 Prospects For 1arge Increase in Acreage Very Flatteringhr. Mciess aad His Packing House.How about the tobacco business and the prospects for the tobacco business, said T. H. MeNes. this morning," is H. MeNes, this morning. is pretty-good and the prespects are most flattering. Since opening the ware and packing house here, I am pleased to state, my line of work has been all and even more than I anticipated, and 1 now have on hand $\$ 15,000$ worth of the product and which will be worth twice th at much when thoroughly cured.'
It would be a splendid sight to anyone, and especially to the uninitiated, to pay a visit to the buildings on Church street that have been and spacking house. With 4500 square teet of floor space-two buildings each 30 $\times 75$-there is now but ample room tor the present buik. The first building has the gentleman's office petitioned in tront and to the rear of which is the sweat room equipped throughout with a eam out-fit and other nec ssary fixtures. The sweat oom is arranged for light too, despite the closeness. The ricks of tobacco, each about 4,000 pounds, are noticably arranged tor convenience and tor the best and most rapid effect for the curing. About 16,000 pounds of the product is wrapper, the remainder, an equal amount possibly, s filler. The adjoin ing building is the stripping and assorting room, wher s me twenty hands are now at work. The buildings rep resent a regular "bee-hive" of industry and while it is only a beginning, the tobacco ware house and packing plant will prove a great thing tor this section and will cause a bigger acreage quicker than most anything else. Mr. T. H. McNess, the manager and proprietor, is a thorough to bacco man, khows the indus try from start to completion, and the location of this plant means a sure and prompt market tor the product. The acreage in thi, county the present year may tot be quite as great as some pecple predict, but it will prove a sur prise to most folk. With an average season, it is sate to
predict a crop of from one to one and a hạlf miltion pounds.
