very conservatively too, that they contain 30,000 pounds. Mr. Reid has confined himself to the growing of but two kinds of tobacco, the open field Cuban and the shade Sumatra. He was highly pleased with the first year's results but says this season's crop is much better both in quantity and quality. Mr. Reid returned but a few weeks ago from Chicago and points in the East, where he spent a month or more showing samples of his product to the largest and most conservative leaf dealers, and asks us to say that the reports from those who made most careful examinations and put the samples to severest tests, agree

that our product, when properly handled, has all the quality and appearance necessary to compete with the very best imported cigar tobaccos. Especially is this true where the tobacco has been grown from the Cuban seed, and in this kind the leaf dealers showed much interest. People who visited Mr. Reid's tobacco farm this year pronounce it a splendidly equipped one—no doubt the best in the state as well as the largest. The growing crop was excellent to look upon, simply fine and many of the plants reached a height of over nine feet, growing out between the lattice covers. Already arrangements for even a bigger acreage for next year are being made on this farm, and associated with Mr. Reid will be J. L. Gill formerly with Taussig & Co. This gentleman will be the manager for Mr. Reid at Redfield, is a splendid acquisition and is well versed in the tobacco growing. He has been identified with the industry for 15 years in East Texas, a part of that time in the employ of the government and was one of the first men to be connected with the experimental work in this county. COTTON COMING IN.
Nearly 2500 Bales Weighed To Last Night—Mr. Murphey Estimates 10,000 For Season.

If cotton continues to come during the month of October, as it was brought in during the present month, Nacogdoches will receive between six and seven thousand bales by November. This assertion is based on the receipts for the past two weeks, as the bulk of the present receipts were brought in since about the middle of the month. Up to last night, September 28, the four yards here had weighed a total of 2,478 bales, and by tomorrow night, the last day of the month, it is estimated that the total will not miss 3,000 but very few, if at all. The receipts as shown by each yard to last night are: A. J. Locke, 1160 bales; Will Taylor, 632 bales. P. M. Sanders, 169 bales and the union yard (A. J. Murphey manager) 527 bales. That date last year less than 500 bales had been received while in 1906, between 1500 and 2000 bales had been weighed up to October 1st. The first bale of new cotton this year was received and weighed at the union yard July 28, the second coming in nearly two weeks later. On the first day of September this year 383 bales had been received while the first of last September less than 50 was the total. This season's crop is possibly the earliest ever received, at least it has started out to be. The total wagon receipts last year was 4627 bales, most of which was in the yards by Christmas. The 1906 crop was much better than last seasons, but the 1908 crop will run beyond it. One very noticeable thing is the sample this year being so much better than former years. Another thing too is, that very little cotton is being held. That this year's crop is better in every respect, goes without saying. The 1908-09 crop is estimated at from ten to fifteen thousand bales, that is, the number of bales that will be received here by wagon. Ten thousand bales is placed as the minimum, and it is confidently believed that it will run more than 12,500, while some few think it will reach the 15,000 mark.

Messrs. Skillern and Mills, two school patrons of the Prospect District, No. 57, were in the city today on business relative to school matters. According to the gentlemen, the trustees have caused the school house of their district to be moved to an extreme corner, convenient to some of the patrons but entirely too far away to suit others. It is said the present location puts about 12 of the pupils four or five miles away. An effort is to be made to have the trustees reconsider and have the school more centrally located in that district. There is a total enrollment of 29—including the 12 who live the long distance away.

The San Antonio Fair, which opened Saturday, is said to be the best-attended of all, thus far.

OVERSEERS REPORTS.

Commissioners Court Urges Prompt Attention and Full Information at November Term.

To Road Overseers.

You are each respectfully requested to have your commissioners in the hands of the commissioners court on the 9th day of November, that being the second Monday in that month. Before filing your commission you should be careful to report fully on the blank pages in the back of your commission on these subjects:

1st. Giving the number of hands and their names in your road liable to road duty.

2nd. The number of days you have caused your road to be worked.

3rd. The condition of the road in your precinct.

4th. The amount of money received by you for your road precinct, from whom received and for what purpose such funds were paid out.

5th. The amount of such fund, if any, that remains in your hands, and if any fund remains in your hands be ready to turn the same over to the court.

6th. Give an itemized list of all tools and implements belonging to the county or your road precinct, in your hands or the hands of any other person that you know of. A full report on all these subjects and especially the last is most important and is requested by law, and will be appreciated.
