1. Declared the legislative congressional districts to be wrong and ordered them

2. Decided that it was unconstitutional for school districts to collect ad valorem taxes;

3. Advised that it was also unconstitutional to charge a political party candidate a filing

That's enough to make that aforementioned citizen wonder what's going on and where it's all going to end, if it does.

Changes, even we know, are bound to come, but we wonder if these federal courts, wherever they are, are being wise in making these decisions and then dropping them on the public like bombs.

We don't have a big argument about the filing fee decision except that it was dropped too sudden for comfort and arrangements have to be made to finance the elections otherwise. We'll admit that the filing fee could possibly keep some qualified candidates from entering a race. That's a weak argument, but it's an argument,

The school tax business is no doubt a door opener toward less local control of schools. We'll be hearing more about this in time to come, it sez

However, with the indebtedness of school districts, which are paid off by local taxes, it appears that it would be tremendously difficult to work out | bock, a brother-in-law of Mr. a fair solution across the state. Palmer said the survey will play a major role in helping farm program planners, farm groups, and analysts have a better understanding of how farmers stand in the nation's

economic picture.

The nationwide survey will show current buying patterns of farmers. It will indicate the kinds and amounts of goods and services bought to raise crops and livestock. The last farm expenditure survey was conducted in 1955 and purchasing patterns have changed drastically since then. Farmers now buy considerably more fuel, fertilizer, and machines, but less labor and different chemicals.

Information on production expenses plays an important part in the computation of the USDA monthly index of prices paid by farmers and is also used in determining net farm income, Palmer stated.



Do they eat more snacks than well balanced meals? Malnutrition, is no respector of income levels. Six out of every 10 teenage girls and four out of every 10 teenage boys have poor diets, according to recent research. At a | where. time when one out of every four mothers bearing her first child is still in her teens, teenage girls had the poorest food habits of any age group studied in another survey. Research findings such as these continue to underscore the fact that teenagers don't eat right.

Why do teens eat the way

There may be as many anssers to this question as there are young people, but the lack of knowledge on good nutrition also contributes. These researchers report that "adolescents have only the sketchiest information on the caloric content of foods and on sound nutritional practices."

Many youngsters have the idea that well-balanced meals are "kid stuff" and important only during the growing period.



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

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

On The Farm In Parmer County

Fertilizing time is just around the corner and a soil test is a good idea in order to exactly what the soil needs. If you haven't taken a soil sample yet, it might be a good investment to do so before you apply your fertilizer. Test forms and shipping boxes

are available in my office. There are several new products on the market this year that are supposed to replace our present fertilization program. They are called soil conditioners and their purpose is to keep the soil in a natural state of being. Before using these products altogether, a producer should make sure they are supplying the nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium needed by all living plants.



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
