# NACOGDOCHES TOBACCO INDUSTRY

Texas Legislature Appropriates \$2,000 for Two Years for Demonstration Work—Bill Passes Both Houses and is Signed by Governor Within 23 Hours—Splendid Achievement of Association.

The biggest feather of them all has been added to the hat of the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers Association, in the recent appropriation accomplishment at the hands of the Texas Legislature. It means more than can at present be said or imagined and only will the people of this immediate county and section be benefitted, but the industry in all parts of Texas will reap large shares of the excellent results. Just a few more than thirty days ago, the organization of this county conceived the idea of getting state aid, along the line of demonstration work in this county, so a petition was gotten up, signed by every member of the Association in the county and every tobacco grower, and addressed to the Texas Legislature asking for an appropriation of \$2,000. This was brought about by the announcement that the Federal Government was to withdraw their experimental works on account of the apathy of the people in reference to such, and in reference to the tobacco industry in general. The Federal Government had promised to continue their efforts, however, if the state would assist, and on this latter, aid from Texas was solicited. The petition was forwarded to Representative Homer A. Dotson, together with several hundred of the delightful smokers, grown, cured and manufactured in this county. Results were foreseen at the beginning. Mr. Dotson introduced a bill and which is as follows:

By Dotson. H. B. No. 115.

In the House—March 31, 1909, read first time and referred to Committee on Agriculture; April 1, 1909, reported favorably.

An act to provide for the maintenance of an agricultural experiment station for the experimental culture of tobacco, to be located in the Seventeenth Representative District, and making necessary appropriation therefore; and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. The Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas are hereby authorized and directed to assist the National Government in maintaining an experiment station for the purpose of conducting experimental culture of tobacco and carrying on researches and experiments in tobacco growing under the direction of the National Government's expert in the Seventeenth Representative District.

Sec. 2. There is hereby appropriated out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the support of the State Government, the sum of two thousand (\$2000) dollars to be used in assisting the National Government's expert in demonstrating and experimenting the culture of tobacco. Said

Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas are hereby authorized use one thousand (\$1000) dollars per annum for a period of two years in defraying the expenses of the National Government's expert in demonstrating and experimenting to the actual settler the best methods of raising tobacco for the market.

Sec. 3. The fact that the National Government has conducted experiments in tobacco growing in said Seventeenth Representative District for some two or three years, and the further fact that they will remove their expert unless the State assists the National Government in making demonstration in tobacco culture, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitution rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each house be suspended, and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

The bill was introduced March 31 and the following day, the Committee on Agriculture reported favorably, as follows:

COMMITTEE REPORT.

Hon. John Marshall, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Sir: Your Committee on Agriculture, to whom was referred House bill No. 115, have had same under consideration, and I am instructed to report it back to the House with the recommendation that it do pass. Mr. Porter has been appointed to make full report.

FULL REPORT.

Hon. John Marshall, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Sir: Having been appointed by your Committee on Agriculture to make full report of favorable action on House Bill No. 115, respectfully recommended that the bill be passed for the following reasons:

The National Government has conducted experiments in tobacco growing in said Seventeenth Representative District for some two or three years, and that the National Government has given notice that they would remove their expert unless the State assists the National Government in making demonstrations in tobacco culture, and as tobacco is destined to be one of the greatest industries in the State and said industry will be stopped in its infancy if said expert is removed as the farmers can not conduct the business of tobacco growing without assistance. We, therefore, think that this bill should pass.

Saturday afternoon George T. McNess received the following telegram:

Austin, Tex. April 10. Geo. T. McNess, Nacogdoches, Texas. Bill passed both houses by large majority staying with it. Homer A. Dotson. About an hour later a second message came and read: Austin, Tex., April, 10, Geo. T. McNess, Nacogdoches, Texas, Governor approved bill at three o'clock. Send three hundred cigars. Homer A. Dotson. The first message came during the meeting of the Tobacco Association, and was read amidst cheers and hurrahs. Mr. McNess, as secretary and treasurer of the Association, wrote Mr. Dotson late that afternoon as follows: Hon. Homer Dotson, Austin, Texas. Sir: Your two telegrams of the 10th inst received in time enough for me to read them at the meeting of the Nacogdoches Tobacco Growers Association held here last Saturday which met with the entire approval of all the members present. Upon motion by Mr. Gill, seconded and carried by all present, the Nacogdoches Tobacco Growers Association tender

afternoon at 5 o'clock; passed the Senate this morning at 11:30; signed by the Governor at 3 o'clock. I called on the Governor and got him to sign it immediately so that I could communicate with you as I did by wire today. I persuaded the governor to give me the pen that he approved the bill with. I had some strong opposition in the House, and one man in the Senate made two speeches against the bill, but we got it through over the opposition. The boys are clamoring for me to get some more Nacogdoches cigars, so please have about 300 of the best cigars made of the best Nacogdoches County tobacco, that ought to be shipped at once. If the association does not feel able to pay it, you take a pencil and piece of paper and meander up and down the streets and take up a collection for same. If you cannot collect enough for it, I will bear 1-4 of the expenses myself. Our county has already had better advertisement through the cigars you sent than any other county in the state. In putting this bill through in less than 23 hours from the time it started, until it was approved, it is the best record

very gratifying indeed. As a result the man with a hoe, as well as others, will wear a more pleasant countenance. However the drouth in East Texas is not yet at an end. 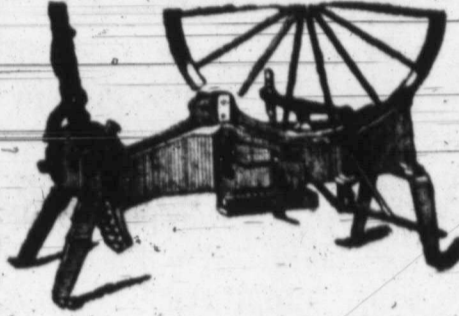

A Valuable Machine.

S. N. House, the inventor, was for fifteen years or more, a wagon maker in Fort Worth and at other North Texas points, also doing blacksmith work in connection. While at these things he conceived the idea of the machine that now bears his name and which has revolutionized the feature of tire setting. After completing his model machine and getting a patent, Mr. House removed to St. Louis where a strong company was organized, the setters are manufactured and placed on the market. To go into a detailed description of the machine is hardly necessary as the man who has any occasion to have tires set, knows full well the meaning when the statement is made that the work can be done without removing the tire from the wheel, without heating the tire and without cutting a single bolt. This machine also takes the fish out of any wheel, wagon, buggy, cart, etc, without injury, thus making it as good as it was when rolled from the factory, braa new. In addition too, there is attached a cold punch and a bolt cutter, two of the very best things that could have been put in use. The machine has only been installed a few days but all who who have seen it work express themselves as greatly surprised at the superior work, the simplification of this heretofore bad task, and the quickness of it.
