ENORMOUS COTTON RECEIPTS
Galveston Proves Herself th Greatest Cotton Port in the World.
Receipts of cotton at the port of Galveston yesterday were 51,592 bales. Receipts at all ports were 90,205 bales indieating that this port yes terday received over 57 per cent of all cotton received at
United States ports. To date Galveston has received 1,487 , 845 bales, while the total received at all United States ports is $\mathbf{3 , 7 6 2 . 0 3 9}$ bales. This means that the port of Galveston has received practically 40 per cent of all cotton received at United States ports Orleans and Savannah tor season up to and yesterday's receipts are 1,384, 990 bales. This means that the port of Galveston has re
ceived 102,852 bales more to date than have both the othe large cotton ports of the coun try. These figures prove that Galveston is the greatest cot ton port in the world.

## REPORT OR EXPERIMENTS.

vernment Expert, Otto Olson Tells About Work of Toba 0 Growing in 1908

During the field season of 1908 some experiments were Hall's tobacco plantation near Nacogdoches, by' the Bureau of Plant Industry, U S. Department of Agriculture, in order to test the effect of diflerent combinations of ter quality of filler and wrapper cigar leat tobacco
For the filler experiment one halt acre of Orangeburg clay loam was selected and divided into tén plots of one twentieth an acre one The plots were planted i sed of the best strain Cuban filler type, acclimäted Texas conditions
The fertilizer used per plo and yield per acre. were a ollows:
Plot A: One ton stable manure, 10 lbs acid phosphate ost per acre $\$ 38.00$, yield pe acre 510 lbs.
