[^0]GOOD ROADS AND BAD RUADS A railroad is the first neces sity tor the develonment of a State, says Mr. Yoakum, but the area made available b the railroad is comparatively small without the improvesent of the public highways. Mr. Yoakum recently conducted a tour of representative tarmers from Oklohoma, Texas, Lovisiana and Arkan es through the North and Fast in order that they migh inspeet the improved high ways in that section and be ome impresed by what ha seen done in the way of goo moads building
Since this) evidence of $\mathbf{M r}$ Yoakum's interest in good road's has become generally known, he has received many invitations to deliver addresse on the the subject, but so busy a man as he is could hardly find time to comply with such requests. But his interest in the development of the country through which his rail ways run in sincere and he recards good wagon roads as second only to railroads as promoters of development. Farming is becoming a science, says Mr. Yoakum, and to receive a larger return on the constantly appreciat ing value of land the crop must be increased and cost of transporting it to the railroad station or town market decreased.

No economy has been more neglected than the reduction of the cost of hauling over wagon roads, and none susceptible of a great saving. Mr. Yoakum says:
Bad roads and bad weather shut oft communication between the tarms and the towns, and when weather and bad roads permit the farmers to reach the markets and resume their deliveries they usually find glutted markets and low prices. The necessity of only hauling halt loads by reason of mudholes, causing broken axles and damage to harness and teams, accounts for the enormous loss to the entire country, as given by the Department of Agriculture, of more than $\$ 250,000$,000 annually. These disadvantages are indirect taxes on the farmers and paid for by the communities for meintaining poor roads. The saving resulting trom building goods roads would be much more, to say nothing of the contort enhariced yalues. greater development and the less cost of maintaining good roads after they are constructed. To put it differently, a farmer who lives ten miles away torm the railroad stater of time of traversing the distance over good roads than three miles distant but who has: the disadvantage of bad roads, and he saves not only the time but the wear and tear of his wagons and the strain on his teams, and he rehauling. It costs much more to use a bad road than it does to maintain \& good ones and

It is time that the people of old Nacogdoches county were rising up with theif ballots and saying we will not commit this grievous sin any more but wili build a respectable court house and a commodious and sanitary jail.
