One of the most illuminat ing-and incidentally one of the most interesting and musing- series of answers sent to the commission on country lite was from a farmthat he had ari. He stated ng children, he and his wite being each 52 vears old; and that they owned 520 acrer of that they owned 520 acrer of
land without any mortgage land without any mortgage hanging over their heads. He had himself done well, and his views as to why many of his neighbors had done less well are entitled to consideration. These views are expressed in terse and vigorous Englisb; they cannot always be quoted in tull. He stated that the farm houses in his neighborhood are not as good as they should be because too many of them are encumber ed by mortgages; that the schools do not train boys and girls satistactorily tor life on the farm, because they allow them to get an idea in their heads that city life is better, and that to remedv this practical farming should be taught. To the question whether the farmers and their wives in his neighborhood are atistactorily organized, he nswers
"Oh, there is a little onearse grange gang in our lo-
ality, and ever darned one thinks they ought to be King." To the question, "Are the renters of farmes in your neighborhood making a sat isfied living?" he answers: No; because they move bout so much hunting a better ob,.' To the question. Is the supply of farm labor in your neighborhood satisfactory" the answer is: "No; because the people have gon out of the baby business; and when asked as to the remedy he answers, "Give a pension to every mother who gives birth to seven living livTo the question, "A soil." conditions surrounding hired conditions surrounding hired

TALKING TO NORMAL STUDENTS PASSING OF CHEAP LANDS Kas, and are provided with Profs. Anderson of Lufkin, and Mc Knight of the A. \& M. College Delivered Addresses T .

The students who are here attending the tri-countyNormal enjoyed a double treat to days, in the torm of addresses by gentlemen who are. identified with the school work in the state. Prof. Anderson, superintendent ot instruction for the county of Angelina, was the first on the program, and made a most interesting and entertaining talk, lasting for about an hour. His address was along the lines of higher education, emphasizing the necessity for close application, intensity of labor, and the tocusing of ones work
Prof. Anderson, though a comparatively young man, well qualified to occupy the responsible position he has, this morning was appreciated by the teachers. Following him Prof. McKnight of the A. \& M. College at College Station, made a most interest-
ing, practical and wholly enjoyable talk, on education in general, the state school in particular, and especially the agricultural phase or teature. This gentleman is considered ne of the leading agricultureducators in the state, heart nd soul in the good work and to put this line of work n a still higher basis in th public schools seems his soul
