## SMALL BLAZE AT NOON.

Residence of H. C. Covington, Located on Church Street, Damaged by Fire Today—  
 Fire Company's Good Run.

A fire alarm was turned in just before noon from the residence of H. C. Covington, located on South Church street, beyond the creek. A quick run was made by the fire department and some effective work done after the arrival, saving the building from a possible total loss. A bucket brigade was already at work however, and kept the flames in check till the arrival of the fire fighting apparatus. The blaze caught from the kitchen flue, damaging the roof of that room and the back porch, and also damaging the ceiling and inside of the kitchen. Nearly all of the furniture was moved out of the house and with little damage. The loss on the house and furniture together will hardly go above one hundred dollars. The house is the property of George Whitkorn. Whether there is any insurance on either the house or furniture is not known. The alarm failed to work at the City Hall,—the bell not ringing,—but it is stated that such is not the fault of the telephone company in any way. The defect existed with the apparatus, and is being looked after this afternoon by the Fire Chief. The run to the residence was a quick one and some good work was done by the boys. In the race to the scene an injury was done one of the hose carts, but it can be repaired.

**GOOD ROADS AND BAD ROADS.**

A railroad is the first necessity for the development of a State, says Mr. Yoakum, but the area made available by the railroad is comparatively small without the improvement of the public highways.

Mr. Yoakum recently conducted a tour of representative farmers from Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas through the North and East in order that they might inspect the improved highways in that section and become impressed by what has been done in the way of good roads building.

Since this evidence of Mr. Yoakum's interest in good roads has become generally known, he has received many invitations to deliver addresses on the subject, but so busy a man as he is could hardly find time to comply with such requests. But his interest in the development of the country through which his railroads run in sincere and he regards good wagon roads as second only to railroads as promoters of development. Farming is becoming a science, says Mr. Yoakum, and to receive a larger return on the constantly appreciating value of land the crop must be increased and cost of transporting it to the railroad station or town market decreased.

No economy has been more neglected than the reduction of the cost of hauling over wagon roads, and none susceptible of a great saving. Mr. Yoakum says:

Bad roads and bad weather shut off communication between the farms and the towns, and when weather and bad roads permit the farmers to reach the markets and resume their deliveries they usually find glutted markets and low prices. The necessity of only hauling half loads by reason of mudholes, causing broken axles and damage to harness and teams, accounts for the enormous loss to the entire country, as given by the Department of Agriculture, of more than \$250,000,000 annually. These disadvantages are indirect taxes on the farmers and paid for by the communities for maintaining poor roads. The saving resulting from building good roads would be much more, to say nothing of the comfort enhanced values, greater development and the less cost of maintaining good roads after they are constructed. To put it differently, a farmer who lives ten miles away from the railroad station is nearer to it in the matter of time of traversing the distance over good roads than is one whose place is only three miles distant but who has the disadvantage of bad roads, and he saves not only the time but the wear and tear of his wagons and the strain on his teams, and he requires fewer teams to do his hauling. It costs much more to use a bad road than it does to maintain a good one, and Mr. Yoakum illustrates it this way:

To reduce the cost of trans-

Nacogdoches county has just been bludgeoned by a grand jury and perhaps the citizens of Nacogdoches county deserved the bludgeon and perhaps not. We wish we had the language to express our disapproval of this particular place where the poor unfortunate criminals and sometimes more pitiable insane are forced to remain for days and even months where we honestly believe disease germs will flourish and grow. In making our visit we could not afford to remain inside for any great length of time, therefore our visit was not very lengthy there, and we want to suggest at this point that the water connections should at once be looked after in order that the filth may be taken care of and carried off. We say it with all candor and frankness, that we would not, if we had such a place on our premises, as individuals, allow a healthy hog to be placed therein. Are we to continue this practice of putting the man who has been so unfortunate as to have violated the laws of our country in this hole where a well man would become sick? Would we do unto a human being that which we would not to an animal of the lowest type? It is time that the people of old Nacogdoches county were rising up with their ballots and saying we will not commit this grievous sin any more but will build a respectable court house and a commodious and sanitary jail. We would be glad to impress all men with the gravity of this matter for we conscientiously believe that nations and communities are guilty of sins just as much so as the individual and that the heavy hand of a just

postation of a poor railroad, the first work is to drain and ballast the roadbed, strengthen the bridges and renew decayed ties, saving damage caused by derailments and rough usage, the results of which are broken engines and cars.

A railroad must pay interest far money to make these improvements, but when the improvements are made the interest on the cost of same is offset by the saving in maintenance and operation, by preventing delays and damage

and righteous God will be upon us if we do not do what is surely our plain duty. We do not believe that there is a county in the state with the wealth of Nacogdoches that hasn't a respectable and an adequate jail. We recommend, therefore, that the county fathers get their heads together and see that at least they are blameless in this matter. What we have said we mean, and surely trust that not more than one body of this kind will be forced to call the attention of the people to these conditions.

Texas has an army of reformers, from the governor down. It has agitators who roll their eyes to heaven and call for vengeance upon hop growers, wine growers and "sich." Texas has reformers who hurl ponderous volleys of rhetorical bombs at the cigarette, the cigar and the pipe. Texas has political agitators who demand a separate law for every citizen and a straight-jacket for every individual. But these apostles of the new dispensation are silent when it comes to the unfortunate insane who are thrust in miserable jails or poor houses; they are mute when it comes to prison camp and prison farm horrors. Hon. Thomas M. Campbell is a native Texan. He has been the chief executive of Texas for three years. The report of the Nacogdoches county grand jury is passed up to him and his advisers; it is submitted to the theorists and professional talkists who are ever fighting for spotlight positions. That grand jury indictment is an indictment of Texas civilization, of the Democratic party which is in control of state, district, county and city and of the army of agitators who make mountains out of mole-hills, fight trifles and close their eyes to evils which are gangrened and glaring. Texas sends thousands of dollars to foreign lands "to convert the heathen." Texas, according to the "good and true men" of Nacogdoches, Texas permits "poor, unfortunate criminals and sometimes more pitiable insane," to remain for days and months where "disease germs flourish and grow." The Times Herald is proud of Texas and Texans but it is not proud of the men who are responsible for the housing of insane in jails or the horrors of the prison camps and farms.

to equipment and in improved service to the public.

It is purely a business proposition with the railroad, and it should be regarded as a business proposition for farmers and others who use the wagon roads. The bad roads are an expense that ought not to be borne for the reason that they impose a much heavier obligation than do good roads.—San Antonio Express.

**DEVELOPING EAST TEXAS.**

The Houston Oil company, which recently announced the policy of placing its cut-over land on the market for the benefit of bona-fide farmers, thus opening up in East Texas as a large area to settlement, where the best of land can be obtained at reasonable valuation, now announces that it will still further add to the industrial growth of the section in which it has such large investments by opening its holdings to turpentine.

This is a comparatively new industry in this section, having been established within the past three years, but so successful has it been that it is attracting attention. The large holdings of the Houston Oil company will add immeasurably to the industry and increase its importance. While only a portion of the trees will be submitted to the turpentine industry each year, the resolve to submit the trees on eight hundred thousand acres of land to this process can but have its immediate effect upon the growth and

standing of the new industry in this section.

It is stated that a contract has been closed with a large turpentine producing company, whereby all of the timber holdings of the Houston Oil company are contracted, and the production of turpentine and rosin will be entered into upon a large scale.

The Houston Oil company has in the past only assumed the position of a timber-holding company, selling its standing timber to the Kirby Lumber company, but since the ending of the receivership in the early summer there is abundant evidence that it intends to become an important factor in shaping East Texas industrial affairs, a fact that will mean much for the prosperity of this section.—Beaumont Enterprise.

## STILL MAINTAIN AN INTEREST.

Work on Lufkin-Chireno Project Does Not Lag These Days in Either Place — Nacogdoches Selected as Place For Conference.

Lufkin News.

Work is progressing on the plans for the building of the Lufkin-Chireno Railroad, mention of which has been made in the News on former occasions. The interest in the project is still running high both here and in Chireno, and it will not be long before matters will have passed the formulative stage and actual work of a material sort begun.

Contractor J. S. Moore was in the city yesterday and stated that he would be ready to furnish figures to the committees as to the cost of the road. Acting upon this, the local committee yesterday called up H. V. Fall, one of the gentlemen who constituted the committee from Chireno, and asked him what time he preferred to meet the Lufkin committee in order to talk the matter over more thorough and with better understanding. After some deliberation it was decided that the men from the two towns should meet on halfway ground in Nacogdoches next Monday, and that the matter should be gone over carefully at that time.

It is probable that all three of the Lufkin committee will be there, but the chairman at least, with Contractor Moore will be on hand. The project at present bids fair to get through, and seems to be getting out of the planning stage, and all should stand by to lend a hand toward making the Lufkin-Chireno road a reality.

## NACOGDOCHES GETS ALL.

Message From J. Thomas Hall States That The Tobacco Exhibit Wins Medal And Six Prizes at Dallas Fair—Two Other Exhibits.

A message from J. Thomas Hall, received by the Sentinel this morning states that the tobacco and cigar exhibits from this county took all prizes at the State Fair at Dallas. The exhibit took first and second prizes on the six best stalks of tobacco, first and second prizes on the best cigars and a medal for the best general exhibit. There were two other tobacco entries. The message also says the pears sent by D. L. Campbell got second prize over all competitors from every section of Texas. The tobacco and other exhibits from this county are attracting more attention than any other, being better located too, and the interest in the tobacco industry is very great. The advertising matter is being handed out on every hand and people seem pleased to get hold of it. An additional shipment of the leaflets and post cards were sent this afternoon to Mr. Hall.

W. I. Perry Wins the Medal.

The second contest of the Nacogdoches County Debaters Union was held last night at Shady Grove, under the auspices of the County Union. President Lee Carter of Cushing presided at the meeting and in addition to other features, several short talks were made by W. E. Fezell, A. L. Harris, Lee Carter and Sharp McNeil. Music was furnished by the Faulkner Orchestra, with singing by W. E. Fezell, Sharp McNeil, Joe R. Day and Eddie Day. The subject for discussion was "Resolved that the state of Texas should establish and maintain an A. & M. College in every Senatorial District. The speakers were: affirmative, —W. T. Petty, representing Nacogdoches; Eddie Day, representing Shady Grove. Negative. — Robert Coats, representing Fairview; Fulton Fuller, representing Appleby. The decision of the judges was favorable to the affirmative and W. T. Petty was declared the winner of the medal offered by the Farmers & Merchants State Bank for the most logical speech. A large crowd was in attendance at the meeting.

She did not come into the room until I had been talking for some time, and evidently did not get anything like all that I said on any subject, but I presume that your reader will understand this fully. If they should not, they would be warranted in concluding that my speech was even more hurried and disconnected than it was. If you should have occasion to refer to the speech again, I would thank you to call attention to the fact that the extracts are incomplete and disconnected.

I am not sure than I will be in the race for Congress, but I am much inclined to enter the contest and will do so if circumstances take favorable shape. I hope to visit Nacogdoches county and become better acquainted with your people during the present fall and winter. When a convenient occasion presents itself, I will be glad to embrace the opportunity of outlining my views fully. I do not wish to go to Congress in any capacity other than as the representative of the whole people of the district. The opposite theory is born of bad faith, and will result in ruin for the party and bad government for the people.

I believe that the use of large sums of money by candidates for office is hurtful to the people, because it tends to corruption, excludes many good men from the public service, and weakens sound public sentiment in its never-ceasing contest against the power of money and corruption.

I am a Democrat, and believe in party loyalty. Should I become convinced that the party is not the friend of the people, I would quit it, as many honest men did a few

NACOGDOCHES county will make as many bales of cotton this season as she did last, and is getting fifty per cent more for the product. This old county is the best ever and has a magnificent future,—if her citizens will push it along.

With cotton selling around thirteen and a half cents a pound and a pretty full crop for this county, farmer folks are living off the fat of the land and adding materially to their bank accounts. It is a good thing to live in the best country in the world.

That advertising at the Dallas fair is going to be worth many thousands of dollars to this section, and will no doubt result in lots of new comers. But the fact that the advertising has been done does not mean that all work necessary is at an end. It is up to the citizenship to keep it moving and talk the good qualities of this city and section at every opportunity.

If there ever was a section of country that has been discriminated against in freight and passenger rates, it is East Texas,—or at least this particular portion. It is unjust, wholly without reason, and some action must be taken in reference to this matter. Traveling men complain as well as citizens, and all realize strongly the one sidedness of the affair. The rate committee of the Commercial Club should take it up with the rail road commission at once.

RIBBON cane crops are somewhat short in this section this season, but there will be lots of syrup making just the same when the proper time comes. The acreage was greatly increased this year, and all who planted will have syrup enough for home consumption. The shortage however will be felt with the people who heretofore have been in the habit of buying the genuine goods. Nacogdoches county is merely unfortunate this year on the cane proposition, and a still larger acreage will be put in in 1910.

THE recently appointed Fire Rating Board is going at their work just as lots of other fellows on the State's pay roll. They have selected a number of the larger cities in which to hold their meetings and to investigate rates; and nine times out of ten those cities will get some benefits. So much labor will be attached to their places however, that to get to the smaller cities will be an impossibility, and the folks in these places will continue to pay the high rates. Nacogdoches,—as well as many other cities—is entitled to consideration, but chances are our people will keep on paying the freight, despite the Fire Rating Board.

## SOLID EAST TEXAS.

The Southwest.

The value of cut-over pine lands for agricultural purposes, has been exploited this season as never before in East Texas. The efforts of the lumber people to secure settlers and cultivators for this East Texas land on which once grew the sturdy yellow pine, have been justified in the fullest measure by the results of the present season in Texas crops. East Texas is the only portion of this great state that has produced what might be called even a fair crop this year, and the difference is more glaring from the fact that the piney woods land have produced the greatest crop of cotton, corn and truck that has ever been known, at the same time that the crops are almost a total failure in all other portions of the state, even the famous black land country, where land sells at a fabulous price.

Those who have traveled over East Texas this month say that the crop is nothing short of wonderful. There is a magnificent cotton crop, and such corn has never before been known east of the black lands. It is the best crop on record, and the beauty of it is that the failure of the crop in other parts of the state has raised the price of both corn and cotton wonderfully, and this makes a perfect harvest for the East Texas farmer, who has a bumper crop, selling at the highest market prices. The big East Texas crop is not confined to any particular portions of the district, but is general throughout the timbered section. A line drawn from Houston to Texarkana, from Texarkana to Orange, and from Orange to Houston, will enclose a triangle that has made a bumper crop, and this district is larger than many of the fair-sized states of the union.

The reason for this is supposed to be the fact that timber brings and fosters moisture, and on this moisture the crops of the timbered district have thrived, while in all other portions of the southwest the sun has burned up the crops. There has been no more rain in East Texas than there was in Western, Northern, Southern and Central Texas. One of the saw-mill companies reports that they have had but one genuine rain in over a year, at their mill and yet the farmers in that vicinity have a magnificent crop of both cotton and corn. This is true of practically the whole eastern part of the state. There has been no rain, but the moisture that clings to the timbered sections has kept the life in the crops, and the farmers have prospered.

A well known magazine writer recently took exception to the often reiterated statement of the forestry bureau of the United States government to the effect that forests and trees bring and foster moisture and that if you want good crops, plant trees around your fields. The doubts expressed by this writer are totally dispelled by the crop that East Texas has produced this very year, and have been

previously dispelled by thousands of illustrations of a like character.

The moral of this all is, exploit your cut-over timber lands. They will produce better crops than any other land in the entire state, not omitting the black lands or any other. No such thing as a total crop failure in East Texas will be known, for even without rain there will always be moisture enough to keep the crops alive. Exploit farms in East Texas, and this part of the state will build up wonderfully.

With the advance of the dairy industry there should come, too, a great advance in the consumption of dairy products of the state. In comparison with their food value there is not enough of the products of the dairy now used. The necessity for bringing butter and cheese from other states with the added freight charges has put these foods out of the reach of many who now should know their value.—Beaumont Enterprise.

## INTERVIEW WITH MR. CLARIDGE.

"Every thing indicates a strong movement of new people to East Texas this winter and as a rule they are coming from the timbered districts of other states which means that they will not only be easier to locate, but understanding East Texas conditions are more likely to succeed. The various sections of East Texas will get these people in about the same ratio that they go after them. The joint Immigration Bureau of the Gould Southwestern Lines is spending a large amount of money making known the advantages of East Texas, but not being in the land business, must depend upon the people interested in the settlement and development of East Texas to get in behind this work by active co-operation. What would do the Grapeland section more good right now than anything else would be the organization of a development company to list, advertise and sell lands in this section, fortified by an expense fund to go after and bring the people in. Beside the benefit to this section, it would make them more money in a year than would their business, which would run along the same. I could aid such a concern greatly by putting them in touch with people interested in Texas and in the arrangement of out of state agencies to aid them."

In view of the fact that the crops over other parts of Texas are short. East Texas is enjoying prosperity in the way of harvesting a very bountiful yield. — Grapeland Messenger.

## THE SCANDALOUS CONDITION OF TEXAS JAILS.

In a communication which Mr. George A. Carden addressed to The News a few days ago he protested severely, but none too severely, against the sanitary and hygienic conditions of the Dallas County jail. Mr. Carden said that three prisoners had contracted tuberculosis and died of the disease, and that fact he considered as proof of a social crime.

News quite agrees with this verdict, drastic as it is. But what makes the matter worse, the condition of the Dallas county jail is not exceptional; or if it is, the difference is favorable to it. We venture to say that, however bad the condition of the Dallas Conditions of the Dallas county jail may be, they are at least no worse than those in half the jails in Texas. The fact is—and it were well we stripped it of the concealment of soft words—that our treatment of prisoners in county jails is little better than barbarous. What exceptions there are, are just few enough to emphasize the rule. We do not, to be sure, beat, starve or kill outright those whom we imprison in jails; but, for the most part, we subject them to conditions that not only make living a torture to the man of even ordinary sensibilities, but expose them to the dangers of deadly disease. Lacking even the most ordinary means of ventilation and lacking the commonest methods of sanitation, we lock men up in an atmosphere so laden with disease that only the hardest—and the luckiest—can hope to escape a fatal infection. Damning as even that criterion would be, we can not measure our sin by the number of men who actually die on our hands. Many we release from jail after we have kept them only long enough to infect them with disease. Many others are convicted and survive their penitentiary terms only to be

released to die of a disease contracted in the jails. The freedom we give such after they have paid the penalty of their crimes is a mockery. Such we formally adjudge deserving only of a term of confinement, but in reality, pending the determination of their crime, we have informally sentenced them to death by lingering process. If this fact were not so certainly the result of insensate negligence, an unfriendly critic might suspect us of a desire to make away with men whom we lack the courage to condemn.

Doubtless these words will shock many ears; but if they shall shock men and women of Texas into a sense of the enormity, of the wrong we do the prisoners in our jails, any slight exaggeration will be abundantly atoned. For this is one of those great wrongs which react hard to the hurt of those who themselves do the wrong. The existence of such conditions dulls the popular sense of justice, weakens the people's power of perception, and, we have no doubt, speaking more concretely, the vile condition of the ordinary jail operates often to defeat the ends of lawful justice.

This is not a criticism of jailors, who in most cases do the best they can with the means and provisions at hand, but of the whole people of any county in which the bad conditions exist. — Galveston News.
