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



"TO OLD VIRGINIA SHORE." Pays Visits to Historic Places Before Returning Home on the. Plains.

· Yesterday I lett Washing ton at 4 p. m. arriving a Shepherdstown at 9:30 to visit relatives. This is to me a most interesting, quaint old place one of the oldest towns settled by the colonists. Here I visited the house where my husband's father was born and looked on the church wherein he used to worship. I went to the cemetery and stood by the graves of my husband's grand parents and little farther along saw the ground made sacred by the burial of confederate soldiers who fell at the battle of Sharpsburg. All had markers and most of them were named. Near by is a beautiful Confederate monument, one of the first erected, bearing the date, 1870. On one side this inscription, "We lie here in obedience to the built in 1795 but rebuilt in

the very essence of patriotism? Leaving here this morning

at 10, I went to Sharpsburg only three miles distance, to see more relatives and spent the day with them sightseeing. We visited a national cemetery where the Federal dead are buried, but aside from the magnificent trees there was little to interest us there; one monument' dedicated to the dead stands near the

center of the grounds. From there we crossed the street into the Citizens cemetery drops in the little. and found the grave stone of

grounds is called Bloody lane, where hundreds of the dead tell. Over the river Antietam which flows trough the old battlefield is built a bridge called Burnside bridge; there the battle was hotly contested and the bridge has plates bearing the names of many who fell.

To those who like relics, found at the house where I stopped, quaint tables, chairs and bedsteads nearly 200 years old and a wine chess over 200 years old in splendid preservation. 





Gist of Col. Simpson's Speech Last Night-Banquet at the Banita -Sketch of the Man.



Col. John N. Simpson of Dallas, nominee of the Republican party for Governor of Texas. arrived in the city yesterday atternoon at 3 o'clock from Beaumont. He was met at the station by a delegation of business men and escorted to the Redland hotel, when, after a brief rest, he same down to the lobby and met a large number of callers, being all the afternoon, surrounded by a group and seemingly enjoying conversation. On account of fatigue, speaking was postponed from afternoon until 8 o'clock-at night.

LARGE CROWD PRESENT

The opera house was comtortably filled by eight o'clock, a few minutes after which Col. Simpson, accompanied by Capt. H. H. Cooper and Eugene H. Blount, arrived and was greeted by applause. In a brief speech and in that pleasing style of his, Mr. Blount introduced the gentletleman, and who in a talk of more than an hour's duration. re-viewed the work of the state administration, especially the legislative end. He laid particular stress on the Robertson insurance law, criticising it severely, alleging that the result of that law had caused the withdrawal of millions of capital from the state, causing an increase in interest rates and retarding the development of the state in many ways. To emphasize his view, statistics were quoted and in which comparisons of Texas with other states were made. The full rendition law was also taken up and discussed, in connection with which he stated that the taxes now received by "the state were much more than is necessary for an economic administration, but new offices have been created to take care of all surplus funds in salaries. The text book law was referred to, and Governor Campbell censored for allowing the professional lobbyists" to play the part they played in the adoption of the new books. The "experimental legislation," regarding the creating of this law was the subject too, of untavorable terms, previous to the "governor and the lobbyists."
