TO ROME, 1911.

Congress Meets Next Across the Waters—Roosevelt Makes a Speech.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 8.—I will bid farewell to the Capital City today. Since writing you I have visited parks, cemeteries and public buildings but merely a glimpse can be obtained of so much immensity. Saturday I attended the closing ceremonies of the International Congress, the resolutions read, the foreign delegates made their speeches of farewell, embracing more or less their gratitude and their great admiration for this country and city. The Italian delegates invitation to come to Rome in 1811 was accepted with enthusiasm. Near the close of the exercises a stir was heard which led up to excitement and great cheering when the president came forward and gave a characteristic talk. I have seen his pictures in papers taken when speaking and he is just like them!

We saw the president and his wife mount their horses for a ride a few days ago; poor things, lots of people stood and looked at them as though they were sights to be wondered at, they crowded so near as to actually touch the hydrant on which she stood to get on the horse. I wondered why her husband couldn't give his hand for her foot to assist her in mounting her horse! They both looked embarrassed, I'm sure they must have been. Mrs. Roosevelt does not appear well on horseback in either dress or position.

A visit to the Soldiers' Home where all that nature and art could do to enhance the beauty of 640 acres is one of the sights of the city. It is very beautiful but these poor men do not feel that your visit is to them—when you visit the Confederate Home in Austin you are met with smiles and pleasant greetings, but here you pass these old soldiers who look neither to right or left, they know that the place attracts sightseers who care nothing for the dwellers in the home. In the beautiful entrance you are confronted with a painting, Sherman's March to the Sea; you can imagine the blood-curdling scenes portrayed and the feeling of coldness and contempt it would awaken in the heart of Southern patriots. I wonder if these old men gloat over that pictured distress and unnatural war upon the innocent, and if this piece of canvass will be allowed to remain in future years a disgrace to this country. A walk through Rock Creek cemetery, not connected with the home, soothed the shocked feelings aroused and pity acted as a gentle monitor. I have re-visited the splendid Capital and other noted build-

ings and I hope some day all my friends may have the privilege of walking in my footsteps. I stood on the spot where Adams dropped dead and saw the old theatre where Lincoln met his tragic fate; the house in which he was cared for and died is now used as a museum. I have seen the house, a museum draped with flags, where Francis Scott Key was born and wandered through places made sacred by noble men and women. Tomorrow I will visit Sharpsburg and Harpers Ferry and I will remember that our own Hood was dangerously wounded and a brilliant cousin of mine killed at Sharpsburg.

PROGRAM FOR THE FARMERS CONGRESS A SPLENDID SUCCESS

The Committee Appointed By the Commercial Club Have Made Their Report.

DR. KNAPP IS EXPECTED

Also Several Other Government Men Prominent in the Department

We print below the program for the Farmers Congress to be held in Tyler, October 20th to 23rd inclusive under the directions of Dr. S. A. Knapp, special agent in charge of farmers demonstration work.

This will be a great opportunity for the farmers to hear discussions on subjects of vital importance, by men who are thoroughly posted from a practical standpoint.

Representation from about thirty counties is expected. An opportunity for general discussion on any and all of the subjects submitted will be given, and it is hoped that any farmers who desire to submit his views will come prepared to do so.

It is the object of Dr. Knapp to make the meeting one of great practical value, and any practical suggestion will be gladly received. It is his desire that a large number be present, and everything will be done to make the congress pleasant as well as profitable. A round trip rate of one and one-fifth fare on all the railroads entering Tyler has been secured, good from October 20th to October 24th.

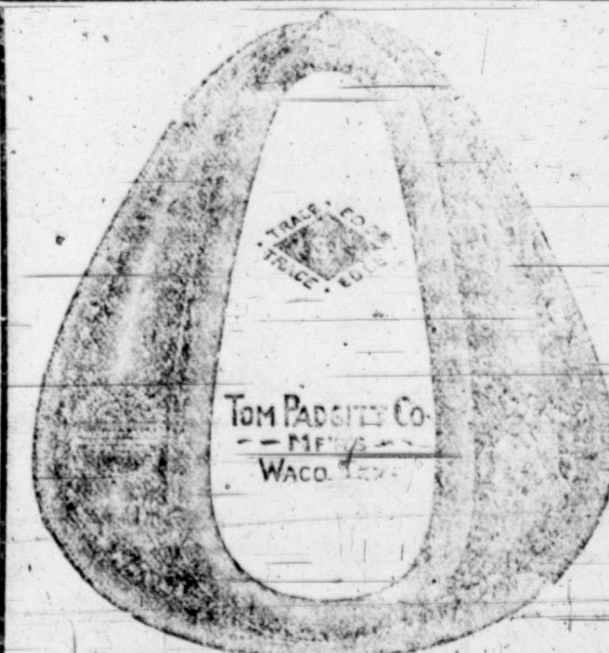

DR. LEAK IS DEAD.
Aged Physician Passes Away at 4:25 O'clock Yesterday—Resident of County 56 Years.

From Tuesday's Daily:
Dr. Robert Leak, probably the oldest resident and physician, at least one of them, in Nacogdoches county and East Texas, died yesterday afternoon at 4:25 o'clock at the home of his grand daughter, Mrs. Luther Swift. Dr. Leak was a native of Georgia, coming to this county in 1852 at the age of 29, immediately beginning the practice of his profession at Melrose. He was a graduate of a medical college at Augusta and practiced a few years, before coming here. Dr. Leak has not been very active for some time, though he had been seriously sick but a few weeks.

He was truly a pioneer in this section and during the early day his practice covered a portion of many counties. He was eighty-five years old. Up to the last his mind was wonderfully clear, despite his age and he enjoyed talking of times when the citizenship of East Texas was not as great in number as present. Dr. Leak became affiliated with the Christian church when quite young and was a consecrated Christian and a worker in religious circles. Surviving him are only two sons, Dr. E. E. Leak of Center and Rev. D. A. Leak of Timpson, and a number of grand children. The remains were interred this morning at 10 o'clock at Melrose, the funeral cortege leaving here about five o'clock.

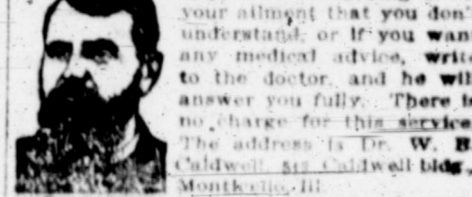

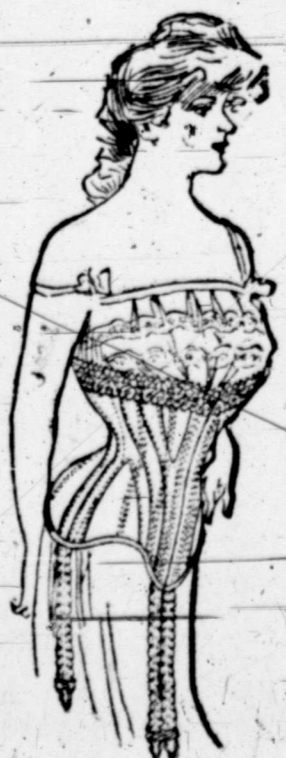

TOBACCO GROWERS COMING.

Migration From Kentucky Will Help the Lone Star State.

Houston Post

As a direct result of the series of night riding in Kentucky, many tobacco growers from the Blue Grass state will migrate to Texas. Information to this effect is obtained from Charles B. Schmidt, general immigration commissioner of the Rock Island-Frisco line, with Chicago headquarters.

Many thrifty, successful Kentucky tobacco growers lost their entire crop during the serious period of the depredations of night riders and many were run entirely out of the business. Many others have become discouraged and inquiries indicate to Mr. Schmidt that the ensuing fall and winter will witness a rather heavy movement of these discontented Kentucky growers of the weed to the Southwest. And they do not expect to give up tobacco growing, for they have heard of the splendid results obtained in that section of East Texas tributary to Nacogdoches and Palestine, and the gulf coast is also scoring in this line. So they accept these demonstrations as proving that vast areas of Texas soil are adaptable to profitable production of various grades and varieties of the weed, and they contemplate developing new fields and extending the scope and importance of the tobacco growing industry in this state.

A TOBACCO MEETING.

Association Convenes With Good Attendance—Many New Members.

The meeting of the Tobacco Growers Association Saturday afternoon, was the most enthusiastic and the most successful ever held.
