Well Known Citizen and Merchant of Attoyac Died Here Sunday Night—Was Buried at Black Jack.

After having been confined to his bed for some time with a malady that baffled all medical skill, Mr. Joe M. Fuller, a well known citizen and prominent merchant of Attoyac, this county, died in this city Sunday night at 7 o'clock. Mr. Fuller was conscious up to the last hour of his life and made all arrangements for the proper disposition of his estate and the settlement of his business affairs. 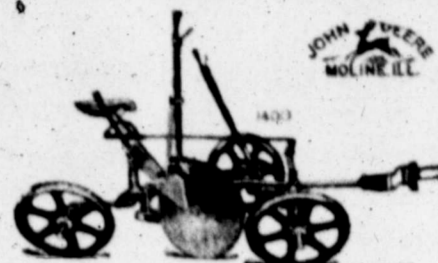

TEXAS POLITICS AND POLITICIANS.

In this day and time things are strenuous in Texas. Fifteen cent cotton, high price beef, top notch porkers, seventy-five cent corn, three hundred dollar broom corn, money making East Texas tobacco, and the side dishes at equally as expensive prices, seem to cut no figure with the people, for they are politically as wild as a West Texas broncho on a New Mexico ranch. We talk about New York City politics with the various lights and kaleidoscopic views; we picture Colorado and her many phases of dealings, from constable to congressman; we open our eyes in astonishment at the situation in far off old California; we throw verbal spasms when Oklahoma, Kansas and some other Commonwealths are mentioned; but we forget Texas,—the peer of them all in a sense, and different politically from any and all of the rest. The gubernatorial situation is occupying the center of the stage at present, and will continue to do so, no doubt, but there are many other lesser lights that promise to add color later on and at the proper time. Cone Johnson, a native son of East Texas, the section that has furnished more Governors than all the rest put together, is in the arena for all he's worth,—and then some. An avowed state-wider and who seems to have the endorsement of that sentiment from all points of the compass, has already begun an active campaign. William Poindexter, the Johnson county giant, man of sterling worth, exponent of Senator Bailey and his virtues, a bed fellow of Cone Johnson on the prohibition question, is aspiring. Gus Shaw, the Red River planter, banker, farmers union man, and Lord only knows what else, is shying his castor into the whirligig ring, and seeks support from "the common people." M. M. Brooks, a prohibitionist, and likewise an anti-prohibitionist, one time candidate for the place and a long time judge of law and dealer of bar justice, is of the "Barkus is willing" type. Oscar B. Colquitt, railroad Commissioner, ex-country editor, hobnobber, rail-road, anti-railroad, and given up as the best "politician" in the "hull" of the Lone Star State, wants to be Governor of the great and glorious Texas. He is an out-

and out anti. A local optionist but utterly opposed to state wide prohibition, and a believer in "a drink is a drink" when you want it. There are some others being talked, but that is the record to date.

The one faction has almost settled on Johnson and the other faction is backing Colquitt. It is to be a question of the "survival of the fittest" and it looks that the thing will be settled in Texas this coming election. R. V. Davidson is not mentioned much. He has an enviable record as attorney general. He went through the storm a year ago, with extremely severe odds against him,—and won out. He is being pushed by his friends for Governor, but Davidson is quiet. Awaiting developments possibly, and maybe too busy with official duties to get into the bubble yet. But the chances are that Davidson will not be a candidate.

It looks very much as if the dye is cast and that the present runners will be the only entries. At the eighth mile post some will drop, at the quarter others will get down and before the race is done, Colquitt and Johnson will be the two candidates representing the two factions said to be in existence in the so-called Democratic party in Texas. Brooks had a pretty strong following at one time but he changed his coat recently and thus shelved lots of his admiring admirers. Poindexter is too young. Not in years nor experience,—but in state politics. He got his schooling during the Bailey investigation and graduated when Bailey and Johnson pulled feathers. He is entirely too young to be matched against such experienced politicians and Colquitt and Johnson,—or even Brooks. Shaw made a whirlwind trip over a strip of big Texas to feel the pulse. He returned to his cotton growing bottom farm a much wiser man. It is likely that he will not even start. Brooks is out of the question, and maybe the race. He drops out at the quarter post, and may go farther than some of the others. It's Colquitt and Johnson to the finish. Colquitt,—pro-Bailey, anti-prohibitionist. Johnson,—anti-Bailey, prohibitionist. The lesser lights in Texas will be vaudeville compared with these. Truly politics in Texas are peculiar.

THE "PORE MAN'S KENTRY."

Editor Claridge of the Southwestern Farmer, published at Houston, is a plain, practical man, and as full of progressive ideas as needs be. He is an excellent editor too, and tells some truths that ought to be read, reread and absorbed by a few of our so called "tillers of the soil" in this country. We've often heard the remark that has prompted the following article from the pen of Editor Claridge, and have just as often wondered why it was made,—unless for the same reason as is expressed. East Texas is a great country and no denying it,—but now in the common sense any person of average intelligence can call it the "pore man's kentry" any more than a rich man's country, is too deep for solution. We endorse the article in every respect and by way of emphasis add that if East Texas had a big bunch of progressives,—instead of a few,—things would change so rapidly that the scratching, existing, work-four-months-in-the-year-farmer would either have to get down to business or hunt a new location. Editor Claridge says:

I am getting tired of hearing East Texas called the "best 'pore' man's kentry on earth." In a sense this is true, because a lazy man can scratch a half starved living out of it with less labor than in any country on earth. Knowledge of this fact has brought too many of this class of people into it—people who would starve to death almost anywhere else; who skin a rented hill and then hunt another hill to skin; who, at a critical juncture in the career of their "craps" load the "old 'oman" and the "younguns" into a ramshackle wagon, pulled by a pair of ewe-necked, cat hammered bronchos, and go off on a visit to their wife's relations; who promote the Kansas flour and Mississippi bacon industries, by "totting" home a little old short weight 25-pound sack of meal adulterated Kansas flour, and a slug of Missouri sow-side, which looks as if it had been "swallowed" a couple of times, and all this in a land where a few thrifty, moneymaking people are growing big crops and the cheapest pork on earth.

I have a well grounded suspicion that this expression, the "Best 'Pore' Man's Kentry on Earth," has had no little to do with bringing in a class of "tramp farmers" the last few years who are worth more to a country when out of it than when in it—in other words, a class hunters and fishers night riders, who are never "in it," and whose anemic wives and watery kids, fed upon "fry" and soggy biscuits, "made up" with alum baking powder, and who drink water from the branch, or from shallow wells, catching the drain from a dirty yard or

BECAUSE men are in the penitentiary is no reason they should be treated like brutes. They are still human beings, and worthy an extraordinary effort to make them useful citizens. Many of them are

cowlot, give employment to the doctors, and color to the hallucination that the country is "onhealthy." Indeed, I am afraid the time worn expression does still more harm by keeping out of the country a class of well-to-do people needed to develop its possibilities. I do mean, necessarily, rich people, though there is perhaps no more inviting field for the capitalist in Uncle Sam's broad domain. I mean people who may have more children than they have room for, and who can sell high priced farms where they are, and come with money and energy enough to get out of this country what a few moneymaking country people in almost every neighborhood are beginning to get out of it.

Nor do I mean by this to discourage the man of very small means, if he is of character likely to succeed anywhere in the wide world. If he brings fair intelligence, a strong will and reasonable industry, he can get a home easier here and secure independence quicker than in any country of which I have knowledge. But he must be a soil-builder instead of a soil-skinner; he must grow his living, selling more than he buys; his phisic must consist of good water and good living; he must have some black pigs in a Bermuda pasture, instead of a lot of razorbacks sleeping under the house; he must build his wife a fowl house, so the "varmint" won't "ketch" her chickens; he must work during the day and sleep during the night, instead of sleeping most of the day and riding a sore-backed broncho most of the night.

This sort of "pore" man can come to Eastern Texas without a dollar and in five years be owner of 200 acres, improved and paid for, and, unless the physicians of this region, who, by the way, stand as high professionally and in point of integrity as men of their profession anywhere, are at fault, he will, if he lives half as well as he may, have as good health, rear as big, good looking children, and as many of them, as in any country which receives rainfall enough to render it a safe crop country.

Because a half-human blur upon the face of nature can make a few rented acres of sandy, East Texas hillside, the basis of credit for a meager living at the country store, with the expenditure of less "elbow-grease" and gray matter than anywhere else on earth, the fact should emphasize the opinion of this scribe that the thrifty, intelligent hustler, with a nose for cowpeas, red cattle, black pigs, Bermuda grass and other phases of new crop diversification, will get rich a little faster in East Texas than anywhere upon the mundane spheroid.

ABOUT NACOGDOCHES TOBACCO

Two Kinds, Havana and Sumatra, Shown in Various Stages of Preparation for Consumption.

Dallas News.

An interesting exhibit in Agricultural Hall is the display of tobacco raised in Nacogdoches county which is in charge of J. T. Hall. Two kinds of tobacco, Havana and Sumatra, in its various stages of preparation for consumption, are shown. Bales ready for the Eastern market, growing plants of Havana tobacco, bottles of seed, "hands" of the Sumatra and Havana, and the finished product, are shown.

Tobacco raising has already come to be an important industry in Nacogdoches county. Mr. Hall says that last year there were nearly 300 acres grown in that county, being nearly twice as much as was grown the preceding year. The land produces from 800 to 1,200 pounds per acre, and most of the growers sell the product in the green stage, getting 15c to 17c for the Havana and 40c to 50c for the Sumatra. Of the 300 acres only about 30 or 40 acres were in Sumatra tobacco.

The following statistics are taken from a folder which Mr. Hall is distributing to those who may become curious about Nacogdoches county:

"The Government reports show the Nacogdoches product to be the very finest quality grown in the United States: Some statistics as to acreage and returns of a few growers are:

C. J. Shoener, 5 acres, \$721.80; J. E. Reese, 3 acres, \$400.70; G. R. Reese, 1 1-4 acres, \$180; B. F. McBee, 4 acres, \$471; H. Nabors, 1 acre, \$100; W. A. King, 10 acres, \$880; N. T. Sisco, 5 acres, \$618.99; J. H. Halton, 4 acres, \$796; Eugene Muckleroy, 3 1-4 acres, \$672; J. R. Richardson, 3 acres, \$386; Frank Power, 5 acres, \$548; J. H. Boozer, 5 1-2 acres, \$278; D. W. Muckleroy, 1 acre, \$125; H. M. Boozer, 2 acres, \$249; W. F. Doss, 1 acre, \$135; D. W. Lanier, 1 acre, \$90.

"The United States Government Tobacco Demonstration and Experimental Farm is located here."

The Havana is grown in the open, where it can be reached by the sun. It is used for making the filler or inside of the cigar. The product grown in Nacogdoches county has been pronounced by experts to be equal to that grown in Cuba.

The Sumatra tobacco is grown from the seed and under a slatted shade. It is used for the wrapper and is a very high priced quality. In 1907 the United States was put to the necessity of importing 40,000,000 pounds of Sumatra tobacco for home consumption. The duty on that tobacco is \$1.85 per pound, and it sells in the United States from \$1 to \$3 per pound, according to the quality.

These plants are shown growing in boxes of Nacogdoches County soil. There are also boxes of seed, the very tiniest plant seed to be imagined. Then there are "hands" of tobacco already fermented and "hands" which have not been fermented.

The tobacco seed are grown in beds and when the plants are four or five inches high they are set in rows. This is done by machinery. Then they are cultivated like garden truck. In former years the "worming" of the tobacco fields was quite a job, but now this is done by blow guns, which distribute a powder poisonous to the worms, and one man can handle about ten acres per day with these blow guns.

When the Sumatra tobacco "buttons," it is topped off and then the "suckers" are pulled from it. Then one by one as the leaves mature they are pulled off and put on strings and hung in a specially constructed barn for curing.

The stalks of the Havana tobacco are cut and dried in the barns and tied into hands or bundles. These barns are specially constructed, and it usually costs 15c per pound to dry and ferment the shade-grown tobacco and 10c per pound for the open grade.

Then follows a process of fermentation in a specially constructed house. The tobacco is put in in bulk and kept until it reaches a temperature of 120 degrees, when it is turned outside and the inside is heated. This process is repeated at definite periods for several weeks, when the tobacco is taken out and assorted according to lengths and colors, then baled and put on the market.

Report of Cotton Yards.

Following is the report of the three cotton yards of the city, the amount of cotton received to date:

Lock's yard weighed this year 2979.
Weighed last year to same time 2389.
Taylor's yard weighed 1195.
Unable to secure last year receipts.
Sanders & Murphey, 1802.
Weighed last year to date 1759.

The total of 5916 have been received up to date this year which excels the receipts to this time last year. Many are reported to be holding their cotton and at the end of the season it is thought that Nacogdoches will market much more cotton than last year.

NACOGDOCHES COUNTY COURT

Convenes Monday, November 15th, for Full Three Weeks Term.—Settings of the Several Dockets.

County Court convenes Monday, November 15, 1909, for the full three weeks term of work.

The jury civil docket will be taken up the first day of the first week, and will have precedence for that week if the docket requires it. The non jury civil docket will be taken up Thursday of first week, or on any later day of said week, and tried during remainder of first week, subject to the completion of the jury civil docket, as mentioned above.

All non jury civil cases not disposed of during first week, will be postponed to Thursday of third week, and said civil cases will have the right of way Thursday and Friday of third week.

The criminal docket will be taken up Monday, November 22, of second week, and will be tried during the entire second week and first three days of third week.

Defendants and witnesses in criminal cases will be expected to be in attendance upon the court the first day of the criminal docket, unless their cases have been definitely set by the court to some subsequent day, in which latter event they will attend on the particular day set. The cases on both the civil and criminal dockets will be tried unless there are good reasons for not trying same.

Probate business can be attended to at intervals during the entire term.

Motions for new trials will be heard on last day of third week.

Primary Election Laws.

Let parties choose their candidates if they wish them. Do it in their own way, and at their own expense, instead in the name of the State and at the expense of the tax payers. But the people appear to have lost all of the spirit of 1776. They stand for party regardless of principle. All right thinking men know that we have no Republican or Democratic form of government. We have a form of government that is controlled and run in the interest of ungly trusts, combines and corporations. No man with common horse sense can't deny the truth of the above statement and if the people do not awake and turn away from party loyalty and unite and contend for their constitutional rights and the principals of pure unadulterated democracy I fear their rights and liberties will soon be gone forever for the money power controls nominations and elections. They carry the Republican party in one pocket and the so called Democratic party in the other. Our official as a rule are not servants of the people. Corporations elect them by deceiving the people and by the corrupt use of money. They are not under any obligations to the people for they know how they obtained their office. Therefore they labor in the interest of trust combines and corporations, and pass any laws that the combined money powers want or demand. The people must unite and choose their own candidates as our Fathers did. Then the officers served the people faithfully and honestly, and there was liberty for all.

THE BUILDING OF GOOD ROADS

Superintendent Will McMillan, With His Crew of Hands, Has Completed the Two and a Half Mile Strip West of the City—Citizens Are Delighted With the New Order of Things and are Urging More Improvements

The clay-sand road west of the city, from the corporation line,—Mile Branch,—to a point two and a half miles, and near the J. P. Clevenger place, has been completed, and W. E. McMillan, county road superintendent, with his crew of hands, is ready to go to other parts of the county to do similar work. The road, before this work, was considered one of the very worst sand beds in this section, to say nothing of the county, and the improvement has proven a boom for good roads in this county. The people west of the city, who have occasion to travel over it, are extremely well pleased. They see plainly the difference and are henceforth and forever pledged for good roads in Nacogdoches county. Where they pulled one bale of cotton, sand half way to the hubs and sometimes a stalled team, now three and four bales can be hauled in a trot. This is not an exception on just some portions of the road, but the rule over all of it, and even the hills are 200 per cent improved. This has possibly been the cheapest constructed road in the county, though the work is far ahead of some in other sections. Considerable difficulty was encountered in building the road, in the beginning, but during the past few weeks work has been much easier, clay some better, the haul more advantageous etc., though the sand became deeper the farther this way the work was done.

There are five different kinds of clay used on this road, and each one seems almost as good as another. However, the very red clay has settled smoother so far, than the grey. Only two of these kinds were found by the road, the others being hauled for some distance. The road hands, Mr. McMillan says, have done some excellent work on this strip, and it is his opinion that it is ahead of the Government piece of road east of the city. There has been a disadvantage in one way, with this Douglass road,—though some people look on it as an advantage. Since its beginning there has been scarcely any rain. The travel over it has been heavy and the road is pretty well packed, but rain would have helped considerably. Of course it would have been muddy during a rainy spell, but the packing would have been so much more solid. People should not make the mistake of believing that sand-clay roads should not get muddy. They will get muddy, and bad

muddy too, but after a time they will settle, become rather hard, and somewhat glazed, and act to a great extent as a mud-absorbent. Mr. McMillan has done a fine piece of work on that road. Folks here in town can't realize it like the folks who have traveled through the sand bed for so many years, and then happen onto a hard, smooth, easy going thoroughfare. The people in that section of the county are jubilant over the few miles of good road, and the venture is made that they are enthusiastic for more. The completion of this two and a half miles makes practically a good road from San Augustine to Alto, forty miles or more. It means that all along that road improvements will be better and more rapid with the farmers. The question of raising stuff is not the only one. There is the question of getting the stuff to market too,—and as important one as growing. The two and a half miles have cost not exceeding \$1400—a very low figure when compared with the result. Not a single complaint has been heard,—nor even rumored. People, lots of them, ride or drive out of their ways to go over the new road. It's easier on their teams; quicker; more comfort; cheaper,—and really enjoyable. Mr. McMillan is efficient in road building, and no disputing that fact. He has been right with the work for several years, it might be said, and knows the county from a road construction standpoint. It is well that he is in the charge, and it would certainly be well that the road building be continued. Nacogdoches county needs more and needs them badly. It will be the making of this county, agriculturally, commercially and socially.

The cry is give us more good roads. Right here too it might be suggested that the city should now get into harness and build clay on the sand from the corporation line,—Mile Branch,—to the top of the hill. That is the only bad place on the road till far beyond the Moral. Just this side of the Moral there are some gullies and wobbling ditches, ruts etc, to be fixed, but that will take but a short time,—the clay road is already there. People along the good road say it has already been worth hundreds of dollars, and if that is correct it will be worth thousands in the future.

"Investigating committees" have grown to be a habit in Texas. For the last several years the state has been burdened with "investigating committees" and there is yet the single one to result in any changes in matters put under the microscope. From this distance it looks as if the "penitentiary investigating committee" is uncovering things of a rather startling nature, but what good will come is yet to be seen. Any way it is plain that conditions are not what they should be.
