A TOBACCO WAREHOUSE.

"Going to Have One if Home Capital Has to Build It"—Mr. Lindsey and the Fair.

"Yes, you can say that Nacogdoches is going to have a tobacco warehouse, if it has to be built with home capital," said Mr. Robert Lindsey, president of the Commercial club this morning. He stated further however, that a letter had been received from Mr. Taussig of Chicago, stating that he would be in the city some time within the next ten days and wanted to meet with the business men and discuss the matter. Mr. Maroney, who received the letter, immediately wrote the Chicago gentleman that the business men could and would have a meeting at any time he may visit the city and so desired. Nothing other was mentioned in the communication and it is not known what proposition, if any, Mr. Taussig entertains or what plans he has in view. Suffice to say however, that the business men will be glad to meet him at any convenient time and discuss the tobacco warehouse feature.

There is another gentleman too, a tobacco man of wide experience, who is talking warehouse and while he does not reside in this state, he is well acquainted with the industry, conditions etc. here and may possibly put his talk into execution, should no one else erect one. MR. LINDSEY HOME.

Speaks Words of Praise for Dallas Fair—East Texas Lags—Tobacco Exhibit.

Robert Lindsey, president of the Nacogdoches Commercial club, returned yesterday afternoon from Dallas where he has been with J. Thomas Hall, in charge of the Nacogdoches tobacco exhibit at the fair. Mr. Lindsey is enthusiastic over the institution and calls it the biggest thing in the United States and the finest exhibits in the entire world.

Speaking about it further, he said: "It is a pity but what every farmer and every business man in East Texas could spend some time at the Dallas fair. It is an education almost within itself and would cause a revival and a waking up of our people. The West Texas country, including the Panhandle, has the best farm products exhibits there and covers almost every thing that grows in Texas—except tobacco. All of this stuff nearly is grown by irrigation and I want to tell you that East Texas has them beaten by far—if East Texas would have put an exhibit there."

"What counties of this section are represented?"

"Well I am sorry to say," he continued, "only two—Nacogdoches and Shelby, the latter has the Timpon handle display, the former tobacco. There should be many counties from this section bidding for publicity at the big fair, but there are not."

"What about tobacco?"

"Now there is where we shine," and he smiled, "when it comes to tobacco, Nacogdoches out distances all in every respect and our display, though not large, is the center of attraction from morn till night and nothing but words of praise are heard about it. Tobacco men—and others—from northern states, eastern states and even old Kentucky are there and are astonished at our tobacco. They are pleased beyond expression and daily ask 'where can I get the tobacco and where can we buy the cigars?'"

"Will the exhibit help Nacogdoches?"

"Will it"—he said—"well I should guess. Already I am receiving queries about next years crop and there are going to be more buyers. That Dallas Fair exhibit is one of the finest advertisements in the world and we are going to have some new people here as a result. You knew Nacogdoches tobacco gets the highest award, that means a great deal and people coming here is going to mean more."

Mr. Lindsey will return to Dallas tomorrow to remain until the close of the institution.

There is more money in poultry raising.

ON Nov. 3d vote for the school amendment; vote for the school boys and girls of Texas; vote for progressiveness and in favor of education; vote for Bryan and Kern and Campbell and the whole Democratic ticket; vote right in all matters; it's a duty you owe yourself, your family, your state and your nation to vote—and vote right.

THE fact that Nacogdoches tobacco captured the highest award—gold medal—at the big Dallas Fair, is just another feather in the caps of the sterling men who are laboring so diligently in behalf of the industry. WINS-NEW HONORS.

Nacogdoches County Products Capture More Prizes at The Big Fair—Apples, Corn and Cigars.

Nacogdoches county has added new laurels to her crown at the big Dallas Fair, and so unexpected were they, that they are the more pleasing.

That Nacogdoches county would win an honor over all competitors in the tobacco line, was confidently believed; but that she would win several was not thought of; but she has annexed three on the tobacco exhibit, one on cigars, one on apples, one on cane, all first prizes, and a second prize on a white corn exhibit. Mention has been made before in reference to the gold medal on tobacco and the second prize on corn, but the other news comes as a surprise, a very pleasant one of course. And these were all won in the face of strong competitors from the irrigated sections of Texas—where the products for exhibition were nursed and trained carefully for this occasion. THE OFFICIAL BALLOT FOR NOV. 3RD.

The official ballot to be used in voting next Tuesday, November 3d, is the largest one, and in some ways the most complicated one, that has ever been used in Texas. The sheet on which it is printed is about the size of an ordinary newspaper page and contains the tickets of seven political parties, namely: Democratic, Republican, Prohibition, Socialist, Independent, Socialist Labor and Peoples. There is an eighth column too in which is printed the list of offices with blanks for writing in the names of any candidates that may be desired and that are not already printed in one of the other seven columns. In order to vote a straight ticket it will only be necessary to draw a line through each of the other six tickets, with a black pencil or ink—not a colored or indelible pencil. To vote a mixed ticket, naturally will be more complicated and care should be exercised to do such exactly right, lest you err that your ballot will not be as intended. To vote a mixed ticket draw a line through the name of each man that you do not desire to vote for, leaving the one you desire to cast a ballot for. If, however you do not want to vote for any name in any one of the seven tickets, scratch them all and write in the eighth column the name of the man you do want to vote for. Some may be disappointed too, in not finding the names of the presidential candidates on the tickets, but you do not vote for president direct. Instead, you vote for presidential electors and the party that is successful in a state, the electors of that party cast their ballot for their candidate for presi-

dent. If for any reason these electors, who meet at the state capitals, can not elect a president by their instructed ballot, it is then put up to the House of Representatives to elect—and the Senate to elect a vice president. There are 483 electoral votes in the College, requiring 242 to elect—so it is possible that the election of a president be done by the Lower House of Congress. In addition now to the seven political tickets on the official ballot, there are three amendments to the State Constitution to be voted on. One is the school amendment, one is relating to commissioners precincts and one is relating to the governor's and lieutenant governor's salaries. If you want to vote for any one or all amendments, scratch out the against and if there is one you want to vote against, scratch out the "for etc." Now in conclusion: That you may cast a ballot as you should, study the proposed amendments carefully, read them before election day, if you have not already done so, and don't expect to learn about them after you go to the polls. It is every American citizen's duty to vote and to do so intelligently; it is necessary to know something about the men and measures to be voted on. Don't neglect a duty; go to the polls next Tuesday, no matter what comes, and cast a ballot, regardless of your political faith. The ballot box is the foundation of the government; without it men would be nothing above peons,—exercise your ballot. The ticket is complicated, as we stated, and much time will be taken in counting, so vote fast and regular,—but above all else, vote.

The idea that Nacogdoches county is not fit to raise anything but cotton, corn, long horn cattle, scrub horses and razor back hogs, has become imbedded in the minds of a few to that extent, we fear, that it can never be dislodged. Watch the demonstration work of 1909 and you'll see. Watch Nacogdoches come to the front.

MEETING AT HOUSTON.

Texas Tobacco Men Will Gather There November 10th—Experts and Government Men.

Nearly a score of Texas towns located in the tobacco growing districts of the state will be represented in Houston on November 10 when the Texas Leaf Tobacco Growers Association meets in annual session in the rooms of the Business League. President George S. Bruce has sent urgent invitations to tobacco men to be on hand and affirmative answers have been received from a large number. Representatives are expected from Orange, Beaumont, Nacogdoches, Woodville, Palestine, Crockett, Hallettsville and San Augustine.

President Bruce states that the sessions are always productive of much information which helps the tobacco growers to scientifically go about the cultivation of the weed. Samples of tobacco are brought over and the members examine and criticize it, pointing out where it is deficient or praising it if all right. There is always a lot of useful hints thrown out and the tobacco men look forward to the meetings with the hope that tobacco experts will be on hand. The government usually has a man or two to attend the meetings and give them the benefit of his experience. Methods of cultivating, curing and holding tobacco, together with market conditions, are talked over.

The officers of the association are as follows: George S. Bruce, Houston, president; William Blakesley, Hallettsville, secretary and treasurer; French Simpson, Hallettsville; John Hearne, Palestine, L. H. Gill, Redfield; Dr. J. E. Mayfield, Nacogdoches; L. H. Shelter, Orange, and J. Blohm, San Augustine, all vice presidents.

ONE frequently hears of and often times sees too, big businesses built up by advertising, good systematic advertising; but there is no record of any immense businesses that have been built up without the use of printers ink; and yet there are some merchants who continue to drag along and harbor the opinion that spending money for publicity doesn't pay. ALLEN UNDER ARREST.

Negro Wanted in This County Caught in Oklahoma—Governor is Asked for Requisition Papers.

Through the excellent official workings of the sheriff's department of this county, another person is in the clutches of the law, Ether W. Allen, a negro wanted here for disposing of mortgaged property. The negro is well known here, but for a number of months his whereabouts has been a question, though some work has been done in the case for some time, in an effort to locate him and bring him to justice. Deputy Sheriff Horace Wilson adopted a pretty good scheme however, and one that proved a success, for but a few weeks ago Allen was "spotted." Sheriff George W. Blackburn took passage and last night a message was received from him, conveying the news that the negro had been arrested at Taft, a small place a few miles from Muskogee, Oklahoma. Evidently some one else came on the scene though, for a second message was received from Mr. Blackburn this morning, asking Deputy Wilson to fix up requisition papers and forward to Governor Campbell, at the same requesting him to order the negro held in custody until the papers can be received in Oklahoma. The matter of fixing up the papers required but a short time and before noon this morning they were in readiness to forward. County Attorney A. T. Russell wired the Governor's office at Austin advising him and also asking him to make requisition to Governor Haskell of Oklahoma by wire. Whether this will be done before the proper papers are received at Austin, is not known, and on the governor's disposition of the matter depends the time of return of Sheriff Blackburn and his prisoner. If it is acted on immediately as advised from here, the officer will possibly be in tomorrow evening or night, if not, Mr. Blackburn may not get here for several days. Deputy Wilson wired Mr. Blackburn at Muskogee this morning, what had been done.

H. CLAY PIERCE has accepted the invitation to visit Texas. The news comes as a surprise despite the fact that the Missouri oil magnate has been urged time after time to come to the Lone Star state—and visit the officials at Austin. Yes it is news, and it causes a degree of hope, that justice may yet have a way. For months and months Pierce has evaded the strong arm of the law, always on some flimsy, yet seemingly rank, technicality. But now he is coming back Nov. 9—coming to Texas to face the charge that has so long been pending against him. We know he will get justice in Texas; no one can charge that Texas, Texas officers or Texas people are unfair; and here's hoping that H. Clay Pierce, the fugitive and oil magnate, will get all that's coming and will be treated as he should be—and as all other prisoners are.

4. It removes the unwarranted Constitutional discrimination against country schools and the education of country children by authorizing legal provisions for more liberal financial support by the people.

5. A vote for the amendment is not a vote for a tax; it refers the whole matter of local financial support to the property tax paying voters of the district.

TEXAS GAME SEASON.

Regulations Governing Hunters in the State—Game for Personal Use.

An even eight days to the beginning of the game season, and since Texas now has a strict law, vigorously enforced by the army of deputy game wardens, many inquiries are being made as to the provisions of the law. Below will be the essential restrictions or regulations. The open season is as follows:

Deer—Nov. 1 to January 1; limit three bucks, no does.

Turkeys—Dec. 1 to March 1; limit three turkeys.

Quail, Partridges and Doves—Nov. 1 to Feb. 1; limit twenty-five birds.

Prairie chickens, pheasants, antelope and Rocky Mountain sheep not to be killed for five years under any circumstances.

It is unlawful to purchase, offer for purchase, transport within or without the State for purchase wild turkeys, ducks, geese, grouse, prairie, chickens, pheasants, partridges, quail, doves, pigeons, plovers, snipe, jacksnipes or curlews. Each bird constitutes a separate offense. The penalty is a fine of from \$10 to \$100 or imprisonment of from five to thirty days, or both.

Unlawful to sell, offer for purchase deer, antelope, Rocky Mountain sheep, hide or antlers thereof.

Netting or trapping of wild birds prohibited.

Unlawful to shoot wild fowl other than by ordinary gun, placed to the shoulder.

Unlawful for common carrier to transport game unless prescribed affidavit is made by person killing same. They must have killed it and that it is not being shipped for market, but for personal use, and such persons must take passage on same train. Three days' killing of wild ducks (seventy-five) permitted at one shipment.

Possession of game out of season is prima facie evidence of guilt, and each bird is a separate offense. The State Game Warden and his deputies have the same power and authority to make arrests and serve process as sheriffs and same power to secure aid. He may arrest without warrant.

A game bag one day may contain a limit of twenty-five birds of all kinds, and no more. It makes no difference whether they are ducks, doves and quail—only a total of twenty-five killed one day is allowed.

THE voter who fails to exercise his duty at the ballot box next Tuesday, not only does himself an injustice but treats his family, his neighbors and Democracy wrongly.

COL. JOHN N. SIMPSON is continuing to tell the people what's the matter with Texas. To listen at the colonel's talk is like looking through a piece of smoked glass—looks cloudy. Truth of the matter is, there is nothing wrong with Texas, it's the colonel and his smoke glass.

WHAT are you doing for the coming trade's day? Are you making any plans for an exhibit, or are you going to pass it up and let some other person walk off with the premium or blue ribbon? If you are taking no stock in it and showing no interest in it—you are certainly failing to do a duty. Not a duty? Yes it is; it is every Nacogdoches citizen's duty to do everything possible for the success and upbuilding of the city and everything relating to the city. It is every Nacogdoches county citizen's duty to aid in the work of developing both the county and city. Do something for the trade's day. It will be a winner and you can help.

The next ten years will see more development in East Texas than the past twenty-five years has witnessed. The

next decade will see more land put in cultivation; more and better crops raised; more factories, such as creameries, canneries etc; more and greater developments in usages of by products, including those of the lumber industry; more and better stock, including horses, cattle and hogs; more homes built and more homes bought; a greater immigration, from other sections here and the building of more railroads than has been witnessed in three decades. To an extent this will come, without extra exertion, but the people who are already here should do their utmost in aiding it and hurrying it up. Not "watch East Texas grow," but "help her grow."

GUESS you had better not put it off another day, but get busy and advertise without delay. So far as is known the one responsible for the following lines has escaped the shotgun, but his identity has been lost in the shuffle: "We don't want to buy at your place, we don't trade there any more; you'll be sorry when you see us going in some other store. You can't sell us any stale goods, we have now opened our eyes; we don't want to trade at your store, because you don't advertise."

THE MAJORITY VOTE IS DEMOCRATIC

R. B. Cousins, State Superintendent.

It is unfair to limit the country people to twenty cents on the hundred dollars for the schools, when the people of the towns and cities have a statutory limit of seventy-five cents on the hundred dollars and have no constitutional limit whatever. It is unfair to allow the country children only twenty cents worth of schooling while allowing the city children seventy-five cents worth. There may have been a time when it was dangerous to allow the people to vote to spend their money as they pleased in quantities to suit themselves, but that time has passed. The day of the carpet-bagger is in history. The men who now vote a tax must pay it. In other days in Texas, for a short time, one set of men voted taxes for other men to pay. In those unfortunate days our Constitution was made and this illiberal limit was fixed. The people have come into full possession of the government, State and local. They can safely be trusted to spend as much as fifty cents of their own money on their schools, where a majority is in favor of that.

Many people have left their comfortable homes on the farm and have moved into the towns and cities to educate their children, because the country schools could not be made good enough for their children. This should be changed and will be changed if the amendment is adopted.

The country schools should have a more liberal rate than cities, if any difference is to be made, for the reason that the city's rendition is always higher than the country's. For instance, an acre of land in the city is frequently worth a thousand dollars or more, while in the country even the best black land is at times rendered at eleven dollars per acre. Even with these higher values the cities could not run their schools on a twenty-cent tax. A change from the seventy-five cent limit to the twenty-cent limit—that which now hampers the country schools—would ruin every city school in Texas. The reason city schools as a rule are excellent is because they are adequately supported financially. The present requirements of the Constitution, which limits country districts to twenty cents for all purposes, is grossly unjust to the country schools and country people. This condition would be remedied and improved by the adoption of the amendment.

The majority should rule. This maximum is almost as old as democratic government and is applied almost universally. Yet we have the important question of building schools an exception to this rule. It now requires a two-thirds vote to do the best thing that a community or

district can do, viz., to build a school-house or improve the local school. It is strangely inconsistent to allow a bare majority vote to decide the question of building a court house, or a bridge, and to require a two-thirds vote in favor of building a school house before it can be done. A majority vote a tax for anything except a school. This requires two-thirds. For example, a few days ago a town in Texas voted on building a school house. Seventy-one men voted for it and thirty-six against it. The proposition was lost. Thirty-six non-progressive men in that town prevented seventy-one progressive men from improving the schools. Under present conditions, the minority rules in school affairs in Texas. No man in this country will assert his belief in the rule of a minority, even though that minority be an enlightened and just aristocracy of superiors. Much less will he assert that a minority should be allowed to control a majority of equals. No man will assert that a minority of even the best men should control a majority of even less intelligent men. Much less will any man assert his belief that a minority of the worst men should control a majority of the best men. And yet we have this very condition in our school affairs in Texas. A minority of the worst citizens frequently control in school matters, against a majority of the best citizens—such is the absurdity of our present constitutional requirement of

a two-thirds vote on school questions. Possibly these restrictive constitutional provisions were once justified by hard conditions, but those conditions have disappeared and these provisions are now without justification. The good of the people demands the adoption of the pending amendment to the constitution relating to the public free schools.

Rev. John H. Davies of Oklahoma City, who occupied the pulpit at the Presbyterian church Sunday, has been called to the pastorate here and has accepted. He has been doing evangelistic work in Oklahoma, is a forceful preacher and comes highly recommended as a church worker and a gentleman. His wife will join him here in the near future.

LETTER FROM BRYAN.

Hon. W. O. Crain, at Austin, is in receipt of the following letter from W. J. Bryan addressed to him at this city, and which was forwarded to him: The letter was sent to the Sentinel by Mr. Crain, for publication in the belief that it will cause more interest in the coming election and therefore cause a bigger vote to be polled. The letter is: Lincoln, Nebr., Oct. 20. Mr. W. O. Crain, Nacogdoches, Tex.

Dear Sir: The committee has thought it wise to arrange dates for me in the doubtful states, and I therefore have not had time to visit the states known to be certainly Democratic. I wish you would explain the matter to our Democrats there and assure them that my absence is not due to lack of interest in them, but to the fact that I can serve them better by going to win a national victory than by visits which, while pleasant, would not add to our strength in the electoral college.

I shall visit the south after the election. The favorable reports we are receiving lead me to hope that I may come as the president-elect and share with your people in the rejoicing that will follow a triumph for the Democratic principles and policies. I need not say anything in explanation or in support of

our platform. Your people are acquainted with the issues and understand the importance of a national Democratic victory. I do wish, however, that you would impress upon the voters of your section the necessity of polling the largest possible vote in the Southern states. GRANDMA BOLES DEAD.

Passed Away at 4 O'clock Yesterday—84 years old—Buried at Garrison.

From Monday's Daily:

Mrs. Boles, familiarly known by her many friends and relatives as grandma, died yesterday afternoon at 8:50 o'clock at her home in this city. She had been sick several days and conscious of the fact that the end was near, her children were summoned to her bedside, nearly all being present when she died. She was 84 years old and the major portion of her life had been spent in this county—at Garrison—having resided in this city only about one year.

Surviving Mrs. Boles are

eight children besides a large number of grandchildren, in all making 69 direct descendants. Of her children, two live here, Mrs. W. S. Bridwell and Miss Ida, the latter who lived with her mother; three sons and one daughter who live at Garrison, a son who lives at San Antonio and a daughter, Mrs. Tisinger, who lives in South Texas. The remains of Mrs. Boles were shipped to Garrison this afternoon where they were interred at 5 o'clock in the Walnut Grove cemetery, six miles from that city. A large number of friends, in addition to the relatives, attended the funeral from here.

THE DEMONSTRATION WORK.

James D. Greer Appointed Special Agent, U. S. Department of Agriculture—Plans for 1909.

James D. Greer, a Nacogdoches county citizen all his life, has received notification of his appointment as a special agent of the United States Department of Agriculture, and has already entered upon his duties. That the appointment is a most commendable one, goes without saying, inasmuch as the gentleman is a native of this county, a successful, progressive farmer, up to date in that line and thoroughly acquainted with the soils in every detail. His work will be wholly in this county and the plans he has in view are excellent and if

the co-operation that should be, is forth coming, Nacogdoches county will make some marvelous strides in the agricultural line during the next few years. While Mr. Greer will be identified particularly with demonstration farm work, he proposes to aid as much as possible in the good roads movement which found its initiative, it may be said, in this county; for good roads and successful farmers go together. Two things that will receive much attention too, are the building up of old

lands and terracing or saving the land from washing. Some four or five demonstration farms are to be located in the county, one reason to be as convenient to all parts as possible and another, in order to test the various soils of the county. Associated with Mr. Greer will be G. W. Orms of Timpson, district special agent and Mr. Proctor, state special agent, Mr. Greer, however will be the only one permanently located in this county. These gentlemen expect to make a canvass of the county, meet the people, explain to them the objects and to get in touch that all may be benefited more. He stated today that in order to get a meeting it is only necessary to advise him and a date will be selected and the proposed meeting advised. He has just returned from a trip to Tyler, where he attended the Farmers Congress, and comes back enthusiastic in the work, having acquainted himself with the labors and results in that section. The demonstration work in this county is going to be a great thing and when considered that costs the farmer absolutely nothing, should receive the glad hand of all of them. This of course is entirely separate from the tobacco work and is to be done for the man who raises cotton, corn, cane, etc. The Sentinel takes special pride in the proposed work and believes it to be the beginning of a movement for more and better Nacogdoches county agriculturists.

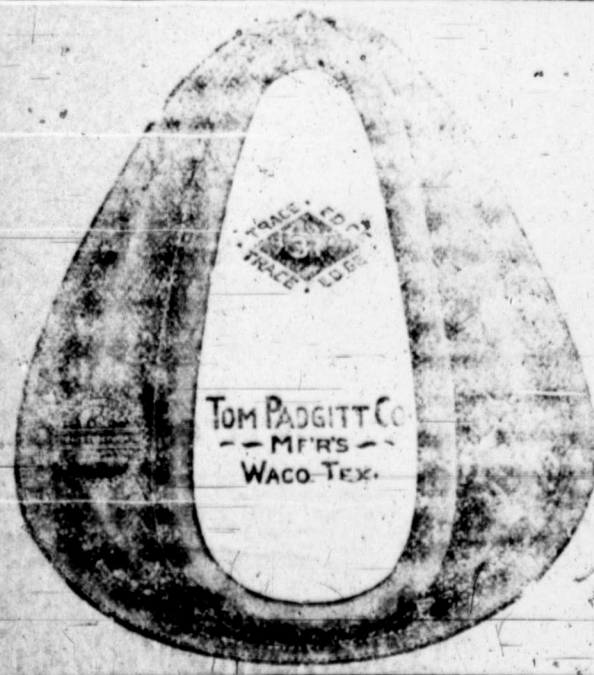
