Meets Number of Citizens to Discuss Tobacco Packing House—Committee Appointed.

Mr. A. Tausig of Chicago, leaf dealer and cigar manufacturer, with Mr. Wineberg of Palestine, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon. At Mr. Tausig's request, Robert Lindsey, president of the Business League called a meeting of the business men at his office at 4:30 o'clock. The object was to discuss a tobacco packing and ware house for Nacogdoches. Mr. Tausig made a proposition to the business men, a committee composed of Messrs. E. A. Blount, John Schmidt and Tom Baker, being appointed to take the matter under advisement and submit in writing as soon as possible to Mr. Tausig's office in Chicago. The meeting was rather lengthy, the details of the matter being gone into thoroughly. Messrs. Tausig and Wineberg left this afternoon, the former for Beaumont, the latter returning to Palestine.

MR. COOPER RE-APPOINTED.

Will be Postmaster Another Four Years—Has Served as Such Since 1897.

In the list of Presidential appointments sent out from Washington yesterday, and as ratified by the Senate, appears the name of Harry H. Cooper, of this city. Captain Cooper was asked this morning about the matter, and stated that he had not received official notification nor a new bond, but had noticed his name in the list sent out by telegraph. It is probable that he will not get his bond etc. for several days. Mr. Cooper has been postmaster here for eleven years, receiving his first commission signed November 1st, 1897. He served about two months over five years, having been appointed by President McKinley, and was re-appointed by President Roosevelt, getting his commission January 20, 1903, this term having expired nearly two years ago. Mr. Cooper has made an excellent postmaster for the people and according to the departmental records has not a black mark against him. A reason for this is that he does nothing but attend to his post office duties. His many friends and the patrons will be pleased to learn that he will continue in the capacity. It is announced that no change will be made in the clerical department.

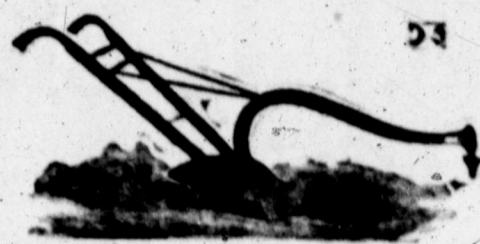
Disposes of Interest.

TOBACCO PACKERS INTERESTED

Some Are Preparing to Handle Portions of the Texas Crop in Near Future.

Galveston News.

Houston, Texas, Dec. 2.—Some of the largest packers of leaf tobacco in the United States are becoming interested in the Texas raised tobacco, and representatives of some of the packers are expected in East Texas soon to investigate conditions. As the experts of the federal government have spoken of the East Texas tobacco in terms of the highest praise, the promoters of the industry in Texas await the advent of the commercial experts with confidence.

Mr. George S. Bruce, president of the Texas Leaf Tobacco Growers' Association, is in receipt of letters from one of the largest packers in Florida, who has sales offices in New York and other large tobacco distributing centers, asking for samples of Texas raised tobacco, and stating that if the tobacco is all the government men say, he is satisfied that they can find use for it in unlimited quantities. Mr. Bruce sent him samples of tobacco raised near San Augustine, Palestine and Nacogdoches, and all of the available information regarding the conditions under which it is grown.

For shade-grown Texas tobacco, which is used exclusively for wrappers, 50c per pound is being paid, and for field-grown, which is used largely for fillers, although there is some that is fit for wrappers, 17c to 20c per pound is being obtained.

The future of the tobacco industry in East Texas seems to be bright. One of the hindrances of the present time, which is expected to be removed by local capital of the respective communities, is the absence of warehouses in which to store and cure tobacco. The San Augustine people are working on a plan for the construction of a warehouse, but the plan has not fully matured as yet, it is stated here.

Letter From a Carrier.

I am a Rural Letter Carrier and like the work splendidly when the weather isn't too bad. My route is 23 6-10 miles long and the roads are fairly good with the exception of about five miles. I collect and deliver between four and five thousand pieces of mail per month. I think I have the best lot of patrons in the county. They seldom ever grumble unless I fail to bring that letter they are expecting. I often find water melons and fruit of various kinds waiting at the boxes for me; all of the carriers know that these are greatly appreciated. Now before closing I want to suggest a few don'ts for the patrons residing on the several rural routes over the county: 1. Don't hang your boxes to a tree with a spur root extending out so as to prevent a carrier driving up to it. Put your box on a level place by the roadside and at such a height that it will permit the wheel of an ordinary vehicle to pass under it. The department requires this. 2. Don't ask your carrier to deliver a note on the route for you without first putting a 2 cent stamp on it as there is no drop-letter system on the rural route. It is a violation of the law for the carrier to carry anything that is mailable without postage. Your carrier don't mind accommodating you but he can't afford to violate

the law to save a postage stamp. 3. Don't ask the carrier to look good for your mail in the office before leaving in the morning. He will carry all the post master gives him. Its a violation of the law to do otherwise.

Last, but not least, don't let your post roads go down. It won't hurt you to cut a stump out of the road or patch a mud hole, if you are over 45 or not subject to road duty.

The department is paying \$30,000,000 a year to have this part of the service carried on and it should be appreciated by all patrons to that extent that they will keep up the roads and read two or three good newspapers.

It may be true that lots of juries do not do just what, possibly, should be done, but it is evident that when they do their duties, it is not known then whether their verdict will hold good or not. Nine out of ten, big cases at least, are urged for new trials; if refused, are appealed, and that's when the rub comes. Technicalities play a most prominent part when it comes to "a point of law is a point." Whether or not the condition of affairs is the result of our statutes and whether or not a plainer, more simple code is needed, are questions, but it is plain to all that some change, some where is needed. Laying aside the matter of thwarting justice, the things as carried on this day are very expensive, and this expense burden falls on the tax payers. The cost of maintaining our courts is much greater than the cost of any other government department, and for the reason that they seem not to be final; are not decisive. Court trials come nearer representing perpetual motion than anything else. The trouble that the Tribune speaks of is not confined to one county or locality but is a prevailing menace, and a very expensive one.

OCCASIONALLY we hear ladies complaining of the dirty, dusty sidewalks and tobacco spit "puddles" that have to be waded or gone around. As a rule the sidewalks are kept pretty clean, are washed off every morning and swept several times daily; but once in a while a sure enough mean looking side walk may be seen. Of course such are always avoided by the ladies if possible and a "tobacco pond" is enough to drive them a block out of the way. Tobacco chewing is all right to the man who wants to do so, but he ought to spit off the side walk or carry a spittoon with him.
