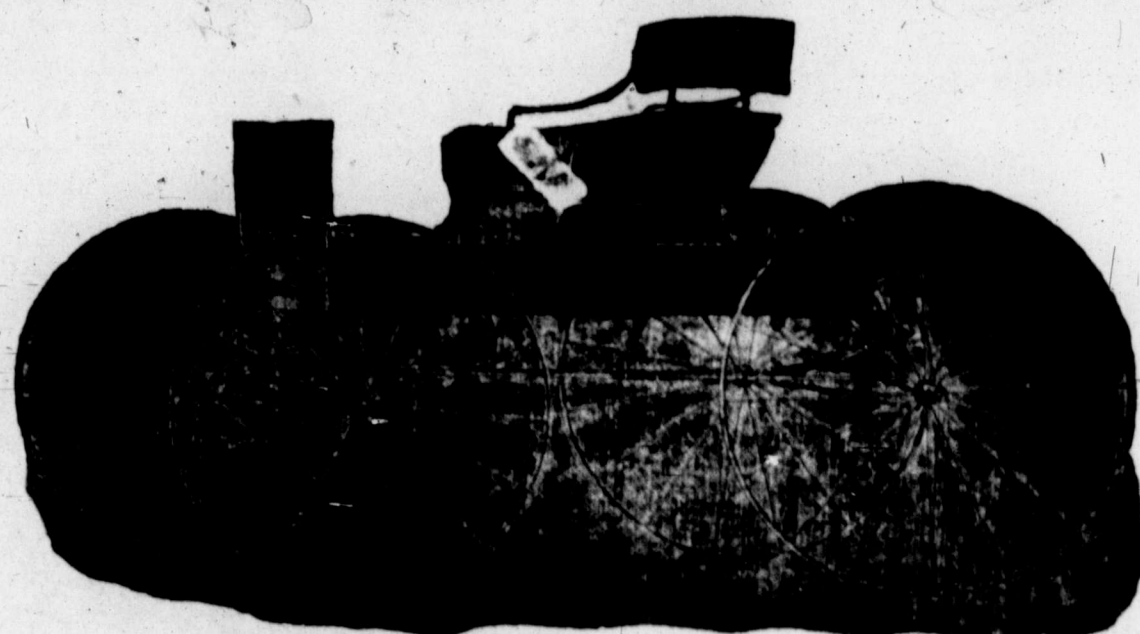

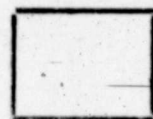

J. M. BARRIE, the playwright, who has long claimed to "know all about women," has been sued for a divorce. Probably there are some things he didn't know.

It is not too early to begin to talk for a fair in 1910—and every body knows we ought to have one. Sound your neighbors and friends about the matter, and let's push it along.

FROM the out come of things to date, the heretofore popular practice of bootlegging will be relegated to the "has-beens". Push it along,—it's a good thing,—and anything is a good thing that helps a town.

THE San Antonio aviator has traveled farther in his machine than any other, so far, having covered 518 miles. A "little at a time" improvement with the everlasting "keep at it" tenacity, will win the game,—and demonstrate to the world that people can fly.

TEMPLE citizens have decided to do some more improving, and have already let a contract for forty three blocks of paving. Temple is a city of 14,000 people,—live folks too,—and the way they are doing things means a near future, big increase in population. The Temple way of doing things is commendable.

THE city council at Lutkin has passed an ordinance prohibiting the writing of signs on side walks, and also prohibiting the throwing of circulars on the streets. These latter must be given to people, put in vehicles or placed in the stores. It's two pretty good city laws and will go a long ways toward keeping a place clean.

THE winning streak of the Nacogdoches horses at the Timpson and Carthage Fairs is pretty good evidence that people of this county are showing more interest in good stock. It's right and mete and proper, and with a fair association here, including a swift track, the interest in another year or two would be even greater.

A BOOTLEGGER is about as hard to get rid of as any pest extant it seems, but from the reports in the papers, his time is limited. And when the country is entirely rid of the thing that sneaks around dark corners and peddles whiskey and beer, the world will be better by it. If there is one critter in the wide that the entire people is opposed to, it is the boot legger.

HOUSTON is making some great preparations for the Carnival to be held there next month. Thousands of people from all over Texas,—and adjacent states—will attend the festivities in the Bayou city, will enjoy them selves and talk about it when they go. Houston is growing rapidly and just such hustle as is being done in connection with the Carnival, is the whole cause of it.

GOOD roads are being built more rapidly in Nacogdoches county than in any other in East Texas. The people are awake to the necessity of better thoroughfares and are going to have them. The few miles of clay road built in the county the past year have demonstrated beyond any further doubt that this section can have good roads,—and the man who travels over them is clamoring for more. Talk to some of the farmers and you'll hear some "good roads" news that will interest.

As little as a fellow thinks about it, there are some pretty nice manufacturing plants in this city, and which combined make a pay roll worth while. For instance we think of the compress, oil mill, several planers, cigar factory, packing houses, shirt factory, laundry, bottling works, ice plant, electric light plant, gins,—and possibly some other things. Aren't these institutions a help to the city? Take them all out of Nacogdoches and see what a gap would be left. If these we have are good for the town, wouldn't more be better?

THE individuals who are planning to have an exhibit at the Dallas Fair have already gone to a great expense. The shelving for the booth is being made here, the signs are painted, fifty-five thousand pieces of literature are ready for shipment, the tobacco and cigars are being selected and many other items are in the course of arrangement. Several hundred dollars will be expended in doing all this and in getting the exhibit to the exposition. Now added to that must be expenses for a man to stay at the Fair sixteen days. All this expenditure is to be done for the entire section by a few men,—three of them. It merely shows the difference between a very few and the entire citizenship of a city; laying claim to six thousand population. And then we call ourselves a wide awake, hustling bunch.

NACOGDOCHES will harvest almost as large a cotton crop as she did last year, and will get half as much again for the product. Ten thousand bales at twelve cents per pound beats twelve thousand bales at eight cents per pound. Therefore this old county is better off in many ways, though the cotton crop be some short. It is taking less labor to gather it, less time also. The cost to the farmer is less and another good feature too,—the people are selling it. More feed stuff has been raised,—more hogs are being fattened,—more cows and horses raised,—and better stock,—and more of the home necessities are on hand. The crop will be gathered much earlier than usual, giving the farmers time to break lands at the proper time for another year. The people of this county are mighty well off and will be still better in another twelve months if the practice of more feed stuff and home consumption articles is continued.

NO MATTER how patriotic the purpose with which the tax on raw material is proposed. It can not be defended without resort to arguments that have been employed by the protective interests, and a protective policy can not be adopted without three results, which follow as a matter of necessity. First, the many are taxed for the benefit of the few; second, men who get the benefit will attempt to corrupt politics in order to retain that benefit, and third, the greater the number of those who believe that they are benefitted by protection, the more difficult will we find it to secure tariff reform; for the protective interests will stand together, and a few people well organized and pecuniarily interested in a bad system are often more than a match for a larger number unorganized and bearing each one but a small portion of the burden.—W. J. Bryan.

AMONG the very recent charters issued by the state department is the Tyler Creamery Company, capitalized at \$4,300. That, on the face of it, looks like a small item, and it is from a standpoint of dollars and cents,—for a city the size of Tyler. The importance—magnitude—of the proposition is in the effect it will have in that section. Creameries not only afford markets for dairy products and keep butter money at home, but makes the raising of good stock—milk cows—the rule instead of the exception. There is not a creamery in Texas but is making money for the investors, and there are fifty men in Nacogdoches able to erect one and carry it to success.

THE corn show was a great success, and in a very strong way emphasized the fact that with the proper co-operation and work, this old county can do wonders. It is up to the business interests to encourage such and through the Commercial Club will prove the medium. Get together and get a hustle on you.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

THE big state fair opens at Dallas next Saturday, and the management of that great institution is leaving nothing undone that will add to the attractiveness of the exposition. It's worth a person's while to attend the Dallas fair, for one day at least, but more if possible.

THE organization of a corn growers association for Nacogdoches county will be a good thing, and every farmer in the county ought to become a member. No matter whether you grow one acre or a hundred acres, you should link hands by getting into the association.

ADVERTISING TEXAS.

The Association of Commercial Secretaries is preparing to enter upon a campaign of systematically advertising Texas and making known its resources and attractions to people of other states and other lands.

The plan is undoubtedly a good one, but it is the part of wise precaution to remind the secretaries that there is danger that out of the very abundance, so to speak, of their theme they may overshoot the mark and "harm" where they mean to help.

Texas has been harmed to no small extent by fine writing, by extravagance of statement—or at least seeming extravagance—and by word painting and pen pictures which, while literally true were, for practical purposes and as a guide to the home-seekers, calculated to mislead.

It can be stated in advertisement that land is very rich; that it is shaded by wide-spreading trees; that it will produce a variety of crops, and that water is easily obtained in abundance, and every word of it be true; yet the land could be, and likely would be, in some river bottom where living in health is impossible. Then in many advertising pamphlets comparisons are frequently instituted between Texas and other states in such way as to draw people to Texas by making them dissatisfied with their present surroundings, which is always bad policy.

There should be made no effort to foster discontent in the minds of people anywhere. No man should change his home unless he will thereby improve his condition, and no man should be urged to leave the land and the home he lives in unless it is reasonably sure he will find a better land and a better home.

There should be told what kind of land there is in Texas; what it will raise; what it costs per acre; what climatic conditions are here; what the rate of taxation is; what the law as to the homestead is; what the law as to insurance of bonds is; what provision has been made in Texas for free education, and how the laws are administered. The educational facilities of Texas, the rate of taxation, the security of the homestead, the law as to subsidies and bond issues, salubrity of the climate and the variety of farm products are the chief attractions of Texas, and these should be set forth in plain, simple, truthful terms, without exaggeration or coloring.

Honesty, truthfulness and fairness of statement should characterize all advertising. Nothing should be kept back that would likely influence the home seeker. If this plan is followed, people will come and come to stay, and not come only to go back deceived and dissatisfied.—Houston Chronicle.

Payne Given Five Years.

The jury in the case of Frank Payne, charged with unlawfully selling intoxicants, was out but ten minutes last night, returning a verdict of guilty, and assessing his punishment at five years in the pen. A Good Tobacco Crop.

F. L. McCall, who lives near Appleby, was in the city yesterday and paid the Sentinel office an appreciated visit. Mr. McCall stated that he has been growing tobacco the past eight years and this season has the best crop he has ever raised. He had in three and a quarter acres, yielding about 2,600 pounds which sold readily for fifteen cents per pound. He stated further that twenty-five per cent of his crop would run wrappers, showing conclusively the nature of their tobacco soil. He planted this past year the home grown Cuban seed, and expects to do likewise next year, increasing the acreage materially. It is probable too that many others in his section will grow patches of tobacco, though he is the only one at present in that line. The soil in that section is considered as good as the very best in the state, and no question of success is with those people who plant tobacco; if they will only look after their crops as they should. An effort will likely be made from this end of the line to have at least twenty or twenty-five acres in the vicinity of Appleby next year.

GOOD ROADS IN TEXAS.

There is a wonderful awakening on the subject of good roads in Texas, and in every section of the State good roads movements are in progress, and many miles of good roads are under a tual construction.

Heretofore the better class of macadamized roads, have radiated from the larger cities of the State almost entirely, because the urban population has voted so stragly for and contributed so largely to the issue of bonds necessary for the building of the roads, but now the farmers are becoming interested as never before, and are showing a disposition to have good roads even though they may be called upon to pay a special tax to provide them.

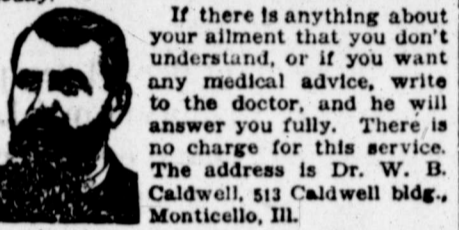
The last Legislature passed an act authorizing any county or political subdivision or other defined district of any county upon the vote of a two-thirds majority of the qualified resident property taxpayers voting thereon, to issue bonds for public road improvement in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in such county or district. In other words the property owners are permitted to organize road improvement districts and to vote bonds or to pledge their credit to raise money for good roads, and the people are taking advantage of the privilege. Road districts have been and are being organized from the Panhandle to the Rio Grande, and road bonds are being sent to the Attorney General's office for approval in such numbers as to indicate the general interest.

A week from today Galveston County taxpayers will vote on a proposition to issue bonds to the amount of \$500,000 for the construction of macadamized, graveled or paved roads, and notwithstanding the heavy expense of the protecting seawall recently completed and the causeway now under construction, which has been shared by the whole county, it is believed the proposition will carry by a substantial majority. The Tribune says the increase in the tax rate due to this bond issue will be so slight that it will not be felt, while the building of good roads will enhance land values enormously. It is realized that by far the greater part of the tax created by the bond issue will fall upon the city taxpayers, but the Tribune urges this as another reason for the city's warm support of the bond proposition as a recognition of the debt the city owes to the mainland people for their loyal and hearty co-operation in voting for the issuance of seawall and causeway bonds.

In the past there has been a woeful lack of appreciation on the part of the farming communities in some parts of the country of the advantages of good roads, and in the past the urban property taxpayers have been willing to share in providing them. When bond propositions have been submitted the opposition has come from those who would pay but a fraction of the tax

rather than from the city property holders, who would pay the bulk of it. It is assumed that the reason of this was that the city people were more appreciative of the value of good roads, not only to the farmer, but to the merchants and business men with whom the farmer deals. Now the farmer is beginning to recognize his own interest in the matter and the result must be greater co-operation in the efforts for good public highways.—San Antonio Express.

NACOGDOCHES OIL MILL BEGINS THIS SEASON'S RUN

Wheels of the Institution Start Monday at 10 O'clock to Turn Out Product for the Man Who Feeds—About Seven Hundred Tons of Seed on Hand and More Coming In—With Nearly Forty Men, Pay Roll Exceeds \$300.00 Per Week.

For possibly the shortest run in the history of the institution, the Nacogdoches Oil Mill began its season's career Monday at ten o'clock, with barely enough seed on hand to supply the demand of the mill for three weeks. A full force of hands is at work however, and when all departments are in operation, some thirty five or forty names will be on the pay roll and the expenses will run from three to three hundred and fifty dollars per week. There have been many improvements in the oil mill since last season, but to the usual visitor hardly discernable, for most of it is in the way of repairs, additions and changes, with here and there a new piece of machinery, extra feature or platform. Let it be said with credit to the management too, in general, and the men directly in charge, in particular, that the entire plant has been kept in an exceptionally good condition, from the office to the engine room: The seed, meal and press rooms are large, clean and tidy, and within a few hours Monday everything was going with clock work regularity. Frank P. Adams, for the past seven years with the concern, four or five of which have been spent in the capacity of night foreman, has been promoted to the day run, and among the first things to secure the very best work and the greatest degree of success, employed the same hands that were at the wheels last season, and some of them for many seasons. Mr. Adams is a thorough mill man and not only understands the workings of the various departments, but is always active, looking personally after every-

thing from the oil tanks to the finished product—and by-products—hulls and meal. Will Holbrooks is now night man, going on the works at seven o'clock in the afternoon with a new crew, and retiring at seven in the mornings.

DOUBLE BARRELLED RISK. To tie forty thousand dollars up in any kind of a business is no small item, especially when the risk is double barrelled, but that's what a concern that gets into the oil mill field does.—or at least has done here. The first risk is in getting the raw material,—cotton seed,—and in this time with the keen competition that is, it is sometimes an enormous venture. The second risk is in getting shut of the finished product and the by-products. Of course ordinarily there is a great demand for the oils, meal and hulls, and possibly this season will see it extra in this respect, but merely selling has not altogether solved the problem. Unless an article or product is disposed of at a profit to justify the making or handling, it had best be let alone and the same amount of capital invested in another way. Well it must be admitted then that this is a feature worthy of consideration, inasmuch as the competition is as keen with the mills to sell their finished stuff as with these same concerns to get the raw material.

The interest on forty thousand dollars, at the rate usually demanded in Texas, would amount to four thousand dollars. The average run of an oil mill is three months, or twelve weeks. To make four thousand dollars in twelve weeks, it would be necessary to make clear of

all expenses, wear and tear of the machinery, pay rolls and all included, more than three hundred dollars per week, or better than fifty dollars per day. Money is worth that in this section now, therefore a fellow's profit cannot be figured until that interest is laid away. But will it make it?

SOME FIGURES OF INTEREST

Mr. Adams tells us that a ton of seed, of average quality, will yield thirty six gallons of oil, seven hundred pounds of meal and eight hundred and fifty pounds of hulls. That leaves a waste of, say four hundred pounds. That dirt and trash waste is made up to some extent by the lint which is taken from the seed, something like an average of one hundred and twenty five pounds. Then some body gets pay for nearly three hundred pounds of dirt at cotton seed prices. But that is not the question, and no one can be blamed for that. How much money does the oil, meal and hulls bring in? Cotton seed were selling Monday at the mill for twenty three dollars per ton. Mr. Adams further tells us that statistics show that the average yield per ton,—everything included,—is twenty six and a half dollars. That is,—the oil mills get that much money back. Seed at twenty three dollars per ton leaves three dollars and fifty cents per ton profit. The pay roll of the oil mill is more than three hundred dollars per week,—nearly four hundred dollars some weeks,—necessitating the consumption of one hundred tons of seed to pay the expense account. The mill's capacity is much more than that, but the short time run, and the short cotton crop as well as the inferior seed as a result of the drouth, reduces the earnings to the point of less than the interest mentioned above.

BULK OF SEED SOLD. It is surprising though at the number of people who are selling seed here, who have never done so before,—and still stuff has to be shipped in here by the ear load. The seed houses at present contain something more than seven hundred tons,—about three weeks run,—and not more than half that amount was bought at the scales here. Several carloads came in Monday from taraway places,—some on the entering rail roads and some from other roads. The visible supply grows smaller to the oil mill eye the longer it is looked at

and the opinion is that the bulk of the seed is already sold. The extremely high price paid the past few weeks has caused many a man to dispose of seed,—possibly a change in his ordinary way of doing. But twenty three dollar cotton seed is one of the most tempting propositions imaginable, and the farmer can't be blamed for disposing of them and buying hulls and meal and hay instead. The seven hundred tons of seed in the houses are figured as about half of the season's run. Mr. Adams believes with average good luck that two hundred and fifty tons can be crushed each week, and using in all about fifteen hundred tons of seed. Eight hundred tons will have to be gotten somewhere else,—if the bulk is sold,—if the mill runs the allotted six weeks. Whether the seed market has reached the limit or not is a question that time alone will answer, but from the present status of affairs, and the opinion of men well versed in that line, the limit is pretty close at hand. That, however, is neither here nor there, as no matter how high they go, nor how low they drop, the benefit is mutual in a sense.

NONE TO BE SHIPPED

One feature that has been inaugurated by the mill,—possibly last year,—is commendable, and the farmers and others who have to buy the by-products to feed are expressing themselves favorably towards it. None of the stuff is to be shipped out, but every pound of meal and hulls will be kept here for the people of this county. So far none have been contracted, and the chances are that not a pound will be, as the demand for all stuffs will be too great. Now some more figures. The people adjacent to this city have so far sold about three hundred and fifty tons of seed to the mill. Suppose that only half of the seed have been marketed then it's fair to infer that the entire sale for the season by these people will be in the neighborhood of seven hundred tons. Eight hundred tons have to be shipped in, to complete the run,—and the product of those eight hundred tons is kept here for local consumption, the same as the seven hundred. The point is: people are not raising sufficient feed stuffs and but for the fact that the mill ships in more than half that commodity would be a scarce one indeed. Another very noticeable thing about the mill and its product, is that the seed are not turning out as they usually do. The oil and meal and hulls are possibly as good quality, but the quantity is less per ton than is usually figured. This can't be gotten at as closely as it can be when the meal room starts operation, which will be Thursday, but it is the belief now that the quantity is some less. This is attributed, of course, to the drouth affecting the cotton crop.

IT'S A BUSY PLACE

With the exception of the Hayward Mill, the Nacogdoches Oil Mill has the largest pay roll of any institution in the city, for the time that it

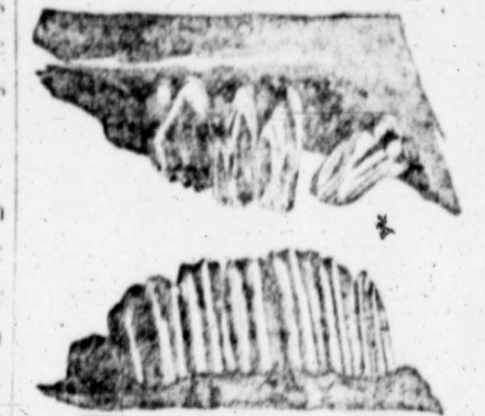

is in operation. There are seventeen hands on each shift, and two shifts every twelve hours,—besides the office force and the two superintendents. The pay of the thirty four hands will run about fifty dollars per day, with five and a half days in the week, and five nights. That runs the figures above two hundred and fifty dollars per week, with out taking into account W. U. Perkins, manager; R. J. Sullivan, office man; and the two superintendents. From that is can easily be seen that the weekly labor expense will be greatly in excess of three hundred dollars. The mill is a busy place indeed, as every other place in Nacogdoches is at present, and any person who wants to get an idea of the real work ought to make a trip to some of the institutions while they are in operation. The employees at the mill, as stated above, are nearly all old timers, understand their places and the work to be done,—and do it. In the office it's just as busy and to get a conversation out of the men, must be done on the instalment plan,—between weighing seed and telephone calls. Mr. Sullivan is always on tap though, and when he is not at one thing, you can guess at something else,—it is nothing but,—well, work. Pay rolls make cities,—pay rolls like the oil mill has, and other institutions in this city have,—and the only fault in the world to find is the simple fact that we haven't more manufacturing concerns that are running day and night, scattering money among the people and making the wheels

of business turn with more rapidity and regularity.
