Clinic To Provide Service

Representatives of the Texas Department of Health will conduct an immunization clinic at Bovina Medical Clinic, 509 Avenue I, from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday, June 14.

Vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (haemophilus influenzae type B).

There will be a charge, which will be based on family income, family size and ability to pay.

This charge will go toward the upkeep of the clinic.

Farmers Home Administration Speeds Loans

"Farmers in the state of Texas will get expedited service from the Farmers Home Administration," stated George Ellis, new state director of the Texas Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

In his first week on the job, Ellis declared an all out effort to act on every Farmer Program loan application, throughout the state of Texas. "I expect the backlog to be cleared by the county and district offices by this Friday," Ellis said.

Any assistance needed by a county or district office will be provided by other district offices, and by the state office in Temple.

This effort will affect all farm loan applicants who have already submitted a completed application.

Any problem applications which are not acted upon by the June fourth deadline will be completed by June 15, 1993.

The Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program at Texas Tech University has volunteered its expert staff to help clean up problem applications.

Ellis said that he is implementing USDA Secretary Mike Espy's dedication to quality customer service. "We intend to meet the Texas farmer's needs effectively and efficiently, and we expect our farmers to be able to work with us as partners," Ellis said. Summer TAAS Test Dates, Review Courses

The Exit Level TAAS Test will be offered for all the eleventh and twelfth graders who have not passed all parts of the test. These tests will be given July 13, 14 and 15 at Bovina High School.

The writing portion will be given on Tuesday, July 13, with the reading test given on Wednesday, July 14 and the mathematics test given on Thursday, July 15.

Students who took the TAAS Test at Bovina this spring and will take it again at Bovina in July do not need to pre-register.

Students who did not take the spring test at Bovina or who want to take the July test somewhere other than Bovina must pre-register with Mrs. Pat Turner.

All students who have not passed any or all of these tests are encouraged to take the tests they need to take on the above dates. The school will provide opportunities for students to take review courses to prepare for the tests. Students interested in these review courses should contact Mrs. Pat Turner at 238-1317 or 225-4922. All students are required to pass the writing, reading and mathematics portions of the TAAS Test before they can graduate from high school.

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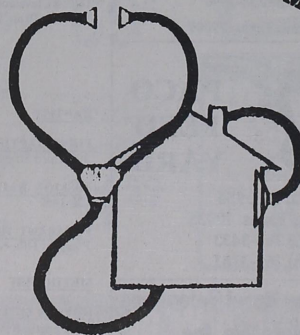

Melons Are Great Summer Afternoon Refreshment

Nothing cools off a hot summer afternoon quicker than biting into a thick slice of watermelon and having the juice run down your chin.

I would say I have those memories from my childhood, but I'm afraid I'm remembering a time much closer to the present. I still enjoy sloppily gnawing on a big chunk of watermelon until I'm practically covered in watermelon juice.

I've never outgrown my love of watermelon; I acquired that taste from my mother. The two of us sit at the table scraping the last bits of red flesh from the watermelon rind long after the others have had their fill.

If, by some chance, some of the watermelon is not eaten immediately, I usually store it in a covered bowl in the refrigerator and eat it the next morning for breakfast.

Although watermelon is by far my favorite melon, I enjoy cantaloupe and honeydew melons, too. And, although I appreciate the unadorned sweetness of the melons, I also enjoy using them in creative dishes. Melons can be used in salads, soups and cold drinks.

When you've had your fill of melon straight from the fields this summer, try the following recipes for a change of pace:

CANTALOUPE SOUP

1 medium cantaloupe, halved and seeded
3 cups orange juice
1/2 teaspoon lime juice

Scoop the pulp from the cantaloupe. Place the pulp, the orange juice and the lime juice in the container of a blender; process until smooth. Chill until serving. Makes 4-1/3 cups.

MINTY WATERMELON SALAD

1-6 pound watermelon
3/4 cup slivered mild white onion
1/2 cup minced fresh mint leaves
Spicy dressing (recipe follows)
Salt, to taste

Slice the watermelon into 1-inch thick rounds; cut the rind from the flesh, and discard the rind. Cut the flesh into 1-inch cubes and remove the visible seeds. Place the cubes into a large bowl (you should have about 3 quarts of watermelon cubes). Add the slivered onion and minced mint. Cover and chill up to four hours. Pour the Spicy Dressing over the watermelon mixture and mix gently. Add salt to taste. Makes 8 servings.

SPICY DRESSING

3 tablespoons cider vinegar
1 teaspoon chili powder
6 tablespoons vegetable oil

Whisk together the ingredients and cover refrigerated for up to 3 days.

TROPICAL FRUIT SALAD

3 large mangoes, peeled, cored and cubed

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3 large papayas, peeled, seeded and cubed
2-1/2 cups honeydew balls
2-1/2 cups watermelon balls
1 fresh pineapple, peeled, cored and cubed
6 bananas, sliced
1/2 cup honey
1/2 to 3/4 kirsch or other cherry-flavored brandy or pineapple juice
1/2 cup grated fresh coconut
Fresh mint sprigs

Combine the fruit and honey, tossing gently. Cover and chill for at least 2 hours. Stir in kirsch or juice and coconut before serving. Garnish with fresh mint. Makes 15 to 18 servings.

WATERMELON SPARKLE

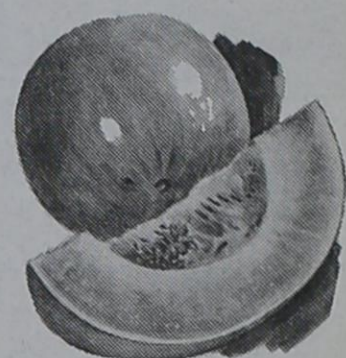
1/2 cup sugar
1/3 cup light rum
3 tablespoons lime juice
6 cups cubed watermelon

Combine the sugar, rum and lime juice; stir well. Pour the mixture over the melon cubes. Cover and chill for 2 to 3 hours. Makes 6 servings.

MELON THIRST QUENCHER

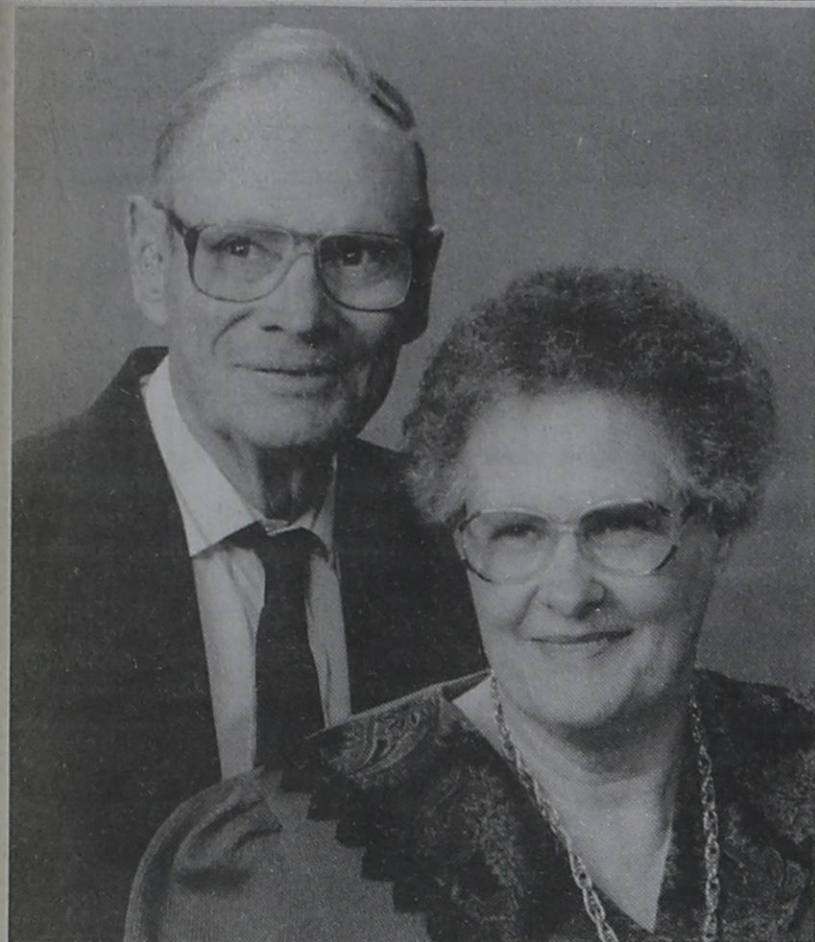
2-2/3 cups cantaloupe or watermelon, peeled, seeded and coarsely chopped
3 to 4 tablespoons sugar
2 to 3 tablespoons lime juice
2 cups water

In a blender, puree the fruit pulp and juice with sugar and lime juice; adjust sugar and lime juice to taste. Add melon mixture to water, then rub through a fine strainer into a large jar or pitcher; discard pulp. Cover and chill up to 1 week. Garnish with chunks of matching fruit just before serving. Serve over ice cubes in tall glasses.



Honeydew Thirst Quencher: Follow the above directions using 3 cups of seeded, peeled and coarsely chopped honeydew melon, 2 to 3 tablespoons sugar, 3 tablespoons lime juice and 2 cups water.

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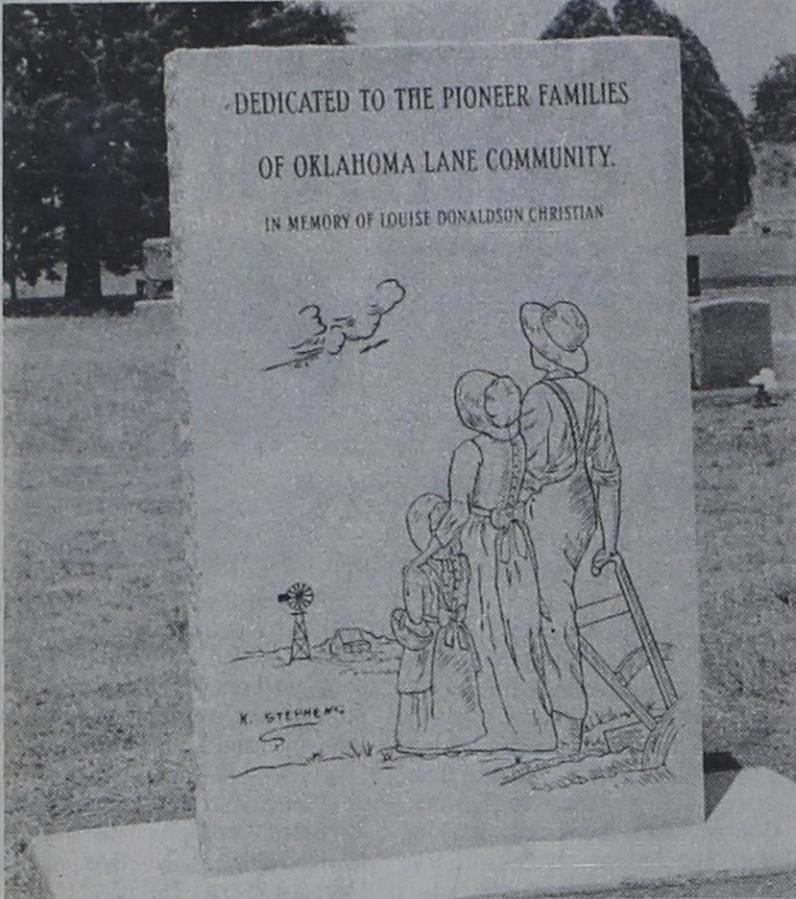
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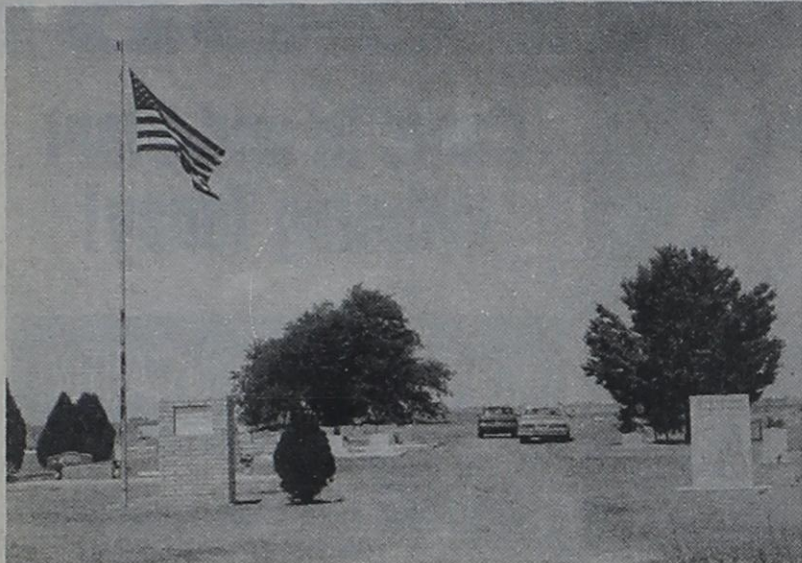

Panhandle Groups Are Sponsoring Pilgrims

"Operation: Hospitality High Plains" is the Panhandle effort to host pilgrims passing through Amarillo in mid-August on their way to the World Youth Days '93, held in Denver, Colorado. Pope John Paul II, spiritual leader of the Catholic Church, will be the special guest at the event on August 12-15, addressing nearly a half-million youth and young adults from around the globe.

So far, according to Rev. Ken

Keller, local co-chairman of the hospitality committee, over 6,000 travelers will come through the Amarillo area on their way to and from the events during the week of August 10-17. Local motels and restaurants will take care of the bulk of these travelers without any extra assistance. Many of the larger motel chains and local food caterers have already received reservations from groups in Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana.

However, many of the international groups will need special arrangements as they travel. This is why a service committee, "Operation: Hospitality High Plains," has been established with Ken Keller and Larry Lancaster as co-chairs. Consisting primarily of local church leaders and organizations, the group also includes civic, social and business leaders from the Amarillo area as well. Both the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce and Hispanic Chamber of Commerce have representatives working with the Committee.

On August 11, 140 youthful pilgrims from Genoa, Italy will arrive in Amarillo for accommodations. The local YMCA has become host lodging for the group, while The Big Texan and J&M's Restaurant will show the Italian youth the fine West Texas cuisine. The Gremaldi family of Italian Delight's Restaurant will help with translations.

The largest contingencies of youth and young adults will arrive on August 1. The country of El Salvador will have nearly 800 youth staying the night in Amarillo, while Venezuela will have more than 400 youth pilgrims. The countries of Santo Domingo, Guatemala, and Costa Rica will each have four groups of one or two hundred. A smaller group from the city of Jalapa, Mexico will be sending more than a hundred. These nearly 2,000 youth and young adults will need food and lodging. Many local churches, both Protestant and Catholic, as well as many local schools and gymnasiums have offered their floor space for sleeping bag arrangements. Hundreds of youth will need complimentary housing in Amarillo homes, and volunteers can call 376-9222 or 376-7204 to make that arrangement.

The District Knights of Columbus, under the leadership of Ed Boenisch, will have a community dinner and breakfast for the two thousand, to be held at the Diocesan Activity Center, on North Spring Street. The Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, under the leadership of President Matilda Baca of Friona, and area church women's organizations, "Altar Societies," have been asked to provide sack lunches for the pilgrims as they embark on the buses to Denver. Serra Club of Amarillo and Catholic Order of Foresters will also help host the travelers.

An organizational meeting held on Saturday, May 22 from 4-5:30 p.m. at the Diocesan Activity Center in Amarillo, the hospitality headquarters, helped to finalize the plans of "Operation: Hospitality High Plains."
