NO POSTOFFICE SITE.

Chief of Architectural Department at Washington Not Pleased With Lots Offered For the Federal Building.

Richard Fourchay, of Washington, head of the architectural department of the government, was in the city Saturday for the purpose of inspecting the sites offered for the erection of a post office building. The gentleman was armed with a complete and detailed map of Nacogdoches (how, when or where he got it is still a puzzle) and knew well the location of every plot of ground that had been submitted. He visited these places, looking over the ground carefully and investigating matters ament such. To the great disappointment of the citizens, it might be said that none of them were found available. Mr. Fourchay stated that he could not but make an adverse report on every site, as everything, location, surroundings, etc., was against any of them being available. The government is very particular about the location of their buildings, as well as their erection; every detail must be worked out to a fine point, but when improvements are made, they are the best and most modern and are kept up for all time to come at the government's expense. It is understood that some of the citizens have another proposition—the choicest location of all—but whether or not it will materialize is yet a question. As things now stand, Nacogdoches is not any nearer a Federal building than a year ago—unless the "new proposal" makes a go.

A Big Increase.

In just four days nearly 500 poll tax receipts have been issued by Collector Brantley, and if the same interest is shown the remaining days of the month the total will reach 3,100 by Saturday night. GROWING GOOD CORN.

James D. Greer Offers Premium to Nacogdoches County Farmers—A Wonderful Awakening.

James D. Greer, agricultural agent in this county for the Government, was in the city yesterday from his farm near Appleby. Mr. Greer is not in an official capacity at present, unfortunately on account of the rules of the department he is out two months of the year, returning to such labors March 1st. Notwithstanding this, he is continuing the work as far as he can, at his own expense, and simply for the benefit it will be to the agriculturists of this section. He is extremely enthusiastic in the work and is very optimistic too, regarding the future of this county as an extra developed farming center. The past week or two he has conducted a number of meetings and now has some half dozen dates ahead for gatherings. The outlook he considers very flattering and especially in the corn growing line. To induce this particular feature of crop, he has offered a premium of \$5.00 for the ten best ears of corn grown this season from the Indiana seed and which is considered the best in the world. Mr. Greer is also expecting other premiums to be offered the farmers, on corn and other products, and more especially if a fair is organized. In speaking of these matters, the gentleman

among other things said:

"A person who is not in direct touch can have no idea at the wonderful improvement over even last year. The farmers are awakening; they are showing an interest in their own work and in the effort of the government. It is no trouble now to get a crowd and one that wants to learn and to co-operate, while heretofore, such was almost impossible. People are preparing their lands earlier and better; they are plowing deeper and seem to intend to do some "intense" farming. My opinion is that Nacogdoches county will be a banner corn country in the course of a very few years, if the lines now followed are continued." In reference to his official work, Mr. Greer stated that Mr. Proctor of Tyler would join him in March and together they will conduct some "field schools" and visit the different sections of the county in the interest of the co-operation method.

DEATH OF JAMES STRODE.

Gentleman Who Passed Away Thursday an Old Resident—County Commissioner.

The death of County Commissioner James Strode came suddenly it might be said, having taken sick last Tuesday night, dying Thursday night. He was an ex-Confederate soldier and a native of this county. He served with Captain Raguett, Company H.—who afterwards became colonel and was killed in the battle of Glorietta, Mexico. Mr. Strode leaves a wife and two living children and 10 grand children. Mrs. Strode is a sister of John P. Davidson of this city. Mr. Strode was one of the most substantial citizens of this county and section and was a conservative, yet progressive man. He was just serving his first term as county commissioner having been elected the past November. A number of people from this city attended the funeral which took place Saturday at Appleby.

EVERY tillable acre of land in Nacogdoches county ought to be in cultivation. It ought to be producing something, and until a greater progress can not be as rapid as it should. More farmers and intense farming is what Nacogdoches county—and all of East Texas—must have. Pay your poll tax.

THEM as your rich neighbors are with them. Put so much dignity, sincerity, kindness, virtue and love into your simple and inexpensive home that its members will never miss the costly flipperies and showy adornments of fashion, and be happier in the cozy and comfortable apartments than most of our wealthy neighbors are in their splendid apartments.

THE person who gives all that he earns back to the world, is oft times called shiftless, while his neighbor, who hoards his earnings, is idolized for the act. Some times this proves the reverse of what is proper; the former may be the best citizen and business man of the two. What the world considers of a man is many times mistaken for what he really is.

"ETERNAL vigilance is the price of success," is an old adage but the truth of it is demonstrated every day. Keep a working, keep a pushing, keep a hustling—it will make you a winner in the end. Let's get busy for Nacogdoches.

ING some hustling, boosting—work for the city. Cut off both feet and then count the toes left. That's the number exactly. Discredit! No, not to any one's discredit but held against the whole and entire city. This is all in good faith and said merely to call attention. The business interests, the citizens—should take a new hitch in affairs. The Business League should be revived strongly—and revive some other things strongly. ONE of the most valuable assets of a city or town is a good, live business organization—no matter under what name it may go,—and one of the biggest liabilities, or drawbacks, any city or town ever had, is a dead organization. No person can be so unthoughtful as to believe that such an organization can do every thing or even do great things right in the beginning. But it is certain that much progress can be caused, much immigration turned this way, many industries influenced and lots of things of real worth gotten for our city and county, by and through a get-up-and-go business league. What has been done, can be done again. Get in line, become identified with the movement for a bigger Nacogdoches, get membership in the Business League and do a citizen's part.

THE REMEDY OFFERED BY DEMONSTRATION WORK.

(Next Week, Special Features: Effect and Natural Results)

What primary remedy for the improvement of rural conditions ought a republic to propose where all the adult male citizens are expected to exercise through the ballot the functions of a ruler? Evidently it should be one that can directly and immediately benefit all the people. More than nine tenths of the rural population of the South are limited by their conditions to an education provided by the country district school. What help can be given them that will be immediate and will benefit both parents and children? It must be such that will reach the farm and appeal to the interests of the farmer. It must find the man and not compel the man to find it. It must be a home remedy.

The only remedy that can be successfully applied to help all the rural people, one that will be effective and immediate, is to increase the net earnings of farmers and farm laborers. The paramount issue now is how most wisely and effectively to aid all the rural people. If each farmer is shown how to produce twice as much to the acre as he now produces and at less cost, it will be a profit in which all rural classes will share and will be the basis of the greatest reform ever known to rural life.

How can the knowledge of better agricultural methods be conveyed to the masses in a way so effective that the methods will be accepted and their practice become common? For many years the United States Department of Agriculture, the agricultural college, the experiment stations, the agricultural press, the farmers' institutes, and the national and State bulletins upon agriculture have thrown light upon almost every topic relating to the farm. These have been of great assistance to farmers who are alert and progressive, but the masses, especially in the South, have scarcely been affected. There came a time under cotton boll weevil conditions when it was found necessary to reach and influence the poorer class. The cooperative demonstration plan was then tested.

The Farmers' Cooperative Demonstration Work aims at several things:

- (1) To reform agriculture and make it an occupation of profit and pleasure.
- (2) To improve rural conditions.
- (3) To broaden and enrich rural life.
- (4) To make the farm attractive and country residence desirable.

As organized under the Bureau of Plant Industry the working forces of the Farmers' Cooperative Demonstration Work consist now of 1 director with assistants, 10 state agents, and 188 district and local agents. Local agents must be practical farmers and thoroughly instructed in their duties by the state and district agents. Semi-annually State meetings

of agents are called for instructions, at which the director or an assistant from Washington is present. Weekly reports show work accomplished each day are made by all agents to the director.

The campaigns for the ensuing year are planned in September, and active work commences in October by calling public meetings in every district to be worked, at which is shown the great advantage to all the people of increasing the crop yield two, three, or four fold, and it is made clear that this can be done by adopting better methods. In country villages the banker, the merchant, and the editor join with the leading farmers of the section in endorsing the progressive plans of the demonstration plots of one or more acres are located so as to place a sample of the best farming in each neighborhood of a county or district. There must be enough of these to allow every farmer to see one or more during the crop growing period. The necessary work on the plot must be done by the farmer and not by the Government agent, because the whole object lesson is thereby brought closer to the people. The demonstrating farmer understands it better because he does the work and his neighbors believe that what he has done they can do.

FIELD SCHOOLS.

Previous notice by letter is given to all the cooperating farmers in a neighborhood to meet the agent on a certain date at a given demonstration farm, where the crop and plans are thoroughly discussed. This is called a "field school" and has been marvelously effective in arousing local interest. At such meetings and on all occasions where the agents meet farmers, the following fundamental requirements for good farming are discussed by the aid of notes sent out from the central office:

- (1) Prepare a deep and thoroughly pulverized seed bed, well drained; break in fall to the depth of 8, 10, or 12 inches, according to the soil, with implements that will not bring too much of the subsoil to the surface. The foregoing depths should be reached gradually.
- (2) Use seed of the best variety, intelligently selected and carefully stored.
- (3) In cultivated crops give the rows and the plants in the rows a space suited to the plant, the soil, and the climate.
- (4) Use intensive tillage during the growing period of the crops.
- (5) Secure a high content of humus in the soil by the use of legumes, barnyard manure, farm refuse, and commercial fertilizer.
- (6) Carry out a systematic crop rotation with a winter cover crop.
- (7) Accomplish more work in a day by using more horsepower and better implements.
- (8) Increase the farm stock to the extent of utilizing all

the waste product and idle lands of the farm.

(9) Produce all the food required for the men and animals on the farm.

(10) Keep an account of each farm product, in order to know from which the gain or loss arise.

These field schools are bringing about a revolution. A meeting of the farmers of a township called at a home to discuss a field crop and to inspect and compare home conditions can not fail to place local public opinion upon a higher level, and that is the principal opinion to be considered in influencing the farmers.

Instead of expending time and force in molding state, city, and county influences which have but slight practical results in changing rural conditions, the Farmers' Cooperative Demonstration Work makes a direct attack on the men who should reform. It reaches them in a practical way and establishes a different local standard of excellence for farming and for living.

Tobacco Growing and Kindred Topics.

In a general way, it looks like there is something doing among tobacco people here. We can't be very definite just now, but we may soon have something of importance to write about.

We can say now that the industry of tobacco growing is a growing industry. It grows more extensive. The farmers are getting onto it more generally. They are busy now preparing and planting seed beds, getting fertilizer and other necessities, and preparing their lands.

Texas Cuban seed tobacco for fine cigar filler, also shade grown tobacco for fine cigar wrappers are now the most popular. But the weed known as hybrid is also widely grown. There will be an increased acreage of all these species this year, and we now proclaim tobacco growing as a leader and a stayer.

We already have in operation a first-class packing house in which any farmer may have his crop sweated. Another such enterprise is almost assured. Both will be operated by experts and in the most up to date modes.

There are two or more parties considering the planting of patches here in town. This has heretofore been successfully tried.

We have two operating cigar factories here in town, and buyers for cigar factories and leaf dealers are investigating. Inquiries are pouring in, and thus it goes and thus it grows. Our East Texas red lands now stand in line with Cuban tobacco lands, even the famous *vuelta abajo*, Pinar del Rio, or whatever it may be called.

Prospectors are here now from foreign and distant lands, sent here by the U. S. authorities from Washington, D. C., who are familiar with our advantages by actual personal inspection.

POLL TAX PAYMENTS.

County are Both Light to Far—Lots of Property Tax Receipts Being Issued

Unless the next eight days witness a big increase in all tax payments, the number of receipts issued from county collectors office will fall less than the 1907 or 1908 number. Up to last night, January 21, 1907 had been paid with a daily issuance of barely more than 100. In 1907 there were 2879 and last year a few more than that. The property tax receipts issued up to last night numbered 2856 against 2948 last year on January 24. However by this night it is expected that the number will equal, if not exceed the 1908. As to the amount in dollars and cents it cannot be arrived at before the end of the month. In reference to poll taxes, Mr. Brantley stated that he will close his office at 12 o'clock Saturday night, January 30th, and therefore will not be open Sunday. There are about 5000 assessments for poll tax in the county, and about 500 exemptions, giving the county a voting strength of 5,500 if all paid up. In the city tax collector's office, things have been moving lively of late, with regards to property tax payments but the number of poll tax receipts up to last night are only 158. There are 505 poll tax assessments in the city of Nacogdoches and between 75 and 100 exemptions. They are paying at the rate of a dozen or fifteen a day, making hardly possible that more than 300 will be issued, unless some "waking up" is done. The property rolls show \$16,758.52 due the city, out of which has so far been collected by City Marshal Matthews.

CHARGES OF BURGLARY.

Jim Horn, Alias Jim Harris, Negro, Arrested By Deputy Mart Andes Near Rockland.

Deputy Sheriff Mart Andes came in yesterday afternoon from Rockland, bringing with him a negro by the name of Jim Horn, charged with committing a number of burglaries in the vicinity of Clevenger's mill and Lingo a few days ago. At the former place the negro went into two or three houses getting a six shooter, razor, watch and chain, and some other little things, and at Lingo last Sunday he appropriated a Stetson hat. Deputy Andes was notified and immediately went after him. At Clevenger's mill he was informed that Horn had gone to Colmesneil where his parents reside. Deputy Andes then went to that place but soon learned that the negro had not been there, so he came back overland to Rockland, arriving just before daylight. Learning that the "wanted Horn" had previously passed a foot, going south, he likewise took it a-foot, overtook the alleged burglar about four miles from Rockland. When caught, the negro was sitting on the railroad putting on his shoes. He admitted being the right party and on him was found the pistol, razor, watch, etc. He had a letter addressed to "Jim Harris" but when questioned as to why he had an assumed name, refused to answer. Horn is a big negro, fully six feet tall, brown skin and blue eyes, and it is possible that he is "wanted" at other places too. He stated that he had been in twenty-five jails, including the one at Waco, Houston, Woodville, Shreveport and Memphis, Tenn. What he was jailed so many times for, he did not tell, and he claims to be clear of all charges except the burglaries in this county. It is likely that Tyler county authorities will want Horn on a "pistol toting" charge when this county has been satisfied.

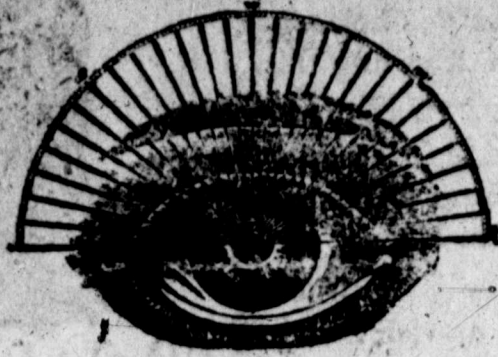

LOVES OLD NACOGDOCHES

Former Citizen Cannot Forget The Place and People—Land Booming There.

Beeville, Tex., Jan. 25, '09. Nacogdoches Sentinel, Nacogdoches, Texas.

Enclose find \$1.00, please put to my credit. I receive several weeklies but no secular paper that comes to our home is appreciated like The Sentinel. Thinking it would be of interest to some of your readers, to hear from me, will say that in my ministerial work I have no complaint to make. More than 400 have joined the Baptist church in my meetings in less than two years and the great majority of the people have been exceedingly kind to us but no place will ever seem like dear old Nacogdoches and her people whom I labored with and for so long, and if I could have my health I would go back and finish my life there.

This is a fine country but hard on a poor man. It is so dry here a man has to live here a year or two to learn how to farm. In four weeks from today all the up-to-date farmers will have finished planting. In our community out here they have almost solved the boll weevil problem, early planting and burning every cotton stalk, root and branch before Christmas. Some men at Gregory and Tatt, Texas, have averaged a bale to the acre, or near that for 10 years, but they stir things fall, winter and spring and rest in the summer. Everything is high here; it is expensive to live but the folks spend their money freely. Land has advanced 50 percent in two years. Land agents are in clover; whole train loads of prospectors from the north and west come in week after week. The only trouble is not enough of them are Baptists, but some 60 have fallen in love with us and our doctrine down here who were not Baptist and joined in with us and have been earnest in the work. Tell those who bought Simmon, City property, there is a strong probability of its being a good investment soon. Would be glad to answer any letters of inquiry or other kinds concerning this country. I am trying to sell out here, if I do will go some 150 miles southeast perhaps to Palacios, but my address until June will be Beeville.

Some day I shall come back to Nacogdoches, when the end comes it not before, and I shall then expect my Masonic and Baptist brothers to take charge. If I can't live there I want to sleep there; that is, my body until the Master comes again.
