Prof. W. E. Feazell's school will close here Friday with an exhibition beginning Friday at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and lasting up in the night.

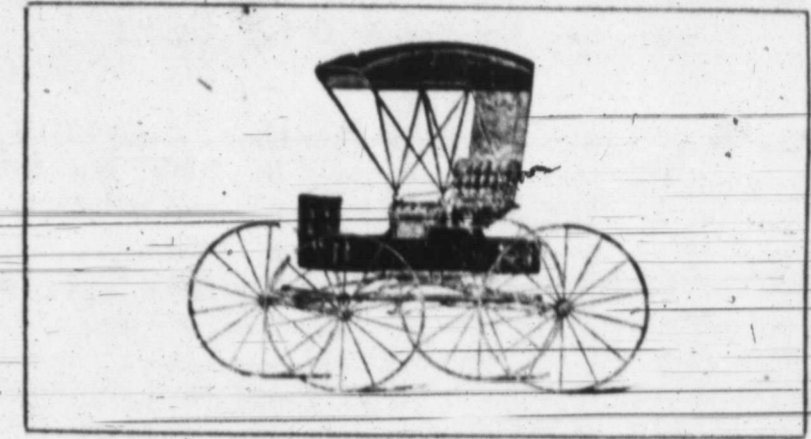
A good shower of rain and warm sunshine would be very beneficial to the farmers. Some are wanting to plant cotton but fear it would not come up, the ground being too dry.

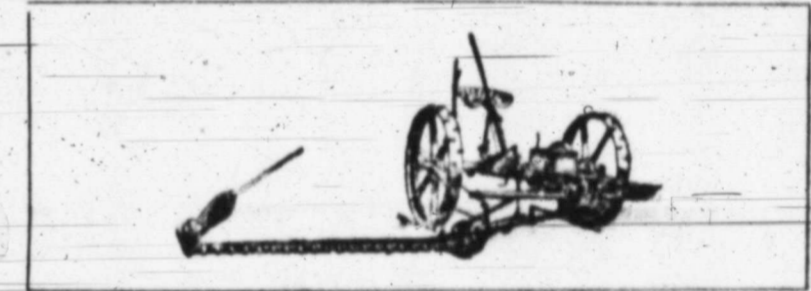

PRETTY AQUA VITAE PARK OPENS ITS GATES MONDAY

Nacogdoches Resort Presents Scene of Beauty and Promises to be Great At- traction--Analysis of Waters Shows Wonderful Medicinal Properties

ARRANGEMENTS BEING MADE FOR A GALLA OCCASION

Railroads Will Put on Special Rates For Formal Opening and Prominent Officials and Other Noted Personages Have Been Invited--Several Thousand People Expected to Attend and Enjoy the Health Giving Liquids

After several weeks of intense labor, the kind necessary for the accomplishment of anything of import, the Aqua Vitae Park is ready for the public, and Monday morning, April 5th, at 8:30 o'clock the gates of the pleasure place will be thrown wide. Such was the announcement today by Messrs. Robert Lindsey and June C. Harris, instigators of the affair and managers of the place. The difference in appearance now, and what this same plot of ground was four short weeks ago, is rather striking to say the least of it, and a word picture of its present looks, given some weeks ago, would hardly have been credited. Yet the change has come; wrought by the ingenuity of man or men, for it is ingenuity to convert a swamp,--almost marsh,--into as pretty and attractive a place as now greets the eye. And this is not all. What is done is merely a starter of what will be done, its present plans do not fail, and there is small likelihood of that. To really do justice to the place, however, its attractiveness, waters, etc., it is necessary to detail, minutely almost, and this we will do, beginning with the location.

FOURTEEN ACRES OF NOTHING.
On the west side of the pretty Lanana creek, south of the public road and only a few blocks from the city, there lies a body of land comprising about fourteen acres, and until recently, owned by several parties. The land has been of little value, in one sense of the word, as there was but one or two houses on it, its main use being a pasture. "Uncle" Charlie Bird, a well known negro round town and a unique character, especially when it comes to anything in connection with the mineral wells, purchased a piece of ground not a great many months back, and he and his wife made that place home. "Uncle" Charlie dug him a well in September 1908, but when the water vein showed up, the liquid had a peculiar taste--and effect--and the old negro and others of his race, had some faint suspicions that the stuff wouldn't do to drink, possibly having some connection with the wonderful spring discovered years ago by the Catholic Priest. Being as resourceful as it is possible for an "old slave time darkey," the old negro began to peddle the water around town, dealing it out to the sick and afflicted, in such quantities as they desired and in such ways as he could. Not a great deal of attention was paid the matter however, and little did anyone think the long stretch of marshy, swampy place along the banks of the creek would ever be utilized to any very important advantage. Describing the land as marshy and swampy is done so advisedly, though such it was despite the fact that that particular part of the city is much

higher than some other sections, in which are located fine homes and palatial residences.

COMPANY ACQUIRES LAND.
Some few weeks ago "Uncle" Charley conceived the idea of disposing of his property, or a portion of it, and laid the matter before Messrs. Robert Lindsey and June C. Harris. These gentlemen took the matter under advisement, and after some consultation, decided to purchase the property and therefore organized a stock company, they being at the head. The lands were acquired, about seven hundred feet fronting on Main street and running back toward Hayward Mill taking in fourteen acres. The west line meanders along the Lanana creek, south line being partly formed by that stream. Immediately work was begun in clearing away the houses and other stuff from the place, preparatory to improving and making the site into a park. A large force of workmen were put on the job, and have been at it since, until now the place presents a scene of real pleasure instead of an eyesore as it formerly was.

WATER IS ANALYZED.
In the meantime, or rather previous to the improvements, several jugs of the "peculiar" water was sent to the state chemist for analysis, and to other chemists, as well as was analyzed by local physicians. The reports were most gratifying and caused a little bubble of glad feelings to exist with the new proprietors. ORIGIN OF THE NAME.
The name given the park and the water, Aqua Vitae, was suggested to Messrs. Lindsey and Harris by Dr. Joseph E. Mayfield of this city, who says there is a tradition, interesting too, in reference to the water of the Lanana. In the prehistoric days of Nacogdoches, an ad-

venturous Catholic Priest was exploring the wild land, accompanied by a band of associates and owing to a great drought no water could be found and the little band was about to perish. They found no water in the Lanana creek to quench their racking thirst and prostrated themselves and prayed. While they were thus engaged, still prostrate and faces upon the grounds, the Priest stole away and went up the dry bed of the creek, returning to his prostrate companions and faithful band, with uplifted hands he cried, "Ho, every one that thirsteth come drink freely of the water of life." They arose and followed the priest to a place where he smote upon a rock in the bluff in the creek as he prayed, and cold, clear spring water gushed forth. The place was called "Ojo Santissimo" (Holy Spring) and it is there today. Thus the name, Aqua Vitae, (Water of Life) was suggested, and adopted. The spring is but a short distance from the mineral wells.

MASTER HAND OF MAN.
The scene that now greets the eye of passers by and visitors is indeed a pleasing one and but shows just what can be done in the way of

plants. Nearer the center of the park, flower beds have been laid, special attention having been given to the arrangement of all these beautiful spots, and which appeal already to the artistic temperments of the hundreds of people that daily pay visits to the place.

LOCATION OF FAMOUS WELLS.
Almost in the center of the beautiful park is located the famous mineral wells, the one discovered by the old negro, and known as No. 1, and near it the No. 2, recently put down by the new owners. A large pavillion has been erected over No. 1, the curb has been extended high, a pump has been put in and other conveniences and comforts for the thirsty folks. At this pavillion is dispensed the cool, sparkling liquid, the Aqua Vitae, destined to place this city in the topmost niche as a health resort and a place to spend delightful days--any and all seasons of the year. Well No. 2 is but a few steps from the original, and just as soon as it is possible for the workmen to do so, the pavillion will be extended to take in this latter drinking fountain. The water in No. 2 is similar in taste to that of the other well, but the

turies almost ago. The rivulet that feeds the Lanana from the fountain spring is to be beautified with moss banks and across it will be built a real rustic foot bridge with grapevine bannisters. The location of the spring is in the big grove, a most inspiring one and calculated to make the imaginative minds of both young and old forget all else than surroundings.

THE BIG OPENING DAY.
So engrossed with work has the management been the past few weeks that but little attention has been given to details, but within the next week possibly, the date for the formal opening of the park will be decided and all plans worked out. It is already settled that it will be about the middle of this month. Prominent railroad officials have been invited for the occasion, including those of the Southern Pacific, Santa Fe, Cotton Belt, and I. & G. N., besides other personages of renown. The railroads will put on special low rates for that day, the occasion will be thoroughly advertised, far and wide, and efforts made to accommodate the several thousand people that are sure to come. The program for that day has not yet been entirely arranged, but it is safe to say it will be a most interesting one. It is understood that some of the railroads will run special trains in here, at least from within a hundred miles, making it an extra inducement for the people to visit Nacogdoches, enjoy the Aqua Vitae Park and drink of the health giving waters. This occasion will not be for the visitors exclusively, of course, but features of an exceptional interest to home folks will be included, insuring a crowd of our own citizens. A day of recreation, of pleasure and of pastime, is what is being planned and nothing that will add in any way to the enjoyment of the crowds will be neglected. It is possible too, that there will be other attractions for the opening date, aside from the ones now arranged and in the state of planning.

DISPOSITION OF THE WATERS.
The management informs us that there will be no charge for entrance, the entire grounds being at the disposal of the public at all times. This news is gratifying indeed and will be hailed with delight by all, inasmuch as the people of this city have yearned for just such a place as is being made. There is no place,--or at least has not been--where folks could go to rest and spend a quiet hour. So aside from the beneficial waters, the park as a resort will certainly prove invaluable. As to the disposition of the waters,--of course it will be sold,--as is the case with all mineral waters. That will be the only source of revenue however, as nothing else at present connected with the place will have any admission fee, attached. As to the price of these waters it can be truthfully said they are as reasonable as any of the wells in the South, and much more so than some of them. A great deal of it is now being daily used, not only by local folks, but outsiders, the amount shipped, almost on every train out of the city, being rather a surprise. The benefits to be derived from the use of such are numerous, this fact being attested to by Nacogdoches people. Mrs. A. V. Muller will have charge of the well, beginning Monday and will have all the assistance necessary for the accommodation of the public. At present the waters from the first well are being bottled, but as soon as

the pavillion is extended to take in the second well, a regular bottling plant and shipping house will be arranged.

A FAMOUS HEALTH RESORT.
What has already been done, is but a small matter when compared with what will be, provided no unforeseen hinderance presents itself. The bed of the creek is to be changed among the first things, thereby straightening the course of the Lanana and making the drainage even better than it is. At no distant day too, it is proposed to put in a bathing pool just west of the wells, where the bend is. It is also proposed to erect a band stand right away and later, as the patronage justifies, other features will be added. The location of the park is after all, a most ideal one and is going to prove a very popular place from the very opening. The waters are fine. This is vouched for by the chemists and the local physicians. The opportunities for making Nacogdoches a famous resort are great, and much capital has been put at the command of the management for the making. This city and section is certainly a proper locality for a health resort and the climate and other extremely gratifying features places it above and beyond any other resort that can be mentioned. Nacogdoches with her historical spots, too numerous for detail at this time, adds lustre to the brilliant opportunities now existing, and there is but little doubt that a pleasure and health resort here would soon be the leading one in the state. Neither money nor pains will be spared in making this city, and this pretty place now improved, the one spot around which will cluster thousands of people, seeking both health and enjoyment.

converting a "noplac" into a thing of beauty,--and a joy forever. A high solid wall fence has been built entirely around the resort, excepting along the line of the Lanana and the front. A spring, gushing forth the purest cold waters from old mother earth, is a distinct feature, and when this particular spot has undergone the improvements now in mind, it will indeed be an appealing one to the lover of nature and her untold beauties. The spring has been opened freely and will be walled in with rock--taken from the creek near by, from where is supposed to have come a portion of the stone that was used in building the "Old Stone Fort," two cen-

BILL REPORTED FAVORABLE.

Dotson Asks For an Appropriation For Experimental Work in This County—\$1000 For Two Years.

The tobacco industry in this county has a chance for recognition at the hands of the state at last, according to a dispatch received yesterday from representative Homer A. Dotson, at Austin. The Federal Government has maintained an experimental station here for the past several years but seems to be a little leary of the work on account of the apathy existing among some of the people, and had almost decided to cut out all efforts here in the future. Prominent tobacco growers and others interested in the industry went to work, or learning such, with the determination that something should be done and more interest shown by the people. After some correspondence it was learned that the Federal Government would not withdraw from this county if the state would show any concern and aid in the work;—in other words if Texas would appropriate some money to help carry on the experiment. The Tobacco Association of the county at their recent meeting decided to petition the Texas Legislature for a small sum, and in a few days the instrument was forwarded to Austin to Homer A. Dotson, with the request that a bill be introduced asking for an appropriation. Two thousand dollars was the amount needed to cover a period of two or three years but the Representative was instructed to ask for half, if the first amount could not be secured. Mr. Dotson immediately framed a bill calling for two thousand dollars and which was referred to the proper committee. Yesterday afternoon George T. McNess, president of the Nacogdoches Tobacco Association, who has been one of the main movers in the transaction, received a telegram from Representative Dotson informing him that the committee had reported the bill favorably, but had cut down the sum to one thousand for two years.

While this amount is not as much as was hoped for, still it will aid greatly in experimental work in the tobacco business in this county. The message received yesterday is as follows: Austin, Texas, April 1, 1909. George T. McNess, Nacogdoches, Texas. Bill unanimously reported favorably from House Committee on Agriculture, for one thousand dollars for two years. Homer A. Dotson.

Child Died This Morning.

Link Harrison, the year old son of Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Reese, died this morning at 5 o'clock of bronchial pneumonia. Announcement of interment has been made for tomorrow afternoon at Melrose. This is the second child these most estimable people have lost by death of late, making the grief beyond comprehension almost. -REBUILDING THE MILL.

E. B. and Lee Hayward Here to Superintend The Work—Three Million Feet of Logs on Hand.

Work preparatory to rebuilding the big Hayward lumber mill has already begun, large crews of workmen being busy clearing away the debris, repairing the damaged places and erecting the little plant. E. B. Hayward, president of the company and Lee Hayward, vice president and general manager are here to look after the work, the former arriving yesterday while the latter has been here several days. To a Sentinel reporter this morning Mr. E. B. Hayward stated that work on the big new plant would begin as early as possible and the structure would be pushed to an early completion. A small mill has been purchased and will arrive today, this for the purpose of cutting the timber for the big plant. The entire mill is to be as modern as it is possible to make it and will be similar to the one burned. Mr. Hayward places their loss at a little more than \$100,000. They have on hand 3,000,000 feet of logs now.

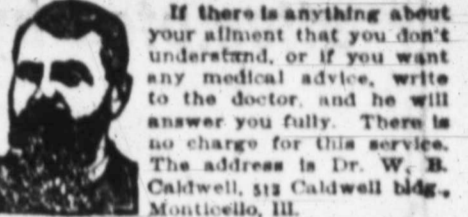

A. Y. Matthews Re-Elected Marshall and J. F. Floyd, J. R. McKinney and J. G. Orton Named as Councilmen—403 Votes Polled.

The amount of votes cast in yesterday's city election proved quite a surprise, there being a few more than four hundred polled. At noon it looked as if the number would barely go half that amount, and at three o'clock it looked as if the number would reach three hundred. At five o'clock however things were some more interesting and voters were hustling around with an air of vimness indicating that the friends of every candidate were determined. The vote is considered a fairly good one, about an 80 per cent ballot. No counting was done until the polls closed at 6:30 o'clock and it was 10:30 almost before the result became known. The announcement that but an hour would likely be consumed in counting, was short, as it took nearly four times that long. The marshals race was the closest, of course, the votes of all the candidates showing that a total of 403 ballots were deposited. In this race A. Y. Matthews was successful, being re-elected by a majority of 34 votes. In the election for aldermen J. F. Floyd led the ticket by 24 votes, J. R. McKinney running second and J. G. Orton third. Bill Calls For \$2,000.
George T. McNess, secretary and treasurer of the Nacogdoches Tobacco Growers Association, is in receipt of a letter from Representative Homer A. Dotson, at Austin, stating that the bill recently introduced by him, as mentioned in the Sentinel a few days ago was misquoted. Instead of calling for \$1,000 for tobacco experimental work in this county, it calls for \$2,000 for two years, just double the amount reported. This error was the result of transmission of the telegram possibly as the message read only \$1,000. We are glad to note the correction and still more glad the amount is larger than at first thought, as \$2,000 will prove much more adequate in carrying out the work intended and which ought to be done.


